

Old and new have Panthers primed for finals tilt

ANGASTON is going back to the future as it looks to break its two-year finals drought, appointing former coach and club stalwart Craig Hadden to the role of senior coach for the 2023 season.

Hadden, who played more than 300 games for the Panthers and led them to a grand final appearance as a coach in 2009, returns to the club after a recent stint with Central District. The club stalwart says that he is returning to Angaston a more experienced coach and looking to share that wisdom with a new crop of players.

"Since the last time I coached, I have learnt a lot and I probably

have a different view on how the game is played now," Hadden said.

"I am hoping to bring a few different things to the club that I have learnt over the journey and I am coming back more experienced and hopefully imparting that on the group." While Hadden has returned to the club, he has been joined by Steve Rusca and James Papronty, with the pair set to play a key part in Angaston's push to end a two-year finals drought.

"We know what Steve can do, he is a quality player and he has come back in really great nick especially after having not played at any level last year," he said.

"James Papronty has come back to us after a couple of years as well, so we are really pleased with both of those guys." As well as the returning pair, Angaston has also added a pair of reliable defenders with Port Districts Luke McInerney and former Port Magpies SANFL player Tom Corcoran helping offset the departure of some younger local players due to

"Tom is a quality player and he has been really good and fit in really nicely," Hadden said.

work commitments

"Luke McInerney has come over from Port Districts so he will be a defender for us and we're hoping that the gains outweigh the losses."

While the recruits have taken most of the attention, Angaston's improving core of young homegrown players will also be a key part in shaping the club's fortunes in 2023.

"Both the Antonie boys (Jayden and Ben) have had really good pre-seasons," Hadden said.

> "They have been out to almost every session and they are ready to take some games by the scruff of neck this season.

"Myles Harvey has also been training well and its some of the locals and young fellas who have been out most and making an impact."

With the mix of youth and experience, Hadden is hopeful that his side can improve on its fifth-place finish and challenge not only for the finals but for the premiership.

"It's been a really good pre-season, we started pre-Christmas so it's been a long time and we can't wait to get into some games," he said. "I think we will stack up well and our midfield will be as good as anyone going around in the competition.

"We just have to try to convert into decent scores and defend a bit better than we have over the last couple of years but hopefully we can be in the thick of it at the end of the season."

Barossa look to build on finals appearance The Bulldogs responded

FRESH off a finals appearance last season. Barossa District is looking to continue its improvement in 2023 by winning a final for the first

after disappointing campaigns in 2020 and 2021 by making the elimination final against Tanunda in 2022, where a winnable game slipped through their fingers. Senior Football Operations manager Simon Wills said that the Bulldogs were looking to build on their successful campaign. "We are looking good, we have had a pretty good pre-season," Wills said. "We have plenty of numbers out on the track and we are probably looking stronger this year

than we were last year." Barossa has been among the more active clubs in recruiting across the region as they look to build their depth to challenge the top sides in the competition.

The Bulldogs have added a mix of new talent while also having some players return to the club from stints with Central District. "Liam Tapper and Ryan

Nelson have returned from Central District along with a couple of other youngers guys," Wills said.

"We have added Lachlan Webb from Payneham and Jake Mazzone from Hectorville while Brayden Owen will split his time between Central District and us when he isn't picked to play for them." The additions have added depth and quality to the Bulldogs squad who will also return Brendan Dew. but will be forced to cover for the loss of Rvan Grey who has moved to Goodwood in the Adelaide Footy League. Wills also said the club's youth was ready to step up and fill the void as they try to push into premiership contention. "Jake Tobin is one of our voung guvs who has had a really good summer," he

"We have just been really even across the field and we have blooded a fair bit of youth in the past few vears.

"A lot of these kids are now at 30 or 40 games now and with a bit more maturity we are looking forward to seeing them in action for us this year."

As for their goals for the season, the Bulldogs are hoping to play finals and give themselves a shot at premiership success.

"Once you get there anything can happen, we saw that last year in the elimination final if we kick a bit straighter it could've been a different story," he said.

"Our expectation is to finish top four again, play finals and when we get there anything can happen."

Improvement on the agenda for Redlegs

AFTER breaking its long losing streak midway through last season, Freeling enters the 2023 BL&G season full of confidence.

With senior coach Johnathon Ross set to enter his second season and strong cohesion within its playing group, the Redlegs looks set to build on its two win year in 2022.

While wins against Willaston and Gawler Central were the highlights for the year, Freeling also turned in strong performances against a number of other sides across the competition.

The Redlegs still have a way to go to challenge the top sides in the competition, but Freeling coach Johnathon Ross says he believes the club definitely has the right man.

"We won two games and probably lost seven or eight games by less than four goals, we made great strides," Ross said.

"I don't think we are that far away and in terms of work over pre-season, things should be a little more exciting in what we can achieve in terms of results."

Freeling has been able to maintain most of its squad for the upcoming season while also adding some quality talent who can help the Redlegs be more competitive in 2023.

"Sam Tylor is coming over from North Haven with Aaron Insley," Ross said.

"I played with Sam at the Port Magpies at SANFL level and Tyler Westley comes from Kersbrook who I played with as well, while we have also added Harry Lienert who is a young footballer who looks like he has a bright future."

Since joining Freeling, Ross has endeared himself with the players with a coaching style that looks set to be more attacking.

"Last year, we were more controlled and this year we want to be quicker and use the corridor a bit more." he said.

"The boys have been able to execute that and have had some success as we have been able to see the results in our trial games."

Ross did not make any big predictions for Freeling ahead of the season but firmly expects his side to be more competitive across the board.

"We want to show continued improvement and close the gap between our best and our worst," he said.

"If we can do that coupled with continual improvement across the board in our good young brigade so that improvement over the last 15 months has shown us plenty of good sign."

ROUND 1 at Kapunda

A mouth-watering clash against rivals Kapunda awaits Freeling in round one, with the two sides set to do battle for the Mickan/Shanahan Cup at Dutton Park.

Despite finishing the year in good form and snapping its long losing streak against Willaston, the Redlegs were unable to topple their neighbours in both matches in 2022.

Freeling fell by 12 points in round three and 15 points in round 11, coming close to beating Kapunda for the first time since 2019.

If Freeling are to continue to improve and shock a few sides in 2023, a round one win against their traditional rivals would be the perfect way to start.

ROUND 5 vs Willaston

Having not recorded a win in close to three years, Freeling snapped their long drought with a 44-point over Willaston in round 10 last year.

It was a rather remarkable effort for the Redlegs, given they were defeated by 88 points against the Donnybrooks in round one.

The 132-point turnaround showed the drastic improvement in Freeling's group and gave the Redlegs motivation for the rest of the year.

They will get a chance to make it two wins in a row against Willaston, when they host the Donnys in round five and continue to show the improvement that was on display last year.

It won't be easy against a Willaston side with a new coach and a group of players who will be eager to right the wrongs of 12 months prior.

Tigers seek improvement, stability under new coach Dawe

AFTER an injury-marred 2022 campaign, new Gawler Central coach Shane Dawe is hopeful his side can make a leap and improve in 2023.

With several key players such as Charlie Molyneux and Kyle Thorogood enjoying full preseasons, Dawe was hopeful his side would be able to make strides up the ladder.

"We have those players returning from injury who missed most of the year so they are all back, fit and ready and raring to go," he said

"We are really keen to see how we perform, it has been a healthy pre-season for us which is a big positive for this time of year given the headaches we have had the last couple of years."

A long time servant of the football club, Dawe steps into the senior coaching post after serving as an assistant and then interim coach in the 2022 season.

After a tumultuous two years since the premiership season of 2020, Dawe said his focus was on bringing fun and stability back into the group.

"I think I can bring stability and also giving the enjoyment back to footy and that's an area where I can bring some real positivity," he said.

"We have changed a few things up on how we want to approach the game and we want to be more attacking with our style as well.

"So with that in mind, our key focus in the pre-season has been fitness and skill level and getting that to the required level for A-grade football."

The Tigers have been active in their recruiting, looking to fill the holes left by the departing Brett Kennedy and Jamie Wegener while also looking to bolster their depth as well.

"Last year at times we had 14 or 15 players in the twos so we will definitely be stronger and have more quality this season," he said.

"We have added some midfielders including Jacob Shepperd and Riley Mitchell from Elizabeth as well as Jamie Coff who is our 200cm forward who's been impressive."
In pairing Coff with team of the year ruckman Joe Botton, the Tigers have a potent pairing and one Dawe hopes to use throughout the year.

"One hundred per cent, we will use them both forward at times," he said.

"We aren't blessed for height but we saw at times how good Joe can be forward last year so it's something we can use at stages for sure." As for his side's expectation, Dawe said he was putting a cap on what they could achieve but said he was focusing on building consistency.

"Last year, we would win a game then lose a game but we want to be consistent and stay in games for as long as we can," he said

"I never want to put a cap on what we can achieve but we just want to be consistent and delivering our best every Saturday."



KEY PLAYERS

JOE BOTTIN

No big man had more impact across the Barossa, Light & Gawler Football Association than Gawler Central ruckman Joe Bottin.

Bottin was one of the standouts for Central last year taking the lead ruck honours in the BL&G team of the year, stamping himself as one of the league's most influential big men.

With new recruits joining the Gawler Central midfield, Bottin's role in the ruck will be crucial as they look to improve on last year's performance. As well as his presence in the ruck, Bottin's leadership will also be important with the talented big man having been a key member of the Tigers leadership group.

Bombers ready to fly up in 2023

AFTER narrowly missing finals and sitting just a game outside the top four, Kapunda is hoping a solid pre-season can help take it into the finals in 2023.

Under second-year coach Jason McKenzie, the Bombers look set to be one of the teams pushing for a finals spot in a congested middle part of the ladder

Playing the game at Dutton Park, a win could give Kapunda great momentum as they push towards a finals birth in 2023.


ROUND 18 at Nuriootpa

It is not often a round 18 fixture can draw much fanfare, but Kapunda's final round clash with reigning premier Nuriootpa could be a seasondefining clash.


With the season shaping up as one of the closest in recent memory, the final round clash on Nuri's home deck could prove pivotal for the Bombers finals aspirations.



"The girls are half old and half new and I want the older girls to lead by example and help the new girls to showcase their potential while also just focusing on the basics and getting them right."


As for the style of footy she wants her team to play, Pavlovich said she wanted to be tough to play against and be a team that other sides do not want to face.

While the 49-point defeat was not ideal, there were plenty of positives for the group to build on after a strong season for coach Ash Barnett.


"There are some pretty good sides in this competition," Barnett said.

Changing of the guard for Mallala


DESPITE disappointing back-to-back finals exits and a changing of the guard in playing personnel, Mallala again look set to contend for the Adelaide Plains premiership.






As well as a new coach, Virginia has also added some experienced talent with Jacob Bortoletto joining his former Woodville South coach along with young tall Tex Dowdell.


