
ratepayers about what it intended to do.

Coalition forced to make tough decisions

SINCE its election in The mode may change, to V/Line operations, October 1992 the Victorian Coalition Government has been forced to make some tough decisions, a number of which have presented real challenges to the people of North Western Province.

To those people, particularly in the more isolated areas, there is a perception that rural Victoria is absorbing all of the pressure, which is not correct when we address the whole picture.

May I take the liberty of highlighting some positive points for rural Victoria which often get lost in the negative presentation portrayed in our media?

SOME POSITIVE POINTS (1) Whilst not m

(5) Major breakthrough in Government funding to Bush Nursing Hospitals.

(6) Exempt stamp duty on the transfer of family farms between family members.

(7) Rural municipalities received 100% of their allocation of road funding whereas metropolitan municipalities received 92%.

(8) Rural politicians have researched and produced a discussion document of netrol pris

whereas Commonwealth off-road rebates do not apply, which is a clear anomaly.

(10) The Government commitment to Salinity Plans such as the launch of the Kerang Lakes and Nyah to the SA border programs, will benefit rural Victoria.

(11) The Corporatisation of our Ports of Melbourne, Geelong and Portland, will increase our international competitiveness.

(12) The launch of Food Victoria that is headed up by my colleague Barry Steggall, is at last a clear recognition of the value of rural products to Victoria
