Meet Lukkanu - the star of the Barkly!

AN unbelievable discovery unfolded in the Barkly on Tuesday after one of the most endangered species in Australia – the Bilby – was found near Bootu Creek Mine.

Tennant Creek's Barkly Vet Practice was contacted by a woman from the mine who came across a mother Bilby's body, and held onto it until Central Land Council Rangers came to pick it up.

In the mother's pouch was a baby. It was trainee veterinarian Shoni Smith's first time seeing the native critter.

"It took me a few seconds to realise the importance, I'd never seen any bilbies come into out practice in Tennant Creek," she told the

Tennant Times.

"It looked like a miniature kangaroo with a long snout!"

Local wildlife carer Carol Hepburn has been given the task to attend to the needs of the infant mammal and has named him Lukkanu – meaning "star" in Warumungu.

"He is the star of the moment, it was such an amazing find because we thought the population was decimated in the area due to feral cats," said Carol.

"I have spoken to many countrymen and they can't remember the last time they have seen one.

"The mum had to be pregnant to somebody, so hopefully it's a good sign there are more about."

Carol describes Lukkanu, suspected to be two-and-a-half months old, as a little character who is very gutsy but is still finding his feet, especially being taking out of his makeshift pouch ready for all the photos.

He also chirps like a baby bird and loves nestling.

Lukkanu's feeding has been what Carol describes as "up and down", however thanked the Desert Park in Alice Springs and Seaworld for help in the knowledge to care for him.

As well as volunteering as a wildlife carer and the Barkly Vet Practice, Carol works with Julalikari Council Aboriginal Corporation's Karguru Nursery, working with the First Nations Seed Bank and Ancient Grains, where she takes her precious babies to work.

Barkly Vet Practice owner Dave Hall and other local conservationists have been lobbying for a cat-proof fence to surround the poo farm ponds, where endangered species

could live and thrive.

And Carol agrees and says it could be a huge boost to tourism for the Barkly.

"This is such a significant find for the Barkly and it's important we take step up to protect the species from extinction," she said.

"The wildlife we have around Tennant Creek is pretty unique.

"We have a few Mala (kangaroos) and the migratory birds which come to the sewerage farm ponds every year which twitchers will travel for miles to see some of these birds.

"The find of Lukkanu is better than finding the biggest golden nugget!"

For those who aren't familiar with the Bilby, they are the size of a domestic cat and once populated around 70 per cent of the nation prior to colonisation.

The species is now restricted to around 15 per cent in the deserts in NT, Western Australia and south-west Queensland.

The Bilby is pretty handy for other native wildlife too, being renowned for digging new burrows every few weeks - often used by other native animals.



New homes for govt employees in Tennant

A HEAD-leasing agreement between the NT Government and two local construction companies has added 14 newly-built homes to the pool of government employee houses in Tennant Creek, with more under negotiation.

GK Builders, a Tennant Creek company established more than 40 years ago, owns 10 of the houses while four homes by Remote Industries are nearing completion.

Government employees have now occupied ten homes which have been head-leased by the NTG for ten years with five of their previous homes to be returned to public housing stock.

Minister for Remote Housing and Town Camps Chansey

Paech said the head-leasing arrangement offered incentives to construction companies to invest in the town and to create jobs for locals within the industry.

“It also means we have more homes for public employees which are better suited to their requirements, leaving homes with more bedrooms available for bigger families,” he said.

“Having more homes in our public housing stock means reducing waitlists for public housing and alleviating overcrowding.”

Mr Paech said the new homes were a key deliverable against the Barkly Regional Deal, utilising funds from the Territory Labor Government’s \$30 million contribution.

“We are proud to be delivering upon yet another initiative

of the Barkly Regional Deal to improve the productivity and liveability of the Barkly region,” he said.

“Our Government is leading eight of the 28 social and cultural initiatives of the Deal to improve the productivity and liveability of the Barkly region by stimulating economic growth, improving social outcomes and supporting Aboriginal leadership.

“With the delivery of these new houses, over half of the Territory Labor Government-led initiatives are now complete including the upgrading of the Alpururulam airstrip, construction of a multi-purpose accommodation facility, and the completion of the feasibility study for an arts centre in Elliott. Several other initiatives are in train.”

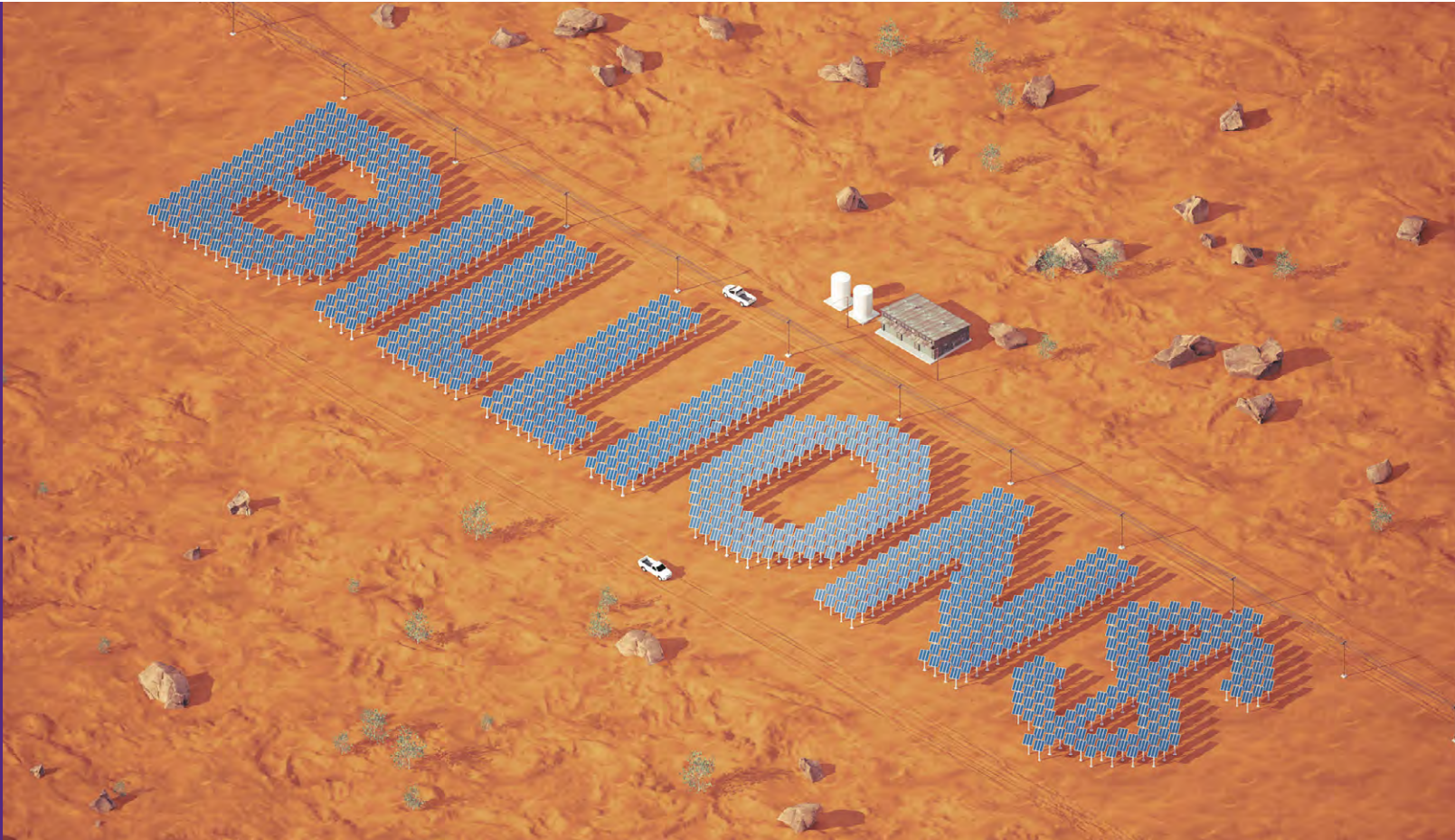

"Leaving Language Footprints across the Barkly Region."

October was a successful month for language



We have been successful in receiving a grant from Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications, Office of Arts, Indigenous Language and Arts program to 'Supporting Warumungu language and literacy' by developing and distributing an early literacy learning app/game, to aid in the development of literacy skills and the learning of the local language Warumungu.

"This grant is a great resource development for our children and adults to ensure we have better literacy and speaking our language– it keeps our language strong," commented

Ms Brenda Crafter.

CEO Karan Hayward said the language teams will be very busy working on this program with stakeholders and speakers, as well as all the other current programs they are currently working on.

The new Elliott Language vehicle has arrived this month courtesy of the vehicle gift grant from the Northern Territory Government.

"We were granted the vehicle over 18 months ago to aid the Elliott school to engage their students in more language and culture trips around the community," said Ms Hayward.

"We joined with the Elliott school on many occasions during the year on trips with the language speakers to undertake cultural experiences and this vehicle will be a great asset to enable more trips in the future.

A language teacher based at Elliott School, Rayleen Bill said having a vehicle now based in Elliott would make the language program stronger improve on the ability to host more activities.

"We are so pleased to now be able to receive this vehicle and we thank the Language Centre and the NT Government for the gift vehicle," said Elliott Principal Kevin Gaskin.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984 (Cth)

Notice of an application for the protection of a specified area, being the area known as Mount Peake Mine, near Wilora, Northern Territory

Invitation to make representations

I, Alice Buhrich, hereby give notice as follows:

The Minister for the Environment (**Minister**), responsible for the *Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984 (Cth) (Act)*, has received an application made under section 10 of the Act. The application is seeking long term preservation and protection of a significant Aboriginal area being the area known as Mount Peake Mine, near Wilora, approximately 251kms north of Alice Springs in Northern Territory. The Minister has appointed me to provide a report to the Minister under paragraph 10(1)(c) of the Act.

The Applicant

The application is made by Christine Palmer on behalf of herself and other Kaytej Traditional people (**Applicant**).

The purpose of the application

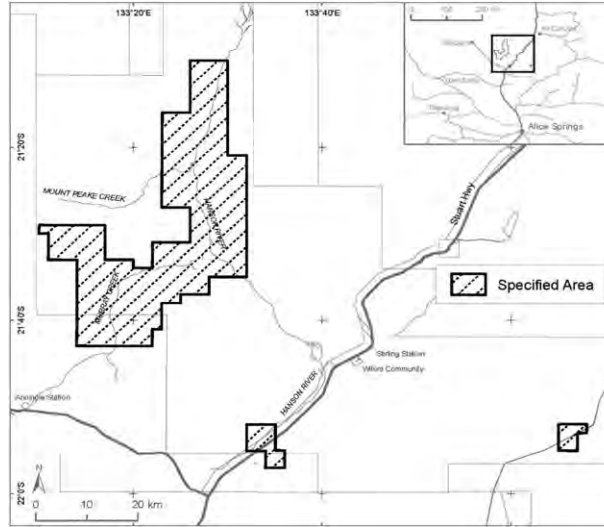


Figure 1 Map showing the specified area of Wilora

The application seeks the long-term preservation or protection of the area specified in the application (**specified area**). The specified area is depicted in Figure 1 below. Section 10 of the Act confers power on the Minister to make a declaration to preserve and protect an area where the Minister is satisfied that it is a 'significant Aboriginal area' under threat of injury or desecration. A 'significant Aboriginal area' is defined by section 3 of the Act as an area of land or waters that is "of particular significance to Aboriginals in accordance with Aboriginal tradition". 'Aboriginal tradition' is defined as the "body of traditions, observances, customs and beliefs of Aboriginals generally or of a particular community or group of Aboriginals, and includes any such traditions, observances, customs or beliefs relating to particular persons, areas, objects or relationships".

Matters the report is required to deal with

The Minister must consider my report pursuant to section 10 of the Act in relation to the specified area before deciding whether to make a declaration under section 10 of the Act. Under subsection 10(4) of the Act, the report is required to deal with the following matters:

- the particular significance of the area to Aboriginal peoples;
- the nature and extent of the threat of injury to, or desecration of, the area;
- the extent of the area that should be protected;
- the prohibitions and restrictions to be made with respect to the area;
- the effects the making of a declaration may have on the proprietary or pecuniary interests of persons other than the [Applicant];
- the duration of any declaration;
- the extent to which the area is or may be protected by or under a law of the State or Territory, and the effectiveness of any remedies available under any such law; and
- such other matters (if any) as prescribed.

The specified area

Figure 1 below depicts the area for which preservation and protection is sought. This specified area is described as the Mount Peake Mine, near Wilora, Northern Territory.

Claimed nature of the particular significance

The Applicant claims the specified area is of particular significance in accordance with Aboriginal tradition for several reasons, including:

- The specified area is important for the Wampere (Possum) Dreaming – Wampere (Possum) Dreaming songlines run in multiple directions, from coast to coast, including through the Walpuri Tanami Desert and the Wampere (Possum) at Mount Peake and is therefore significant as a cultural and heritage site in song line and story.
- The specified area is a women's site and men are not allowed access to the area.

Claimed threat of injury or desecration

The Applicant claims that the specified area is under threat from the drilling and sterilisation proposed by mining company TNG Ltd. The threat is primarily attributed to drilling in the area and will threaten at least five fauna species which are part of the Mount Peake Dreaming.

Interested parties are urged to **contact me** as soon as possible to be provided with further information about the submission process, including the provision of the application, making representations in response to the application, and making final comments in response to representations received.

As part of the submission process, I will seek to take oral submissions from the Applicant, and if such occurs, any arising written record I make will be supplied to the other interested parties as a representation.

Representations must be made in writing by 5pm on **Monday 22 November 2021** or within such further period as may be allowed. **Do not send your representations directly to the Minister.**

Representations received by the due date will subsequently be provided to the Applicant and to all interested parties who duly submitted a representation, and thereafter the Applicant and such interested parties will be afforded an additional period of **two weeks** to make final comments in writing.

Claiming confidentiality

If you wish to claim confidentiality over any part of

your representation, please identify why you are claiming confidentiality and how you wish confidentiality to apply. Representations will be provided to the Minister for the Environment and the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment, along with the section 10 report. Representations, even those subject to confidentiality, may be disclosed where it is authorised or required by law, to meet procedural fairness requirements, and in response to a request by a House or Committee of the Parliament of the Commonwealth.

Privacy notice

Personal information means information or an opinion about an identified individual, or an individual who is reasonably identifiable.

Sensitive information is a subset of personal information and includes any information or opinion about an individual's racial or ethnic origin, political opinion or association, religious beliefs or affiliations, philosophical beliefs, sexual preferences or practices, trade or professional associations and memberships, union membership, criminal record, health or genetic information and biometric information or templates.

By submitting a representation in response to the 'Notice of an application for the preservation and protection of a specified area, being the area known as Mount Peake Mine, near Wilora Northern Territory, you consent to the collection of all personal information, including sensitive information, contained in your representation.

I, Alice Buhrich, collect your personal information (as defined by the Privacy Act 1988 (Cth)) contained in your representation for the purposes of consideration in drafting a report under section 10 of the *Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984 (Cth) (Act)* in relation the specified area and related purposes. If you do not provide some or all of any relevant personal information in your representation(s), I may be unable to fully and comprehensively consider your representation in the drafting of the report to be submitted for consideration by the Minister responsible for the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment (Minister).

The Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment (**department**) collects your personal information (as defined by the *Privacy Act 1988 (Cth)*) contained in your representation for the purposes of the Minister's consideration in deciding whether to make a declaration under section 10 of the Act in relation to the specified area and related purposes. If you do not provide some or all of any relevant personal information in your representation(s), the Minister may be unable to fully and comprehensively consider your representation in deciding whether to make a declaration under section 10 of the Act in relation to the specified area.

The department may disclose your personal information to the Minister, parties that may be affected by a decision of the Minister under section 10 of the Act (to meet procedural fairness requirements), and other Australian government agencies, persons or organisations where necessary for the above purposes, provided the disclosure is consistent with relevant laws, in particular the *Privacy Act 1988 (Cth)*. Your personal information will be used and stored in accordance with the Australian Privacy Principles.

Big week for the Memo Club

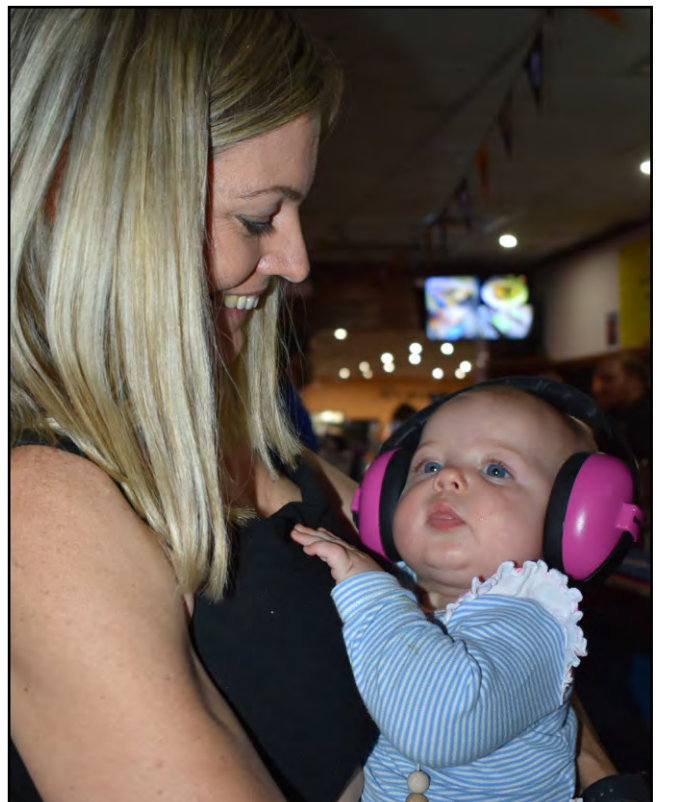
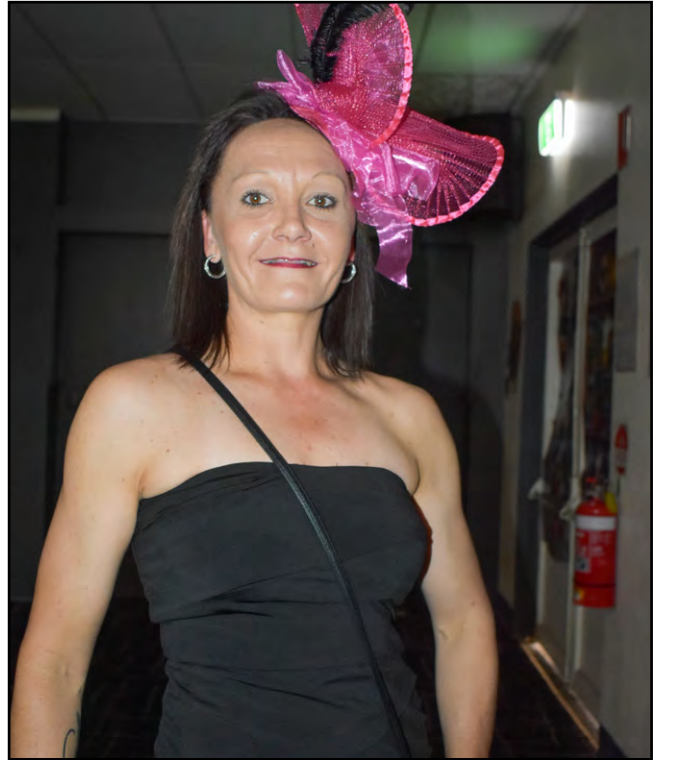

Rick said they were proud to have served the Barkly for two decades as the only retail nursery in a 500 kilometre radius.

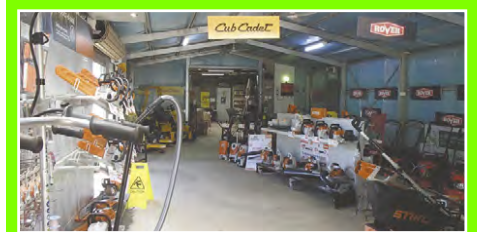

During these activities they practised many skills including number recognition, number sequencing, time, estimation, angles, teamwork, balance,
