

Worksafe investigating death at Koonoomoo orchard

WORKSAFE is investigating the death of a worker during an irrigation installation at an orchard at Koonoomoo last Thursday.

WorkSafe said it is believed the 49-year-old man, who was working alone, was handling a 6.5 metre length of aluminium pole when electricity from an overhead powerline passed through it, causing electrocu-

He was found deceased by a colleague about 2pm on Friday after being reported missing.

The death is the 36th confirmed workplace fatality for 2025.

There were 38 work-related deaths at the same time last year.

FIRE WATCH

Driver flees after car hits tree

LOCAL CFA brigades have responded to seven incidents over the past week.

Last Wednesday, September 10, at 11.50am, Wunghnu Fire Brigades was called to assist Katandra and Tallygaroopna Fire Brigades at a tractor fire in a paddock at Jutland Road, Invergordon, between Bedford and Church Roads. A farmer was cooking corn for the sheep and the fire got away, burning some hay and a tractor.

At 10.40pm last Thursday, Yarroweyah, Strathmerton and Cobram Fire Brigades turned out to a grass fire on an orchard at Kenny Road, Yarroweyah. A heap of rubbish was being burnt and the embers set fire to grass and a tree.

On Saturday, at 25 minutes after midnight, Naring Fire Brigade was called to do a wash

away because of an accident at Singapore Road, Naring. A vehicle had run into a tree, and the driver had left the scene. Police were in charge, and when the scene was made safe, Naring was

Then at 12.50pm, Cobram, Yarroweyah and Strathmerton Fire Brigades responded to an alarm at Ottery Homes, Campbell Drive, Cobram. This was a false alarm.

On Sunday, at 11.40pm, Katunga, Numurkah, Strathmerton, Yarroweyah and Muckatah Fire Brigades turned out to a reported house fire at Numurkah Road, Katunga, between Sandmount Road and Spences Road. When Katunga arrived on scene the occupier had the fire out. All other brigades were cancelled. The fire was in a shed

where a solar panel inverter had caught fire, burning the wiring and part of a wall of the shed.

At 7.20am on Monday, Yarroweyah and Strathmerton Fire Brigades were called out to a truck leaking fuel on the Goulburn Valley Highway, two kilometres north of the Murray Valley Highway. Shepparton's Hazardous Materials vehicle also attended.

Later, at 4.15pm, Cobram and Yarroweyah Fire Brigades turned out to a motor vehicle accident at the corner of the Murray Valley Highway and Campbell Road, Cobram. There were no serious injuries. The fire brigade remained on scene until a heavy haulage tow truck arrived to move the truck off the road.

Girls are seeking homelessness support alone, while thousands of under-fives also look to services for support

GIRLS are seeking homelessness support alone, while thousands of under-fives also look to services for support.

As the nation marks National Child Protection Week, Barnardos Australia (Barnardos) has released fresh analysis revealing the shocking reality for children facing

In June 2025, 28,279 children went to a specialist homelessness service for help. Concerningly, 30 per cent of them were under the age of five, a further 27 per cent were aged five to nine.

Barnardos frontline worker Eliza Gibbs said this should be a massive wake up call for governments and communities.

Thousands of children, who are in many cases leaving unsafe home environments, are winding up homeless. Children are not bystanders to crises like homelessness and family violence, they are also victims-survivors, and we cannot stand for that as Australians," Ms Gibbs said.

New snapshot analysis of the latest Australian Institute of Health and Welfare data released by Barnardos Australia last week shows girls are significantly overrepresented when it comes to children seeking help without a parent or guardian. In 2023-24, 13,300 unaccompanied children accessed specialist homelessness services, and 63 per cent were female.

"If we are going to protect children, we need to ensure families have safe and secure housing, but we also need child-focused support and early intervention programs to protect children facing family violence and homelessness," Ms Giibbs

"Children who experience these unhinkable kinds of challenges early on ın life, will be more likely to end up in a cycle of homelessness and poverty. We must break that cycle for our nation's children," Eliza Gibbs said.

Barnardos Australia is urgently calling

for action from governments, including:

- Recognising children and young people as equal victims of domestic and family violence in policy, programs and service delivery so that they receive trauma-informed counselling and support when they most need it
- Recognising children as equal victims of domestic and family violence in legislation to trigger dedicated support and prevention programs
- · Increasing investment in social and affordable housing to ensure parents and guardians can provide a safe and secure home for their children
- Increasing funding for more specialist child domestic and family support workers and trauma-informed counselling for children, beyond refuges to include Barnardos Children's Family Centres
- Lifting of JobSeeker and other income supports so no child has to face going without food or a safe home

Snapshot analysis key findings:

- 28,279 children received support from specialist homelessness services in June 2025. 30 per cent were aged 0-4 and 27 per cent were 5-9.
- 13,300 unaccompanied children sought help in 2023-24. 94 per cent presented alone and 6 per cent in a group of
- Among unaccompanied children who were homeless at the start of support, fewer than one in five were housed at the end, while about 77 per cent remained without secure housing.
- Girls are over-represented among unaccompanied children, with females comprising 63 per cent in 2023-24, up from
- Interpersonal relationship issues were the main reasons unaccompanied children sought assistance, with family and domestic violence and relationship breakdown prominent drivers.

Moira resale sheds diverting tonnes of waste from landfill

THE Resale Shed at Cobram Resource Recovery Centre is celebrating a year in business - a year in which it has diverted 80 tonnes from landfill whilst providing affordable household goods to local families.

Since opening its doors on August 28, 2024, the Cobram Resale Shed has transformed potential waste into community treasures, with 67 bicycles finding new riders, 155 chairs taking pride of place in local homes, and 648 books starting new chapters with eager readers. The milestone comes as both Cobram and Numurkah

Resale Sheds combined have achieved remarkable environmental and economic outcomes, diverting 161.45 tonnes from landfill, saving over \$52,000 in disposal costs.

Moira Shire Council Chair Administrator Dr Graeme Emonson PSM said the Resale Shed's success demonstrated the community's strong commitment to sustainability and resourcefulness.

'What we're seeing is the circular economy in action, where surplus items become essential household goods for local families," Dr Emonson said.

"Although these are just some examples, 67 bicycles which found new owners means that children can now ride to school, 155 chairs repurposed means families can gather around dinner tables, and over 76 rehomed doors have helped residents complete home renovations affordably.

"We're building community resilience while ensuring everyone has access to quality household items regardless of their budget."

The environmental impact has been substantial, with sales including 18 pallets of pavers (18 tonnes diverted), 104 garden pots (7 tonnes), 17 wardrobes (9 tonnes), plus tables, stools and BBQs that have found new homes across the shire.

The Resale Shed has also partnered with Cobram Secondary College's pedal program, where students restore donated bicycles while learning valuable repair skills. Dr Emonson encouraged residents to visit the Resale

Sheds to discover bargains and donate quality items they no 'Whether you're hunting for treasures, decluttering re-

sponsibly, or simply curious, the Resale Sheds offer something for everyone," he said. "Drop in your quality pre-loved items and help them find

new homes. Every item saved from landfill is a win for our environment and our community.'

The Cobram Resale Shed opens Wednesdays and Sundays from 10am to 2pm at 64 Pye Road, Cobram East. The Numurkah Resale Shed operates Tuesdays and Saturdays from 10am to 2pm at 367 Naring Road, Numurkah. Both facilities accept EFTPOS only.

Residents can drop off reusable household goods free of charge during operating hours. Items accepted include furniture, kitchenware, toys, books, bicycles, and building materials in good condition. The sheds do not accept baby items, clothing, textiles, mattresses or soft furnishings.

Nathalia local takes on The Long Run after prostate cancer diagnosis

NATHALIA resident John Attwood is taking on The Long Run this September, committing to walking 72km to help raise awareness and funds for men affected by prostate cancer.

The event, led by Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia (PCFA), encourages Australians to cover at least 72km throughout Prostate Cancer Awareness Month – a symbolic distance honouring the 72 men diagnosed with the disease each day.

Mr Attwood said joining The Long Run was a personal decision to make a difference after his own experience with the disease.

"I was diagnosed with prostate cancer three years ago and specialists have been keeping an eye on my PSA levels since then," he said.

"My PSA levels have risen steeply recently, so I have started hormone treatment first followed by a course of radiation.

"There's still a long journey ahead, and it's been a bit of a shock on my wife and four children, but they are very supportive."

Mr Attwood said he's looking forward to tak-

ing part to help raise awareness and vital funds

"Awareness of prostate cancer and early detection is very important. My two sons now have a higher risk of developing the disease, as family history can be a risk factor, so I'm always encouraging them to get tested.

"Through early detection, you have a much better chance of a cure."

Mr Attwood encouraged locals to join him in the fight against prostate cancer by getting involved in The Long Run.

"It's a small sacrifice to make during September, but will make a big difference to those impacted by this disease," he said.

More than 26,000 Australian men are diagnosed with prostate cancer each year. PCFA is on a mission to reach zero deaths from the disease by investing in research, awareness, and vi-

tal support services for men and their families.
PCFA CEO Anne Savage encouraged the community to get on board.

"Prostate cancer is the most commonly diag-

nosed cancer in Australia," Ms Savage said.

"While survival rates are drastically improving, around 4,000 men are still dying from the disease each year.

"It's our goal to invest in lifesaving research and clinical trials that will help save their lives, and in addition, provide access to vital support services to help them navigate this devastating disease."

Ms Savage said that taking part in The Long Run was a practical way for everyday Australians to help join the fight to save more lives.

"We're on a mission to defeat this disease, but we can't do it alone," she said.

"Every Australian has the power to play a part in this fight – whether you raise funds or raise awareness about the disease this September, it all makes a difference."

Levee works impact Melville Street

CONSTRUCTION of Stage One of the Numurkah Flood Mitigation Implementation Project has reached Melville Street, with temporary traffic measures in place to maintain single lane access while works, which continue for some weeks, take place.

Works along Melville and Brenion Streets include:

- Construction of the flood wall and drop-in barrier system across Melville Street.
- Installation of a Wombat crossing to improve pedestrian safety.
- Associated drainage upgrades.
- Reshaping of the adjacent parkland to support cross-land water flow during flood events.

These works are expected to continue through October, after which Melville Street will be reopened to two-way traffic to support community access and upcoming events.

While some works on the eastern side of the levee may still be underway at that time, Moira Shire Council has worked closely with relevant user groups to implement measures that minimise disruption. This includes coordination around key community events such as Show Us Ya Wheels in October and the Numurkah Fishing Club's junior fishing competition in November.

Moira Shire Council told the *Leader* that the redesign of the parkland was a considered decision, developed in consultation with the project's steering committee and the broader community.

"It enables the retention of water in the creek year-round for aesthetic purposes by maintaining the drop bars under the bridge—without compromising the flood resilience of the area," a Moira Shire representative said.

"Council acknowledges the impact these works may have on the community and is actively working to minimise disruptions while ensuring the delivery of this critically needed high-quality, long-lasting infrastructure which will ultimately protect hundreds and houses and businesses in the

Starting conversations to save lives at Katunga on RUOK Day

"BE kind for everyone you meet is fighting a

It's a well known quote that speaks to the fact that being human is complicated, and, as well as we might know someone, we might not know

how hard they're struggling.
That's something that Liana Stanyer from Stanyer Engineering in Katunga never forgets, and every year on the second Thursday in September, RUOK Day, she holds an event to remind locals to check in with each other.

She told the *Leader* she felt it was the least she

"Mental health is so important, but it's something that we, as a society, aren't open enough about," she said.

"I really just want to encourage everyone to ask the question to those around them. Are you OK? And then just listen without judgement. It's really that simple, but it can make a huge difference to someone who is struggling, to know that someone cares and is prepared to listen."

Liana said that the R U OK Day theme "Ask R

U OK? Any Day because life happens every day"

"We should ask the question every day, because someone is struggling every day, and that's why we wanted to do something public, just to get it out there in the open."

Liana said that, because she is open about the issue, she has people in her circle who know they can come to her and she'll be a listening ear.

"You see it a lot in the industries we work with, tradies and farmers. It's that stoic kind of stiff upper lip attitude where you just get on with things and don't complain or burden those around you. That's really not a helpful attitude though; it leaves people isolated and struggling on their

"All a lot of people need is a listening ear, but they don't know how to ask for one."

This year was the fourth year that Stanyer Engineering held their RUOK Day event, providing free coffee and sweet treats to entice people to

stop and have a chat.

"This year has been our biggest turn out yet.

We had over 100 people here before midday," she said.

"We've had a couple of local businesses bring all their employees down here, which is really great to see. If we can get rid of the stigma that comes from talking about mental health, and encourage people to ask each other, and open up to each other, then we can save lives, or just make life easier for people.

"Just the knowledge that there's someone there to listen and it's OK, that can take the shame out of it. Because, struggling with mental health is nothing to be ashamed of, it's just part of being human. There's no reason to hide it if you're struggling, and that's what we want people to know. But a lot of people don't know how to start a conversation, they don't want to be a burden, so having someone ask that simple question - are you okay - gives them an opportunity to open up.

Dementia now leading cause of death for **Australians**

DEMENTIA is now the leading cause of death for Australians, according to the latest update of the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare's (AIHW) Dementia in Australia report.

The update, which was released last week. also found that without a significant intervention, the number of Australians living with dementia will exceed one million by 2065.

Dementia Australia CEO Professor Tanya Buchanan said the report, released in the lead-up to Dementia Action Week (September 15-21), reveals the enormous impact dementia has on Australian families.

"These figures highlight just how many families are impacted by dementia across Australia. Most of us know someone who is or has been impacted by dementia," Professor Buchanan said.

"People affected by dementia often tell us that friends and family drift away after a diagnosis, because they are unsure of how to

"That's why the theme for this year's Dementia Action Week - which starts on Monday 15 September - is 'Nobody can do it alone'. We are challenging Australians to reconnect with someone impacted by dementia to help combat the high levels of social isolation many experience."

Dementia Australia Dementia Advocate Lil Mirtl, who lives with dementia, said the report highlighted how important it was to act now to provide the support and services for people living with dementia.

"We don't have time to feel uncomfortable or awkward about these conversations about dementia - we need to have them now."

"We have to pull together as a community to do this. We can't do it alone as individuals, the government can't do it alone, we need to all act together."

The update to the Dementia in Australia report also revealed that 43 per cent of the dementia burden in Australia can be attributed to six modifiable risk factors: being overweight or obese, physical inactivity, high blood sugar, high blood pressure in midlife, smoking and impaired kidney function.

"With dementia now the leading cause of death for Australians it is more pressing than ever that the federal government commit to funding a national conversation on dementia to raise awareness and promote brain health at all ages," Professor Buchanan said.

"By taking a comprehensive approach to addressing dementia, we can reduce the impact of dementia into the future. With aged care across the country already under pressure, and the number of people living with dementia expected to exceed 1 million by 2065, we simply cannot afford to wait. We call on the government to take decisive action. People living with dementia, their families and carers are depending on us to do this right, and

Tigers take control to end Bombers dream run

WAAIA'S hopes of a completely unbeaten 2025 season culminating in a fourth straight senior premiership flag were brutally dashed on Saturday with a 21 point loss to Katamatite.

The Tigers clinched their first senior grand final win since 2001, and just their fifth in the club's 134 year history, with a 14.6.90 to 10.9.69 win over the Bombers.

In the form spectators have come to expect from Waaia, the Bombers started strong, taking an eight point lead into the first break, courtesy of four straight goals right out of the blocks. Katamatite refused to be walked over however, responding with two goals late in the quarter, including a cracker from the boundary right on the siren.

Things looked like ultimately going Waaia's

way in the second quarter, with Katamatite repeatedly fumbling in front of the goals to slot three behinds, but the Tigers finally found their aim for a major to level the scores at the quarter's half way stage. An answering goal from Waaia, who had also wasted a number of opportunities in the quarter, put them back in front, and allowed them to take a seven point advantage into the main break.

However, they say whoever wins the third quarter wins the game, and so it proved at Deniliquin Memorial Park on Saturday.

Katamatite came out in the third quarter like a different team, all energy and determination, and it quickly showed on the scoreboard. Forward Mitch Coleman rapidly slotted three goals, each followed by exuberant celebrations on and off the field, and when fellow forward Mark Mills responded with another two, it was a whole new ball game.

Finding themselves in an unfamiliar position - the back foot - Waaia's attempts to slow the Tigers' flow fell flat in the face of relentless pressure, and they managed just seven points for the quarter, paling in comparison to Katamatite's 31 which took them into the final break with a 17 point lead.

If the Bombers were hoping to wrest back control, and the lead, those hopes surely began to fade quickly when forward Connor Brown missed two seemingly easy goals in the opening minutes. What was left of those hopes must have evaporated entirely with three goals from the Ti-

gers Mitch Ward, two from Will Gorman, and a beauty from 50 metres out by Toby Kopa.

Responding goals from Waaia stalwarts Jesse Trower and Connor Brown were welcomed by the Waaia faithful, but it was too little too late to turn the tide away from the Tigers, and when the final siren sounded, Katamatite's victory was emphatic.

Waaia's effort and commitment were never in question, but it wasn't enough on the day in the face of a determined Katamatite side who held tightly to control of the game once they'd taken it, with the result a timely reminder that you can't win them all.
