### New faces to join councils

BARUNGA West and Yorke Peninsula Council residents have elected their new councils.

Several new faces will join their respective councils, with voting closing last Thursday, November 10, and votes counted on Saturday, November 12.

Only YPC ratepayers in the Gum Flat ward had to vote, with four candidates nominating for three positions, as Kalkabury and Innes-Penton Vale wards only received four nominees — the exact number of available positions.

Newly appointed, Trevor Clerke, Kylie Gray and Michael O'Connell will join council ranks, with Scott Hoyle and Alan Headon returning after terms in 2014.

Mayor Darren Braund was elected unopposed.

There were 11 candidates for nine positions in BWC, with a mayor to be chosen from within elected members.

First-time councillors Kim Gregory and Kevin Beinke are joined by former

mayor Cynthia Axford as newer faces to the BWC numbers.

No votes were counted in Copper Coast Council, with only eight nominees for nine positions.

Andrew Male joins CCC as a new councillor.

Mayor Roslyn Talbot was also elected unopposed.

### **History repeating**

NOW the repairs of the collapsed mineshaft or sinkhole at East Moonta have been completed, I would like to share a memory involving the same spot some 68 years ago.

Jack Lodge, a local carrier residing at East Moonta, almost drove his truck into a collapsed mineshaft on the corner of Shepardson Road in

He notified the Kadina District Council and the highways department, situated in Moonta, which was working on the Moonta/Maitland road at the time and together repairs were completed as soon as possible.

I sought information recording the event from the YP Country Times, unfortunately none was

This was in the day of The People's Weekly so the actual date and time is not available.

As the latest collapse involved a burst water pipe and rainfall, I sought rainfall charts from the Moonta and Kadina Post Offices — very interesting comparisons were found.

The average rainfall for Moonta is 384mm, Kadina 389mm.

In 1951, Moonta recorded 445mm, Kadina 489mm.

In 1952, Moonta 460mm, Kadina 474mm. In 1953, Moonta 350mm, Kadina 352mm. In 1954, Moonta 354mm, Kadina 341mm. Now things get interesting.

Moonta's records are monthly and Kadina's

In 1953, Moonta recorded 281mm from June to December, a further 32mm in January 1954, 85mm until April and 12mm leading into May.

It seems to me very likely the collapse occurred in May during school holidays at the

Being a student on the school bus at the time, I do not recall any road restraints, closures or

This is why I think it occurred during the school holidays and repairs were completed in this time. Further repairs were needed between 1995 and 2000.

Kevin Browning, driving his truck, informed council of the day that repairs were needed before an accident occurred.

There was quite a dip in the road at the time. Being overseas at the time a date is not

There are many fenced off holes throughout the Mines precinct, one in particular was used as a rubbish pit until it was fenced off.

Remnants can still be seen.

When I got home, Pat asked, "What the ... happened to you?"


My shirt was torn, my shorts were torn slightly, I had scratches to my arms and legs.


I have released emus from wire fences (which is not easy) but have not been attacked by the male because it was on the Willochra Plain, where no animals can jump out of bushes.

AUSTRALIA'S largest soft plastic recycling program REDcycle has suspended its supermarket collection scheme after revealing warehouses full of unrecycled materials.

Plastics collected in the program at supermarkets were used to create recycled plastic items through Australian companies Replas and Close the Loop.

"Consumer recycling of soft plastic

has grown exponentially in recent years, with a 350 per cent increase in plastic returned since 2019," a REDcycle spokesperson said.

"However, due to several unforeseen challenges exacerbated by the pandemic, REDcycle's recycling partners have temporarily stopped accepting and processing soft plastics.

"This combination has put untenable pressure on the REDcycle business model.

"We can't confirm at this stage the length of the pause, but we can assure

you all stakeholders are working on solutions for the short-term pipeline imbalance."

As a result, Woolworths will cease to be a collection point while Drakes management is reassessing its options.

"We are currently working through a range of options with the Australian Food and Grocery Council, the Australian Packaging Covenant Organisation, and the recycling industry to support the future of soft plastic recycling," a Woolworths spokesperson said.

The program's sudden halt has left locals confused and frustrated, as the soft plastics can't be recycled though weekly kerbside bin collection.

Wallaroo Primary School is one of many schools on Yorke Peninsula which utilised soft plastic collection and will now be advising student to throw soft plastic into waste bins.

"There is still a demand for a recycling program for soft plastic while we strive to one day be fully biodegradable," principal Dominica Thomson

"All classes and staff have been recycling soft plastic as much as we can.

"We only laminate what we need to and we hope to one day be plastic free.

"Even if we keep pushing to reduce the plastic, we still get mail, et cetera, in plastic wrapping."

School groundskeeper David Hettner, is one of many who are disappointed by the recent announcement.

These programs are set up and we get on board, but then down the track we see the infrastructure isn't there to sustain them," he said.

### **Local man blows** four times limit

A WALLAROO man was caught driving with more than four times the legal blood alcohol limit early yesterday morning (Monday, November 14).

A Yorke Mid North Highway patrol stopped a vehicle just before 12.30am on Irwine Street, Wallaroo, for a mobile driver

The driver, a 47-year-old local man, recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.215.

He was reported for drink driving, issued an instant 12-month loss of licence and had his vehicle impounded for 28 days.

He will appear in the Kadina Magistrates Court at a later date.

#### SYP police catch drink driver

Minlaton police reported a man for drink driving on Friday evening, November 11.

A vehicle was stopped for a roadside breath test at 7.55pm on Progress Road, Hardwicke Bay.

The driver, a 45-year-old man from Salisbury Downs, returned a positive blood alcohol result; he was then required to complete a breath analysis at a southern Yorke Peninsula police station, where he recorded a reading of 0.128.

The man was issued with an immediate six-month loss of licence for drink driving. He will appear in the Maitland Magistrates Court at a later date.

#### Moonta Bay man blows over

A Moonta Bay man was caught drink driving late on Friday night.

Copper Coast police stopped a vehicle and submitted the driver to a blood alcohol test at 11.33pm on Bay Road, Moonta

The driver, a 55-year-old male from Moonta Bay, returned a positive blood alcohol result.

Following a further breath analysis at Kadina Police Station, the man returned a reading of 0.088, and he was issued an immediate six-month loss of licence.

He will appear in the Kadina Magistrates Court at a later date.

### Locals urged to lock vehicles

Numerous vehicles have been illegally interfered with in Wallaroo across recent

Copper Coast police have received multiple complaints from local residents, particularly in the Copper Cove Marina, of vehicles being entered.

"All the vehicles appeared to have been unlocked as there's been no damage observed," a police spokesperson said.

"The intruders seem to be looking for money and other valuable items.

"I'm encouraging people to make a concerted effort to lock and avoid storing any items of value in their vehicles."

FIRE DANGER RATING... The new Australian Fire Danger Rating System has four levels, Moderate, High, Extreme and Catastrophic, and has been active since September 1.

### **New fire rating system**

NATIONAL Council for Fire and Emergency Services has implemented a new \$50 million nationwide rating system.

The new four level Australian Fire Danger Rating System replaces the previous six stage system, in place for more than 50 years, and is nationally consistent.

Levels are now considered moderate (plan and prepare), high (be ready to act), extreme (take action now) and catastrophic (for your survival, leave risk areas).

Northern Yorke Peninsula CFS group officer David Bussenschutt said the new rating system would make it easier for families to identify when they needed to take action against potential fires.

"The new system brings a standard that is used all across Australia," Mr Bussenschutt

"The system has been researched and trialled for over a year, and we have done a lot of work in the background to make sure the new fire danger ratings are matching up with actual fire behaviours as well.

"We have had some horrendous fire weather in recent times, and people need to be aware of recent fire behaviours and what the serious the rating is each day hence why the new rating system is so important."

The new system has been in place since September 1, with Yorke Peninsula's fire danger season officially starting today (Tuesday, November 15).

Local CFS brigades were

called out to five small grass fires last week.

"The new fire rating system makes it easier for everyone to understand the risk, whether that's farmers, families or even those going out to fight the fires," Mr Bussenschutt said.

"It's a simpler system that not just the state but the entire country can follow and it has shown how useful that rework of the fire danger system is already."

### **Drive to the conditions**

POLICE have pleaded with the local community to be patient and to take care on the roads after recent severe weather across South Australia.

A spokesperson encouraged drivers to leave for their destinations earlier than usual to prepare for expected delays caused by conditions.

"Police urge motorists to slow down, drive to the conditions, never drive or ride through floodwaters and obey the directions of emergency services personnel," they said.

"Local flooding and road damage has also been reported with many roads closed in regional areas.

"Please check on vulnerable family members, neighbours, and people in your community to ensure they are

### **More wet**

### weather expected

THE Bureau of Meteorology has warned Yorke Peninsula residents to expect more wet weather this weekend thanks to another low-pressure system.

Although the upcoming weekend is expected to be wet, the forecast is for weather less intense than that of Saturday, November 12.

A BOM spokesperson said winds of up to 80km/h at Edithburgh and Stenhouse Bay were caused by a lowpressure system from the south east Indian Ocean on Saturday.

"The low-pressure system brought on several troughs of heavy rain and a cold front which brought on temperatures in the low teens despite reaching the mid-30s earlier in the week", the spokesperson said.

"During the course of the weekend, several locations received heavy rainfalls, with Pine Point recording 51mm, Maitland 42mm Edithburgh 40mm.

"The coming low-pressure system will stabilise from Tuesday to Friday, bringing clear skies and cooler temperatures before the rain is set to return on Friday evening.

YP AG agronomist Chris Davey said the wintry weather would reduce quality rather than quantity of the current harvest.

"Despite some YP farmers already starting harvest in the first weeks of November, the crops continue to hold on

during the extreme weather experienced," Mr Davey said.

There has a been a small percentage of grain lost in barley and lentil paddocks that were ready for harvest-

"Depending on where you are located, farmers have recorded 10 to 60mm of rain over the weekend.

"Reports of wrinkled lentils and black tipped barley are starting to come through since the recent rain.

"The wild and woolly weather continues to prolong harvest, and threatens to take the cream off of what should be a good harvest for local farmers.

"Fingers crossed we don't experience any more wind and rain in the coming weeks that further reduce yields."

### YP left in the dark after severe weather

SA Power Networks responded to more 163,000 customers being left without power following thunderstorms acroos the state on Saturday, November 12.

The power outages were a result of more than 423,000 lightning strikes and wind gusts measuring up to 106 km/h, which damaged electricity infrastructure.

SAPN head of corporate affairs Paul Roberts said the power supply on Yorke Peninsula was significantly impacted by the severe weather.

"For the people on YP, it has certainly been a very disruptive time, as our crews had also been responding to outages for several days before the

weekend," Mr Roberts said.

"This is the largest outage event we have had since the state-wide blackout in 2016."

Mr Roberts said SAPN crews have restored the majority of power across the peninsula.

There were 29 customers were still affected - 17 in Ardrossan and 12 in Yorketown - according to the SAPN outage map at the time of print.

"We will have some customers without power into today (Tuesday); as crews get to site and determine when we can reconnect their electricity supply, we will provide them with SMS updates," Mr Roberts said.

"SAPN has mobilised all possible resources and called interstate field resources to assist.

"We are doing everything we can

to respond to what is an extreme event and thank the many customers who have thanked crews for their efforts."

Among locals affected by the outages, Yorketown Area School, St Memorial School, Columba's and Yorketown Yorketown, Community Children's Centre students were forced to shut their doors again today (Tuesday).

SCMS principal Scott March said Yorketown's educators were just a few of the 50 schools affected across the

"We woke up without power this morning and saw the restoration time was about 1.40pm this afternoon," Mr March said.

"We're not able to run the school site without power as we rely heavily on communication and internet, so we decided to close the schools.

"This has been really challenging with an already interrupted year, due to Covid and weather issues.

"However, our school community has been very understanding and resilient."

Boors Plain resident Kathryn Dayman was left without power for more than 50 hours. "We've had to throw out all our

(refrigerated) food, which we put in insurance claims for," she said. "It's been a bit difficult with kids

who need to get to school and work, as we still need to get them showered and charge their phones.

"It's also been quite expensive to rely on takeaway and keep putting fuel in the generator."

### **CFS** cleans up the mess

LOCAL CFS crews were kept busy responding to weather-related incidents across the weekend.

"CFS responded to more than 800 incidents during this weekend's severe weather; however, we predict the incident response from brigades was significantly higher," a CFS spokesperson said.

### George Street works enter final phase

STORMWATER works on George Street, Moonta, have entered the final stage.

Phases one, two and three of the project, spanning from Henry to Ellen Street are complete.

These phases comprised undergrounding 500 metres of new central stormwater pipe, linking with the existing stormwater system.

"Phase four is focusing on the Ellen and George Street intersection, and will be the head of the drainage network," Copper Coast Council director infrastructure services Tim Neumann said.

"This phase consists of six new side entry pits, including four on Ellen Street and two on George Street.

"Work is going well despite the wet weather which has and will continue to have an impact progress.

These upgrades will stop consistent flooding on the street, which occurred almost anytime there was significant rain."

Copper Trail Bike Hire as well as Nook and Nourish, located on the corner of George and Ellen Streets, have been enduring the works, now right on their doorsteps.

"We don't mind the disturbance because contractors have been working efficiently and going as quick as they can," Copper Trail Bike Hire co-owner Colin Minion said.

"We've seen shops further down the road (towards Queen Square) flooded due to rain, and we don't want to see that again.

"This is some short-term pain for a long-term gain."

Taste the Yorke, on the corner of George and Henry Streets, felt the effects of phase one works.

Owner Jo Gibbons said her store had a 50 per cent downturn across six-weeks.

"There was zero road and footpath access (at the shopfront) for some time," she said.

"This was after council informed us there would be one lane available to traffic and full public access to the footpath.

"If I had known this was going to be the outcome, I would've structured staffing differently and given holidays to one staff member.

"I don't think council managed this project well, (nor did they) provide enough information about the works."

CEO Russell Peate said he and Mr Neumann doorknocked every available shop



to inform the affected owners of the project in November 2021, before sending letters in

"Initially, council advised shop owners there would be one lane available to traffic and footpath access to shops would remain available at all

times," Mr Peate said.

"After completing a final site risk assessment, it was determined a larger excavation plant was required (than anticipated), and neither lane could be available to traffic.

"However, an alternate

solution to break the work zone into (four) smaller phases and only close each phase as it was being worked on would be the most practicable approach to reduce incon-

"We have tried to minimise the inconvenience of the

works by scheduling them at this time of the year, reopening the street during school holidays and only closing sections of the road for works undertaken," he said.

The project is on track to be completed by mid-



### Fisherman Bay receives power pole upgrades

POWER poles in some sections of Fisherman Bay are set to be upgraded.

SA Power Networks is currently shifting infrastructure from private land to an adjacent road reserve.

The work were initiated after residents of Whiting Road raised concerns about overhead wires and poles situated within their property boundaries.

The concerns raised to Barunga West Council demonstrated the difficulties in further developing properties due to the restriction of the poles and wires.

SAPN agreed to prioritise the Fisherman Bay upgrade under a shared cost arrangement with council.

SAPN will remove about 500 metres of overhead wires and 10 poles across 33 properties between 22 and 88 Whiting Road.

Nine new poles and 450m of new overhead low voltage buncable will be installed on an adjacent road reserve.

Council manager assets and infrastructure Steve Davev said new work may result in increased property values.

"The outcome of the work will include improving the amenity of the area of the affected properties, removal of



SAPN easements from properties, and providing property owners additional space to develop their allotments," Mr Davey said.

Mr Davey said SAPN was funding the upgrade of the poles and wires, expected to cost \$168,000 while property owners will each pay around \$3200 for relocation expenses.

"Only residents along Whiting Road — who have been consulted — will incur a cost through their rates over four years," he said.

"The total project is approximately costing \$280,125 and SAPN is funding 60 per cent."

Barunga West Council CEO Maree Wauchope said the council was funding the new works upfront.

"If council did nothing then this would hinder any future development of 33 properties," she said.

"It is pleasing to see now, after many frustrating years, the freeholding of the Fisherman Bay settlement and delivery of key infrastructure is well underway."

### **Grandstand neighs an end**

KADINA'S old racecourse grandstand is set to be demolished.

The top section of the western grandstand suffered significant damage during a storm in 2020, and has since been unusable.

Kadina Pony Club president Melanie Pringle said the damaged stone wall and roof of the grandstand posed safety concerns for club members.

"The grandstand and rooms underneath it were used regularly by the club up until the storm," she said.

"The club was receiving ongoing funding for the building's upkeep but it's now beyond salvageable.

We're now (with Copper Coast Council) looking into a new facility with toilets and showers to help cater for events practically.

"We'll be hosting events during the Copper Coast Masters Games 2023 (April 20-

23), and have lots of rallies and competitions before then, so hopefully it's all looking tidy soon."

Council CEO Russell Peate said numerous meetings and discussions had been held with the pony club to discuss the best possible outcome for the grandstand.

"The cost of the demolition is estimated at \$270,000 which isn't a viable option, so council is working towards a less costly option," he said.

"Tenders have been called for the demolition of the top section of the old grandstand and these will be received shortly, assessed and a report submitted to council early next year.

"We will continue to liaise with the pony club regarding upgrading and/or new facili-

The eastern grandstand is set to be retained and used again after the western grandstand's demolition.

### Wheels turning for another track

Vincent Association and Yorke Peninsula Council are hopeful plans for a pump track in the town will lift off next month when the project is presented for elected member support.

YPC assessed a number of potential sites through its wheeled sports and recreation parks plan after 12 local progress associations registered interest in bringing facilities to their towns.

It is hoped an application can be lodged soon for funding through the state government's Community Recreation and Facilities Program Sports grants.

The project is expected to cost between \$200,000 and \$350,000, with council required to contribute between \$50,000 and \$125,000.

Progress president Michelle Twelftree said the association had developed an overarching community recreational space concept plan five years ago.

"This was one of the phases (of the concept), a pump track, but we haven't had the money or ability to move forward with certain sections of it and this was a prime opportunity to put in our proposal for the opportunity," she said.

"We already had the ball rolling; it was just we didn't have it finalised in the sense of the

exact specifications for the project."

Mrs Twelftree said the plans made the project a more viable option for council.

"It's not a standard modular pump track, it's a bitumen one so it's pretty unique and there aren't any of them, as far as I'm aware, on Yorke Peninsula," she

"The track will be longlasting, there's local children, those who travel with their parents from other towns but of course the influx of visitors as well, all who will use it."

YPC CEO Andrew Cameron said the community has expressed a strong desire for more wheeled sports facilities, such as pump tracks and skate parks.

"Council is working with local progress associations to help them become shovel-ready for any funding opportunities that may present for such facilities," he said.

"Through this work, it has been determined that a pump track at Port Vincent is the most suitable project for the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing Community Recreation and

retraVision

Sports Facilities Program grants.

'We are now working closely with Port Vincent Progress Association to prepare for a possible grant application, pending further consultation, additional project planning, and elected member approval at an upcoming council meeting.

"In time we hope to help many local communities achieve their goals of installing wheeled sports facilities for locals and visitors to enjoy."

Elected members are expected to decide whether to pursue the grant at council's meeting on Wednesday, December 14.

### **Snapper stocks** still too short

SNAPPER stocks in Gulf St Vincent and Spencer Gulf remain depleted despite a fishing closure in place since November 2019.

The South Australian Research and Development Institute released its 2022 snapper fishery stock assess-Wednesday, ment last November 9.

The closure is expected to last until January 2023; however, the Marine Scalefish Management Advisory Committee will consider the report before providing recommendations to the state government.

"The current snapper closure appears to have stopped the declines in biomass, but there is not yet evidence of stock recovery," a Department of Primary Industries and Regions spokesperson said.

"There is, however, some evidence the closure has allowed the snapper to increase their natural schooling behaviour to spawn throughout the warmer months.

"These undisturbed schools of spawning fish may increase the potential for future spawning success and stock recov-

The spokesperson said the assessments relied on multiple sources of information such as long-term fishery data, extensive biological information and documented seasonal spawning activity.

"Snapper is a long-lived and slow growing species, with variable recruitment of juvenile snapper, meaning the number of baby fish that are produced, survive, grow older,

and contribute to the adult population each year can vary greatly and is difficult to predict," the spokesperson said.

"Given this slow pace of life where populations are replenished by irregular recruitment events, it may take several years for the stocks to recov-

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said no decision had been made regarding the end of the ban.

"Snapper is an iconic species, and one which SARDI research shows has been in decline over the past decade," she said.

"The Malinauskas Labor government understands how important the decision whether to reopen the snapper fishery is to both the commercial and recreational fishing sectors and is committed to making the decision based on the long-term sustainability of the snapper species.

"Prior to the last state election, we committed to better explaining the science behind decisions that impact fisheries, and we are meeting that commitment with SARDI holding forums across the state in coming weeks.

"I thank the world class researchers at SARDI who have worked tirelessly to produce this important report, which will guide government in making the right decisions for the long-term future of the snapper fishery."

The state government is expected to make a decision about/regarding the future of the closure in December.



### Turning over a new leaf with policy

THE planting, maintenance, conservation and removal of trees on Yorke Peninsula Council land has been prioritised after council updated its Tree Management Policy recently.

A review into the policy led to minor changes, including reference to legislative updates and relevant council policies, procedures and standard forms.

"Council recognises its responsibility to effectively and reasonably manage trees located on council land, to minimise risks and maximise benefits on behalf of our community," operations manager Stephen Goldsworthy

"Another notable addition (to the policy) is reference to the Aboriginal Heritage Act 1988, in particular significant Aboriginal scar trees."

Individuals and organisations wishing to plant trees or other vegetation on public road carriageways are required to submit a written application.

This can be done with the creation of the application for roadside vegetation clearance on the council road reserve form located on the YPC website.

Mr Goldsworthy said council recognised the cultural, economic, social and environmental value of trees.

"Council is committed to maintaining and, where appropriate, increasing the number of trees across the district," he said.

"Council recognises the importance of going green which contributes to community wellbeing and enhances biodiversity.

Where consistent with the function, character and amenity of the land in question, council's tree management activities will place emphasis on enhancing biodiversity by giving consideration to species selection, landscape connectivity, habitat availability, and the use of local provenance plantings."

Mr Goldsworthy said YPC viewed the removal of healthy and established trees as undesirable but recognised it may be required on occasion.

"The removal of a living tree will be viewed by council as the option of last resort," he said.

"The removal of any tree on council land without prior approval from council is strictly prohibited and may result in prosecution."

### Keep obtaining petition signatures

At last count, we've tallied almost 2000 signatures just at my office for the petition launched last month which demands improved health services in our electorate and across rural SA — and I know there are wads of sheets of signatures at multiple business counters across our region and many, many people have been walking the streets collecting support. I am visiting main streets when time allows to collect sheets so anyone with completed forms can keep them aside for pick up or have them dropped off at my Kadina office, if convenient, or post them back to 37 Graves Street, Kadina SA 5554. They can't be scanned or emailed as only original sheets comply Parliamentary rules.

As explained, legislation dictates we need 10,000 signatures in order to trigger a formal Parliamentary Inquiry to address the specific requests petitioned — a necessary step to invoke urgent and vitally important system change.

Introducing my Private Member's Mining Bill: I today (Tuesday, November 15) will give notice to introduce the Mining (Land Access Inquiry Recommendations) Amendment Bill 2022 and tomorrow will introduce and speak to it in the chamber. This Bill I have formed in response to the six findings of the Select Committee I served on last year which was established to inquire into land access regimes in this state, other states and overseas.

My Bill establishes a Mining Land Commissioner with various functions and introduces a land use mapping plan which elevates recognition of the importance of primary production land and additionally protects aquifers and other water resources from mining activities. The Bishop family lived for a short time at Morphett Vale then settled at Oaklands in 1872.


The family members' farming and stonemasonry skills left a legacv on YP, as well as further afield in Australia and New Zealand.

### **Celebrating Edithburgh** Museum's 50 years

EDITHBURGH Museum's 50th anniversary was celebrated with a community dinner at the Edithburgh Hotel on Sunday, October 9.

During the afternoon, the organisation's first life membership was presented to Marie Stanton, who has been a committee member for the entire 50-plus

About 40 people attended.

Chairperson Keryn Dawes began by thanking all supporters, including committee members, volunteers who kept the museum open, the sausage sizzle crew, and markets, social media and produce stall coordinators.







game Creeper is looking to deliver, he said there will certainly be a defensive aspect to it. "As we have seen, especially in


the women's game recently, low scoring games can be great contests as well," he said.

## Kick it to me: girls c

YPFLW coordinator Scott Brown has been driving the push for a local women's footy competition.

Brown said he believed the interest from potential players was there, it just needed support from clubs and volunteers.

"The girls are keen; every time we run a training, we get good numbers," he said.

"(Previous local initiatives) have been really well supported by the girls and by volunteers; however, some of those volunteers have moved on and the trouble is now trying to find someone else to push it along."

More than 3500 women and girls played football across the state in 2022, but only 38 played on Yorke Peninsula; the vast majority participating in Auskick.

SANFL head of community football Lisa Faraci said enticing volunteers to be involved is the biggest issue facing progress.

"I think it's just challenging we haven't got the numbers because we don't have the competition structures there," she said.

"While female footy is growing exponentially, we know there are gaps and that's one of our key targets as part of our strategy moving for-

"We've had things like come and try days, there was a sign-up day at Moonta in the preseason of 2020 to try and launch into an under 16 and senior competition for six

"But the problem once again was we didn't have enough volunteers show up from clubland, so the girls just played a scratch match."

She said there is no magic bullet, but many program structures such as through schools could be viable.

"Whilst we have staff pushing it, there's still the difficulty from clubland and we understand why," she

"This is absolutely no criticism for our people at our clubs, it's just about capacity and where they're

"You do need to attract different volunteers to be involved in female footy, you can't ask the ones already involved to do it because they're already strapped by their current

YPFL secretary Phil Brand said the league is very supportive of women's football.

"It seems to be very difficult to get people involved and things going in our area," he said.

"We do encourage girls to play in our under 14 competition and I think last year there were quite a number of young girls who played."

He said the introduction of female football would require an almost completely new volunteer

"If someone is prepared to pick it up and run with it, and we would encourage them, we're quite happy to support them," he said.

"But our league administration, which is quite small... is committed with existing duties and none of them want to take on extra responsibilities."

#### Club brings new hope

Moonta Football Club president Mark Durdin has become increasingly fed up with the lack of action, so much so his club has taken on the challenge of starting teams.

After launching the project in October, he has already garnered enough support to fill a 12-a-side open age team to play in the Mid Women's Football Competition at Crystal Brook, in February.

Durdin is hopeful the numbers will also be available to form under 14 and 17 teams to play in the Northern Plains Female Football League, which could include games played at Moonta.

He said despite playing under the Moonta name, the groups would essentially be YPFL teams.

"I believe we had about 14 girls (of all ages) register in the first 24 hours, and now within a couple weeks we've had 14 register for the open age side alone," he said.

'There's plenty of interest around; I think at the last come and try day in 2021, there were about 80 girls who registered.

"I know there are probably girls from the bottom end who might find going to Crystal Brook every Friday difficult.

"We're organising a come and try day at the club for December as well, with dates for this to be published on Facebook (via Moonta FC, YPFL and YPFLW) next week hopefully."

He said it's about time clubs on the peninsula took the push seri-

"The biggest thing for me is trying to get other clubs involved," he

"It was brought up at our recent

She and her parents travel to Adelaide three times a week during the season and aren't offered the same fuel assistance as the countrylisted boys at the club.



"Some of the lads (at the Eagles) have said to Shineah about how their parents get fuel assistance and we know one lad who moved to Adelaide for school and still got the assistance anyway," she said.

"We don't ask for much, but especially with what she's achieved, a little bit of assistance would be nice, but we're not going to go out at chase it.

"It's the same with other things too, she was the Powerade Breakthrough Player of the Year this year in the SANFLW so she got \$500 from that, but the men get \$1000."

Shineah began her career with the Southern Eagles, before playing with Snowtown and Henley Sharks alongside commitments with Woodville-West Torrens.

Rachel said she believes originally playing alongside the boys has shaped her skills.

"I look at how tough she is when she's out there, going head first into the play, and think those first steps at the Southern Eagles alongside the boys where she had to stand up for herself really set her up for that," she said.

It's a sentiment agreed upon by Matt Meyers, whose daughter Amy has stood out in the Ardrossan junior colts for the past two years.

"I love seeing Amy dominate in the boy's competition, to no end, but we've also got the culture over here that the girls shouldn't be playing amongst the boys," he said.

"But I would love to see a female league up and going, because I think for the potential of the girls, they're going to be noticed more playing in their own competition, especially now with the development of the AFLW."

Matt said it's always been a difficult system to navigate.

"We already started putting feelers out before this season (2022) as to where there are girls' leagues playing, weighing up travelling distance and cost factors to keep her going once her days at Ardrossan are finished," he said.

#### Other sport impacts

There's a long-held view the emergence of a female football league would be detrimental to the health of local netball.

Yorke Peninsula Netball Association president Sue Brown said there's no reason why it would be the case.

"It's a hard one, because some people find it really good girls are playing football and others say 'well, football's just a boy's sport," she said.

"However, I think some clubs need to open their eyes and be accepting to girls playing (footy), but that then means we might have a few less netballers."

She said they've seen netball participation numbers decrease but concedes you can't force someone to play a sport if they don't want to.

"If it (female football) was being played on a Saturday, it would have a detrimental effect on netball," she said.

"But if we can co-exist with both

being set up so players could still play both (at different times), that would be best." SANFI's Lisa Faraci said, as part-

ner sports, football and netball must find ways to coexist to benefit everyone.

"I have personally found the girls who are playing football, aren't those who play netball," she said.

"You're attracting girls who might be disengaged with sport because they weren't good enough for the netball team and they're coming over to footy and they're getting a game.

"That's not a criticism of netball, that's just the nature of the game.
"We don't want to force a choice.

"I could argue the point we're not up against netball, but I think our role is to recognise netball is there and we have to work with them and schedule accordingly so we're not forcing girls to make a choice."

#### League a must

Scott Brown said it's extremely disappointing there is currently no proper outlet for those keen to play.

"Female footy isn't going away, it's only going to get bigger, and we currently don't have a pathway without going to Adelaide," he said.

"There is undoubtedly so much talent hidden on the peninsula, and without really knowing it, they're getting left behind.

"I will try and try again to get something up and running, because those who want to be involved, deserve a proper outlet."

Brown said Moonta's initiative has his full support.

"That has had my 100 per cent backing, I said to Mark (Durdin), 'if there's anything you need, let me know and I'll help out', I've shared a lot of it on Facebook as well because this needs to get up," he said.

"I'm just happy to see girls playing footy."

Playing junior colts at Ardrossan, Amy Meyers is prepared to go elsewhere to play when there is no longer a local option.

She said, although it's currently not ideal, she relishes playing alongside those of her opposite gender.

"I just love playing the game and being involved in such a close team environment," she said.

"I enjoy it (playing alongside the boys) because I feel like I can be a little rougher and I feel like I get noticed more when I beat the boys

Amy said she is determined to continue playing footy.

"I reckon it (not having a proper structure locally) has a negative effect by not being as noticeable for the bigger AFLW clubs as it would be in the cities," Amy said.

"I want to go find somewhere in Adelaide I can train with a girls' side because I hope to go as long as I can and go up to the highest standards possible."







## Land access mining bill introduced

"The balance between farming and mining has been a primary concern for the entirety of the time I have been in the fortunate position as the representative of our community," Mr Ellis said.

"Having taken action on multiple occasions, including crossing the floor, trying to amend a previous bill and establishing a select committee to investigate better outcomes, the introduction of my own bill is the next

step.
"The bill I am introducing is an attempt to legislate the recommendations from the multi-partisan Select Committee in the previous Parliament.

"That Select Committee had equal representation from the Liberal and Labor Parties as well as independents which hopefully bodes well for (the bill's) passage through the Parliament."

Mr Ellis said it is important to be aware of the scope of the amendment and the actual operation of mining would not be affected.

If passed, the bill will establish a Mining Land Commissioner with various functions including to enforce exploration and rehabilitation regulations, facilitate resolutions of complaints from landowners and administer a code of conduct for explorers.

"Not wanting this important work to amount to nothing, I have drafted this bill in an attempt to legislate the recommendations of the committee, the overall aim to provide increased support and protection for both industry and the state, about where we want to encourage mining to occur and where we want to reward existing, profitable incumbent land use," Mr Ellis said.

"I continue to believe hurdles over which a prospective mining company has to jump should be higher on land that's in use and is valuable prime agricultural, food-producing land.

"Additionally, the promotion and regulation of mining in our state should be functions undertaken by two separate entities."

## Safety reminder ahead of harvest

GRAIN Producers SA is reminding motorists to be aware of the additional heavy vehicles on the road during the coming months as harvest ramps up.

"The prospect of high grain production volumes throughout South Australia means more heavy vehicle traffic on our country roads, so road safety must be at the forefront," CEO Brad Perry said.

"Motorists are urged to be patient and exercise caution when interacting with the thousands of extra heavy vehicles on the road over har-

Mr Perry said the wet weather also provided additional challenges for all motorists to be aware of during har-

"In many areas on farm, the ground is sodden, so for the grain producers and carriers it's important to have a level access point at paddock entry or loading for heavy vehicle accessibility and safety in all weather conditions," he said.

"With such a wet start, harvest in South Australia will continue throughout the festive holiday season, so for those travelling during this period it's important to plan your trips ahead, drive to the conditions and ensure it is completely safe before overtaking trucks and large agricultural vehicles.

"For heavy vehicle operators, this is also a timely reminder to make sure heavy vehicles are correctly registered or permitted and are properly checked before use.

"Whether it's a farm-owned heavy vehicle or grain producers using contractors to cart grain, the message from us is clear: take your time to ensure you've considered any risks and put appropriate steps in place to make your harvest operations safe."



Wallaroo: I launched my new tinny during the week for its shake-out cruise caught a few blueys and squid at Poin Riley. Then the gale-force winds with plenty of rain arrived to curtail any more fishing plans. Squid, tommy ruff (Australian

herring) and a few whiting are at the

Point Turton: Recent inclement weather has meant limited fishing opportunities for boaties but, when it improves, crews will be chasing KG whiting, garfish, squid and big snook. Shore-based anglers have caught salmon trout from Daly Head, The Pines and Hardwicke Bay (north) on the high, early morning tides. The jetty is worth a try for squid, tommies and garfish.

Marion Bay: There are some good catches of red nannygai to be had offshore from Marion Bay, along with trevalley, KG whiting and even flathead. Squid, tommies and garfish are closer to shore with False Bay and Port Moorowie all good for a rewarding fish.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Anglers in tinnies fishing close inshore from Sultana Passage to Klein Point all caught tommy ruff and squid before the stormy weather cracked in. Small, just legal, blueys are in the waters up at The Hut with bigger blueys just north of the oyster lease main

Ardrossan: Crews that fished Long Spit during the week caught KG whiting and a few squid, with gar and blue crabs also out from Mac's Beach and Rogues Point. The jetty has overnight tommies, blue crabs and cruising soapie mulloway.
