NARRANDERA retail shops are set to be filled with weaving, photography, paintings, air brushing, sculptures and pencil drawings by local artists, showcasing talent to visitors.

The Narrandera Walk In Art Trail project is due to be launched on December 4 at the Narrandera Arts and Community Centre.

Local Community Arts Installation Narrandera facilitator Tracey Lewis said the project was a celebration of local artists.

"I can't wait to see the walls and floors of the arts centre filled with amazing works,'

The project will see works of all mediums and from visual artists aged from 12 years and up eventually installed in Narrandera shops, with support from Western Riverina Arts and Narrandera Shire Council.

"Within the town there are limited opportunities for young artists," Ms Lewis said.

"This initiative will bring emerging and established artists together by prominently exhibiting and selling their work in shop windows along Narrandera's beautiful tree lined main street, creating interest for visitors and locals.

The exhibition includes dot paintings and didgeridoos by established local indigenous artists plus book author Jane Carter.

The exhibition launch will be held on Friday, December 4 at 6pm (with registrations on Eventbrite.com.au for a free ticket) to a background of music by local musicians.

Grant funding of \$3000 was received for framing with all works framed by John Prior, Narrandera, while QPL Rural and Narrandera Shire Council have helped with the Art Trail booklets.

Hot days hit

SUMMER has begun with a vengeance as Narrandera sweltered through temperatures peaking at 40.8 degrees last week.

And, another heatwave is in store with today (Thursday) forecast to be 37 degrees, 40 degrees for Friday, peaking at 43 degrees on Saturday, 40 degrees for Sunday and 38 for Monday.

Last Friday reached a top of 40.2 degrees, Saturday 40.8 and Sunday 39.4 before a cool change brought relief at 27.3 degrees and thunderstorms.

The highest temperature recorded in November at Narrandera is 43 degrees in 1980. The average temperature this month has

been 30.8 degrees, above the long-term average of 28.1 degrees.

A stop harvesting advice was issued to growers in the MIA district on November 19 and 22. A weather front swept through the region on

the weekend bringing with it lightning strikes which caused a fire near Coolamon destroying Farmers were quickly onto the scene, along

with the Rural Fire Service and two graders from Coolamon Shire Council were used to contain the blaze. The Bureau of Meteorology has recorded 570.8mm at the Narrandera airport for the year

- compared to 234.6mm for the same period A total of 8.8mm fell on Monday while the average rainfall for Narrandera to November

is 403.5mm.

CANCER patients in the Narrandera Shire have been given a helping hand with financial assistance granted to Can Assist.

Narrandera Shire Council resolved to provide financial assistance to Narrandera Can Assist by absorbing the travel costs of clients through the Narrandera Leeton Community Transport service.

In March, the community transport service offered to provide financial assistance to Can Assist to ensure residents could attend medical appointments.

This assistance amounted to \$289 and for the current financial year, \$550.

The cost is funded through Health Related Transport Deputy general manager corporate and community

Martin Hiscox said Narrandera Can Assist provided an invaluable service to residents through the provision of emotional and financial support for clients to attend medical appointments. "Due to the pandemic, Narrandera Can Assist had

to suspend fund raising activities and was not able to pay for client transport costs," Mr Hiscox said.

Council endorsed to pay \$289 for the 2019-2020

financial year and ongoing assistance until Narrandera Can Assist is able to restart fund raising.

Donations roll in for hampers

THE generosity of local business houses and residents will enable Christmas food hampers to be distributed to the needy in the Narrandera Shire.

Narrandera Meals on Wheels appealed for donations for the hampers with QPL Rural immediately tipping in \$100 and individuals \$20 each, resulting in 15 hampers

Coordinator Sonya Hammer said the \$20 donations bought a box full of non-perishable groceries enabling a family to have a festive

These included pasta sauce, tuna, Christmas pudding, tea and coffee, baked beans, diced tomatoes, canned fruit, shortbread, spaghetti, fruit cake, ham, rice, dressing, crisps and lollies.

"This is a new partnership between Meals on Wheels and Food Bank giving hampers to our clients," Mrs Hammer said.

"We have 50 clients in Narrandera plus we deliver to Barellan and Grong Grong.

"To qualify as a client, people must be 65 years and older, and want to remain in their home independently, or 50 years and older for Aboriginal people.

"Referrals are made through My Aged Care and we can help people with that process.

In the past six months, Narrandera Meals on Wheels have sold 357 chicken parmigiana and 859 braised steak and onion dishes, and dished up a staggering 39,000

meal items.

Meals are delivered from Narrandera to Leeton, Griffith, Murrumbidgee, Temora, Young, The Rock, Henty, Holbrook, Lavington, Albury, Hay, Hillston and Wentworth.

'We are getting organised for Christmas and trying to make it a little cheerier for our clients," Mrs Hammer said.

"If we could distribute 30 to 40 boxes that would be fantastic but it really does depend on the community donations.

"Donors can contact us for

Orders are being taken for glazed ham and turkey breast served with gravy and vegetables for \$6.20 and frozen berry cheesecake for \$2.70 as a Christmas meal.

Mrs Hammer said a training package for volunteers had been developed by NSW Meals on Wheels Association and would be implemented in the New Year to win back volunteers lost during

Koala Count lauded

NARRANDERA'S annual koala count has been held up by Federal Environment Minister Sussan Ley as a shining example for the planned national census.

The \$2 million national count is part of a new \$18 million commitment from the Federal Government and will identify koala habitat areas and establish an annual monitoring program.

Ms Ley said the koala count at Narrandera involved volunteers supervised by National Parks and Wildlife reporting and counting the animals.

"And there are other ways of doing it but that's the practical approach that I'm looking to complement the work of our scientists and experts," she said.

"We love our local koalas, but we just don't have the big picture so part of the announcement is all about a national koala census."

Ms Ley said there were challenges of urban planning when it comes to koalas.

"One of their biggest threats is actually dogs and cars, and there's also disease and we live where they live," she said.

The landmark koala package will include funding for health research and medical support, as well as the restoration of key habitat sites through on-ground actions such as revegetation, weed control, fencing, managed grazing and tailored fire planning and implementation.

Minister Ley said the koala audit would help direct Commonwealth, state and private funding to where it will achieve the most good for the species.

Annual reporting on koala populations and conservation strategies will become a manda-

National Environment Ministers and a range of techniques will be employed from scat monitoring to drone and acoustic surveys, detector dogs and citizen science surveys.

Emeritus Professor Helene Marsh, Chair of the Threatened Species Scientific Committee said that despite their iconic status, there is still much to learn about koalas in different parts of their range.

"State and territory agencies, researchers and community groups are collecting much valuable information but there are still gaps and there is a need for national coordination and reporting," Prof Marsh said.

This funding boost will build on these efforts, to give us a much better picture on population numbers and trends, in turn enabling us to better target our conservation effort."

From the funding package, a further \$2 million will be invested in koala health research and veterinary support, tackling challenges such as Chlamydia and other diseases that are second only to car strikes in the normal causes of koala mortality recorded in veterinary hospitals.

The remaining \$14 million will help restore impacted koala habitat in both bushfire and non-bushfire affected areas and provide targeted funding for koala habitat in northern NSW and southern Queensland.

The NSW Premier and Deputy Premier scrapped the new SEPP, reverted to the old SEPP, and agreed to sit down with farmers to develop a new policy to protect koalas and the interests of farmers.

Call to identify health gaps

NARRANDERA has joined Leeton in a push to identify gaps in the health and hospital services in the region.

Narrandera Shire Council Mayor Neville Kschenka told councillors concerns had been raised in the region, particularly around ambulance

Cr Kschenka said the concerns were not staff related but patient transport was taking ambulances out

He asked the Council to make a submission to the inquiry called by the NSW Legislative Council into health outcomes and access to health and hospital services in rural, regional and remote NSW.

The inquiry will examine patient experience, wait-times, an analysis of health expenditure in regional NSW, staffing challenges, provision of ambulance services, availability of oncology treatment and palliative care, and the impact of hospital services on indigenous communities.

Cr Kschenka called upon shire residents to make individual submissions to the inquiry.

"If they have any incidents to let us know about, please contact us so we can include it in our submission,"

Leeton Shire Council will be providing a submission to the inquiry with a view to ensuring regional communities have fair access to quality health

Leeton Shire is seeking feedback from the community about personal experiences and thoughts for all health-related services.

Mayor Paul Maytom said feedback would help identify any common needs, areas of strength and any gaps in services required to meet the Shire's health needs.

"It is vital people who live in rural, regional and remote areas such as ours have comparable health outcomes and access to health and hospital services to those who live in metropolitan areas," Cr Maytom said.

"This is an important opportunity for residents to have their views heard by a parliamentary committee and for the committee to gather valuable information on health and patient outcomes experienced here."

There is an online engagement portal at haveyoursay.leeton.nsw.gov.au with the deadline for feedback extended from November 22 to 5pm today (November 26).

Leeton Shire also held a public engagement session on November 23 with a second one at the Roxy Theatre today at 1pm.

Mayor Maytom said the inquiry would not conduct investigations or reviews of individual cases.

Specific concerns about individual experiences can be raised with the NSW Health Care Complaints Commission on 02 9219 7444.

Pool entry slashed

REDUCED gate prices have been offered to swimmers by Narrandera Shire Council due to the delayed access to the \$5.8 million upgrade at Lake Talbot Water Park.

The Park will be opened in stages as each of the pool areas are complete.

Due to the shorter season and limited access to some areas during the staged opening, Council will be reducing the gate admission (a 50 per cent saving until 23 January 23) and season pass (50 per cent

Day passes (until January 23) are: Children under 3 are free, Senior Citizens and non-swimmers \$1 and Swimmers \$2.

Season passes: Single \$55; Family \$125, Small Family (eg. single parent with two chil-

The eastern part of the facility will open to the public including the BBQs, water slides, kiosk, top changerooms, Olympic and middle pools on December 12.

The new splash park will become accessible for everyone to enjoy on December 23.

The final area on the western side of the facility will be opened on January 22, including the toddler pool, bottom changerooms, plantroom roof area, bottom enabled gate, accessibility pathway and ramps.

During stage one and two there will be limited disability access. The access will be at the top entrance with some stairs involved, while only the top changerooms will be available for use.

Tributes flow for champion of remote Aboriginal communities

Michael Galluzzo will be remembered by everyone as a happy, loyal, hardworking, compassionate mentor,

A HIGH achiever in his academic and professional life, the late Michael Dominic Galluzzo made a considerable contribution to the welfare of Aboriginal people and was a champion of remote communities in Australia and overseas.

Michael was born on May 23, 1986 at the Narrandera Hospital to loving parents Joe and Jean Galluzzo and the youngest brother to Tony, Roseanne and Angela.

Starting from a young age he was a natural born leader as the first Aboriginal School Captain in primary school and continued on to become a State SRC rep, State Debater, National Youth Roundtable selectee, Aboriginal National Youth Committee member and an invited participant with the then Prime Minister Kevin Rudd and other high school students from across the country to participate in the youth summit.

Being a dedicated student and community champion Michael received many awards and the prestigious Charles Allan Seymour Hawker Memorial Scholarship.

After Year 12, Michael made the big move Canberra to fulfil his dream of gaining a Bachelor of Law/Bachelor of Arts degree. It was in Canberra where the boy from Narrandera really started to find his passion in advocating for the disenfranchised including remote Aboriginal communities and other

Michael made the most of his new life as a uni student and didn't let studying a double degree stop him from experiencing all that uni life had to offer.

Michael continued his leadership roles as Student Union President, National Student Union committee member, setting up charity organisations to support remote Aboriginal communities and undertaking volunteer work with Australian Volunteers International - working to support and improve the conditions for families and children in remote and isolated villages in Indonesia, India and South Africa.

was awarded the ACT Australia Day Youth of the Year Award. He may not have won the National award but he brought attention to the many causes and plights he was an advocate for.

Nearing the completion of his degrees Michael was ready to tackle the world. Committed to making a difference, he began working at Reconciliation Australia to help bridge the gap for Aboriginal communities. His most cherished moment was being a part of "The National Apology".

His work with Aboriginal Peoples didn't end there, he then went on to work with the Healing Foundation in 2011 where he worked tirelessly to support Stolen Generation survivors and their descendants. Michael embraced a new home in Melbourne,

started a new job with Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) and continued with In Melbourne, his volunteer career really took off

and he became an active and dedicated member of Rotaract and Rotary. Michael was proud of his presidency of both clubs and the opportunity to lead change. In Melbourne Michael met the love of his life

Franco, and got engaged in September 2017 before Franco tragically passed away at the young age of 32. Michael was much loved by Franco's family in Bulacan, Philippines. Culture was important to Michael, both his Aborig-

inal (Wiradjuri) and Italian heritage. He travelled to Italy many times to his father's home town of Cinquefrondi in Calabria, Southern Italy.

He caught the travel bug early on starting with a trip with friends in high school to the Australian Outback. He travelled and experienced the world's beauty and many cultures, visiting close to 30 countries and seeing more of Australia through his work, going through a number of passports.

With his extensive travelling knowledge, love of world cuisines, family recipes and working with community, together with his two sisters, Michael started a new venture – Kitos in Wagga.

Michael lived a short life but he made sure to live every day to the fullest. He accomplished so much and made a huge impact on everyone he met and was always willing to give a hand and go that extra mile.

Inspiring with HerCanberra

FOUNDER of HerCanberra, Amanda Whitley is one of Canberra's best-known entrepreneurs and the University of Canberra

The former Narrandera woman provides huge inspiration with her innovative outlook, resilience and hard work.

Amanda is a woman who has learnt to adapt to the ebbs and flows of the media industry where change is inevitable and resilience, innovation and hard work are mandatory.

She did her work experience at the Narrandera Argus while attending Narrandera High School and is the daughter of Margaret Whitley and the late Michael Whitley, a returned ex-serviceman and former president of the Narrandera Exservicemen's Club.

Amanda juggles family commitments with a burgeoning business.

It was during a difficult period when her second-born daughter Sophia was premature and she could no longer work as a communications director at the Australian Public Service that she began volunteering with a smallbut-growing website, and formed an online friendship with the site's editor

That website was Mamamia, which expanded in recent years, evolving into Australia's largest independent women's media group.

Amanda was ready for new challenges and realised Canberra did not have an online community for women and so HerCanberra was born.

By 2011, HerCanberra was operating out of Amanda's home, creating an inclusive digital community for women in Canberra.

The online magazine focused on a wide range of issues impacting women quickly found a previously untapped market.

HerCanberra grew into one of Canberra's leading lifestyle media brands and when COVID-19 changed the media landscape n 2020 Amanda drew on both her upbringing and experience to come up

Business at HerCanberra was booming until the pandemic struck this year, forcing HerCanberra mainstays such as event promotions to be curtailed. This resulted in a significant downturn in the business. as it did most media organisations

Amanda stepped back from the day-to-day running to take up a position as the Deputy Information coordinator for the ACT Government's COVID-19 response, managing the public information campaigns, social media channels and website.

Her decision to work outside HerCanberra ensured the survival of the business, with the website continuing with an audience that relies on its content more than ever in these uncertain times.

"I feel incredibly fortunate I have been given an opportunity to step into an important role which allows me to give back to my community in a different way, while relieving financial


pressure on the business and also giving the HerCanberra team a chance to put their own stamp on the brand."

Growing up in the small country town of Narrandera she always wanted to write for magazines, but didn't get the required score to get into journalism.

Not to be deterred she began studying a degree in General Communications, moving to Public Relations at the end of her first year.

After looking at several universities that had Communication courses, she decided on the University of Canberra and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Communication, specialising in Public Relations.

Her first job out of university was at a fashion and PR agency in Sydney, promoting high profile brands such as Ray-Ban and Redkenbut it wasn't for her and she ended up moving to Griffith to be

nearer to her family after her father was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis.

Amanda became a driving force in marketing with Riverina Citrus, an organisation that represented around 450 citrus growers. She ran national marketing campaigns, lobbied politicians, and effectively ensured the product was being sold in supermarkets around Australia.

This five-year period proved to be pivotal, as she entered the next phase of her life as an Australian Public Service Communications Director back in Canberra, before embarking on the journey that would lead to one of the most successful media stories to emerge from the ACT - HerCanberra.

The success of HerCanberra has brought many accolades for Amanda. She was awarded the title of ACT Woman of the Year in 2016 and was named one of the '100 Years, 100 Great Women' by UN Australia, for making a difference to Canberra.

Youth step up advocacy for more mental health services

NARRANDERA youth continue to advocate for the need of mental health services and facilities within the Shire.

Following interviews with local Narrandera High School students, it is clear the need for these services and facilities is an important issue in this town and region.

For students undertaking their Higher School Certificate examinations, stress is a common concern to them and other

Feelings of frustration, apprehension and tiredness are becoming more common.

"The environment is not as happy as it could be, so learning does not go as well as it could," one Year 12 student

The pressure and stress from teachers and family to perform well is increasing, in particular during exam time and on top of the coronavirus, the ability for students to learn has been impaired significantly.

Student interviewees agreed it has been harder to learn from home than at school, as it has been challenging to adapt their learning to a new virtual environment. It has caused them to miss out on events and experiences that previous year 12 students have had.

These contributing factors have all made this year extremely stressful and challenging.

Local students believe mental health facilities and services located in Narrandera are needed, especially to reduce examrelated stress. It will give easy access for people in the Narrandera Shire to seek mental health advice, instead of travelling to neighbouring townships for these consultations. "There is a need to express and talk

about mental health without barriers, like travel and we need to be able to talk to someone directly and easily in Narrandera," one student said.

It is agreed, there is an urgent need for specialist mental health professionals who could help students to manage school-related stress and anxiety by individual consultations or group work-

Narrandera Youth Advisory Councillor Mayor Braden Lyons, Youth Advisory Councillor Deputy Mayor Wesley Bamblett, and Youth Councillor Madeline Fraser also agree the need for local people to access these facilities and services locally.

The Youth Advisory Council plans to hopefully initiate the development of these facilities by contacting the Member for Cootamundra Steph Cooke, lobbying for grants and funding, and having community involvement.

"What we want to see is permanent mental health facilities for the whole town to go there, whenever they want, no shame and stigma," Youth Cr Lyons

The Youth Advisory Council wants these facilities to be welcoming, a place where people will not be judged.

One Youth Councillor said female and male therapists would be needed for those who do not feel comfortable talking to the other sex.

Workshops specialising in certain mental health areas, such as managing anxiety, would be beneficial. Youth Cr Fraser said having mentors who

have experienced certain events will help. "It will benefit young people. We have seen in this town before, where young people have struggled and have sadly

taken their life," Youth Cr Lyons said.

"It seems to be a real problem in Narrandera and other rural towns. A lot of people cry out for help, but don't get it or don't know how.'

The Youth Council believes permanent services and facilities in Narrandera will make seeking help easier and simpler.

"If someone who is suffering and can't seek help from a parent, grandparent or whoever it may be, they can go down there, and it might just save a life," Cr Lyons said.

Youth Councillors suggested home consultations, where the specialist visits the patient's home, could help some people feel more comfortable to openly talk in a familiar environment.

Permanent mental health facilities can also provide opportunities for local people to be professionally trained and find employment within Narrandera.

"These facilities could do traineeships for young people who want to get into mental health therapy," Cr Lyons said.

"This might encourage them to stay here and be a part of the facility." The Youth Advisory Council agreed the

need for the facilities and services have increased during the COVID-19 pandemic, especially for those who have lost jobs or students that are unable to go to school, which may amplify mental health struggles.

"It has definitely brought out some anxiety for young people. Not being able to go out and see friends, and getting back into normality can be stressful," Cr Bamblett said.

Coolamon Cheese aims for lactose-free brie

ARTISAN cheesemaker Coolamon Cheese Co's brie has won an international award offered by Hyundai Australia.

Hyundai announced in August it would be giving its 2020 advertising budget to three small businesses who needed it more, and artisan cheesemaker Coolamon Cheese Co is the first company to receive this

The Take a Load Off award was especially welcome in a year that has thrown a number of difficult obstacles at small businesses such Coolamon Cheese, which had to close their main public-facing venue due

General manager Keiran Spencer told Business Insider Australia its cheesemaking, cheese tasting and cheese tour revenues were lost and many wholesale customers running cafes/restaurants were gone.

Revenues from farmer's markets and food festivals also went.

On top of that, successive seasons of drought reduced cafe and restaurant trade from a local perspective.

"COVID-19 had an undeniable impact on our business as it has with other businesses, including the businesses that buy from us. It is by far the biggest impact on trade in all departments," Mr Spencer

"Retail and wholesale sales were down by up to 92 per cent during COVID restrictions. Many of our wholesale customers had to close their doors during those restrictions. This had a flow-on effect to our wholesale

During the process the company had to outsource its café/restaurant and let go its 15 staff members, many of whom were locals, several of whom had been with the business for a number of years since opening.

Coolamon Cheese Co was established in 2015 with qualified microbiologist Barry Lillywhite, the business's founding cheese-

SMALL businesses need to have an up-to-date business plan in place, especially in relation to COVID-19.

This was the message delivered by presenters at a Small Business Month breakfast seminar run by the Lockhart Shire Council in partnership with the Business Enterprise Centre recently at Lockhart Ex-servicemen's

The seminar titled Future Proof Your Business and Build your Brand on Social Media was hosted by BEC consultants and independent business owners Casey Wilson and David Yeates.

"Having a business plan helps identify where the issues are in your business, Mr Yeates said.

Using his business as an example, Mr Yeates expressed the need to have an up to date business plan.

"Even though we already had a business plan, it didn't matter because the whole world has changed and we need to look at how we are going to survive through this pandemic.

"There are a lot of resources available online and the BEC also offer a range of tools and resources to assist with writing a business plan.

"I highly recommend business owners talk to somebody about the doubts you have with your business. Whether it's your business adviser, your bank manager or a friend, find someone to talk to.

"Ask questions and ask people for help. I find people are more than willing to help out."

Mr Yeates emphasised the importance of setting a rolling start date for your business during the COVID pandemic.

We need to set a start date and make it flexible. if the restrictions are lifted early or if they delay, we need to be ready," he said. He also encouraged business owners to

"For Facebook and Instagram, you need to be consistent and should be doing three to four posts a week." To better understand the target market,

she suggested building relationships through online groups and interacting with audiences to refine messaging.

Reply to people's comments on your social media posts and ask questions in your posts for your audience to answer," Ms Wilson said.



BARELLAN'S winning crop in the Western Division of the dryland wheat competition has yielded 5.7 tonnes a hectare for the Hawker family.

Graeme, Leanne and Mitchell Hawker, of Brobenah, harvested the crop of Beckom last week on "Bleakhouse", storing a portion in grain bags, and delivering to GrainCorp Barellan.

Grading H2, the wheat had a protein level of 12.1-12.5 per cent, 4-4.5 per cent screenings and a grain weight of 80kg/hectolitre.

The crop just missed out qualifying for zone judging as district winners had to be 6t/ha plus.

The crop of Beckom was direct drilled into a paddock which had produced a brown manured crop of vetch in 2019.

The wheat was sown into good soil moisture using a Case tillage bar and Bourgault cart on May 13 at a sowing depth of 25mm, on a 300mm row spacing and at 40kg/ha.

The fertiliser at sowing was 90kg/ha of N-Rich 26 split between the seed and deep banded.

The crop was top dressed with 60kg/ha of Urea

in August.

"We had a perfect season with good soil moisture, it wasn't too wet over the winter and we had a couple of good rains in the spring enabling the crop to carry through," Mr Hawker said.

Up until harvest, the crop had received 450mm

"It's the best crop I've grown in 45 years of farming - last year was one of the worst, we just got our seed back," Mr Hawker said.

"It was the stored soil moisture that got us over the line. To have a year like this is fantastic.'

The family uses a blend of minimum and zero till, sowing with knife points and press wheels at 9km/hr, to achieve their yields across 1600ha.

"All our crops have gone exceptionally good right across the board - I've never had a year where the yields were so good," Mr Hawker said.

Yielding 4-5t/ha with a protein of 12-13 per cent, the barley graded BAR 1 with some delivered to Barellan and the balance stored on-farm.

Storms delivered up to 20mm of rain earlier this week, delaying the oat harvest.

Epic water walk for Lloyd

AN EPIC journey to raise awareness about environmental and humanitarian issues impacting southern NSW will finish at Hume Dam next Saturday.

The 303km journey which began in the small rural town of Barham on the NSW side of the Murray River on November 11 will end for Lloyd Polkinghorne at Hume Dam around lunchtime on Saturday,

What is now known as Lloyd's Walk for Water has been well supported by locals as the former farmer and now Koondrook-Barham Bridge newspaper editor stops in on a number of rural communities

 $Mr \, Polking horne\, said\, the\, walk\, was\, his\, contribution$ to raising awareness about the devastating impacts of the Murray Darling Basin Plan and water reform on the environment and people in the region he grew

"The average Australian would be absolutely appalled if they were aware of the destruction to the environment which is taking place along the Murray between Hume and Barham," he said.

"They would be gobsmacked at the annihilation of our premier food bowl, forcing good farmers who took pride in caring for the environment off their farms.

The river banks are collapsing, forests are sick from over watering and the mental health issues being faced by these salt of the earth people is unacceptable.

"I wanted to give people the opportunity to tell their story; there are so many people who have been hurt and are hurting by political decisions.

"We just have to get the message out there the plan is not working."

Mr Polkinghorne said it was in the best interest of the entire country the water mess was fixed.

"The walk has allowed people to come and share their stories in a non-threatening environment. These are stories which the rest of Australia need to know about.

"The amount of support I have received from total strangers just goes to show how important our rural communities are and what they are made

of. But these people are at the end of their tether with how they have been treated by governments,'

Mr Polkinghorne said the ultimate achievement would be drive change for those few who are left on the land to produce food and fibre for the rest of us.

"These remaining people need reliable and affordable water, simple as that," he said.

Work with us, not against

Farmers lumping

EDITOR; While much of the country came to a standstill with the COVID pandemic, farmers and the agricultural industry have once again proved to be the backbone of the nation, with our farmers continuing to put their heads down when the going gets tough.

What a shame in our part of the nation this occurs not only without government support, but the exact opposite.

Farmers are used to working in isolation in one form or another, so while those in other industries such as tourism, hospitality and retail have been hit hard, our food and fibre producers continue to soldier on.

However, as we do this, those of us in southern NSW and northern Victoria have had a gutful of wearing the brunt of South Australian errors in environmental management and the political inertia around fixing it.

The latest insult is the proposal for irrigators in NSW to be lumped with a 62 per cent increase in Murray-Darling Basin Authority fees.

Why is it always irrigators who pay? One of the Basin Plan's objectives is to keep the Murray Mouth open 95 per cent of the time, and as a result of agreements between Basin states, they contribute to the cost of the dredges at the Murray Mouth.

The silting which forces the need for this dredging is a direct result of the barrages preventing ocean tidal action from clearing the opening from Lake Alexandrina and the Southern

At the same time farmers are paying the costs associated with forcing more water down the system, yet suffering from a reduction in irrigation reliability from 84 per cent 20 years ago to 48 per cent now.

And please don't even get me started on governments ignoring the best available science which is telling them about the impacts of decreased basin inflows and rising sea levels.

There will be a tipping point when barrages and river flows can no longer perform the functions that have been in place for nearly 80 years.

My hope is one day our leaders will wake up and realise they are killing the system the Basin Plan was designed to protect, and our food and fibre producers are collateral damage.

All this because South Australia refuses to effectively manage the end of the system and shows no interest in using water wisely for the benefit of all Australians.

Our nation's forefathers would be rolling in their graves if they knew how their foresight in building world's best water infrastructure was being mismanaged.
