Shire adopts \$47.99 Million Budget



THE Mount Alexander Shire Council has approved a \$47.99 million budget for the 2024/2025 fiscal year, following comprehensive community consultation and feedback.

The budget includes significant investments in infrastructure, community services, and recreation projects. Highlights include \$10.59 million allocated for capital works to enhance roads, bridges, drains, and footpaths. Recreation projects feature an upgrade to the Campbells Creek Recreation Reserve pavilion and the design of new public toilets in Norwood Hill, Newstead, and Harcourt.

Key Initiatives:

- **Flood Protection:** \$2.17 million is earmarked for the construction of Castlemaine and Campbells Creek levees.
- **Heritage and Recreation:** \$314,000 for the continuation of the former Wesleyan Church in Chewton.
- **Community Facilities:** Funding for community buildings, plant and machinery, swimming pools, and road maintenance.
- **Affordable Housing:** An inaugural allocation of \$500,000 to the Mount Alexander Affordable Housing Trust.

The budget supports more than 100 services, including family and children's services, youth programs, aged and disability care, business and economic development, waste

management, library services, and emergency management.

Community Engagement:

Mayor Matthew Driscoll emphasised the importance of community input in shaping the budget. "Community consultation is a big part of the budget process, and I'm pleased that we heard from so many residents about what our community wants and needs," said Mayor Driscoll. Feedback highlighted the need for investment in roads, recreation, parks and gardens, arts and culture, and heritage protection.

The budget also responds to the necessity of affordable housing and increased services for older people and those with disabilities. "I'm proud that we're increasing our expenditure in the next year on assessing and planning services for older people and people with disabilities, to help them live independently," added Mayor Driscoll.

Rate Adjustments:

The budget includes a 2.75% increase in average rates income and waste charges, reflecting the rate cap set by the Victorian Government and rising waste management costs.

Forum for feral deer problem



DRIVERS who frequent bush roads in central Victoria have noticed an increase in wild deer, but deer are not simply an amusing novelty or an excuse to write a punning headline. According to the Invasive Species Council, residents in central Victoria are not imagining an increase in deer. In fact, they are such a serious issue that a forum will be held this weekend to address the issue.

Introduced in the 1880s for game hunting, deer lived fairly benignly in the Victorian bush for 100 years before populations began to boom. Deer hunting is still a popular activity, and according to the Game Management Authority of Victoria there are over 40,000 licensed deer hunters in Victoria. A map of hunting regions at MapshareVic shows that most occurs in the east of the state, and reveals that hunting is permitted (by licensed game hunters under conditions) in Muckleford State Forest and the Sandon State Forest. There is no season for most species of deer or bag limit.

Due to the influence of deer hunters, and despite the known environmental impacts of deer as a destructive, invasive species, the State Government's Victorian Deer Control

Strategy of 2020 stops short of declaring deer a 'pest species'. So while hunting goes some way towards reducing the impacts of increasing deer numbers, it is not enough. The Invasive Species Council website says: "To effectively reduce deer impacts we need the best research and experience to inform well-funded regional control plans."

Meanwhile, residents of regional Victoria are grappling with the impacts of these antlered invaders, including destroyed vegetation in gardens and farms, trampled habitat and danger on the roads. The Victorian Deer Control Community Network, in partnership with Biolinks Alliance and Malmsbury District Landcare, is holding a forum on Sunday to raise awareness and discuss options for addressing the issue. New Bendigo Health Campus Opens

THE State Government has launched the new Bendigo Health Clinical Services Campus, providing a comprehensive range of medical services under one roof. Premier Jacinta Allan and Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards officially opened the \$63.5 million facility, formerly known as the Bendigo Day Rehabilitation Centre, last week.

The centre will offer patients access to a team of dedicated health professionals to aid in recovery from accidents, injuries, and medical conditions such as strokes or heart attacks. The newly opened hydrotherapy pool is the centrepiece of the facility, which also includes outpatient rehabilitation, allied health, dental, mental health, renal dialysis, breast screening, and diabetes education services.

The new campus will streamline access to services, providing seamless care and improving health outcomes. Allied health professionals will benefit from working closely together, enhancing patient care and reducing future hospital re-admissions.

Delivered by the Victorian Health Building Authority in partnership with Bendigo Health and ADCO Group, the

project created around 180 jobs during peak construction. With services now fully operational, the ageing East and North Wing tower buildings will be demolished to create a new green space for patients, visitors, and staff.

This project complements the \$630 million redevelopment of Bendigo Hospital.

Premier Allan stated, "The transformation of the Bendigo Health precinct marks an exciting journey for public healthcare in our region – making it easier for locals to access the care and support they need without having to travel far from home."

Minister for Health Infrastructure Mary-Anne Thomas added, "Providing a range of medical, allied health and rehabilitation services at the one address means locals now have access to a convenient, one-stop-shop for world-class care."

Ms Edwards noted, "The completion of the new campus – including the state-of-the-art hydrotherapy pool – is going to make a big difference in the lives of many locals seeking support as they recover from accidents, injuries, or illness."

IT'S been a bit on the chilly side in the mornings, although perfect for a walk in the forest.

observe the magnificent steam train coming through the bush; it's a photographer's dream. After the clickety-clack, whistle and steam have passed by, the bird life just carries on doing their thing. So, next time it's just 1°C, rug up and embrace the day.

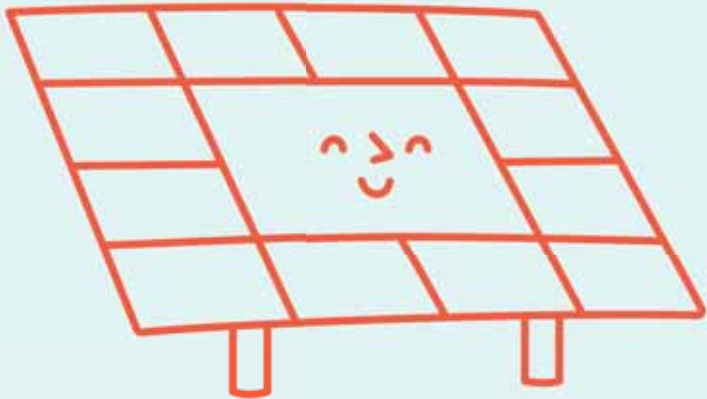

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Remembering Marijke 20.12.1937 – 5.6.2024



PHOTOS of young Marijke Mann (also known as Marijke Margaretha McKelvey-Staal, Marika Maan and Marijke Haakman) reveal that she was absolutely luminous as an actor of stage and screen. More recent photos of Marijke in Maldon, where she lived the later years of her life, show that she continued to glow into old age. Marijke has died at the age of 86 years, after a life filled with travel and drama, and will be fondly remembered by many.

Born in Indonesia, Marijke and her Dutch family fled to Australia when she was five, to escape the Japanese invasion. After her parents separated and the war ended, Marijke and her sister were sent back to the Netherlands to live with their grandparents, where they learnt to speak Dutch and lost their English... before moving to South Africa upon their mother's remarriage and learning it again. In fact, there were so many moves during her childhood that Marijke also learnt Afrikaans and French. Perhaps the ability to successfully step into different spaces and languages contributed to Marijke's skills and interest in acting.

Her thespian life commenced when Marijke was awarded the Queen Elizabeth scholarship to the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts. She earned her living by working as a ground hostess at Heathrow Airport and waitressing, amongst other things; spending her spare change on cheap seats at the theatre.

Much of Marijke's acting took place on stage, where she appeared in theatres all across Europe and England - including the West End – as part of a company formed with her actor husband, John McKelvey. On screen, she appeared in an award-winning film that was made covertly in South Africa to highlight issues of apartheid. In an echo of her own childhood experience, she appeared in the film *Paradise Road* (with Cate Blanchett and Frances McDormand) which portrays prisoners of war in Indonesia. She made appearances in TV shows like *The Avengers*, *Acropolis Now*, *The Flying Doctors*, *A Country Practice* and *Seachange*.

Having arrived in Melbourne in the 1980s to be near John's family, Marijke moved to Maldon after the death of her husband in the late 1990s.

She was active and still acting until late in her life, and even when she was no longer treading the boards, she retained a keen interest in the theatre scene and kept detailed scrapbooks.

"I've performed a Moliere play in Afrikaans in France and stood on a London stage with Laurence Olivier and Michael Redgrave, I've played little places in the Karoo desert in South Africa." Marijke once said. After an exceptionally varied life such as Marijke's was, her scrapbooks must be heavy and fascinating.

Marijke is survived and missed by family members scattered all around the world and friends in Maldon who remember her fondly. A private funeral has been held for Marijke.



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Small ARTWorks pack a BIG punch!

AS part of the Maldon in Winter program MANet Gallery invited 33 local artists to participate in a group show, together with the eight regular MANet artists. The exhibition was opened by Jeff Makin and runs till Sunday 28 July.

A major supporter of the MANet Gallery, Jeff Makin, a grand old man of Australian painting, opened the Exhibition at 3pm last Saturday. Before that, I ventured out to Chewton at 50 km an hour to talk to him about his life's work. His home is an *Aladdin's Cave* of treasures, with works from very famous artists, as well as literally hundreds of his own. We talked about what inspires him.

Formerly a plein air painter, Jeff said "as old age creeps up" he now prefers to sketch from his car, then return to his studio to paint. He added that the reason there are so many artists around this area is that the landscape is so beautiful. Regular places for him are the *Dog Rocks* and the *Silk Worm Factory*, which is a whole other story. He added that there is literally "an artist behind every rock" here.

Jeff has held over 70 solo exhibitions nationally and internationally and has been recognised as one of Australia's leading landscape painters with the monograph *Australia Felix: Landscapes* by Jeffrey Makin, published in 2002. In 2007 a boutique hotel in Melbourne was named in his honour. Alongside his artistic career, Makin has held numerous senior academic appointments and was the senior art critic for the *Herald Sun* for over 10 years. In his opening speech Jeff discussed many of the works on show in relation to the arts and well-known artists in the area, singling a few out as illustrations of his comments.

In order to fit all the artists' works in there was a size limit, no wider than 45 cm, however height could vary. There is an absolute plethora of interesting local artists, some of whom you will know and a few you won't. The range of media is extensive, from oil paint to gouache, watercolour, acrylic and ink, as well as variations on printmaking such as monoprints, lino prints, monotypes and even scratchboard, and of course, sculpture plus a lovely mistletoe burl bowl in wood. Over all there are 94 pieces to choose from.

The artists represented include in no particular order: William Beasley, Damian Callanan, Carol DeGrauw, Linda Dunstan, Mark Fuller, Graeme Galloway, Julie

Goodwin, Geoff Hocking, Karen Holland, Marcus Hotblack, Irena Kaczmarek, Sean Kenan, Cheryl Kennedy, Helen Lehmann, Malini Lewis, Fionna Madigan, Jeff Makin, Gabrielle Martin, Jennifer Merkus, Eva Miller, Janet Neilson, Penny Peckham, Michael Rigg, Eleni Rivers, Ellen Hansa, Jennifer Stewart, Liz Sullivan, Catherine Tait, Liadaan, Carolyn Vickers, Mark Wardle, Smiley Williams, and Selina Wilson.

Local but well-known artists include Ellen Hansa, and Liadaan, as well as the eight MANet Gallery members. Liz Sullivan will also be a familiar name (former student of Jeff's), having just recently exhibited at the Cascade Art Gallery and painted Germaine Greer for the Archibald Portrait Prize, where she was one of the finalists. There are works in a wide variety of media, including both two and three dimensional pieces.

If you haven't seen the *Small ARTWorks* exhibition yet, make sure you drop in to the MANet Gallery, at 27 Main St Maldon between 23 June – 28 July. There is an absolute plethora of small treasures you would like to own.

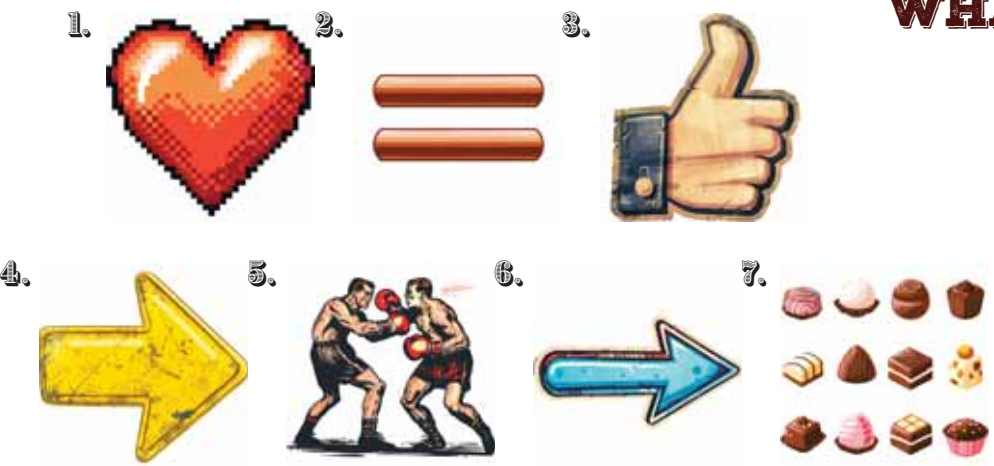

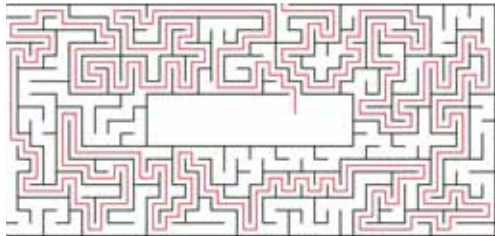

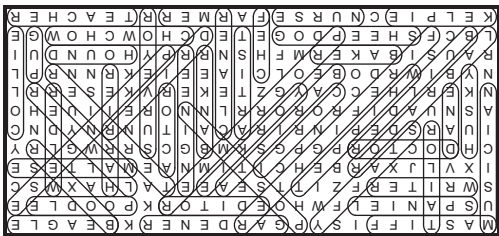

Rose in winter

What a delight to spend some time today with some Rose Robins.

One of our most spectacular winter migrants it has been a couple of years since I've had the pleasure of recording one.

The Australian Bird Guide, the definitive field guide to Australian birds, notes the following about the Rose Robin ... Breeds in tall wet sclerophyll forest and rainforest with a dense mid-storey, especially gullies with large acacias such as Silver Wattle ...

The description of its breeding habitat closely matches the features of the site where I observed it – tall eucalypts (River Red Gum and Yellow Box) above a dense stand of Silver Wattle.

The showy male was confident, dropping to the ground to snatch insects several times, while the female remained largely out of view amongst the wattles and Cassinia.

The Rose Robin is only with us for a few months, departing for its breeding grounds in early August. Rose Robins have a distinctive habit of drooping their wings when foraging, a tactic that is apparently used to disturb insects. Other robins will also do this but not with the same regularity.

The last image of what I believe is a female Rose Robin has me a little puzzled.

Female Rose Robins are typically grey above, with off-white wing-bars and often with a faint pink wash across the breast. This bird is brown above with rufous wing-bars, much like a typical female Pink Robin, another winter migrant but one that I've never recorded locally. It was drooping its wings in Rose Robin style but has left me wondering ...

MUSEUM

YOU don't have a French mantel clock because you need to know the time.

Just ask Paul Keating...

The things we really treasure are nearly always a lot more than just 'things'. They are the souvenirs of the past, reminders of people, places, events.

Think about the first significant thing you bought with your own money. Chances are that you've still got it or wish you had. The thing itself may well be worthless to anyone else, but for you, it has meaning, it has a story.

This series of articles is about the stories from the things in Maldon's wonderful Machinery Museum.

The Sunbeam S8

Step into the Museum and into a treasure trove of stuff. All sorts of stuff. Some familiar, but lots of odd things that you really couldn't put a name to.



Just about the first thing you see, immediately on your left, is an old motorbike, the Sunbeam S8. The movie poster behind it gives it away. *Romulus My Father* starring Eric Bana. There's a shot of Eric riding the bike and it's signed by him and some of the crew and cast.

There are several stories about this bike. Firstly, as you may know, Romulus is a true story. Raimond Gaita's memoir, *Romulus, My Father* (1998), tells of Gaita's father, Romulus, who migrated to Australia from Yugoslavia in the early 1950s. Romulus suffered from mental illness and struggled to raise his son, Raimond, after the suicide of his wife. The family lived near Baringhup and the movie was filmed in and around Maldon. After filming, the bike was donated to the museum. The movie was released in 2007.

Romulus actually had a Sunbeam of this model, but it probably would have been green or black. It's significant because these particular bikes were very expensive and Raimond's father took very good care of it. Unfortunately though, when the movie was made, the production company wanted to rough it up a bit and so they hit it with bike chains to dint the mudguards and covered it with dirt and dust; you can see this damage today, all for effect as a movie prop, but still a shame.

For the movie, it was worked on by local classic motorcycle enthusiast, David Gittus, who had it running for the action shots. He didn't actually restore it though, contrary to popular belief. It was purchased for the film by the production company in restored condition.

Back in the early fifties a Sunbeam S8 would have been about 250 pounds. Compare this to a more ordinary bike, say a BSA 500, which would have been about 200 pounds. Now look at the

average wage in those days which would have been about seven pounds a week or about 350 pounds a year. You're starting to get the perspective of the value of a motorbike back then.

In today's terms, that's about \$37,000 based on a wage of \$1,000 per week. Now, that's an expensive bike.

In fact, the Sunbeam S7 and S8 were actually made by BSA (Birmingham Small Arms) as a prestige model for the 'Gentleman Motorcyclist'. As an aside, the BSA owners club of today organises the All British Rally, which features a large gathering of classic motorcyclists in Maldon for the ANZAC weekend.

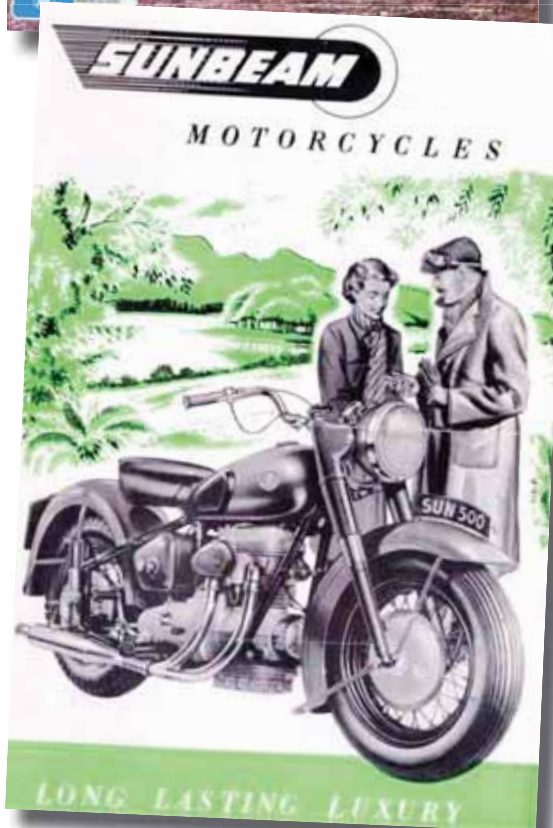
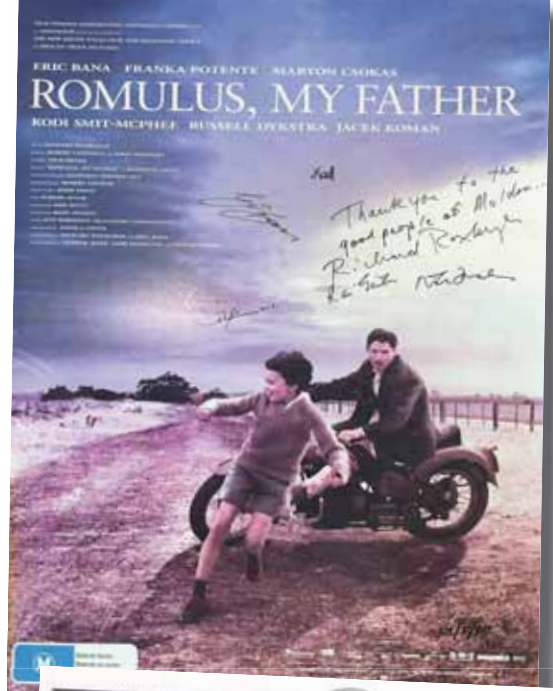
I was surprised that Romulus owned this model, but it seems that there was an active Sunbeam shop in the area and the models were well-promoted around here.

The S7 and S8 models were designed during the Second World War as a luxury model to be released once hostilities ended.

They included some very advanced design features, such as an all-alloy, in-line motor, much lighter than the usual cast iron but more expensive, overhead cam shaft and shaft drive, instead of the cheaper chain. This was all extremely advanced and made to appeal to the forward-thinking, experienced motorcyclist, probably of the upper classes who would appreciate the engineering and prestige associated with riding such a machine and could afford it.

The only problem was that this market no longer existed.

The world had changed between 1940 and 1950 and BSA were barking up the wrong tree.



World War II had changed absolutely everything.

Motorcycles reflect the fashions and economics of the times in which they are made and there has actually been a thesis written on this very subject.

The design philosophy of the Sunbeam was an extravagant dead end, but it's a great story...

Baby it's cold outside... and inside



THE recent frosty mornings in our area might inspire us to cosy up inside by a fire or with a loved one, but university studies have found that Australians have colder houses than people in similar climates around the world. Experts from RMIT commented last week about the phenomenon in which Australians have lower standards for warmth in their homes, leading to health risks.

“The Australian building code has, for a long time, been much less stringent than comparable nations in similar climate zones, such as the US and Europe,” says Professor Ralph Horne from the College of Design and Social Context at RMIT University.

“As far back as 2005, research comparing Australian cities to those overseas found housing in compatible climate zones in North America and Europe was 55% more efficient for heating and cooling energy compared to minimum standard housing in Australia.”

Australian houses are commonly draughty, lacking proper insulation, or simply not heated efficiently. New homes, which are often built to large proportions, can be expensive to heat effectively. Older houses lose heat quickly through walls, windows and cracks.

“Cold homes are also considered normal in Australia,” says Dr Nicola Willand, of RMIT’s School of Property, Construction and Project Management. “That ‘chill in the morning’ is a certainly a widely shared experience in Australia – but it shouldn’t be.”

Occupants cope by rugging up inside, but that’s not enough to mitigate the health issues around living in a cold house.

“Many people are unaware of the health risks associated with cold homes,” says Dr Willand. “Keeping warm advice that focuses on body warmth ignores the risks of cold indoor air for respiratory and heart health, infections and mould.”

The experts advise that it is possible to make our homes warmer, using a mix of large and small retro-fitting options, and they point to

some existing resources to help determine the most cost-effective approach for each home.

“Retrofit includes low-cost options like sealing up gaps and cracks, and adding or improving insulation in the ceiling, walls and underfloor – through to more significant changes like installing double glazed windows,” says Dr Trivess Moore, School of Property, Construction and Project Management at RMIT. “Use resources like the YourHome website and sustainability organisations like Renew.”

The RMIT experts also recommend government intervention in the form of financial support or rebates for retrofits, and suggest that the retrofit industry needs to be prepared for the large task of making more Aussie homes warm.

Meanwhile, the Bureau of Meteorology predicts that chilly mornings will continue. Coliban Water Executive General Manager Customer and Stakeholder, Lauren McLean, warns that while most homes now have digital water meters fitted with covers, meters and pipes above the ground have an increased risk of becoming frozen, preventing water flow.

“For those who don’t yet have a digital meter, you can do your part preventing your water meters becoming frozen by covering them with an upturned bucket, cardboard box or even an old tyre - as long as it can be removed for meter reading and maintenance,” says Ms McLean.

While it might be tempting to pour hot water over the meter, it can also cause a split or burst.

“If your water meter or pipe does freeze the best solution is to wait for the temperature to rise and for the meter to naturally unfreeze,” Ms McLean says.

As overnight temperatures drop in our region, we can all look for small ways to retain heat, reduce breezes inside and stay healthy over this cold period in central Victoria.

Grants available to support dedicated carers

THE State Government is offering grants for projects that aim to create social connections and improve the work and study opportunities of unpaid carers.

The Connecting Carers in their Community program will provide grants of between \$15,000 and \$25,000 to grassroots and community groups delivering local support to carers. Carers Victoria will administer the program.

Many carers provide care around the clock, making it difficult for them to access the support they need to look after themselves, engage in work and study or connect with others in their community.

Grant applications are encouraged from small community groups, particularly those delivering support to carers and their families in regional, rural and other areas in Victoria

where services might be more difficult to access.

The program will aim to increase local community supports and provide opportunities for social connections for carers where they live and work.

“We’re delivering this grants program for local carer support groups because we know being a carer can be tough, and that social and community connection is critically important to the health and wellbeing of carers,” says Minister for Carers and Volunteers Ros Spence.

Carer support groups, community groups, community health services, local councils, neighbourhood houses and other grassroots groups are eligible to apply.

Roads funding doubled to improve safety

THE Federal Government has committed to progressively double the Roads to Recovery funding over the next five years. The funding will see local government areas (LGAs) within the Bendigo electorate receive \$41.37 million over a five-year period. The five-year allocation for the Mount Alexander Shire Council is \$9,523,496, an increase of \$4,112,437.

The *Tarrangower Times* asked Federal Member for Bendigo, Lisa Chesters, about how the funding will be allocated. She says: “This funding is allocated to the Mount Alexander Shire, who will make the decision on where to spend the funding. There are criteria that each project must meet, but ultimately, it’s the decision of local councils which projects they allocate funding to.”

Roads to Recovery provides funding to local councils and allows them to plan for the long-term maintenance and upgrade of their road network. It directly impacts the quality of local roads, allows for potholes to be filled, pavements to be repaired, culverts

to be installed to improve drainage and keep roads open during bad weather, and helps make sure we all get home safely.

The increased funding is part of a series of changes aimed at safer, more productive local roads across Australia.

When asked about details of how the funding might be used in the Maldon area and surrounds MP Chesters pointed to examples of works that have already occurred. “For previous rounds of Roads to Recovery funding, the Mount Alexander Shire Council allocated funding to fix roads such as Muckleford Castlemaine Road (\$767,614 in RTR funding), Templeton Street, Maldon - Templeton Street and the intersection of Main Street in Maldon (\$160,875).”

Regarding any future disruptions to traffic or commutes that might occur as a result of roadworks, Ms Chesters said: “If local constituents are concerned about a particular road, I would like to encourage them to reach out to their local councillor.”

Council green-lights Maldon subdivision

MOUNT Alexander Shire Council (MASC) has voted to support a proposed three lot subdivision at 20 - 22 Morris Street, Maldon. The application was referred to council because 10 objections were received.

The proposal and associated report was tabled at the council meeting on Tuesday 18 June, having been referred to a number of agencies to examine matters raised by the objectors.

The key issues for consideration related to the appropriateness of the subdivision in relation to planning and heritage policies and to ensure future development on the site adheres to bushfire management guidelines.

The tabled report stated that “the proposed lot sizes are consistent with the low-density character of the area and is respectful with the environmental and cultural characteristics of the site.” It said that the applicant had provided “...sufficient justification that the environmental impacts such as retention of native vegetation, bushfire risk and connection to services can be adequately managed.”

The report stated that the site is located within the residential area of the Maldon Framework Plan, where urban expansion is encouraged.

Prior to consideration by council, the application had been referred to the council Heritage Advisor who had no objection to

the proposal. The Country Fire Authority consented to the endorsement of the Bushfire Management Plan, subject to conditions.

The report summarised the bulk of the objections as relating to neighbourhood character, the size of the allotments and the front and side setbacks. In relation to heritage concerns, it concluded that the proposed development was appropriate within the heritage streetscape and that views to significant heritage buildings are retained.

It was noted by councillors at the meeting that after the proposal was referred to the Heritage Advisor, the proposed setbacks were increased.

The report to MASC concluded by stating that any future development on the allotment will be subject to planning permit approval and will be required to respond to the provisions of the Heritage Overlay, the Significant Landscape Overlay present onsite and the Maldon Design Guidelines.

At the council meeting on 18 June, a motion to support the proposal carried with a majority in favour and a notice of a decision to grant a permit will be issued as a result.

Shire launches Alcohol Harm Prevention Project



MOUNT Alexander Shire Council, in collaboration with community partners, is spearheading an initiative to reduce alcohol-related harm within the community. Following their 2023 Community Alcohol Profile, the Council is set to launch the Alcohol Harm Prevention Project.

The project aims to promote health and wellbeing, encourage moderate drinking, and educate the community on reducing alcohol-related harm. Harmful alcohol consumption can result in numerous health issues, including liver problems, cardiovascular disease, cancer, mental health problems, addiction, accidents, injuries, and social and behavioural issues. These impacts are especially significant for young people, affecting their education, employment opportunities, relationships, and overall quality of life.

In 2023, the Council received VicHealth funding to develop a Community Alcohol Profile and an action plan addressing alcohol-related harm. Key findings revealed that, although the shire fares well in overall health behaviours compared to the Victorian average, it has a higher rate of single occasion risky drinking (53.5% of the population) compared to the Victorian average (41.8%). Additionally, the shire has higher rates of alcohol-related deaths and family violence, and lower rates of treatment referrals, potentially due to a lack of local services.

Lisa Knight, Director of Corporate and Community Services, emphasised the Council's commitment to improving community health through the Alcohol Harm Prevention Project. "Excessive alcohol consumption plays a pivotal role in poor physical and mental health outcomes, increased family violence, and road trauma incidents," Ms Knight said. "The findings in the Community Alcohol Profile are eye-opening, and as a community, we all want a safe, inclusive, and healthy place to live."

With further funding from VicHealth, the working group—comprising representatives from various local organisations—will implement health promotion actions over the next 15 months. These actions include updating the Council's website with project information, developing awareness programs for parents and carers, encouraging local sporting clubs to join the Good Sports Program, and identifying suitable education programs for young people.

"This is an exciting project, and I'm looking forward to sharing updates with the community on how we're reducing alcohol-related harm and improving health and wellbeing across the shire," said Ms Knight.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

DIVORCE AND THE BLACK HAT

ON Monday 5 August 1918, Margaret Eudey (nee Pettitt), took proceedings against her husband, Albert Eudey, for maintenance. Both Margaret and Albert were born in Maldon. They married however in Broken Hill in 1906, while Albert was working in the silver mines and boarding at the home of Margaret's mother.

The couple lived together in Broken Hill until 1909 when Albert was diagnosed with miners' complaint. His doctor advised him to give up reef mining and he moved to the White Cliffs opal fields, leaving Margaret to support herself. She then moved to Adelaide where she worked in hotels. In 1911 they both returned to Broken Hill where they lived together for about 12 months.

In 1912 Albert returned to Maldon after learning that his mother, Dinah, was dying. Later after selling their household goods, Margaret also moved to Maldon where she stayed at her sister's home while her husband continued to live with his parents. In his evidence, Albert said that when he came back to Maldon he purchased a single ticket, not intending to return to Broken Hill. Margaret, on the other hand, had purchased a return ticket on the assumption that they would both go back to Broken Hill.

When his mother died in July 1912, Albert told his wife that he intended to buy a black hat to wear at the funeral. According to Albert, Margaret then said that if he wore a black hat she would not live with him another day. Margaret denied saying any such thing, but said that she was upset that he used her money to buy the hat. Following their argument, Albert bought the black hat and Margaret refused to attend the funeral.

After his mother's death, Albert continued to live with his father and claimed that Margaret refused to join him. Margaret said that she was never offered a room at the Eudeys' home and so went back to Broken Hill where she supported herself. She later worked as a housekeeper at Black Rock until she fell ill and then went to live with her sister in Daylesford. It was only then that she sought the legal advice that resulted in her claim for maintenance.

After hearing the evidence the magistrate ordered Albert Eudey to pay his wife maintenance of 15s a week. Albert appealed this decision and eventually in the Castlemaine Court of General Sessions had it set aside.

In April 1919 Albert Eudey petitioned for divorce in the Melbourne Practice Court. Margaret was not present or represented. Albert made great play of his version of the black hat story. The judge accepted his account of events and granted a decree nisi. The Australian press picked up on the novel story of the black hat and it featured in newspapers throughout the nation.

Margaret probably thought herself well rid of Albert as she remarried in 1920.

Advance notice Arson at the Athenaeum Biography Week

This week the focus of the Library News is on biographies. When you read a biography, you experience the subject's life through someone else's lens. This can be good: an objective, perhaps more trustworthy view. "No one can tell the whole truth about himself," the English playwright and novelist Somerset Maugham wrote in *The Summing Up*, his literary memoir. On the other hand, you might miss the quirkiness of the author's voice and insight into their thought processes, which can make autobiographies more intimate. Here is a selection of biographies from the library collection. As subject matter we have chosen to sidestep footballers, war heroes, actors and politicians and tried instead to cast the net more widely, across time and place. Some are written by professional biographers, but others are the observations of contemporaries, to hold memories of a life past but still important.

Peter Pan's First XI: The Extraordinary Story of J.M. Barrie's Cricket Team by Kevin Telfer

The creator of Peter Pan loved cricket, despite his lack of talent, and his village team featured a cast of some of the twentieth century's most famous writers including A.A. Milne (Winnie the Pooh) and P.G. Wodehouse (Bertie Wooster and his valet, Jeeves). Set in England before the First World War, on what Barrie described as "green fields dotted with white figures on reasonable terms," this book tells of a gentle world that is gone forever.

Clever Man: The Life of Paddy Compass Namasbara by Big Bill Neidjie, Bluey Ilkgirr, Jacob Nayinggul, Jim Wauchope, Johnny Williams Snr., Ron Cooper, Thompson Yuludjiri, and Others (Narrators), Ian White (Compiler)

This is the story of the Western Arnhem clever man or marrkidjbu, through the eyes of his countrymen who witnessed his extraordinary abilities as a community leader, teacher, sage, mystic, counsellor and healer. It is based on the stories told by the people he helped, some profoundly and in extraordinary ways. It "offers a unique historical glimpse into an Aboriginal world on the cusp of change due to European incursion." (Susan Greenwood, University of Sussex).

In Search of a Woman who Sailed the World, Danielle Clode.

This is a biography of Jeanne Barret who, in 1766, was the first woman to circumnavigate the world. Disguised as a man, and signing on as naturalist's assistant, she sailed with the French explorer Louis Antoine de Bougainville in his search for the Terra Australis Incognita. For over two centuries the story of who this young woman was, why she left her home to undertake such a perilous journey and what happened when she returned has been shrouded in uncertainty. Biologist and award-winning author Danielle Clode wrote of her motivation: "I feel the need to strip away the assumptions that clothe the historical figure of Jeanne Barret, to see the flesh and bone beneath, the beating heart and thinking brain of the person who lived and breathed but left no words for us to hear. Who was this woman?"

A Year with Wendy Whiteley by Ashleigh Wilson, 2022

These days Wendy Whiteley is a legendary figure in the art world, the keeper of the Brett Whiteley legacy, best known for creating the Secret Garden on the land below her house on Sydney Harbour. But before she met Brett, Wendy was

herself a budding artist; her creative work ever since has been under-recognised. Wendy is a survivor: of drug dependence, bitter divorce, the deaths of Brett and their beloved daughter, Arkie. More than that, she is a remarkable figure whose life has had its own contours and priorities. Now in her early eighties, reflective yet outspoken, with a dry wit she has much to tell about it.

Would that be Funny? Growing up with John Clarke by Lorin Clarke, 2023

When satirist John Clarke died in April 2017, many people mourned his passing as if they had lost a friend or a member of the family. Many of us felt we grew up with him. After all, for the best part of half a century, since he burst into our lives as Fred Dagg in 1974, he was a performer, an actor, a writer, a satirist and as a commentator in both Australia and New Zealand. In this fascinating memoir, Lorin Clarke tells the story of growing up with her famous father, her art historian mother Helen, and her little sister Lucia. Much has been written about John Clarke, but this is the insider's view of his childhood, his relationship with his parents, his decision to leave New Zealand and live in Australia, and the choices he and Helen made to create a family life that is right out of the box.

Wandering Through Life: A Memoir by Donna Leon, 2023

The internationally bestselling author of the *Guido Brunetti* mysteries tells her own adventurous life story as she enters her eighties. In a series of vignettes full of affection, irony, and good humour, Donna Leon narrates a remarkable life she feels has rather more happened to her than been planned.

Following a childhood in the company of her New Jersey family, with frequent visits to her grandfather's farm and its beloved animals, and summers spent selling home-grown tomatoes by the roadside, Leon got her first taste of the classical music and opera that would enrich her life. She also developed a yen for adventure. In 1976, she made the spontaneous decision to teach English in Iran, before finding herself swept up in the early days of the 1979 Revolution. After teaching stints in China and Saudi Arabia, she finally landed in Venice. Leon vividly animates her decades-long love affair with Italy, from her first magical dinner when serving as a chaperone to a friend, to the hunt for the perfect cappuccino, to the warfare tactics of grandmothers doing their grocery shopping at the Rialto Market.

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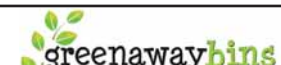
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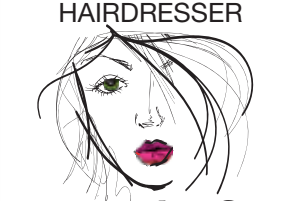
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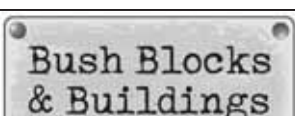
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Nordic Walking in Maldon
