MOST Australians who knew Rosalie Kunoth-Monks remember her for her leading role in Australia's first colour feature film, Jedda.

However, people from the Barkly and throughout the Territory remember her as a warm and caring woman; and a passionate, unrelenting advocate for her country and her people.

This remarkable Anmatjere-Arrente woman from the Utopia Homelands died on Wednesday, aged 85.

Rosalie was a teenager at St Mary's Hostel when she was chosen to star in Charles Chauvel's Jedda, but her shining had just begun.

She went on to become a nun in Victoria and married Bill Monks after she left the order then, after a stint in the public service, returned to the Northern Territory where she continued to work for the betterment of Aboriginal people.

A staunch defender of her traditional ways and cultural rights, and a vocal denouncer of assimilation, Rosalie worked in the social justice field for many years, fighting for better health, housing and education outcomes for her people. She escalated her role as an activist and advocate during the NT Intervention.

When the Northern Territory Government overhauled its Local Government structure in 2008, Rosalie was honoured to be the Barkly Shire's first ever president.

The recipient of many awards including a prestigious OAM, Rosalie was named the NAIDOC Person of the Year and NT Australian of the Year in 2015.

Like many of those who step outside the circle, Rosalie had her critics.

But these were vastly outnumbered by those who adored and admired her, and respected her humanitarian efforts.

Rosalie died in Alice Springs Hospital after being medevacced from Utopia.

She is survived by her daughter Ngarla, granddaughters Amelia and Ruby, and the many children she cared for over decades.

A Barkly legend and a national treasure now rests in peace.

Council to host IWD celebration

BARKLY Regional Council has been successful in the International Women's Day grants.

Council is just one of 26 community groups, organisations and invdicuals sharing in the \$67,856 of funding to celebrate the day on Tuesday 8 March.

This year's theme is #BreakTheBias.

Minister for Women Lauren Moss said the Territory Labor Government is a proud supporter of women and look forward to the Territory-wide celebration of International Women's Day.

"Throughout history women have fought for gender equality across a range of platforms including suffrage, workplace rights, and access to education and health rights. Despite gains over the years, we still have a long way to go.

"International Women's Day is a time to acknowledge the efforts of those before us and to demonstrate our commitment to working towards a world where women and girls no longer face gendered discrimination and bias."

Back to school payments to help offset costs

BACK to School payments are now available to help support families offset the costs of textbooks, stationery and school uniforms.

The \$150 annual payment can also be used for school camps, excursions, elective activities and subject material costs.

All Northern Territory students are entitled to the payment, including those enrolled in government and non-government schools, and home-educated students.

Payments, available now, must be redeemed by the end of Term 1 2022. The payment is available for pre-schoolers throughout the year but is only valid until the end of their first term of enrolment.

Last year payments worth \$6.6 million were honoured for approximately 44,000 Territory students.

"The Territory Labor Government is making it easier for our students to be equipped and ready to learn from day one," said Minister for Education Lauren Moss (pictured).

"This scheme goes a long way towards helping families cover the costs of uniforms, books, online learning subscriptions and oth-



er learning essentials. Each school decides what is on offer, so I urge families to get in touch with their schools to discuss options. "School offices are now open for business, so the payments are ready to be redeemed."

He helps the Association embrace a range of cultures across the local community and for many years has supported Harmony Day and Multicultural Night.

His nominee said: "His patience is legendary. For senior school students needing that extra help to complete their assessment tasks, Ben offers extra classes after school and/or at weekends to help students get the best results they can.

"In holiday times Ben will also arrange to be at school so that students can come in and work on their artworks in their own time and at their own pace.

"Ben is highly regarded in the Arts community both locally and elsewhere in the NT where in particular his ceramics skills are highly respected.

"Regularly Ben's Year 12 students' artworks are selected for the Exit Art Exhibition held annually at the Museum and Art Gallery of the NT in Darwin.

"This honour brings respect to the students and reflects well on the Tennant Creek community."

This year will be his final year of teaching.


