COVID travel restrictions supermarket delay reopening until after Christmas

THE re-opening of the newly rebuilt Tennant Creek IGA supermarket has been delayed by COVID-19 travel restrictions, IRAM CEO John Kop announced today.

"Practical completion of the rebuild is complete, with less than a month needed to fit out and stock the store," he said. "Until last week we were on track to re-open by Christmas." "Contractors were due in Tennant Creek this week to install the point-of-sale (POS)

systems, while additional teams were coming from interstate to start restocking the store." "Unfortunately, most of these people, as well as our project manager, are based in Western Australia and some in South Australia," he said.

"Due to changed risk ratings by the West Australian Government for travel from the

Northern Territory, our main contractor has advised their staff are no longer able to travel to the Northern


Territory until at least January."

"Restocking the store would require us to place orders now, including about \$200,000 worth of perishable goods," he said.

"Given travel restrictions and ongoing uncertainty about lockdowns in the Territory, it is not possible to place these orders without knowing that we will have systems in place and staff on the ground to receive the goods or we could end up losing perishable food."



"Therefore, we have had no choice but to defer the reopening until after Christmas," he said. Mr Kop said the postponed reopening was extremely frustrating and disappointing to staff, contractors and particularly the community, after getting so close to re-opening a modern and spacious new store.

"Many of the IRAM senior management team have spent months away from their families this year, including their children, working to re-open the store before Christmas." he said.

However, he assured all customers that there should be no disruption to existing supplies and Christmas goods for the temporary store located at the BP.

"Everything that can be done continues to be done to ensure the new store opens as early in the New Year as possible," Mr Kop said.

Treasure galore at your local Uniting Church Op Shop

PERHAPS you have wandered past the old cream coloured building between the Uniting Church and the Butcher and wondered "what goes on in there?", "what is the story behind this old place?"

The current Aladdin's Cave that is the Uniting Church Op-Shop is located in Tennant Creek's oldest still used building, the Australian Inland Mission Welfare Hut.

Established in 1935 a welfare club was the brainchild of Reverend Kingsley F 'Skipper' Partridge and John Flynn.

Today's op-shop is in keeping with the original building - everything has been donated. The land by R Schmidt, the finance for the prefabricated Sidney William's Comet steel-framed building by the Sydney branch of the Inland Mission and other donors, electric light supplied from the Ice Works next door and Ron Hughes-Jones, who had the water truck, donated 1,000 gallons of drinking water.

"Completed to original specifications" by 14 January 1936 the Welfare Club was furnished with a small billiard table, library, reading and writing room, facilities for men to shower and a hall to hold about 50 people.

Almost immediately the building hosted a sub-branch of RSSILA (later Returned Soldiers League RSL) and those seeking attractions other than "the hotel and gambling schools".

The billiard table is long gone but the building that housed Tennant's first Library more than 80 years ago still houses a diverse collection of books to tempt even the choosiest readers.

in the Tennant Creek Children's Christmas Tree raffle. Back in 1935 the Sydney Office of the Australian Inland Mission adopted the 35 girls and 30 boys then residing in Tennant Creek and provided the Welfare Club with Christmas gifts for the children.

So if you are: seeking attractions other than "the hotel and gambling schools"; packing up to leave town; hosting a theme party; decluttering over the Christmas holidays; or just need a shirt on your back/Christmas -cards, -socks, -undies/a pair of shoes/some winter woollies for your trip South, why not drop into the Uniting Church Op-Shop/Australian Inland Mission Welfare Hut and explore Aladdin's Cave?

There is a treasure for everyone, most priced at the princely sum of \$1.

You can part with that paltry sum knowing that your contribution won't leave your community and that you are contributing to maintaining a revered historic building.

The Op-Shop is open on Thursday and Saturday mornings.

Donations can also be left at the side door on Sunday mornings or in the green bin out the front anytime.

Local contractors to bring business hub to life

A TERRITORY enterprise with a presence in Tennant Creek has been awarded a \$2.4 million NT Government The Hub is a key initiative under the 10-year, \$78.4 million contract to fit-out the Barkly Business Hub.

Harvey Developments has been announced as the successful proponent. The new Barkly Business Hub will operate in Tennant Creek from the current Northern Territory Government Centre, easily accessible from Peko Road.

The Barkly Business Hub will be a 'one-stop-shop' created to facilitate existing and new business ventures and innovation, including supporting local businesses and local skills development. It will help create jobs, expand industry and elevate the Barkly's business capabilities. The Hub will enable the co-location of Northern Territory Government and National Indigenous Australians Agency staff to streamline business and workforce support.

Design of the Barkly Business Hub has been finalised

The Hub is a key initiative under the 10-year, \$78.4 million Barkly Regional Deal, which was signed in 2019 by the Australian and Northern Territory governments and the Barkly Regional Council.

The Deal aims to improve the productivity and liveability of the Barkly region by stimulating economic growth, improving social outcomes and supporting local Aboriginal leadership. Minister for Treaty and Local Decision Making Selena Uibo said the Hub will be a game-changer for the region.

"It will help businesses innovate, expand and increase productivity for the Barkly, which we know has so much to offer," she said.

"The Hub will also be critical to progressing other Barkly Regional Deal initiatives such as the Regional Workforce Strategy, Barkly Mining and Energy Service Offer, Economic have on the region, and on the Territory's economy."

Growth Strategy and much needed CDP Reform.

"The Territory Government has committed \$30 million to-wards the Barkly Regional Deal and is leading or a partner to 21 key economic, social and cultural initiatives of the Deal to improve liveability and productivity for the Barkly region.



Seniors celebrate festive season with annual lunch


