# More rangers, more hours, so dog owners "do the right thing"

### PETS

Two extra enforcement officers will be employed by Bass Coast Shire Council, and officers' hours of patrol will be increased, to ensure dog owners follow regulations.

Councillors at the October meeting voted in support of the final Domestic Animal Management Plan 2025-2029 (DAMP), sending a message to owners to "do the right thing".

Following lengthy community consultation, most recently in September, the final DAMP includes a promise to "immediately deliver" inland fenced dog parks at Inverloch and Phillip Island

and "strengthened" 24/7 cat containment and desexing support.

But it was the issue of enforcement on which councillors focussed.

Cr Ronnie Bauer said the Phillip Island and Bass Coast Dog Owners Association and council officers had worked together on the plan, saying the main dog problem was enforcement.

"Unfortunately, at the moment it is too easy to roll the dice. The odds are if a person flouts an ordinance they will probably not get caught," Cr Bauer said.

"I am glad to see (the council is) employing two extra enforcement officers and extending the hours of patrol so the amenities can be enjoyed by all and ensure that pet owners do the right thing." hopefully this approach allows officers to educate those doing

Cr Tim O'Brien said increased numbers of officers would ensure compliance, with the "poor behaviour" of a few pet owners threatening wildlife.

Cr Mat Morgan thanked those who advocated "for the animals that they don't own", including wombats, and hooded plovers.

"We need domestic animals and their owners to take responsibility for the actions of their animals that we've brought into the natural environment of our native wildlife," Cr Morgan said.

"I'm glad we're acquiring a couple of new compliance officers, officers to educate those doing the wrong thing, without ruining it for the responsible pet owners."


Cr Morgan said he remained "extremely concerned" after seeing photos and videos of dogs chasing wildlife and digging in burrows.

"That must stop.

"I will not hesitate to bring an urgent notice of motion to this chamber in future if I see this



This year marks the 150th anniversary of Wollomai winning the Melbourne Cup in 1875. Wollomai was owned by Captain John Cleeland and was born on Phillip Island and his win marked the first time the Melbourne Cup was run on a Tues-

Wollomai was an outsider for the Cup and was believed to have run at around 16:1. Ridden by Bob Batty who was considered the best all round jockey in

Victoria at the time he not only won but he beat Richmond the Cup favourite by several lengths in a time of 3.38.

Cleeland's great grandson Mike Cleeland commented that "Wollomai was a very good horse".

"He won the Warrnambool Cup that year and ran second in the Australian


The three-hour forum, from 12.30pm to 3.30pm, is open to everyone, with police inviting local services and community members to talk about the issues that are important in our local community.

The Island then went on to win the special publication category in the National Awards as well.

"It was exciting to win the Victorian award again; then to get the National Award really was the cherry on top.

### **Awards**

In other awards, former Advertiser journalist Edmund Coleman was highly commended in the Cadet of the Year category, while Michael Giles from the South Gippsland Sentinel Times won the Best Opinion/Editorial award.

In the Victorian awards, the major winners included the Sunraysia Daily, winner of the open category Newspaper Excellence award, the Kyabram Free Press in the under 2500 circulation paid newspaper category and the Surf Coast Times, winner of the Best Free Newspaper.

Ms McKay said the Victorian Country Press Association conference and awards was more important than ever, given the changing media landscape and the pressure on independent publishers.

### Cypress tree to be removed, replanted

#### **COWES STREETSCAPE**

One of Cowes' cherished golden cypress trees will be removed to make way for development in the current main street overhaul.

At the October meeting of Bass Coast Shire Council, resident Gina Rosamilia asked why the council was going to remove a low height heritage listed cypress at the bottom end (left side) of Thompson Avenue, as part of the streetscape upgrade which is under construction.

Council CEO Greg Box confirmed the tree would be removed.

"To achieve the necessary level changes for the new accessible ramping, the existing golden cypress tree will be replaced," Mr Box said.

"Its current location would be affected by the raised levels required to improve accessibility, which could impact on the tree's long-term health."

He explained "improved ramping" would be constructed on the west side of Thompson Avenue "to meet modern accessibility standards and ensure safe, easy movement for all members of the community".

Friends of the Thompson Avenue Golden Cypress president Pauline Taylor said the group was "appalled" the tree, the last one on the left going down Thompson Avenue, was being moved.

"By the time we were informed about what was happening it was too late as work was already starting," Pauline

"We found the proposal unbelievable. It is a direct result of having to comply with the modern-day health and safety regulations: the tree would be compromised by a reconstruction of a disabled walkway.'

She said the tree would be uprooted and replanted at the council's depot, while another bigger tree was taken from the depot and planted about 10 metres further up the avenue.

The cypress tree being removed as part of the streetscape project was planted in August 2021, to replace a tree which had died. Friends of the Golden Cypress said the previous tree had had its top cut off and was slowly dying.

### Heritage

The council is currently promoting the avenue of cypress trees, which have been named among this year's finalists in the National Trust of Australia (Victoria) Victorian Tree of the Year awards.

The winner, which will be announced this week, is decided by public vote.

"Åt 113 years old, the golden cypress avenue forms an impressive, welcoming, and historical gateway to Phillip Island," the council said online.

Planted back in 1912 by local benefactor William Eastwood Thompson - with help from schoolchildren, families and volunteers - "these trees have grown into one of the most iconic avenues in Victoria", according to the council.

The Cowes' street upgrade will be rolled out across seven stages, with stage one starting last month to December, focusing on essential upgrades to water, sewer and stormwater, as well as new kerbs, lighting and landscaping.

Stage one will see one-way traffic on Thompson Avenue (from Chapel Street) and The Esplanade, landscaping and a reduction in car parking, with Thompson Avenue between the Esplanade and Chapel Street to have 36 car spaces – down from the current 53.

Along The Esplanade, car spaces will reduce from 10 to

### Carols avoids unsafe platform

This year's Carols by the Bay will be performed on a moveable stage, with the traditional platform closed indefinitely because of safety concerns.

Island Voice last week confirmed the annual carols will be performed on the Cowes foreshore as usual, but unlike past years will use a moveable stage at right angles to the North Pier Hotel.

"We will have a screen set-up near the toilet block for those who wish to sit on the stepped bank," Island Voice spokesperson Peter McMahon confirmed, adding food vendors will be on the road adjacent to the North Pier.

"We regret these changes but council have declared the amphitheatre is unsafe for us to use.

A Bass Coast Shire Council spokesperson confirmed the concrete roof entertainment platform had been closed for several months due to safety concerns identified during routine maintenance.

They said the toilets remained open, and the closure would not affect the ability for community

events such as the carols to proceed.

"We don't believe the issue relates to the absence of steel reinforcement in the concrete," the spokesperson said.

They said the current Cowes street makeover would also not impact the carols.

"Council remains focused on ensuring that business and events can continue with minimal disruption during the Cowes Foreshore Precinct project and looks forward to the completion of the revitalised precinct."

Peter said organisers would work around the Esplanade and Cowes main street construction works

"We are taking all road closures in to account as we come to grips with the changes being made to our town.

"We will keep everyone informed via the Advertiser as we make the final arrangements.

"Looking forward to another successful carols event."

### More focus on anti-vaping and gambling

#### COUNCIL

Awareness of gambling harm and anti-vaping initiatives are among the new additions to final plans endorsed by Bass Coast Shire councillors in October.

Following community consultation on three draft plans in August and September, Bass Coast Shire councillors endorsed the final plans with several changes.

### Health

Following community consultation, the Healthy, Safe and Resilient Bass Coast Plan 2025-2029 has added gambling harm and anti-vaping initiatives.

Resident feedback saw older adults emphasise the importance of aquatics - including a Phillip Island swimming pool - and transport access, while young people sought more action on recreation, transport, and career pathways.

Council officers said in response to feedback, the plan was strengthened with year one actions now including anti-vaping and gambling harm initiatives, as well as advocacy for transport and climate-health.

There will be youth-led antivaping campaigns, as well as smoke-and vape-free signage in playgrounds and reserves, while a gambling harm awareness campaign will include Gambler's Help and Bass Coast Health.

### Disability

Community feedback on the Disability Action Plan 2025-



Gambling harm was a "major omission" in the council's draft health plan, released earlier this year, with the final plan now including a number of initiatives to educate on the harm.

2029 included safer and more accessible roads and footpaths, playgrounds and recreation spaces designed with accessibility and neurodiversity in mind, stronger recognition of carers, and disability-specific emergency planning.

The final plan has been updated to include advocacy to the State Government for road and path accessibility upgrades and neurodiversity considerations in public space planning.

Cr Mat Morgan said "every person in Bass Coast, regardless of ability, should be able to participate fully in community life, access the services they need, and feel that they belong".

#### **Assets**

The Asset Plan received eight survey responses and one submission.

Submitters said the council should prioritise renewal and

maintenance of existing infrastructure over new infrastructure, while others said the council should manage for new growth.

Council officers responded the plan provided a "balanced approach" to providing new assets for a growing community and sustainable funding to maintain current assets, with sustainable asset investment guidelines to be developed.

Residents said there should be a greater focus on parking and congestion, especially around peak times, to which council officers said congestion was a focus of the Integrated Transport Plan, which was adopted earlier this year.

There were also calls to keep existing dirt roads in Sunderland Bay, to which officers replied the Urban Roads and Drainage Improvement Policy oversaw that policy.

Cr Jon Temby said the council's \$1.5 billion worth of assets needed ongoing assessments, maintenance, upgrades and at times disposal.

"We should also be placing greater emphasis on our green assets, the Westernport Woodlands, our coastal vegetation and our natural environment more generally, these are the assets that attract our residents and visitors to our shire," Cr Temby said.

"They are also the rare assets that increase in value as they age."

### Nature Parks to manage St Kilda Penguins

Victorian families and visitors can enjoy a free and up-close experience with Melbourne's iconic little penguins from the purpose-built platform on St Kilda Pier.

Minister for Environment Steve Dimopolous last week opened bookings for the free Penguin Viewing Experience on St Kilda Pier open for visitors from October 29.

The experience will be run by Phillip Island Nature Parks and with its decades of penguin conservation efforts, they will be able to guide and educate visitors about the penguin colony while ensuring the penguin's wellbeing.

"Penguin protection is at

the core of what we do on Phillip Island, and we're excited to extend our experience to the St Kilda Penguin colony," said Phillip Island Nature Parks CEO Catherine Basterfield.

Phillip Island Nature Parks said it has been sharing expertise on little penguins and tourism operations with the project team throughout the St Kilda Pier re-development.

The experience will feature a 150-metre elevated platform with accessible entry, seating and prime views over the penguin colony.

Volunteer group Earthcare St Kilda, which has helped keep the colony safe for more than 30 years, will continue to play a role in the penguin experience by helping look after the health and wellbeing of the penguins.

The viewing experience opens after a settling-in period for the colony, giving the penguins time to adjust to activity on the new pier following a long break from visitors.

The experience will be free, but online bookings will be essential to avoid missing out during busy seasons like spring and summer.

The \$53 million St Kilda Pier upgrade was funded by the State Government, which includes a curved walkway, tiered seating, additional toilets, and community space near the St Kilda Pier Kiosk.

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### Borrowings remain high, expenses climb, income drops

Bass Coast Shire Council almost lost more cases at VCAT than it won, according to the 2024/2025 Annual Report.

The report was endorsed by councillors at the October meeting, showing borrowings continue to be high, and while expenses climb, income has dropped.

There were 17 VCAT cases in the past year, of which the council lost seven, a drop to 58 per cent, compared to 90 per cent the previous year.

The average time to decide planning applications, however, dropped from 127 days to 95 days, and 76 per cent of applications were decided within the required timeframes, with an increase of planning application decisions compared to the previous year.

The annual report also shows:

- · Council received 11 noncompliance notifications for food premises and all 11 were followed up with an inspection;
- There are 312 full time equivalent staff with the CEO Greg Box's wage in the \$350,000 – \$359,999 bracket;
- · All eight animal management prosecutions in 2024/25 were successful. In 2024/25, there were 269 animals collected and 136 were reclaimed by their owner. Of the 133 unclaimed animals collected, 89 were rehomed;

According to the 2024/25 annual report, councillor expenses from November 11 to June 30 totalled \$58,145.

- There was a 2.8 per cent increase in the cost of kerbside garbage collection - "primarily due to inflationary pressures affecting third party kerbside collection costs" – and for every 10,000 kerbside bins in Bass Coast, 1.14 are missed on collection day (compared to 2.7 the previous year);
- There were 66 sealed local road requests in 2024/25 compared to 71 requests in 2023/24; and
- Sixty-two per cent of library collections have been refreshed in the past five years.

#### Budget

Borrowings as a percentage of rates is the highest this decade, currently 37 per cent, compared to 24 per cent in 2022 and a forecast 23 per cent in 2029.

expenses Council have reduced in 2024/25, to \$49,977, compared to \$54,737 the previous year.

The council's total operating expenses for 2024/25 were \$114 million (budgeted \$100 million) compared with \$103.8 million the previous year.

Total operating income for 2024/25 was \$123 million (budgeted \$103 million) lion) compared with \$124 million for 2023/24.

Council delivered \$27.7 million in capital works in 2024/25 including stage 2 of Rhyll boat ramp seawall replacement and Cowes Senior Citizens Club Hall roof renewal.

Cr Tim O'Brien said the annual report was a "backwards and forwards-looking document".

We come in part way through," Cr O'Brien said.

"Much of what we find in this report is a reflection of the past council."

Cr Brett Tessari agreed, saying the new group of councillors were 11 months in the job and were "itching to get their teeth into this plan".

"It was also lovely to see many from the local community come in to buy breakfast too."



### Whale Festival up for award **TOURISM**

The 2024 Phillip Island Whale Festival is a finalist at the 2025 Victorian Tourism

The festival is produced by Destination Phillip Island with the support of an amazing committee, with members from Dolphin Research Institute, Wildlife Coast Cruises, Phillip Island Nature Parks, Bass Coast Shire Events Team, Dr Sue Mason and Zev Landes.

Kim Storey from Destination Phillip Island said to be named as a finalist, meant the festival entry scored over 70 per cent of the judging criteria.

"We will be at the awards on November 27 competing with other entrants in the Festival and Events Category where the winners will be announced," Kim said.

She said the motivation behind the entry was to "showcase what an amazing festival it has developed into".

Although the festival entry is for the 2024 event (as that fell within the awards timeline), Kim said this year's festival had also been a resounding success.

There were 11,400 participants across all activities of the three days, up from 8841 attendees in 2024.

She said 6400 people came to the Festival Hub at Berninneit, up from 4852 in 2024.

The number of activities at this year's festival had also grown from 44 last year to 68 in 2025.

"The Festival Hub included six new installations created by local artist Zev Landes including a life size humpback pectoral fin," Kim said.

"The Hub hosted 13 exhibitors over the three days.'

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
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### Another special charge approved

COUNCIL

A special charge scheme on Links Street, Surf Beach, will go ahead, after 42 per cent of residents supported it.

Seven (58 per cent) submissions were received from the 12 affected property owners/occupiers in the scheme, with two (17 per cent) objecting to the scheme, which "is considered a low number of objections", and five submissions of support (42 per cent).

"As the number of objections received is below 50 per cent, there is no legislative requirement preventing council from proceeding with the scheme (although notwithstanding this, council may still decide not to proceed with the scheme),' council officers said in the report, recommending the scheme go ahead.

Those liable to pay must do so within 12 months after the day on which the declaration is made.

The total cost of the scheme will be \$338,299 and the council's total contribution \$76,388, with the maximum levy to be recovered from property owners \$261,911.

A property owner may apply to VCAT within 30 days of receiving the levy notice from council.

### Questions

Further questions were asked at the October council meeting about special charge schemes, with resident Philip Davy stating council had never explained who pays for the half road cost along the Esplanade frontage of Nature Parks land, 'except to say Nature Parks is not liable".

"Does Council pay the costs or do the ratepayers who live in the street?" Philip asked.

Council CEO Greg Box responded the southern foreshore land managed by PINP was not included in the scheme.

"Only the privately owned northern properties are considered to receive a direct and significant special benefit from the project," Mr Box said.

Darren Murphy asked about Cowes west schemes.

"The Koala Estate has had the benefit of bitumen or dust suppression roads for 18 years," Darren said.
"What is our special benefit under a

special charge scheme if we only want our roads resealed with no other not needed improvements such as kerb and channel, drainage or footpaths?

Mr Box responded the Koala Estate was one of a pilot group of temporary sealing projects in the early 2000s.

"As the road is currently in a poor

state, the property owners would receive special benefit from a properly constructed and permanently maintained sealed road," Mr Box said.

"Council would continue to inspect, maintain, and renew the new road seal and pavement in line with its sealed road network service standards.'

### Purple Hen rules the roost at wine show

Rick Lacey from Purple Hen won the Most Successful Exhibitor at the Gippsland Wine show, with the winery also taking out the award for Best Shiraz and Best Aromatic White.

Dirty Three Pinot Noir won the Best Wine of Show. In a record medal count, the 2025 show attracted 114 high-calibre entries with a strong focus on the region's famed Pinot Noir and Chardonnay classes.

Rob Lightfoot, Wine Gippsland Presi dent, said there was a bumper haul of 55 medals, with an unprecedented seven gold trophies in the varietal classes as testament to the exceptional quality of wines in the region.

The record haul of 18 gold medals overall, 18 silver and 19 bronze, was presented by sponsors at the annual celebration held for 130 guests at Narkoojee Winery, Glengarry North. The judges described the pinot noir, chardonnay and shiraz classes as particularly exciting.

The prestigious Westpac Best Wine of Show went to Inverloch-based Marcus Satchell and Lisa Sartori's Dirty Three Wines for the Dirty Three 2024 "Magic Dirt" Pinot Noir. This wine earlier won the coveted Best Pinot Noir Top Gold and trophy in a competitive category that produced a record five Gold medals, five Silver and four Bronze from 24 entries. The seven gold varietal class trophies

Bass River Winery, Glen Forbes, won the Best Sparkling Gold and Trophy for the Bass River 1835 Sparkling Brut 2021.

Purple Hen Wines, Phillip Island, won Best Shiraz and the Top Gold Trophy with their 2024 The Rooster Shiraz.

Purple Hen also won Best Aromatic White Trophy with the Purple Hen 2025 Off Dry Riesling.

Hen won a further Gold with the Purple Hen 2024 Pinot Noir. They won Best Cabernet Sauvignon Varieties and Blends, a tally which earned them the Most Successful Exhibitor.

Dirty Three Wines also won Gold medals for the Dirty Three 2024 "All The Dirts" Chardonnay, and the Dirty Three 2024 "All The Dirts" Pinot Noir.

Showcasing three vintages of the same wine, Dirty Three Wines was awarded the Best Red Wine of Provenance, and also the Best White Wine of Provenance.

The wine producers involved in the awards then turned out in force for the inaugural Eat Drink Play Gippsland Festival at Leongatha, one day later for an incredibly popular event.

### Reduced speed limits improve safety for cyclists, pedestrians

### **ROAD SAFETY**

Reducing residential speed limits from 50km/hr to 30km/hr would significantly boost bicycle riding safety without majorly affecting car trip times, a study has

The findings come as Victoria enacts a new speed limit law allowing local councils to propose 30km/hr limits in school zones and local streets.

On Phillip Island, as part of the Cowes Streetscape plan, it is proposed to reduce the speed limit to 30km/hr along Thompson Avenue between Church and Chapel streets, with the section north of Chapel Street to be 20km/hr.

Early this year, speed humps and wombat crossings were installed along Chapel Street and Church Street, designed to slow traffic, with a recommended 20km/hr on

Modelling by RMIT University's Centre for Urban Research showed bicycle riders' exposure to roads with high levels of traffic stress dropped by 30 per cent when the speed limit was reduced from 50km/hr to 30km/hr.

Researchers rated every road in Greater Melbourne for traffic stress levels using a framework that considers factors like speed limits, cycling infrastructure and traffic volume, based on government survey data and travel modelling.

They found lowering residential speed limits to 30km/hr more than doubled the proportion of an average bicycle trip on low stress streets and roads from just over one-third to more than two-thirds.

Study lead author Dr Afshin Jafari said while driving at 30kph might seem slow, the limit mostly applies to residential streets, so it has little impact on average car trips, while the modelling showed the average short local trip only increased by about one minute.

Jafari said lowering speed limits was a practical, low-cost way to improve cycling safety

"Slowing down vehicles is a cheap and effective way to improve safety while we wait for longer-term infrastructure up-

The 30km/hr residential limits would also encourage motorists to use main roads, leading to quieter residential streets.

"This should also create safer streets for our kids," Jafari said.

While bicycle riding is often seen as the domain of city commuters, Jafari said outer suburbs stood to benefit the most from lower speed limits.

"Outer suburban streets often don't even have footpaths, let alone other infrastructure to separate bicycle riders and pedestrians from motorists," he said.



New research says reducing speed limits to 30km/hr would significantly boost bicycle riding safety, without a major impact on car trip times. New speed reduction measures were recently introduced in Chapel and Church streets in Cowes, with sections of Thompson Avenue to be reduced to 30km/hr and 20km/hr as part of the streetscape plan.

### **Traffic Signals Installation**

New traffic signals will be installed at the Dandy Premix Quarries intersection to reduce truck traffic through Grantville and improve safety for pedestrians and motorists using the Bass Highway.

Works commenced July 2025, approx. 4-month duration Lane closures, reduced speed limits, contra-flow traffic Deep Creek St and Bass Hwy Service Rd access impacted Bass Hwy southbound bus stop temporarily relocated



### COMMENCEMENT AND DURATION OF ROADWORKS

**Stage 1 Roadworks** confined to the existing quarry intersection commenced early July 2025.

**Stage 2 Roadworks** on the Bass Highway Northbound carriageway commenced 14 August and were completed 19 September 2025.

**Stage 3 Roadworks** require temporary closure of the Bass Highway Southbound carriageway and the introduction of contra-flow traffic to the Northbound carriageway.

The left lane of the Northbound carriageway will continue to be used for northbound traffic and the second lane for southbound traffic after diversion across the highway median to share the Northbound carriageway. During **Stage 3 Roadworks**, each of the two lanes of the Northbound carriageway will have traffic moving in the opposite direction.

During **Stage 3 Roadworks** there will be reduced speed limits through the Bass Highway construction zone with modified traffic layouts and traffic controls in place to assist motorists.

### **BUS STOP - SOUTHBOUND**

The Bass HWY southbound bus stop located in the Stage 3 roadworks zone will continue to be temporarily relocated further north (approx. 220m) in the Bass Highway Service Road (southbound) with signage, waiting area provision and pedestrian protection provided.

### **PROJECT OUTCOMES**

Installation of the Traffic Signals will enable trucks to turn right, northbound onto Bass Highway, resulting in a major reduction in quarry trucks through Grantville. The Traffic Signals will also improve Bus Stop pedestrian safety and assist safer Deep Creek Street traffic flows onto Bass Highway.





#### Wet lettuce

Cr Jon Temby said there was a "legal and moral responsibility" to allow wildlife to exist undisturbed, as they were "here first".

"Strong policing should resolve the seemingly intractable issues around irresponsible pet owners allowing their animals to adversely interact with wildlife," Cr Temby said.

"Fines ... should help to get the message through that pet (or feral) animal interference with our wildlife is illegal, seriously irresponsible and grossly selfish on the part of the owner.

"The 'wet-lettuce' approach of a verbal warning has no impact on these people; they need strong deterrence via fines.'

"I fully support the DAMP on the basis that strong enforcement of the legal obligation from our expanded enforcement team, to prevent the disturbance of our wildlife, as well as minimising attacks on people, nuisance behaviour and that restrictions on dangerous, menacing and restricted breeds will occur.'

Cr Meg Edwards urged kindness by all residents.

She said while she understood a dog was a member of a family and vital for mental health, she had nevertheless been a young mother concerned about the

welfare of her child on the beach when faced with dogs off leash.

Mayor Rochelle Halstead said the DAMP struck a balance.

"Owning a pet is a joy, and it also comes with responsibilities. It means ensuring they live in harmony with our neighbours, public spaces and precious naturally beautiful environment," Cr Halstead said.

"Our coastline, bushland and open spaces are home to sensitive wildlife, so protecting these areas while supporting pet owners to enjoy life with their fourlegged friends is what this plan is all about."

The final DAMP states there will be increased visibility of council officers at beaches and other priority locations and a review of the seasonal roster to include yearround beach patrols, education and enforcement, with a focus on non-compliance by visitors.

The final plan also has "strengthened language" on environmental protection.

#### Consultation

Initial consultation earlier in the year saw 800 residents give feedback, with further consultation in September seeing 137 survey responses and three written submissions.

The final DAMP was amended including:

- Dogs in Public Places Guidelines has been "elevated", to ensure a consistent approach across the shire for off-leash areas;
- Debate over dogs on beaches continues, with some support for more off-leash beaches and calls to review time restrictions at beaches, with some community members seeking increased beach access and others seeking further restrictions. As a result there is "strengthened language in the plan on signage;
- Debate over enforcement continues, with some wanting tougher fines, while others prefer education-first. There is consensus that non-compliance by a minority impacts the majority of responsible pet owners. The DAMP "strengthens language and actions to enhance patrols, community education and positive values-based messaging", with "specific focus added on addressing non-compliance by visitor cohorts".

There will be "immediate delivery" of fenced dog parks on Phillip Island (previously scheduled for 2027) and one at Inverloch by 2026, with \$950,000 budgeted over the next decade for dog parks in the shire.

There will be continued rollout and strengthening of 24/7 cat containment and availability of cat traps.

### Dog owners respond

The Phillip Island Bass Coast Dog Owners Association issued the following statement after Bass Coast Shire councillors endorsed the final Domestic Animal Management Plan 2025-2029:

"The dog association worked collaboratively with the Bass Coast Shire on this new DAMP. We will continue to support off-lead beach areas and will continue to lobby for designated inland off-lead dog parks.

"We will continue to educate all dog owners around protecting and living with our native wildlife in our community. Our association will continue to promote responsible dog ownership.

"We supported the DAMP in good faith as we were involved in the process.

"What we didn't expect was for the councillors to then focus on one narrow component (enforcement) rather than the DAMP in its entirety.

"We are looking forward to advancing the care and protection of the San Remo wombats.

"We certainly hope the councillors can look at it with a broader view going forward."

### Jetty shed to remain closed

### COUNCIL

The heritage shed on the Cowes jetty will remain vacant until next year, despite Bass Coast Shire Council previously promising a new tenant by the end of 2025.

At the end of last year the council sought community feedback on future ideas for the shed, receiving dozens of ideas, from a sauna to a youth drop-in centre and ice-cream shop.

Yet despite the consultation, last week a council spokesperson confirmed the current upgrade to the Esplanade and Cowes main street had delayed a new tenancy.

"While it was originally anticipated an Expression of Interest process and lease for the shed would be in place by the end of 2025, this is now more likely to occur in 2026," the spokesperson

"The revised timeframe reflects the impact of the Cowes foreshore precinct construction works, as well as the additional work being undertaken to develop a robust and enduring lease agreement."

The spokesperson said the heritage value of the site was a strong theme raised through community engagement, and council was working with Heritage Victoria to ensure these values are appropriately recognised and protected within the lease framework.

"This important work is still being finalised.

"In the meantime, businesses continue to activate the Cowes jetty triangle, separate to the

shed lease."

This includes Phillip Island Sauna opening a new sauna building adjacent to the shed.

A council spokesperson confirmed the sauna was not part of the original jetty shed building and was operating from their own custom-built unit.

"After they (Phillip Island Sauna) were unable to continue at their location in Cape Woolamai. our Business team worked with them to find a suitable location.

"It's a great activation of the space for summer," the spokesperson said.

### Disrepair

In 2024 the restaurant on the jetty shed was closed by the council over summer for urgent building works following concerns it was falling into disrepair.

The Jetty Phillip Island restaurant owner Gab Caffieri, who had operated it from November to April for the previous six years, said he received an email from the council asking him to remove his equipment and explaining he couldn't open this summer.

"Planning could have been better," Gab said at the time.

"The timing is not ideal. It could have been dealt with earlier."

The restaurant has since been permanently closed.

The heritage jetty shed dates back to 1870, with the jetty managed by both Parks Victoria/ the Department of Environment and council.

### Roads to ruin?

Community complaints about road and footpath problems have increased in the past five years, according to a Bass Coast Shire Council road report.

Councillors at the October meeting endorsed the Road Management Plan Review Report, which states if the council does not adopt recommended changes, it may be exposed to legal risks.

The report states complaint patterns "suggest gaps in expectation of current service

"Over the past five years, claims have increased, with a notable proportion pertaining to footpaths," it states, explaining inspections are not meeting current standards because of system issues.

"Existing systems are not compliant in tracking all parts of the request process effec-

The report states while the council has no legal obligation to amend road management, "if amendments are necessary and not made, it may expose council to legal risks".

"This review has identified substantial gaps which indicate that the current RMP does not adequately reflect community expectations, resource capacity, and risk environment.

"Failure to amend the Road Management Plan in line with

identified gaps may compromise council's statutory defence, increase exposure to civil liability claims, and reduce community confidence in council's ability to manage its road network.'

The report, which was supported by councillors, recommends starting an amendment process, to update inspection frequencies, align defect response times with current resource capacity, and address known system and process deficiencies.

### **Environmental design**

Bass Coast Shire Council will now consider environmental sustainability in all new construction and renovation proj-

At the October meeting the updated Environmen-Sustainable Design Policy 2025 was endorsed by councillors, with the current ESD Policy adopted in 2017 and "no longer fit for purpose".

The new policy ensures sustainability will be considered in all new projects, introducing a tiered approach to applying the standards based on each project size and complexity.

Council owns or manages over 400 buildings and numerous infrastructure assets, which vary widely in their sustainability performance.

These personal pieces of history help tell the story of the club in a way that records alone cannot," said Mary Whelan, member of the organising committee.





### Big weekend when snapper season fires up

### **FISHING**

The Rhyll-Phillip Island Angling Club (RPIAC) held its third weekend angling competition.

The weather was fine on Saturday and wet on Sunday, with little more than a gentle breeze over the two days, perfect conditions for some serious fishing.

The five-hour RPIAC Ladies fishing charter, with Island Offshore Charters, was also a great success thanks to Lea Bowen and all onboard.

An incredible 76 fish, six sharks, and two calamari were weighed in, with an abundance of snapper, King George whiting, trevally, tailor, flathead, leatherjacket, sharks and cephalopods proving that the fish were well and truly on the bite and that snapper season has definitely started.

In the Squidgies Mixed Bag Points competition, the reigning Squidgie Club Champion Harley Griffin continued his impressive form, finishing first with six fish worth 105 points.

Jude Brown took second place with five fish worth 85 points.

The Junior Weight and Junior Points competitions were uncontested this weekend.

In the senior divisions, Debra Orr took out the Senior Female Points competition with a King George whiting worth 1,288 points (460 grams), while Tyce Kleverkamp claimed victory in the Senior Male Points competition with a tailor worth 2,825 points (1130 grams).

This outstanding catch also set a new RPIAC club record for tailor, surpassing the previous mark of 1075 grams, held by the current RPIAC Club Champion, James Nicolaci.

Leah Valente won the Senior Female Heaviest Weight competition with a 57cm brag mat snapper of 2290 grams and Mark Griffin secured the Senior Male Heaviest Weight competition with a snapper weighing 6830 grams, currently the heaviest weekend-competition snapper of the season.

The Shark competition was won by Theo Kastoras with a school shark weighing 13,400 grams, while Mark Griffin also took out the Squid/Cuttlefish competition with a Southern calamari weighing 1310 grams.

The Secret Weight Prize went to Frank Kastoras, whose snapper weighing 4455 grams came closest to the secret weight of 4256 grams.

The Game Fish competition was uncontested.

After the presentations, anglers and supporters gathered at the clubrooms to enjoy another friendly post-competition celebration, reflecting on what has been the most successful competition of the season so far.

None of the RPIAC Extraordinary Catch Incentives were claimed, and the members-only, competition weekend, \$1000

first-to-catch prizes for senior competitors remain in the bank.

The incentives up for grabs are for eligible species that equal or exceed the nominated weight and include King George whiting (1000 grams), snapper (10kg), Gummy shark (20kg), mulloway (25kg), and kingfish (25kg).

five-hundred-dollar The Heaviest Snapper competition, running over the October and November competition weekends, is still in play and will conclude on the Bill Wallis Trophy weekend competition, marking the fifth competition of the season.

Mark Griffin is currently in first place with his 6830-gram snapper caught this weekend.

All junior anglers who participate receive complementary membership to RPIAC, allowing them to compete for prizes and club championships in the Squidgie (anglers aged nine or younger) and Junior (anglers aged 10 to 16) categories.

The RPIAC clubrooms are open on Friday nights from 5pm and on competition weekends from 4pm, providing a great opportunity for anglers to gather, weigh in fish and share their fishing stories.

The next competition will be held over the weekend of November 8-9.

### Snapper baby boom

### **FISHING**

Snapper season is underway and recreational anglers can expect another solid spring in Port Phillip and Western Port according to modelling undertaken by fisheries scientists.

Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) CEO Travis Dowling said modelling predicted last year's snapper boom would continue to pay dividends through the rest of spring and into summer.

Last year was one of the best snapper seasons in many years, with land and boat-based fishers getting into the great outdoors and catching plenty of fish," he

"Victoria is home to some of Australia's best snapper fishing in Port Phillip and Western Port, and the season is eagerly anticipated by thousands of keen anglers."

To assess the abundance of baby snapper and compare breeding seasons, scientists collect fish measuring between three and 10cm at night using specialised nets. Results are then compared to a dataset of more than 30 years.

Spawning success varies depending on environmental conditions and strong seasons are often followed by weaker years, typical of natural variation within wild fisheries.

"We had record spawning in 2017 and what we saw in 2024 was an unprecedented snapper season in terms of catch rates according to our creel surveys," Mr Dowling said.

"That's not the only good news for snapper anglers. Our more recent 2022 monitoring showed the third highest abundance of baby snapper since surveys began in 1993, so we expect

to see great fishing continue in coming seasons."

Recreational anglers are reminded that the minimum legal size for snapper in Victoria is 28cm, and the daily bag limit is 10, of which no more than three can equal or exceed 40cm.

### Kingfish

The VFA says recreational anglers have overwhelmingly supported a proposal to change the bag limit for yellowtail kingfish.

CEO Travis Dowling said hundreds of fishers state-wide had responded to the proposal through online and in-person consultation, strongly supporting the reduction in the daily bag limit from five to two, which takes effect today.

"From more than 190 formal responses to consultation, 79 per cent were supportive of changing the bag limit of two, viewing it as being more representative of a fair day's catch. A recent VRFish survey also showed strong support from more than 1000 respondents.

"This decision strikes the right balance between encouraging people to get into the great outdoors to wet a line for kingfish and continuing to share the stock among anglers during the summer season," Mr Dowling said.

Mr Dowling said a bag limit of two would be in effect immediately, ahead of the annual season which traditionally begins when water temperatures rise to around 18 degrees in summer.

A minimum legal size of 60cm also remains in place for kingfish, which can reach 120 cm or more.
