WALLAROO Mines Primary School now has an acting principal and the Department for Education is conducting an investigation.

Parents from the school have raised concerns about the school's leadership with the Department for Education, with Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis, and in an online petition, which had

attracted 150 signatures and 107 comments as at 10.15am today, Tuesday, November 4.

Mr Ellis said he was informed on the afternoon of Friday, October 31, by staff from Education Minister Blair Boyer's office that the department had launched an investigation and appointed an acting principal.

Natasha Hefford, from the Kadina office of the Department for Education, will be acting principal of the school, standing in for the incumbent, Tamarin Condon, who started with the school in term three this year.

Parents were informed that Ms Hefford would take the role of acting principal in an email they received at 5.56pm on Friday from education director David Cowles of the Kadina Education Office.

Fisheries mismanagement

THE government has recently announced changes to recreational fish limits and commercial fish quotas under the pretence of protecting fish stocks affected by the algal bloom.

These changes will also affect fishing in Spencer Gulf, but what is not widely known is that Gulf St Vincent commercial operators, who have been offered grants of up to \$300,000 for lost fishing opportunities, will now be able to purchase quota from unused catches in Spencer Gulf.

If this occurs, it will increase the total commercial take from that gulf while reducing recreation limits in the same area.

This will simply mean that any fish left by recreational fishers will just be removed by commercial operators.

At the same time this government is spending \$500k on consultants to look at the feasibility of buying out commercial fishers for unknown reasons.

Well, here's an idea, if the government is really concerned about fish stocks, why doesn't it just use some of those millions of dollars to either buy out the unused quota, or endorsements, from willing commercial operators to prevent transfer of effort, while implementing reductions to recreational limits.

If this was to happen then there might be more support for sensible restrictions from recreational fishers and others concerned about the future of our aquatic resources.

There were no hostilities after that day, although those negotiations took more than six months — during which there were two extensions to the armistice.

The terms of the initial armistice were agreed at 5am on 11-11-1918 and it was decided that guns would be silenced at the 11th hour of that

I am appalled that the Allies, who dominated the discussion on the armistice, decided to delay the implementation of the ceasefire for six hours for no practical

Military leaders on both sides were aware of the armistice within a very short time, but it seems higher officials were infatuated with the chance to proclaim, "On the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month."

The simple statement "effective immediately" would have saved the lives of 2738 Allied and German soldiers who were killed between 5am and 11am.

Well should we remember them.

Not above the law

COUNTRY Press Australia welcomes the federal government's decision to rule out a copyright exemption for AI companies.

Now, urgent action is needed to enforce copyright laws and stop AI platforms from stealing regional

The damage to regional journalism is no longer hypothetical or distant — it is already occurring.

AI companies think they are above the

They harvest local news stories, paraphrase them, and deliver them back to users as answers rather than links.

The public still consumes the journalism, but they never reach the publisher, never subscribe, and never see a local advertiser.

The reporting is ours, but the commercial benefit is captured by offshore technology companies.

Regional publishers operate metered or hybrid paywalls to fund journalism, but AI scraping bypasses those protections, further threatening the economic base that keeps local journalists employed.

These platforms are replacing the publisher in real time, extracting our reporting and converting it into their own output, removing the financial foundation regional newsrooms rely

We cannot afford to repeat the policy failure that occurred when Meta walked away from funding news, even as it continued to benefit from Australian

If AI companies want to use Australian news, they must license it and pay for it — a national framework is needed to ensure licensing covers training and output, explicitly includes regional publishers, and provides a low-cost, fast enforcement pathway for small publishers.

Regional journalism is public infrastructure.

If scraping continues unchecked, local reporting will vanish — not because communities don't value it, but because AI has siphoned away the audience and revenue that sustains it.

The government has taken the right first step by rejecting a copyright carve-

But the next stage — licensing and enforcement — will determine whether regional publishing survives.

And, once a regional newsroom closes, there's no replacing it.

A NEW mural celebrating local people and iconic places has been unveiled by the Snowtown community, capturing the essence of the town.

The mural was revealed on Friday, October 25, and was funded by the Snowtown Community Management Committee and the Snowtown Progress Association.

The project was led by committee member Kelly Freebairn, who commissioned local artist Anna

Ms Freebairn said the previous mural had significantly deteriorated over the past 12 months, prompting the need for a replacement.

Anna and her husband Marek Herburt have done public artworks around South Australia and have previously completed a smaller-scale mural in Lochiel.

Budget review brings grants, savings and AED rollout

BARUNGA West Council has completed its first budget review for 2025-26, with several key changes endorsed at a special meeting on Tuesday, October 28.

Among the changes, the council approved the reinstatement of the Community Grants Scheme, allocating \$40,000 to the program in the 2025-26 budget.

The scheme had been excluded from the initial 2025-26 budget and was also removed during the 2024-25 budget cycle.

The grant program aims to recognise community contributions and support local initiatives, while remaining aligned with the council's Long-Term Financial Plan.

A recent rate review has resulted in a \$20,000 allocation being incorporated into the revised budget, creating a corresponding saving.

Funding has also been approved for the purchase of 11 automated external defibrillators following a legal requirement to install them in council facilities.

The total cost of \$18,150 will be offset by a \$4000 grant, reducing council's contribution to \$14,150.

Council also endorsed a revised organisational structure to support staff transitions and maintain operational stability, delivering an annual saving of

Borrowing levels were adjusted in Budget Review 1, with a reduction of \$645,324 - primarily due to savings on the development of housing blocks on Grace Harwar Drive in Port

Further adjustments will be considered in Budget Review 2,


due in early 2026. The special meeting marked the last before the departure of chief executive Maree Wauchope, who has moved on to a role with the SA Housing

Rallying for respect

WALLAROO nurses, midwives and their supporters were among hundreds who rallied across South Australia last week in support of a union pay claim.

The rallies, held on Wednesday, October 30, were organised by the South Australian branch of the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation as part of its RESPECT campaign.

The campaign calls for improved pay and conditions under the Public Sector Award enterprise agreement.

The demonstrations came just a day after the SA Government announced a new offer on Tuesday, October 29, which includes a 13 per cent pay rise over four years, \$4500 in bonus payments, and additional incentives.

Health Minister Chris Picton said the offer followed the introduction of legislation to mandate safer staffing ratios for nurses, midwives and patients.

"The new South Australian ratios have been modelled on ratios in Victoria and prioritise both patient care and safety, and staff wellbeing, following extensive consultation with the ANMF," he said.

ANMF SA chief executive, Adjunct Associate Professor Elizabeth Dabars, said the union rejected the 13 per cent offer, just as it had when the same offer was made previously.

She appealed to the public to sign an online petition in support of the RESPECT campaign.

"Nurses and midwives deserve to be safe, supported, and respected but right now, they're stretched to their limits," Ms Dabars said.

"This petition to the state government is a powerful way for nurses, midwives, patients, families and the wider community to stand together and demand

Virtual support for country midwives

A NEW pilot program is helping country midwives continue providing safe birthing services in rural and remote communities.

The Virtual Intrapartum Midwifery Statewide Support Service (VIMSSS) is an after-hours peer support platform that connects regional midwives — including solo practitioners - to colleagues at the Women's and Children's Health Network.

Launched in July as a 12-month trial, the program aims to support collaborative decision-making, maintain or improve clinical safety, and reduce staff fatigue and professional isolation.

The service allows real-time, hands-free reviews of patients' cardiotocography (CTG) results, providing valuable second opinions and clinical insights.

Health Minister Chris Picton said the service is now available to midwives at every regional birthing site across South Australia.

"VIMSSS has already been used more than 50 times since it launched, helping birthing practitioners support 32 expectant mothers in rural and regional areas through their pregnancies," he said.

"It's making a real difference for country midwives who provide such an important service to women and babies in rural and remote areas,"

"Midwives have been telling us that this tool helps them access valuable support and insights from their peers, taking some of the pressure off what can be a really stressful job."

Among those who have used the system is Port Pirie Regional Health Service Associate Midwifery Unit manager Kathryn Hansen.

She credited VIMSSS for helping her quickly secure a second opinion from another midwife about the CTG results of local woman, Annalize.

"The VIMSSS provides a fantastic opportunity for teamwork between regional and WCHHN midwifery teams after hours and on weekends," Ms Hansen said.

"VIMSSS is easy to use and allows me to get a second opinion quickly, with minimal disruption to my bedside care provision."

Mr Picton said the South Australian Government was also recruiting more midwives, with this year's Transition to Professional Practice Program workforce recruitment pipeline adding 85 new midwives for both metropolitan and regional areas.

Choppy waters for charter boats

TOM Hams and Bree Alcock have had to cope with a double whammy since they bought Port Hughes Fishing Charters in May 2024.

Although they operate in areas of Spencer Gulf which appear unaffected by the harmful algal bloom, their bookings have been hit because of widespread media and social media coverage of the crisis in other coastal areas.

Their bookings took another hit when Premier Peter Malinauskas announced a range of fishing restrictions on October 23.

These include a 50 per cent reduction in bag and boat limits for recreational and charter boat fishing for calamari, garfish, blue crab and King George whiting in the Spencer Gulf zone.

Ms Alcock said, at this time last year, they had 41 bookings for November and December, compared with only 22 now, while 24 charters had been booked for January 2025, compared with only seven bookings now confirmed for January 2026.

Tom said booking cancellations began as soon as news of the fishing bans was announced.

"People are calling up saying it's not worth it to travel so far and pay for accommodation, food, travel, as well as the charter," he said.

'That doesn't just affect us,

that affects other businesses

Mr Hams said his clients booked accommodation at Port Hughes and nearby areas with family-owned businesses and spent money locally on fuel, meals, coffee and other purchases.

"It's not just us that it's affected, it's all the other family-owned businesses as well.

"It's hard on us... having to decide what we're going to do next."

Mr Hams said he was waiting to find out what discount they would receive on their annual \$20,000 fee to operate a charter boat, under industry assistance measures offered by the South Australian Government.

Charter Boat Association

of SA president Ryan Valente, from Reef Encounters at Marion Bay, said the industry had been put under increasing pressure in recent years.

He said it began with the introduction on the ban on snapper fishing in all areas of the state except the South East in November 2019 and had worsened with the algal bloom.

"And now we have the added pressure of these (fishing) limits, which will essentially be the last straw for quite a few of our operators," Mr Valente said.

"There are 46 active charter boat licences (across the state) and approximately 27 licences in abeyance.

"Of those 46 active licences, there's only a dozen or so that are really operating."



Seafood stores covered in cashback scheme

SEAFOOD retailers are now eligible to join the South Australian Government's Dining Cashback scheme to support businesses affected by the harmful algal

Customers will be able to save up to \$50 off their seafood purchases at participating stores. Premier Peter Malinauskas announced the extension of the scheme yesterday, Monday, November 3, to coincide with the opening of the ballot for consumers to win one of 60,000 cashback vouchers.

The ballot will be drawn on November 10, and subsequent draws will be held at the start of each month until March.

These can be redeemed for up to \$50 at participating seafood retailers throughout the state and at coastal hospitality businesses, including restaurants, pubs, cafes, sporting clubs, kiosks, and take away shops.

Tackling skill shortages

"These placements are about more than study - they help build a skilled local workforce," Uni Hub chief executive Anita Kuss said.

Students earn while they learn, develop industry connections and contribute their skills locally.

The program is delivered in partnership with universities including Flinders University, CQUniversity, University of Southern Queensland and University of New England, alongside host employers such as local health networks, councils and businesses.

"We're grateful to the industry partners supporting this initiative," Ms Kuss said.

"They're investing in local people now to help secure the professionals our region will need into the future."

'Angel' brings siblings together after 56 years

A WALLAROO woman is being hailed as an angel for reuniting three siblings who had not seen each other in 56 years.

Dee Daddow began the journey five years ago, posting on Facebook on behalf of her friend Peter Blake, 74, also of Wallaroo.

Peter had lost touch with his family after emigrating from the United Kingdom to Australia in 1971.

Through her efforts, Dee was able to reconnect Peter with his brother George Blake, 75, and sister Susan Collis, 77, both still living in

Their eldest sibling, Eric Blake, 79, lives in Sydney but remains estranged from the family.

Sadly, their older sister Linda Hoy died last year before she could reunite with Peter.

It was an emotional reunion when Dee Daddow and her husband Brett arrived at the Anglers Inn on Sunday, October 26 with George Blake and Susan Collis.

The siblings had flown in from the United Kingdom and were collected by the couple from Adelaide Airport the day before.

Joining them was Peter's nephew, Nathan Collis, who met his uncle for the first time that

George and Susan are spending a fortnight in Wallaroo and will return home on Friday, November 7.

"Apart from the birth of my three children, this (being reunited) is the next best thing in my life," says Peter, who is a former workmate of Dee's husband, Brett Daddow.

"I couldn't believe it, right up to the day before they came, I still couldn't believe it.

"If it wasn't for this lady, Dee, and her husband, it would never have happened."

Peter also thanked Dee for her support during his treatment for bowel cancer and other health challenges.

"And if she hadn't been here, I don't know what would have happened."

George and Susan's trip was planned for next year but was brought forward thanks to Linda's son Nathan, who paid for the flights with his inheritance from his mother.

Peter believes the family lost touch partly

because they were separated when he was just

The youngest of five, Peter was only one year old when their mother left.

The children were removed from their family home in London and placed in state care, as their father was deemed too unwell to care for

They were sent to different foster homes and institutions.

Susan and Linda remained together, while Peter and George were usually placed together. Eric was sent elsewhere.

Despite the separation, the siblings shared two cherished holidays together on the Island of Guernsey.

Peter and George say they experienced abuse while in care and that their father misled them about their mother's absence.

"He told me that my mother had been run over by a London bus and killed and I believed it," Peter says.

George, Linda and Susan were later reunited with their mother, but Peter never saw her again before her death in 2022, at the age of 96.

Peter briefly reconnected with his sisters in

his 20s; however, he lost contact after emigrating and spending many years living in remote parts of Queensland.

George says he had nearly given up hope of finding Peter, until his nephew came across Dee's Facebook post in 2020.

Since then, the siblings have kept in touch through regular video calls and had been looking for an opportunity to reunite in person.
"We'd been looking for him for years and

years and years," George says.

"I had contacted the Sally (Salvation) Army and all that and we just didn't get any joy.

"With him disappearing into the bush, nobody really knew where he was."

Peter, George and Susan now call Dee their sister and say they can never thank her enough for reuniting them.

For Dee, it's been a joy to help bring the siblings back together.


"I couldn't stop crying when they all got together because I know how unwell Pete's been,"

"I feel deeply about those I care about and so it's just been an absolute pleasure and joy to see Pete have his family around him."

Acting principal appointed at Wallaroo Mines as department investigates

THIS email did not explain the reasons for an acting principal being put in place.

In a statement provided today, a Department for Education spokesperson said the department was aware of allegations and was investigating claims.

"While this process is underway, the principal will be on leave," they said.

"The department takes these concerns seriously and has met with a number of parents multiple times.

"There is no 'secrecy' in relation to this matter and some parents have been warned about their ongoing behaviour.

"The department is closely monitoring the situation, has spoken with staff at the school and is providing additional support to the leadership team — along with continuing to meet with parents."

A spokesperson for a group of concerned parents said parents had made five complaints to the department in term three and up to October 24, while a number of further complaints, possibly up to 15, had been made since October 25. The spokesperson asked to remain anonymous.

The spokesperson said 84 students were enrolled at the school. The school's 2024 Annual Report to the Community stated that 99 students were enrolled that year.

YPCT has been told that a number of the most recent complaints involved allegations that Ms Condon's husband, Simon Condon, had attended a camp for WMPS students held by WMPS at Glenhaven Park Camp, Stockport, from October 22 to 24.

Mr Condon is not listed as a staff member on the WMPS website. YPCT understands that allegations made in complaints to the department include that Mr Condon was not known to parents or staff at the school.

The online petition was created on October 27 by a group described as the Wallaroo Mines Primary School Community.

A number of those who have signed the petition or commented state they are parents from Poonindie Primary School, near Port Lincoln, where Ms Condon was principal in 2024. There are also comments from people who say they were a parent or staff member from Mil Lel Primary School in the South East, where Ms Condon was principal prior to PPS.

The petition requests the Department for Education "urgently review the leader-ship of (the) principal due to ongoing concerns about unprofessional behaviour, child safety, and declining school culture".

"Our goal is to restore a safe, respectful, and supportive environment for all students, staff, and families" the petition says.

"Over 20 families have already considered moving their children to other schools."


Mr Ellis met with six WMPS parents yesterday, Monday, November 3, as part of ongoing consultation with the group.

"I have been doing my best to share the concerns of the parents and families at Wallaroo Mines directly with the Education Minister," he said.

"I don't know specifically what they have investigated, or what they are investigating.

"I know that there's an online petition that shares quite a few concerns.

Ferry suspended

SPENCER Gulf Searoad has announced the suspension of its Wallaroo to Lucky Bay ferry service.

Chief executive Kieran Carvill confirmed the decision in a statement issued on Tuesday morning, November 4.

"The current older vessel, Aurora V, has been in Yamba, New South Wales, since July, undergoing a refit following its recent sale, with the objective of replacing her with a future-proofed vessel," he said.

"We have tried and exhausted all efforts to se-

cure a suitable, high-quality interim vessel.

"Unfortunately, every option evaluated was unsuitable for the crossing, deemed too old, or non-compliant with stringent 2025 regulatory standards.

"The safety and compliance of our operations are paramount, leaving us no choice but to pause the service temporarily."

As reported by the YP Country Times (8-10-25), the Aurora V has been contracted for sale to the Samoa Ports Authority.

Mr Carvill said the design

for a new, permanent stateof-the-art, electric-powered vessel had been finalised and lodged with Lloyd's Register, awaiting final plan approval.

He said, during this downtime, the company was seeking resolution of some outstanding operational issues connected with the port of

Dodgy dollars lead to North Moonta arrests

TWO people have been arrested as a result of an investigation into counterfeit currency in the Yorke Mid North region.

Uniformed and Criminal Investigation Branch SAPOL officers from Kadina executed a search warrant at a North Moonta property on Tuesday, October 28.

The search was part of an ongoing investigation into reports of fake banknotes being circulated in the

Police allege they found more than 30 counterfeit notes, along with an imitation firearm and a machete.

A 38-year-old man and a 32-yearold woman were arrested and charged with deception.

The man also faces charges of possessing an unlicensed firearm and a prohibited weapon.

He was refused police bail and appeared before the Kadina Magistrates Court on Wednesday.

The woman was granted bail and is expected to appear in the Kadina Magistrates Court on December 15. Investigations and forensic exam-



inations are ongoing.

Police urge vigilance

SA Police is urging business owners, retail staff and members of the public to be vigilant when handling cash, following the recent counterfeit currency incidents.

Consumers are advised to take extra care when receiving change and making purchases.

If you suspect you've received a counterfeit banknote, contact the

Police Assistance Line on 131 444. Handle the note as little as possible and store it in an envelope. Be ready to provide details of when and where the note was received, and a description of the person who passed it to you.

Business owners should also note key details about the suspect if the person leaves the premises before police arrive. This includes their appearance, companions, vehicle description and any other relevant

information.

If CCTV is available, SAPOL requests you review the footage and assist police with any recordings of the incident.

Police recommend checking the note's texture and comparing it to a genuine note. Look closely for security features and unusual printing, which may indicate a forgery.

Safer school route in the pipeline

KADINA students may soon have a safer walk or ride to school as Copper Coast Council seeks grant funding for a shared path through the town's education precinct.

The 1.4 kilometre sealed track would run from the intersection of Doswell Terrace and Hallett Street, along Lindsay Terrace and onto Pannan Street, where the existing section up to the intersection of Drain Road would be upgraded.

A spokesperson said council had consulted with and received letters of support from Kadina Preschool Centre, Kadina Memorial School and Harvest Christian College about the proposed path.

HCC principal Peter Ayoub said a new path would reduce current safety hazards including "uneven surfaces, loose gravel, cracked bitumen, exposed tree roots and displaced soil".

"We do have ongoing concerns regarding the instability of the current footpaths, particularly for younger children or those using prams or bikes, as well as limited safe crossing points near the school zone," Mr Ayoub said.

"These concerns are particularly heightened during wet weather or high-traffic periods.

"The proposed shared path will not only enhance safety and accessibility, but also encourage more sustainable and healthy travel options, such as walking, cycling, and the use of mobility aids throughout the broader community."

KMS parent Lauren Russack, whose two children walk to school, said safety was a concern when they were younger.

"With a designated path, I'm sure a lot more parents would feel comfortable for their kids to be walking to and from school.

"The traffic just gets so busy.

"Kadina is huge, Harvest is getting a big school as well.

"The area is just going ahead in population growth, so I do think it's something that is going to be necessary."

The CCC spokesperson said council had received customer requests and complaints about the lack of infrastructure in the area.

Kadina resident Kevin Routley made a submission during last year's Annual Business Plan consultation, advocating for the sealing of the Hallett Street footpath after seeing students, parents and visitors to the bowling and croquet clubs regularly walk away with muddy shoes after rain.

The CCC spokesperson said, while council's recent application for a \$200,000 grant (with \$313k council contribution) from the State Bicycle Fund was unsuccessful, it would apply for the next round in early 2026 and other funding opportunities.

Council last year received \$200k from the State Bicycle Fund for a shared bike and walking path connecting Moonta Bay and Port Hughes.

Kadina Memorial School, Kadina Preschool Centre and Wallaroo Mines Primary School were contacted for comment.

Wallaroo Mines left out

A WALLAROO Mines resident has expressed her disappointment about the walking and cycling conditions around her local primary school, saying the area was "neglected".

The resident, who wished to be identified as Meg, said footpaths were unreasonable, water drainage issues rife, and she had seen a gopher user get bogged on the side of the road.

Meg said Wallaroo Mines Primary School students trying to get to school were put at risk by the poor infrastructure.

"There are lots of families living down this road now with little kids riding their bikes," she said.

"They can't ride on that obstacle course (the footpaths) so they ride on the road and it's terrifying.

"I think probably a lot of parents have given up on allowing their kids to be pedestrians and they drive them to school and pick them up."

Air Marshal visits Moonta to honour RAAF pioneer

AIR Marshal Stephen Chappell, Chief of the Royal Australian Air Force, made a surprise visit to Moonta to view the Sir Richard Williams statue in Queen Square on Wednesday, October 29.

Born and raised in Moonta Mines, Air Marshal Sir Richard Williams is widely regarded as the father of the RAAF, instrumental in its founding in 1921.

The statue was erected in 2021, honouring Sir Richard during the RAAF's centenary

A small number of the original team involved in the statue's creation was present to welcome Air Marshal Chappell during his impromptu visit.

He described the monument as "quite impressive" and noted that he was the first Chief of the Air Force to make the visit.

Air Marshal Chappell also commended the organising group for their efforts; in return, the group presented him with its last bottle of Sir Richard Williams Shiraz.

"Stephen is closely linked to Sir Richard as, during his career, he commanded No. 1 Squadron, Sir Richard's original squadron," Robyn Knight, convenor of the 2021 committee, said.

"He explained about Sir Richard's sword being used for the handover from Chief to Chief and explained how it is kept between times in a protective case in the Chief's office."

Unfortunately, not all the original team were able to be there to meet the Air Marshal, Mrs Knight said.

In the absence of the late former Moonta RSL president Allan Halliwell, Don Skarstrom and Neil Windsor represented the RSL, while Trevor Bowden and Mrs Knight represented the National Trust.

Apologies were received from RAAF Group Captain Greg Weller — who was instrumental in achieving the statue and the centenary events in Moonta — as well as Stephen Stock and Anne Stock from the National Trust SA Moonta branch, Aaron Phillips, patron Paul Thomas and Lyn Longo.

"Air Marshal Chappell also has strong family links to Moonta," Mrs Knight said.

"The son of Australian cricketer Greg Chappell, his links to Moonta include his paternal ancestors William (a boot and shoemaker) and Mary (nee Mitchell) Chappell who are buried in Moonta Cemetery.

"His other paternal ancestors are William (a storekeeper) and Cordelia (nee Grose) Strike, also buried in Moonta Cemetery."

Air Marshal Chappell indicated he has pencilled in the 2027 Kernewek Lowender Copper Coast Festival for a lon-



"We look forward to working with Sam and his team on the upcoming trial of hybrid mining vehicles at Hillside and into the future."

About Hillside

HILLSIDE is one of the largest undeveloped copper projects in Australia and, according to rexminerals.com.au, it contains a mineral resource of 1.9 million tonnes of copper and 1.5 million ounces of gold.

The mine's expected life span is at least 22 years, based on the current plans which include stages 1 and 2, each of 11 years duration.

There is potential to extend beyond 40 years with future stages (stages 3 and 4).

Timeline to date

- November 2008: Rex Minerals confirmed its discovery of high-grade copper mineralisation at its Hillside project, situated on farmland 12 kilometres south of
- August 2013: As Rex got closer to applying for a mining lease, the company was involved in two court cases with landowners whose property bordered Hillside and sought to stop Rex from entering their land.
- September 2013: Rex applied for a mining lease at Hillside. The public was given six weeks to comment.
- September 2014: Rex Minerals officially accepted a mining lease approval from the South Australian Government to build the mine at Hillside
- August 2017: Community consultation sessions were held about the mine.
- February 2018: Rex submitted its Program for Environment Protection and
- July 2020: The SA Government approved Rex's PEPR for stage 1 of the project.
- December 2022: Onsite construction of the Hillside mine infrastructure began.
- July 2024: Work began on a diversion of Pine Point Road and its intersection with St Vincent Highway to make way for the mine.
- October 2024: MACH Metals Australia, a subsidiary of Indonesia's Salim Group acquired Rex Minerals, valuing Rex at \$393 million.
- April 2025: The newly realigned section of the Yorke Highway reopened to traffic.
- September 2025: Work began to upgrade and re-align a section of St Vincent Highway, and the Sandy Church Road intersection.

Other current works to support future mine operations include providing access over deep creeks and improvements on the section of the Walk the Yorke between Pine Point and Rogues Point.



Graeme has released multiple albums and continues to perform to audiences across Australia and overseas.


Renowned for his clear vocals and strong connection with crowds, he is equally respected for his tireless fundraising work.

His efforts have supported organisations such as the Royal Flying Doctor Service, children's health services, cancer care and aged care.


In recognition of his community contributions, Graeme has received Citizen of the Year honours and was inducted into the Australian Country Music Hands of Fame.

Last native orchids bloom for season 2025

Beyond his professional role, Yorke Peninsula agronomist Chris "CD" Davey has a deep passion for conserving the region's native orchids.

Through this semi-regular column, he shares insights into the beauty and rarity of the local species, several of which exist only on YP and are classified as endangered, with fewer than 100 plants remaining.

Protecting these species is considered vital to preventing their permanent loss.

AFTER a month of dry, warm weather from mid-September to late October, YP's native orchids, similar to crops, finished up a lot earlier than expected.

As I write this article, many orchids have flowered and

have buds on them, hopefully laden with fertile seed for future generations.

The last to flower are commonly known as rustyhoods from the Oligochaetochilus family.

The first of this family flower in late August, while the last ones, the tall rustyhood (Oligochaetochilus excelsa) is just starting to flower now.

Surprisingly, the rustyhoods are predominantly found in the north of the peninsula not the south, where the rainfall is higher.

It makes more sense when you look at other rustyhood species. A lot are found in the northern parts of South Australia, from the northern pastoral to the station country. They seem to like a drier envi-

Unlike the tall rustyhood, which stands as high as 30cm tall, the diminutive greenhood flowers only five to eight centimetres off the ground. Upon closer inspection, you can see the resemblance of the two in the flowers.

This is the final article in my native orchids series. Thank you to the YP Country Times for the opportunity to raise awareness about the fragility of our local species.

I hope readers have found the articles interesting — and perhaps even taken the time to walk through a nearby reserve, park or patch of scrub in search of the hidden treasures I've written about.

Students seek solutions to algae bloom

STUDENTS at Warooka Primary School are turning their concerns about the harmful algal bloom into a search for real-world solu-

Reception to year 6 students are taking part in the Naturally Brave project — a collaboration between Makers Empire, Growing with Gratitude and Bushfire Kids Connect — designed to build resilience and wellbeing in primary school students facing natural di-

The project uses 3D design, design thinking and wellbeing principles to help students understand local disaster risks and develop a risk reduction plan, while supporting their emotional wellbe-

WPS principal Beth Purdy-Dart said students recently heard explained how the algal bloom developed and what they could do to help.

Students then took a day trip to the Marine Discovery Centre at Henley Beach, where marine scientist Georgie Kenning guided them through hands-on activities to deepen their understanding of the bloom's effects.

"The children are now designing 3D printed prototypes around three areas — what to do before the algal bloom for prevention, what to do during the bloom and how to help after," Ms Purdy-Dart

"Some of their thoughts so far are things like a robot that is linked with AI that can travel under the water and target the seeds (cysts) from the bloom to stop further spread."

WPS students will travel to Adelaide on November 21 to join other schools from across South

Talbot leads Lightning to breakthrough win

Wearing the Indigenous Round uniform designed by Temaana Yundu Sanderson-Bromley, the reborn Adelaide Lightning claimed a historic first win of their new franchise era at the State Basketball Centre in Wayville.

In the WNBL round 3 clash on Saturday afternoon, November 1, Lightning defeated the Canberra Capitals 73-65.

The contest was evenly poised at halftime, with Adelaide leading by one point at the long break.

A dominant third quarter — both offensively and defensively - set up the win, with the Lightning outscoring Canberra 17-10 in the

After a tight final stanza, Adelaide held firm to record an eight-point victory in front of a vocal and partisan home crowd.

Importantly, the result marked a strong response under new head coach Kerryn Mitchell, following a demoralising round 2 away loss to the Geelong Venom.

Captain Steph Talbot, from Kadina, once again led by example, keeping her team composed under pressure in the closing minutes.

Her all-round performance was outstanding — finishing with 18 points, including two three-pointers, while shooting at better than 50 per cent from the field.

She added five defensive rebounds, four assists and four steals in a complete performance.

Talbot has now played 71 WNBL games since returning to Adelaide Lightning in 2020. She won the league's Most Valuable Player award that same year, during the COVID-19 Queensland hub season.

Her first stint with Lightning ran from 2011 to 2014, where she was named WNBL Rookie of the Year in 2013, receiving the Betty Watson Trophy.

Talbot missed the 2023 season due to an ACL injury, but remains a key figure in Australian basketball, starring for the Opals on the world

Her accolades include a bronze medal at the 2024 Paris Olympics, a silver medal at the 2018 FIBA World Cup in Spain, and a bronze at the 2022 tournament in Australia — where she earned selection in the tournament's All-Star

Adelaide's next match is the round 4 home clash against the Sydney Flames, starting at noon on Sunday, November 9.



Sutcliffe's journey: from Kadina to the AFL and beyond

After a season of SANFL league football with Woodville-West Torrens, Cameron Sutcliffe was recruited by the Fremantle Football Club with pick 71 in the 2011 AFL National Draft.

A product of the Kadina Bloodhounds, Sutcliffe made his AFL debut in round 15, 2012, against the Western Bulldogs at Subiaco Oval.

Between 2012 and 2018, he played 104 games for Fremantle, primarily in wing and half-forward roles, kicking 18 goals.

He was part of the Dockers' firstever AFL Grand Final side in 2013 - a clash with Hawthorn at the MCG. Fremantle fell short, losing by 15 points.

Sutcliffe was also a member of Peel Thunder's 2017 WAFL premiership team. The club, formed in 1993 and affiliated with Fremantle, went backto-back at WAFL level that year.

After being delisted by Fremantle, Sutcliffe joined the Port Adelaide Magpies SANFL side as captain for the 2019 season — wearing the club's iconic number one jumper, traditionally worn by the team leader.

He was elevated to Port Power's AFL list in the 2019 AFL mid-season rookie draft, selected with pick 9.

Sutcliffe returned to the AFL with Port in round 17 against Brisbane at Adelaide Oval, where he was assigned to tag his former teammate and friend, dual Brownlow Medallist Lachie Neale.

Later that year, he captained the Magpies in the 2019 SANFL Grand Final against Glenelg.

Despite a strong personal performance - including three goals and being named among the best players Port Adelaide lost the decider at Adelaide Oval by 28 points.

The Magpies did not compete in the eight-team SANFL competition during the Covid-affected 2020 season, but Sutcliffe returned to the side

He was named in the leadership group for the South Australian state senior team for the Haydn Bunton Cup match against Western Australia.

In 2022, more than a decade after his SANFL debut with the Eagles, Sutcliffe won the Bob McLean Medal as Port Adelaide's SANFL best and fairest player.

He retired at the end of the 2023 season with 49 SANFL games in the Magpies' prison bar jumper and one appearance for South Australia.


Post-retirement, Sutcliffe has continued his involvement at Alberton in off-field roles. He served as a development coach during Port Adelaide's inaugural AFLW season in 2022 and was elevated to midfield assistant coach the following year under head coach Lauren Arnell.

Sutcliffe has also contributed to the club's charity arm, Power Community Limited, delivering the Power to End Violence Against Women and Empowered programs, which promote gender equality and respectful

"I want to bring a great team culture to this club and an inclusive style of coaching where everyone is in one squad — no split groups."













Farmer confidence steady in Yorke Peninsula and Mid North

FARMER confidence in South Australia has lifted slightly, but many in the Yorke Peninsula and Mid North remain cautious as they assess seasonal conditions and market pressures.

Rabobank's latest Rural Confidence Survey, conducted in September, saw South Australia's rural sentiment index rise to a net eight per cent — up from three per cent last quarter — marking a modest recovery following a sharp winter decline.

Most farmers surveyed in the region expected the agricultural economy to either improve or stay the same over the next 12 months.

While winter rain provided some relief, uncertainty around spring rainfall, dry conditions, and falling grain prices

— particularly lentils — tempered optimism.

"Confidence has lifted, but it's still a 'watch and see' situation," Rabobank SA state manager Roger Matthews said.

"At the Yorke Peninsula Field Days, many farmers told us they were concerned about low prices and patchy rainfall.

"The season remains on a knife edge."
Commodity prices and government policy impacts were among key concerns for farmers in the region, alongside the later-than-usual crop development.

Despite lower forward pricing for wheat, barley and lentils, Mr Matthews said improved crop conditions had lifted production outlooks — though a

cooler finish would be needed to realise yield potential.

"Farmers won't really know how crops are tracking until harvest begins," he said.

"We also expect to see more crops cut for hay this year, given better price prospects for fodder."

Many livestock producers are focusing on fodder conservation after extended dry conditions, aiming to build reserves ahead of summer.

The Rabobank Rural Confidence Survey tracks farmer sentiment quarterly across Australia. The next results are due in December.







Notice of Exploration Drilling Activity for Natural Hydrogen and Helium

Gold Hydrogen Ltd is an Australian company exploring for Natural or Geologic Hydrogen and seeking to verify the existence of commercial quantities in its Petroleum Exploration Licence 687, covering portions of the Yorke Peninsula. During 2023 we completed our first drilling activities and verified the existence of Natural Hydrogen and Helium on our Ramsay Project area.





HOT FISHING TIPS

Port Broughton: Fishers launching early in the morning are landing blue swimmer crabs and the occasional garfish, while avoiding the dreaded trumpeters. A bluey or two is also showing up from the jetty in the late afternoons.

Wallaroo: Squid, blue swimmer crabs and tommy ruff were caught from the windbreak section mid-jetty late in the week, while garfish returned to the rocks just north of Point Riley. Calm conditions saw boat crews head out to Bird Reef targeting squid and garfish, making use of the daylight lull as prawn boats anchored ahead of their night

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Squid turned up again at both jetties, though most were small and not worth chasing. A couple of calm days midweek allowed tinnies to head out in search of garfish, squid and King George whiting.

Port Victoria: This spot is producing

good numbers of King George whiting, ranging from just legal size up to 39cm. Blue swimmer crabs, tommies, squid and garfish are also hitting baits from inshore drops to well offshore. A few tommies are turning up at the jetty after dark.

Point Turton: Garfish are active over the rocky bottom grounds south of Port Rickaby, north Hardwicke Bay, and across at Point Souttar and The Pines. Corny Point (Dunn Point) is producing King George whiting, red mullet and squid. Late-season mullet and a few tommies are still showing at Couch and Burners beaches during the high tides.

Stenhouse Bay/Marion Bay: Salmon to a kilogram are turning up at local beaches including Gleesons Landing, Browns and Shell when the winds swing easterly. Boat crews launching from Foul Bay and Marion Bay during clear conditions are reporting catches of whiting, flathead,

snook and red nannygai when the
