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Local footy returns with hopes of an even season

The goal for the Yorke Peninsula Football League hierarchy is to see the evenest competition as is possible in 2024, with last year's lower ranked sides encouraged to chase down the leaders of the pack.

Last season hailed the crowning of new champions, Kadina, who sensationally dispatched the fancied Moonta by 36 points on grand final day in front of a near-record crowd at Ardrossan.

YPFL president Brad Haylock said, although any one of the five teams who qualified for A grade finals last year could've taken it out, measures have been taken to make it a greater challenge to claim the ultimate prize in 2024.

"In the end it was a great season and the grand final was a magnificent day, it probably wasn't what many people would've expected but Kadina played the better footy on the day," Haylock said.

"The major thing for us as a league now is to see if we can have the lesser sides from last year be more competitive in season 2024.

"Three of those sides have got extra player points this year, to use as they see fit in attracting more players, and you think if they recruit properly, they would improve and become more competitive.

"Wallaroo now has 18 points, Bute 20 and Paskeville 17, and Ardrossan didn't ask for any, but had they, they probably would've got some. "You'll get better numbers (at games), for a start, because peo

games), for a start, because people will go along to watch more competitive football; if you've got competitive teams across the nine clubs, it'll help everything."

The league has no major rule changes to be implemented this year, but all club trainers and water runners will be required to wear pink vests, provided to the clubs, to fulfil their duties.

Following a review by the SANFL, player payment regulations have changed, with the total weekly spend increasing to \$3275 for each club, a new per-player amount (excluding travel) of a maximum \$650 a week, and 85c per kilometre to a maximum of \$500 for player travel.

The YPFL's special rounds will kick off with Pink Round in round 5, round 7 is THINK! Road Safety round, First Nations Round will align with Sir Doug Nicholls round in the AFL, in round 8, and CMS Crows and Southern Eagles will reignite the rivalry in the league's traditional Anzac Round encounter at Curramulka in round 3.

"You'll have to put the sides who were around the mark last year up there again; Kadina and Moonta," Haylock said.

"Crows are always around the mark, Eagles and Cougars won't go backwards either, so it's now about whether the other sides can improve

enough to get up there as well. "We'll watch it all unfold from week one."



Reaching new heights, new grades in netball

Following the successful introduction of a new grade for the Yorke Peninsula Netball Association in 2023, the association's aim this season is to more than enough hope for another strong year in 2024.

Roosters, Crows harvest exciting new partnership

Bute Football Club has been boosted for season 2024 through an exciting new partnership with the Adelaide Crows and grain handler Viterra.

Bute is one of just three clubs in the state to benefit from the initiative, which will include past and present Crows AFL and AFLW players travelling to participate off-field on a Bute match day, and host a junior coaching clinic.

As the Crows' regional partner, Viterra will work with the AFL club to add value to regional communities through a range of events and initiatives across the next two years.

Bute president Josh Gill said the club will host Crows players in round 8 of the YPFL season, coinciding with sponsors' day and its clash with Wallaroo, on Saturday, June 1.

"We've got a strong relationship with the Viterra team through grain sales and a few local connections, and they really want to give back to grassroots footy clubs," he said.

"The free clinic is the really exciting part of it for us as a club, league and wider region; it'll be held from 10am to 12pm on Sunday, June 2.

"It's open to the first 150 registered participants from Auskick through to anyone under 18, but they do have to be registered."

The club has already reaped the rewards of the partnership, hosting a junior clinic with Crows players Ned McHenry and Nick Murray — who own and regularly tend to livestock nearby — in March.

Gill said it is a win-win for everyone involved in the partnership, and is proud to have his club selected as a debut participant.

He said the club is still working through which current or former Crows players will be coming along to the day.

"On the Saturday we're going to have two players from the men's team and one from the women's... to be used however we choose, so they could be running water for the B grade or working behind the canteen," Gill said.

"They'll be there for a Q and A in the evening, and then on the Sunday they'll be there for the clinic, and Viterra will be there for both events as well. "They're still working out the finer details behind the scenes, which we'll advise everyone of as we become aware of them."

Crows CEO Tim Silvers said the club is proud to be working with Viterra to strengthen and grow local footy.

South Australia's biggest sporting club has a long affinity with the peninsula, with former players Sam Jacobs, Bernie Vince, Hayden Skipworth, Andrew Crowell and Hannah Button and current players Rachelle Martin, Chelsea Biddell and Jaimi Tabb starting their careers locally.

"Regional towns and local clubs are part of the fabric of our game, they are incredibly important to our club, and we're excited to be working with Viterra," Silvers said.

"My family moved around while I was growing up and I fondly remember local footy clubs as places I gravitated towards to make new friends and feel a sense of community."

Silvers said all three of the Crows' teams receive great support from country South Australia, a debt they're passionate about repaying.

"This way everyone who wants to play or watch footy can do so, and experience the health, social and wellbeing benefits that come with being part of it," he said.

"The events and initiatives planned with Viterra will also bring us even closer to our fans outside the metro area and provide another opportunity for our players to inspire the next generation."

Viterra Australia and New Zealand CEO Philip Hughes said the company is excited to be supporting an initiative aimed at positively contributing to communities across South Australia.

"Regional communities are the backbone of Viterra's network and we recognise the power of sport in connecting people," Hughes said.

"We are proud to facilitate this exciting program of regional clinics, which will provide a fantastic platform for junior footballers to connect and learn from elite AFL and AFLW players.

"As well as the coaching clinics, these regional visits will provide a great opportunity to unite the community behind an exciting feature event."

Ardrossan's Sauce takes Eagles helm

Ardrossan's favourite son Sam Jacobs has returned to his former SANFL club Woodville-West Torrens as coach of its league side.

While Jacobs had a season as the playingcoach of Ardrossan in 2021, this will be his initial year as a senior coach on the sidelines at any level.

"The main reason I got this job was my people management skills," Jacobs said.

"That's a big part of the role in the current climate.

"While I had 15 years in the AFL system, which also gave me an understanding of the game, the position of senior coach at SANFL level also includes roles in recruiting, welfare, organising leadership programs and some commercial aspects.

"It has been a great Chal learning curve which was an appealing part of the job, immersing myself in the various

different aspects of the running of the club." The Eagles finished eighth last year, but

won back-to-back premierships under then coach Jade Sheedy in 2020-21.

When quizzed about his game style, Jacobs suggested he'd prefer his side to win in a high-scoring affair over a low-scoring defensive slugfest.

"I believe we have a responsibility as coaches to make the game watchable and engage future generations of players," he said.

"I'm also pretty big on self-reflection and the romance of coming back to coach my SANFL club is something I've thought about.

"I'm also lucky enough to have a fellow Yorke Peninsula lad Matthew Goldsworthy to work with as my football manager.

"Phil Smyth is another, while Michael Godden and David Teague are also people I can chat to about the role.

"I also have great family support from my wife Isabelle, along with both her and my parents as well."

The Jacobs clan includes Sam and Isabelle's three daughters Imogen (5 years old), Alba (3) and Willow (1).

He is the ninth league coach of the club since foundation teams Woodville and West Torrens amalgamated in 1991, following in the footsteps on Neil Balme, Bruce Winter, Mark Mickan, Paul Hamilton, Ron Fuller, Michael Godden, Sam Lonegan and Jade Sheedy.

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Family ties line the courts

Playing netball on Yorke Peninsula means there's a lot to be grateful for, but for some, the biggest privilege is playing alongside family.

Family connections run deep across all YPNA clubs, which, according to association president Meagan Daniel, is what makes it special and keeps all clubs alive.

"There's not a single club where that's not a huge part of how they work, it just so vital," she said.

"I couldn't fathom that I could've possibly played with my mum... to play alongside your family members, must be amazing; creating memories you'll carry with you forever."

Premiership winning twins Bronwyn and Georgina Farrow have played together for more than a decade, most of which has been spent at local powerhouse CMS Crows.

The duo was at opposite ends of the court as their A grade side won the 2022 premiership, while their younger sister Jessica had already played her part in winning the B grade flag; Jessica and Georgina won the 2023 A grade premiership together.

"I've played with Georgina a lot, because we've been in the same age groups, and the past few years we've both been lucky enough to be picked in the A grade," Bronwyn said.

The twins have had the opportunity to play alongside Jessica in the A grade a few times, albeit the timelines haven't always matched, with Bronwyn playing in Jamestown last year, and Jessica set to spend 2024 on the sidelines.

Bronwyn said having three siblings take to the court together isn't necessarily something you'd see in a lot of places.

"Being in the country, you have more of an opportunity to play together, but it's also not a given because lots of people move away and never get the chance," she said.

"Obviously, you know them (siblings) pretty well, so there's almost the feeling of instinctively knowing what they're going to do (on the court), which can help at times." Georgina agreed, and said having sisters

with you on the court is a different feeling. She said her best memory on court

together was 2022, when all three walked away with premierships, or when Bronwyn shot the winning goal to win the flag the year prior.

"Bronny and Jess, they both play shooting, while I'm at the opposite end, and it's hard to describe, but it's just a different feeling," Georgina said.

"She's (Bronwyn) not afraid to tell it how it is... people might be afraid to say to one another, 'oh you're playing really bad, you need to do this', but no, we tell it how it is.

"Our grandparents come and watch us whenever they can, especially if it's a home game; it makes them proud, they enjoy watching and telling everyone about us." 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JUNIORS FLOCK TO THE MAGPIES' NEST

It was only four years ago Paskeville Football Club had to join with nearby rival Bute to field teams in Yorke Peninsula Football League's junior grades.

Now, both clubs have their own junior programs, with sets of good people as coaches, guiding the next generation of senior footballers.

Simultaneously, the SANFL is continuing its push to have local kids play footy, with the introduction of an under 9s competition in 2023 creating a clear pathway from Auskick all the way through.

Last year was the first time a junior team brandishing the Paskeville name had made a colts grand final since 2018, this time going down to Moonta by 27 points. Pasky has strong numbers in junior and senior colts, the aspect of the club which president Brendan Ramsey described as its heart and soul. "It's about providing an environment the kids want to be a part of," Ramsey said. "Having juniors out there training during the week and playing on Saturday, gives anyone involved in the club a good feeling, I think.

"It's exciting, because if you don't have a junior program, then it's almost like well, what's the point, because that's why we

do it, really.' Ramsey said some new initiatives paved the way for stronger numbers.

"We started running buses out to training, putting on meals for kids, and things have turned around, and it's just growing," he said.

"I think some clubs have 30-odd players come out for each grade, so the message from us is, 'hey, if you're not going to get a game where you are, you're guaranteed a game out our way'."

The club is most passionate about the people its juniors get to learn from this year, including junior colts coach Hamish Price and assistant Shannon Garland, and senior colts coach Tyson Wait and assistant Alistair Price. "Those guys have been in all the big programs, and have learned from some of the best coaches in the state, which allows them to pick and choose what they do in developing the players here," Ramsey said.

SANFL game development coordinator Will Schultz said, overall, there had been an increase in junior players across the peninsula in the under 9 to junior colts age bracket.

"Last year the league decided to bring in an under 9s competition to build up the pathway, so now kids can go from Auskick to under 9s, to under 11s, to junior colts and then senior colts, which brings with it appropriate development," he said.

"The challenge for us with our clubs is providing a set-up which best suits engaging as many kids as possible, and creating a fun, user-friendly environment for everyone.

The conclusion of each football season brings with it the hope of better performances throughout the next and, to chase that goal, clubs seek the best possible recruits.

With only a certain amount of salary space and player points available, clubs must choose wisely and, this year, some have gone bigger than others.

From former SANFL players to Mail Medallists, here are four new players expected to have a big impact on this year's Yorke Peninsula Football League season.

Josh Koster – Bute

A former SANFL player and son of Adelaide Crows premiership player Kym Koster, Josh played 11 league games at West Adelaide and 30 at Glenelg across seven years in their senior programs.

Spending 2023 at South Mildura in the Sunraysia Football League, the silky midfielder was named in the best players on nine occasions.

Finn Betterman – CMS Crows

With strong running ability and goal scoring capability, Betterman joins the CMS Crows with state under 18 experience and 19 SANFL league games at Glenelg under his belt.

He was best and fairest at Yankalilla, playing just 13 games in 2021, and was runner-up in the same award at PHOS Camden last year.

Tom Schott – CMS Crows

A known entity at the Crows following 12 games in 2022, Schott played SANFL league at West Adelaide and Glenelg from 2013 to 2021, amassing 38 games.

The midfielder has most recently played for PINT in the Northern Territory, performing well enough to earn a spot in the NTFL representative team.

Henry Trenorden -**Central Yorke Cougars**

Volunteers provide an invaluable resource for all football and netball clubs, and at the Wallaroo Netball Club, you can find the perfect example in Lyndall Neill.

Playing her first game at the club exactly 40 years ago, Lyndall has gone on to serve as president for five years, on the committee for longer, been coach and umpire, in charge of sponsorships, worked behind the canteen, fundraised, and in her own words, simply "organised stuff". "We're (volunteers) a dying breed, if clubs didn't have them, we just wouldn't be here and everyone wouldn't have the chance to play or be social." Neill said she's most proud of playing a significant role in the relocation of the club's courts, a momentous occasion.

"We had delt with a lot of flooding where we were and we had a small canteen and changerooms, and we wanted to improve them," Lyndall said.

"To be over with the football club was ideal and then getting it finished, that was without a doubt our biggest achievement in my time at the club, and I was very happy to be a part of it."

YPNA president Meagan Daniel said volunteers make everything possible. "Every single club couldn't survive

without their volunteers," she said. "It is hard because we're all busy,

we've got a lot going on in our lives, but you'll often find that there are so many people wearing different hats across any one day.

"They might play a game, umpire a game, coach a game, and then do a shift at the canteen or run teas at night following training.

Three rising Yorke Peninsula Netball Association stars — Stella Hewett, Hallie Koch and Jada Pedler — have been selected for the 2024 Adelaide Thunderbirds' Jamestown Talent Academy.

Representing Bute, Moonta and Central Yorke Cougars locally, the trio will now participate in a program designed to elevate the pathway from grassroots competitions to state-level teams.

Stella Hewett was voted last year's YPNA F grade best and fairest, while Jada Pedler took home the E grade runner-up best and fairest.

"It's a really great opportunity, because Netball SA has just changed the way they're running regional academies," YPNA president Meagan Daniel said.

"They used to have one they ran every year for our region, and they ceased doing that a couple of years ago, so they haven't had a lot of stuff up for the local girls.

"It's really fantastic that not only do our girls have an avenue to further their netball careers and get their skills and development up, but that we've actually got three girls in the squad." Following a successful pilot program in 2022, feedback highlighted the desire from communities to strengthen the pathway while Netball SA maintains a strong presence in regional South Australia.

The structure now consists of one Emerging Academy and six Development Academies based in locations across the state, with trials recently being run in each town, including Jamestown.

FROM THE ARCHIVES...

1994: The old and the new claim premierships

It was a year of beginnings and near-final hurrahs in the Yorke Valley Football League in 1994, with new clubs and those soon to be wound up, claiming premierships.

Both the Southern Eagles and CMS Crows had both been admitted to the competition following the disbanding of the Southern Yorke Peninsula Football League the previous year, and both took home premierships.

But it was Maitland - which would amalgamate with Arthurton at the end of 1996 - which won its third and final A grade football premiership, defeating Wallaroo by 73 points.

The Lions never looked like being defeated on the day, extending their lead at every change, after weathering an early Bulldogs storm.

A 21-point halftime lead was blown wide open in the third quarter, with nine goals setting up a win which confined a 13-year premiership drought to the history books.

Yorke Peninsula Country Times reporter Les Pittaway named

Maitland captain Mark Kirby as best on ground, describing his performance as "perhaps the most individually brilliant performance from any footballer" throughout the

season. Demonstrating the power of their squads in their early days, five out of the six teams playing in the other three grades represented either the CMS Crows or Southern Eagles.

The Eagles narrowly edged out the Crows in the B grade, winning by 13 points on the back of a seven-goal-to-one second quarter.

However, the Crows won the under 17s and under 14s, beating Ardrossan by 77 points in the former, and the Eagles by just two points in the latter.

In the netball, Arthurton won its first A grade premiership since 1985, defeating Wallaroo by three points, 38-35; it also won the next two

premierships in 1995-96, before also combining with Maitland to form the Central Yorke Cougars.

Its side was spurred on by a best on court performance from Rachael McCarthy, with the club also claiming B and C grade flags on the day.



Defence the Roos' best offence

It's not won an A grade premiership in 20 years, but Ardrossan is buoyed by a new coach and some handy offseason signings ahead of season 2024.

Going into his fourth year at the club, Sam Pfeiffer has taken over the reins as playing-coach for the first time, and will be attempting to lift his side from an eighth-place finish last year.

The Kangaroos managed just two wins which bookended 2023; a round 1 win against Wallaroo and a round 18 win over Paskeville.

Pfeiffer said making finals was the goal this year, something he believes is achievable.

"Everyone at this time of year is flying, so every club is going to be the same and they're going to be wanting to do the same," he said.

"We've got Wallaroo and Bute first couple of games, so they're two chances to get a couple wins.

"That's not going to be easy, but I'm hopeful."

The way to do that, according to Pfieffer, is a particular focus on one end of the ground.

"We need to tighten up our defence, really; our structure hasn't been the greatest for the past few years," he said. "That's something we've been working on over the preseason, because obviously the successful teams are always strong defensively, so if we can tighten that up and hold teams to 10 goals or less, it'll go a long way.

"I think the offensive aspect looks after itself, largely." Pfeiffer said he has been impressed by what he's seen of new recruits Charlie Dowling and

Charlie Kirchner. "Dowling played at Mypolonga last year, and Kirchner was at St Peter's Old Collegians in the city, and they're both really fit guys and great ball users," he said.

"Dowling is pretty versatile, tall but can run all day, play in the midfield or up forward, and Kirchner is a good ball user through the guts.

"We've added a bit of midfield depth which we haven't had in the past; we've had to rely on guys going through there all day and they'd just be getting exhausted because the top teams were swapping off the bench with fresh legs, which we haven't had the luxury of doing."

remembering it is a team game and you win and lose as a team not an individual, you will continue to grow if you do it together and keep the encouragement high across the whole club."







"There's no doubt a big part of our group departs over the coming years, so the question is who takes their spots, and there are some boys in the B grade who I think will really start to step up in the next 12 months.

"We've lost four of our recruits from last year, but

gained one outside player who moved to the area, but then also half a dozen, or more, in the B grade who can step up.

"Don't get me wrong, if one or two players pop up, we'll look at recruiting them, but it's really about our local lads this year."

Adams said renewal is also the intention for his side's game plan.

"The boys are pretty keen, they're doing the work outside of the footy club, which is what I wanted, they've got step up themselves," he said.

"Some of those younger kids are starting to go to the gym, and I'm seeing them run the streets.

"I had a chat with all of them before preseason started to say I hadn't seen any of them running, and now I have people coming up to me and letting me know they've seen certain players out."

While this year's greater goal is to develop the players on hand, Adams said his side has its sights set on another deep run into finals, having contested the past three grand finals.

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Eyeing off a finals finish

It took the Demons until round 6 to register a win in 2023, but a strong showing in the second half of the year, due in part to the return of injured players, provided a positive end to the season.

One of the most successful teams in local A grade history, Moonta will be looking to bounce back into the top four in 2024, according to coach Kara Rendell.

Rendell said there is plenty of upside in her squad, particularly with the talented youth at her disposal.

"I think everyone was pretty happy considering we had so many injuries; we had four of our starting nine exit the team at the start of the year," she said.

"We pulled up some young girls and they really stepped into a huge role and our B grade was obviously going well, so it was hard for me to disrupt them, knowing they had a pretty good chance of making the grand final."

Rendell said the side will move away from forced erratic positioning changes which occurred last year

when top-nd talent in one position was forced to play in another.

"We've actually for the first time ever potentially got a good number of goalies," she said.

'We've got some really talented girls, but we'll still be quite disadvantaged when it comes to height inside the circle, that's probably the biggest challenge for us.

"I think it's the strongest our defensive end has been in a very long time."

She said a fourth-place finish would be a target for her side.

"There's some really good topend players who are retiring down the bottom end, but then you've got these young kids now who seem to be getting better and better," Rendell said.

"I think it'll be pretty even again, even last year, the games which you thought would be easy, weren't necessarily easy, and the games you got comprehensively beaten, you didn't feel like you were.

"I think the competition is in a really good place."

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Consistency **Magpies' key**

A change at the helm in Paskeville is hoped to bring a renewed focus, enthusiasm and consistency to the Magpies this season.

Two years of top three placings were followed by two years of missing September completely, but having installed Cohen Mattner as its new coach, the club hopes it can make the move up again.

Mattner said he had been impressed by what he has seen throughout the preseason.

"So far so good, I've been happy with the standards which are being set on the track, and we just keep moving forward." he said.

"I'm not about that, we haven't gone after any mercenaries, but a few guys have come back to the club, which has been rewarding," Mattner said.

"There's now further depth there, especially with leadership and guys who have had A grade stints elsewhere.

"I'm happy to build in-house with what we've got already in the building."

Mattner played for the club in 2013, amassing 61 goals across 17 games for the year, but having been away since, said he wasn't sure what to expect from the competition.

"I obviously haven't seen the league for a few years, but you look at some of the names which played last year and they're quality footballers who could probably still play SANFL footy," he said. "The standard is up there."

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Eagles back last year's approach

With a third-place finish to build on, there are only a couple of better results a team can achieve, but for the Southern Eagles, the goal is to go one or two places better in 2024.

With the largely unchanged squad and former AFL player Jared Poulton now into their second year together, the club is well placed to make a proper push for premiership glory.

"That was our goal last year, to win the flag, and we fell short, so it's certainly our focus going into this year."

He said, after a year off, SANFL premiership player and local Jarred Redden is returning to Woodville-West Torrens in a mentoring role but expects him to be available to play on the peninsula most weeks.

The club hasn't made bulk recruiting moves in the summer, instead investing in locals.

"We had a big influx last year, so I didn't want to just go and chase more people," Poulton said.

"We've got such a good group of young locals, through both the A and B grades, and I'd rather see it stay with them, and focus on developing them as our teams."

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
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Make the Eagles competitive again

The Southern Eagles struggled on the court last year, failing to win a single game in the A grade, but there are positives for the club as it embarks on a new season.

"We got off the bottom, and then in the last round. which we had a bye in, results didn't go in our favour and we were back there.

"We've got a great culture, the fanbase is unreal and we all know what path we're on. "If you can win those

games against those around you, and then snare a win against one of the other teams around the top, I think you've had a pretty good vear."
