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
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
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\$1.6 million upgrade for Juno Centre

NEW accommodation and improved equine facilities are key features of a \$1.6 million investment in an agricultural training centre just east of Tennant.

The Juno Centre offers residential and in-reach programs to students from across the Territory.

The joint funding from the Northern Territory and Australian governments will see an all-weather shade cover built over the horse arena, including fans and lights so training can be delivered into the evening.

The tender was recently awarded to MPH Carpentry and Construction from Alice Springs.

Four modular accommodation units will enable more students to participate in residential training courses.

The funding falls under the Revitalising TAFE Campuses Across Australia Program, to improve vocational education infrastructure that will equip students with skills, knowledge and capabilities applicable to a broad range of occupation and industry sectors.

Juno Centre delivers both accredited and non-accredited vocational education and training (VET) courses, providing students with skills and connections to industry with the potential for future employment and training.

Juno lot had been developed by the Department of Education to offer programs and training opportunities to students from remote communities and regional centres.

"Training is available to both secondary students and adults, with other VET providers able to access the facilities," she said.

"This includes young people involved in apprenticeships along with participants undertaking relevant training courses such as Certificate IV in Training and Assessing, White Card, Working at Heights and First Aid.

> The centre combines built in mentoring with a structured on-the-job training program leading to sustainable ongoing employment for locals in the Barkly region.

> Ms Moss said the Juno Centre was one of only two sites in the Territory registered by Horse Safety Australia to deliver equine training to school students.

> "Increased visitor numbers at Juno has created a demand for more accommodation which will help students to stay in

the Barkly region rather than travelling to Darwin or Alice Springs for block training," she said.

"The VET sector plays an integral role in the ongoing economic and social growth of the Territory by skilling and training the current and future workforce and that's why we are supporting Territorians to be trained, upskilled, and equipped to make the most of future opportunities.

Construction is expected to be completed early 2022.



Epenarra Art Centre undergoes \$230k facelift

THE re-birth of a beloved existing space is taking place today, fulfilled by the \$230,000 upgrade of the Wutunugurra (Epenarra) Art Centre. was finally realised. The grant has been the existing demonstrates the control of the contr

This project was initiated by the Wutunugurra Local Authority and funded by the Barkly Regional Deal's Local Community Projects Fund.

Until now, the Wutunugurra community has been without adequate and comfortable space for people to gather, create art and pass on cultural knowledge to younger generations. There are many people of Wutunugurra who are accomplished artists, with their stories and talents shared through artworks purchased and displayed right around Australia.

The Wutunugurra Local Authority pushed hard to upgrade the existing Wutunugurra Art Centre at Local Authority meetings. After a successful application for a Barkly Regional Deal Local Community Projects Fund Grant, that vision space for visitors to the community to drop into.

The grant has been used for the repair and upgrade of the existing demountable building that was used for the storage of art materials and artists' computer records in Wutunugurra.

The upgrade has been built onto the demountable and created an attractive and practical art studio with air conditioning, toilet and shower facilities, and a kitchen.

This newly created community space project - managed by the Barkly Regional Council (BRC) - will allow the talented multi-generational artists in Wutunugurra to work alongside each other in comfort, passing down knowledge and skills to younger artists and taking inspiration from each other's work. It will also provide a home base for artist workshops offered by Barkly Regional Arts and professional studio

"It is great to see the successful completion of one of the first Local Community Projects Fund applications and we look forward to many more" says Ben Campion, the Executive Officer of the Barkly Regional Deal Backbone Team.

Local Northern Territory business MPH Projects was awarded the contract to carry out the design and construction of this project, which is now complete.

The official opening will take place at noon today and all are invited to come share in this small part of history.

Good news from community on National Nutrition Week

THE year to June 2021 saw eight tonnes less sugar consumed and 508 tonnes of fresh fruit and vegetables sold across the 41 remote Indigenous communities serviced by Outback Stores.

This outcome is the joint result of the Outback Stores Healthy Food Policy and strong, community-led decision making from local store directors to tackle diet-related health

Communities such as Ali Curung have implemented restrictions on the size of soft drink bottles sold, as well as introduced sugar-free days of the week.

"At first people didn't like it, but as store workers we told them it was better for our health and they understood," said store director Audrey Inkamala, about implementing 'Sugar-Free Wednesdays' in Engawala.

Since 2012 an ongoing trend has seen the proportion of full-sugar drinks fall by 23.24 per cent across stores serviced by Outback Stores. T

he proportion of water sold increased 2.46 per cent and sugar-free drinks also increased 0.25 per cent. The result of this is 80,079 litres less of sugary drinks sold in remote communities, enough to fill an average backyard swimming pool.

"It's great to see Outback Stores and local store directors working together to promote a healthier retail environment for stores and communities," said Anna Murison, Health & Nutrition Manager for Outback Stores

Improving access to nutritious and affordable food continues to be a key component in the Outback Stores nutrition policy. In the last financial year customers bought a total of 508 tonnes of fresh fruit and vegetables, which is a quantity four times greater than the average amount sold per store in 2011.

Outback Stores works with communities to maintain value pricing on all fruit and vegetables to support customers to be able to regularly purchase fresh produce. Pricing of fresh fruit and vegetables is maintained at levels as close as possible to major metropolitan retailers.

Over the past year the cost of fresh staples such as carrots, onions, broccoli, apples and bananas has dropped by 40 per cent on average, due to special-buy pricing on key lines being consistently maintained at, or below, major retailer pricing.

From October through to mid-December Outback Stores is promoting fruit and vegetables through a customer promotion.

Those who spend \$5 or more on fresh produce go into the draw to win a \$100 voucher. To involve the kids, stores are holding a colouring in competition, with the best entry winning a \$100 youcher.

National Nutrition Week runs annual from 10-17 October.

The theme this year was 'Get more veg in your life'.


It was established in 2018, created as an alternative education area catering for disengaged students in Years 3 to Year 6, who need small group work, life skills as well as social and emotional learning to encourage self regulation.

New classrooms for Alekarenge School

STUDENTS at Alekarenge School are super excited about three brand new classrooms which they'll move into within the coming weeks.

NT Link Transportable Buildings are at the community south of Tennant Creek installing the classrooms and they have attracted a lot of interest from the students who are keen to chip in and help with works.

In the Barkly, Newcastle Waters School will also receive a new classroom along with Neutral Junction School.

Minister for Education Lauren Moss said the classrooms are part of a \$6 million project to provide 15 new classrooms across the Territory.

"These new classrooms provide high-quality educational spaces with good acoustic qualities and state-of-the-art IT connectivity," she said.

"Our Government is investing in school infrastructure by providing contemporary learning environments for our teachers to deliver high-quality teaching and learning programs tailored to meet the needs of their students.

"The classrooms at Alekarenge have replaced aged infrastructure so the community would have noticed demolition works in preparation for the new buildings."

Minister Moss said the works were part of the Territory Labor Government's \$11 million classroom stimulus program announced last year.

Once again, the committee produced an amazing event, and Tennant Creek responded with its usual enthusiasm and support.







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
