New threats set to challenge two-horse race

OVER the past two Barossa, Light and Gawler Football Association A grade seasons reigning premier South Gawler has put together a 31-1 record, while 2022 premiers and reigning runners-up Nuriootpa sport a 27-5 mark. Barossa District (20-12) is the only other side to even boast a winning record over that span, and the Bulldogs were unceremoniously hammered by 72 points in the 2023 preliminary final.

The undeniable recent history poses an interesting question: Is the BL&G a two-horse race once again? Or is 2024 the year another team ascends to break up the Lions' and Tigers' duopoly?

Willaston missed out on last year's finals by a single win, while the three teams that finished with 5-11 records – Angaston, Tanunda and Freeling – are all realistic candidates to jump into the top-four.

It is hard to ignore the recruiting efforts of Magpies player/coach Sam Colquhoun, bringing a serious SANFL flavour to Tanunda, while Freeling player/coach Nick Hales is also confident his new faces can guide the Redlegs to their first top-four finish since 2017.

Gawler Central perhaps defied expectations last year to claim fourth spot, but it could be a tall task for the Tigers to figure in September again after the retirement of two-time Schluter Medallist Charlie Molyneux –



arguably the league's best midfielder from the past decade.

It may be a bit of a rebuilding season for Kapunda after winning only one game in 2023, but new coach Peter Rolfe has brought some talent and experience with him, so could the new-look Bombers surprise and force someone else into the wooden spoon spot?

South Gawler's reigning back-to-back Schluter

Medallist Steve Burton is expected to spend a fair chunk of the season with Adelaide's SANFL side, so who will put themselves in contention for the league's top individual honour this time around?

With new coaches, new star players and a reigning premier determined to shirk the 'favourite' tag, 2024 promises to deliver yet again in arguably South Australia's strongest local league.

Have there been many changes to last year's Angaston team?

"We've had a couple of players leave due to work/ travel commitments, and have unfortunately lost Jayden Antonie for the season to a knee injury.

"We've had some players returning to the club like Jake Hood, Wade Richardson, and Joel Wilson – who had a year off last year.

"Jack Roesler has joined us from Sedan Cambrai and looks a good young player."

Who are some of the club's brightest talents to keep an eye on?

"Our under 17s played in a preliminary final last year and we're looking forward to some of them playing senior footy in 2024.

"Tyrell Burgess and Ethan Cain had a taste of A grade footy last year, and they'll be joined by the likes of Hartley Eggleton (when not at Centrals), Kynan Harvey, Liam Falkenberg, Marley Harvey, Tyler White, Jesse Parsons and Jordan Bevan – which is really exciting for the club.

What do you think will be the strengths of this year's team?

"I think we have good balance between our senior group and the under 17s coming up, while our second and thirdyear players will look to take further strides forward. "We've had a year under our belts adjusting to how we want to play, which hopefully holds us in good stead for 2024. Our coaching structure has remained steady throughout the grades, which I think is important as well."

Is there anything you've identified as an area you need to improve?

"We've really just looked to build on and improve areas we focused on last year – if we can stay reasonably healthy throughout the season it will certainly help.

"Last year was one to forget in terms of injury, but our depth looks better with the injection of some good,w young talent, and our core senior group staying relatively intact."

Angaston's big import this season, Roesler arrives from Sedan Cambrai Football Club in the Murray Valley Football Netball League, where the goal-kicking midfielder slotted 32 majors in 20 games across the past two campaigns.

Roesler will slot into an experienced Panthers midfield, bringing extra firepower to a group that already had plenty.

In 2023, only the league's top-three teams scored more points than Angaston (78 per game).

Round 2 v Gawler Central

This past year Angaston conceded 327 points fewer than Gawler Central, beat the Tigers by four goals in Round 15, and took a three-quarter time lead into their season finale against eventual premiers South Gawler. But it was Gawler Central playing finals footy, while Angaston was sent packing for an early holiday. That fourth finals spot that the Tigers occupied in 2023 is considered wide open this year, and whoever emerges victorious from this Round 2 clash will put themselves in a commanding position early.

Overall 2023 was a really good year for the team, finishing 12-4 and making a prelim. What are your expectations coming into your third season in charge?

"My expectation is that we are again challenging come the pointy end of the season. Going deep into the finals and playing in the grand final."

Have you had any ins or outs from last year's team?

"We have lost (reigning league goal-kicking leaders) Leigh Ryswyk and Darren Shillabeer (who kicked 55 goals each in 2023). Nathan Casboult will also not be returning.

"We have gained (former West Adelaide SANFL reserve) Tyler Harris, (former Barossa District A-grader and Central District SANFL reserve) Ethan Gant is returning (after a year at Balranald), (former Barossa District junior) Jack Carpenter is back after a few years with Central District and Will O'Brien will be with us full-time after splitting 2023 between our As and Centrals under 18s.

Who do you expect to be in the running for Best-and-Fairest?

"Brendan Dew is our reigning Best-and-Fairest, and he'll be back again.

"Jake Mazzone, Ethan Gant, Jack Carpenter and Austin McDonald (if he doesn't get picked for the Crows) are all good chances as well."

Who are some of the youngsters to look out for this year?

"Lachy Warner, Cody Bahnisch and Nathan Johnson will all play plenty of senior footy this year."

Did you take any lessons from the prelim against South Gawler? Is there anything you will try to do differently, or was it just one of those days?

"A little of both. A real bad day and had plenty to get better at. Fitness level, experience in finals and becoming more organised. "We have an extremely young group and will continue to learn and get better."

Jack Carpenter

Key position players don't grow on trees, so to have a 195cm pillar returning home to the Bulldogs after also spending some of his junior days with South Gawler is a huge coup for Barossa District.

Carpenter, 22, kicked only two goals in his 34 combined SANFL and Reserves games in the past two seasons, indicating Central District preferred to deploy him in the back half, but that could change with the departure of goal-kicking leaders Darren Shillabeer and Leigh Ryswyk.

Regardless of where he lines up – big, young, athletic talls are sure to come in handy in a league where speed has recently reigned supreme.

FIXTURE TO WATCH

Round 7 v South Gawler

A rematch of last year's preliminary final – a game where South Gawler rebounded from their only loss of 2023 with a resounding 16.17 (113) to 5.11 (41) bloodbath to earn another crack at Nuriootpa.

Despite the lop-sided final score, after halftime it was only five goals to three in South's favour, and with some valuable additions to the Bulldogs midfield this year, while the Lions anticipate a step back, Round 7 could tell a completely different story for 2024.

Coach chat

with Nick Hales

Over the past two seasons Freeling has jumped up from two wins in 2022 up to five in 2023, what would you consider a successful year this time around?

"We'll definitely be aiming for finals this year. When you look at the ladder we really weren't far off, and from the games we dropped there were definitely a few winnable ones that just slipped through our fingertips.

"We've got the group – good, developed youngsters who have essentially been blooded through those tougher years – so in my eyes they're a lot older than what they really are.

"The club's done a great job of retaining all the players from the past two years while I've been there, and then we've added to that as well.

"Blokes are putting in and they're keen to get that winning culture back to the club – the club deserves it after a bit of hardship through those Covid-19 years."

Have you recruited any sure-fire A-graders this off-season?

"We've had a few blokes come out this pre-season who I used to play a bit of footy with through Magpies, and a couple of good mates of mine.

"We got Brad Inglis, and his brother Dustin Inglis, Heath McClusky from Port Districts, and we're still working on a few other boys.

"Brad's a guy I had a relationship with since Magpies. He was living over in Victoria for a while but has moved back, and has had a newborn with his partner, so he was looking to get back to his family and play with Dustin, so we were able to package them up. "They'll both play through the midfield and forward line, so they'll give us some good power through the middle and goalkicking ability."

Who among the returning crop of players do you expect to be key contributors?

"Both Ben Heinrich (leading goalkicker) and Scott Dutschke (most 'best player' selections) will be returning, and I think Jono Ross is probably in for another really big year.

"Jono has been building with a bit less responsibility on his shoulders, so I think he should really fire, and no doubt Austin Poulton will continue to improve with a lot of



our other younger guys as well. "Harvey McDonald up forward is looking really good this pre-season – we've got a lot of good development through our youngsters."

Do you plan on making any changes to the way the side has played over the past couple seasons?

"I think we'll definitely alter a few things, try to have a bit more of an easy game-plan – but at the same time the boys will still fall back on a few things and pivot and change when the game isn't going our way, or when we want to control it a bit better we will have things in place for that."

Is this your first time as a senior coach?

"It's my first time coaching at all. I've always been in leadership, and amongst the coaches giving input and asking for input, but yes it's the first time running a team. "The first pre-season has been

really good, we've had some good

numbers pre-Christmas and post-Christmas the boys are back out and into it.

"Everything we've been doing we've been enjoying. We're not flogging them into the ground, everything has a reason for it and that has all been laid out as professional as we can, and we've had great feedback from the players."

What role will you play yourself?

"I'll throw my magnet around a little bit, I'll try to find the bestsuiting spot for the boys. It might take a couple of games to figure all that out, and essentially I'll just find myself filling spots that are a bit needed.

"I've been playing mainly backline and sort of rotating into the midfield to get a bit more size in the middle, so I expect to spend a little bit of time in the midfield, but the back-line is good as a coach to be able to watch and read the game playing out in front of you."

Austin Poulton

Freeling through-and-through, Austin Poulton has toughed out some difficult years in the Redlegs' A grade since making his senior debut back in 2019.

In that 2019 season he earned a best player mention in Freeling's elimination final loss, but since then the club has put together a combined A grade record of 7-39-2.

Freeling's A grade cricket captain has earned selections for the Central Zone Country Championships team in back-to-back seasons, and with his home team finally ready to make a finals push, the reigning BL&G Team of the Year wing could be in for a huge campaign.

FIXTURE TO WATCH

Round 1 v Gawler Central

The rapidly approaching Round 1 clash against Gawler Central will set the tone for the season to come from both sides as Freeling look to emulate the Tigers' top-four finish last year. In their two meetings in 2023, Gawler Central won handily by six goals in Round 7, but as the season rolled on and Freeling found their footing , the Redlegs arguably were the better side in the Round 16 rematch, losing 13.5 (83) to 12.10 (82).

From zero wins in 2021, to two in 2022, up to five in 2023, coach Nick Hales is determined to taste September action, and with expected grand finalists Nuriootpa waiting in Round 2, a hot start is imperative.

After earning a top-four finish in 2023, how different will this year's side look?

"We've had a few that have retired, and Charlie Molyneux will be our runner for the year as he's decided to have a year off. He's getting a bit older and having a bit of a lifestyle change and is a big out for us.

"Will Schmidt has gone to PAC, and Leo Harrison, one of our imports from last year, he's off to Queensland to play footy. "We've got some new players coming in. It's always going to be hard to replace Charlie with a Charlie, but we've got enough. A few kids will step up from last year. "Dean Saunders will step up from 17s into As, and we've picked up two or three new players from outside the area, so that should add a little bit of depth for us. "Tyson Friend has come over from Portland and he'll probably be in the midfield for us.

"Ryan Williams has come from the Eagles, SANFL level, and he should be able to hold down centre-half back for us. He's 190cm – a nice tall – so they'll be the main two ins for us at this stage."

Who do you expect to be in the Best-and-Fairest mix this year?

"Joe Bottin, our captain, he's a previous winner of our Best-and-Fairest but only played about five games last year.

"Brad Mitchell I expect to be around that range as well. To be honest it's quite open this year for us... to put a single name on it would be disrespectful to the rest of the group.

"It's a bonus for us this year – we aren't as predictable I guess – we can roll a few more people through the mids and not be as predictable, so we'll have a few go under the radar.

"Not many people know about our kids, so hopefully they can get under the radar with some teams."

You mentioned one graduating junior who will be in the As this year, are there any others in the mix?

"There's probably about four or five of them down at Central District to be honest.

"Ryan Vandermyle, Oscar King, Ezra Best, Jett Poulish, Tyler Best – quite a few of those kids are still eligible for 17s, and they'll get a look in again this year in senior footy. "Most of them played two or three A-grade games last year, so nothing stopping us giving

them another go.

"There's no specific date about when they'll be back at the club eligible for selection – it's on Centrals and if they are getting opportunities down there."

What will be the strength of this team?


"I'd say our speed. We've recruited a bit more speed into the side, and we're not flushed with talls, so we need to play a faster style game, get a bit more pace into our team. "Obviously our midfield should still be quite strong and competitive, so that's an area we think we should be able to compete quite well in."

What do you need to improve on to become the side you want to be by September?

"We need to stop being scored heavily against. Last year some sides gave us a bit of a touchup, so that's an area we need to tighten up.

"There'll be a change of personnel back there and, to be honest, last year we had a lot of churn of players going into 2023.

"It's a bit more settled this year, the kids are another year older, and we'll change up who plays in that back-six or back-seven so it will look a little bit different for us."

Joe Bottin

Gawler Central's 2022 Best-and-Fairest winner, the towering ruckman also took over the club's captaincy in 2023, although injuries restricted him to just six games before the Tigers' elimination final. One of the few big bodies on a team that will be looking to win with speed and ball movement, Bottin's ability to pull down contested marks as an outlet option could swing results for Shane Dawe's side. During his 2022 B&F campaign Bottin earned eight best player selections from 13 games, and he will need to be leading from the front if the Tigers plan on another trip to the finals.

Coach chat

with Peter Rolfe

What is your footy background and what brings you to Kapunda?

"I played the last two seasons on Kangaroo Island, and then probably four years in the 'ammos' before that, and about 12 years at South Adelaide.

"I have no real ties to Kapunda – I was born and bred in Alice Springs in the NT – but Kapunda sort of tried to get me as a player a couple of years ago, but I'd already committed.

"They kept in contact, and once they knew that 'Buckets' was probably going to do a two-year term, we got the wheels in motion about coming out to coach. "I'm absolutely rapt, it's been a great opportunity and a great start so far."

What was the allure for you to come up to the Barossa, Light & Gawler league?

"I've never really experienced the Barossa league, I spent a lot of my time in Adelaide down south, but I think just how keen Kapunda were to get me on board, really.

"I spoke to David and Tom Leslie in depth over a few months – caught up a couple of times, went out and watched a couple of games of footy.

"I suppose speaking to my wife, it was something I always wanted to do, and if I don't do it now, then when? The opportunity came up and I grabbed it with both hands."

How's your first pre-season been?

"It's been really good actually. We're a pretty young list – the average age probably wasn't much more than 21 or 22 last year – and obviously a tough year on the injury front, so we played a lot of juniors.

"I know Buckets's ethos was trying to blood young talent, and whilst we probably didn't get the wins we would've liked last year, it's put us in a really good position for the future.

"They've come in keen as. We started pre-season at the start of December – nothing compulsory, just a session in town – and we've been averaging mid-20s for the whole time, which is really good."

Have you picked up any sure-fire A-grade recruits this off-season?

"We have. We've got Scott Taylor, who is coming off a best-andfairest last year at Uraidla – he's a good mate of mine. "He's come over and he's one of those blokes that is just a natural leader, he sets really high standards for himself and for his team, so that's probably our boom recruit along with Matthew Rankine.

"Matt is another friend of mine who I played footy with at South Adelaide – obviously everyone knows his brother Izak, he's killing it at the Crows at the moment.

"What we tried to do is get a bit of experience in. Get some great footballers, but also really good people to come in and set the standards, drive those standards, and really show the young crew we've got what it's all about.

"They'll both probably roll straight into the midfield. They give us a bit of versatility as well – both can probably play forward, and both can play back if needed. Good ball-users who work hard.

"They're seasoned physically, both around 32 years old, so they've got bigger bodies and will take a bit of the heat off our young midfielders."

Have any of the returning locals caught your eye so far?

"We've had some really good buyin from all the younger boys, but there have been two who have stood out especially – 'Mudgey' (Aidan Mudge) and Harry Wuttke. "Mudgey is our reigning Best-and-Fairest, Harry was runner-up Bestand-Fairest, they're both about 20 or 21 years old and have come back this pre-season rock-hard fit, setting all sorts of records in the running.

"They've been two who have really caught my eye in terms of what they can bring as players. To have a Best-and-Fairest and runner-up both around that age in a pretty handy competition adds a good string to your bow."

Coming off a one-win season, would you say this is a rebuilding year or do you expect to be competitive?

"I reckon we'll definitely be competitive. Going through last year, I know there were a couple really bad weeks, but the club's been really honest with me the whole way through and I think injuries always play a bit of a part. "I think last year for Kapunda was probably as bad as it can get in terms of senior players being out for periods of time, but it was a sort of 'light at the end of the tunnel' situation.

"We got to play a lot of younger blokes who, instead of having 10 or 15 games under their belts, have played 30-odd A grade games.

"We're definitely hoping to be competitive – we want to win games of footy – but it's also a lot about making sure we look after the young boys and figure out exactly how we want to play. "With a young group there will be some inconsistency, which we're

prepared for, but all-in-all we're really looking forward to a pretty good improvement on last year."

Scott Taylor

Described by coach Peter Rolfe as one of two "boom recruits" this season, Scott Taylor arrives from Uraidla Districts after proving himself as arguably the most valuable archetype in footy – a true goal-kicking midfielder.

The 61-game SANFL veteran with South Adelaide kicked 21 goals in 21 games last year, leading Uraidla to the Hills Football League preliminary final and earning a Best-and-Fairest in the process.

Taylor will slot into the Kapunda midfield from Round 1, but also offers some positional flexibility after spending his SANFL years down in the back-line.

FIXTURE TO WATCH

Round 2 v South Gawler

Kapunda have drawn the unfortunate Round 1 bye, meaning we will have no idea what the reigning wooden-spooners look like under Rolfe until they host the reigning premiers in Round 2.

The Bombers will head into that matchup as resounding underdogs, with a win not really in the range of possible outcomes, but the difference between a competitive loss and a 100-point blowout could shape the rest of the year.





Any big ins and outs to report?

"We've got 'Canners' – Rhys Cannizzaro – come back to the club from Central District. which is awesome. He'll play in the midfield somewhere

"Jackson Baldwin will be back playing. He's coming back from doing his knee a few vears ago, so he'll be back in the fold as well. That's pretty much the two biggest changes.

"We'll lose Aaron Laverty – obviously he's been fantastic in the midfield for us - but he's going to Port Broughton or somewhere. "We've managed to keep pretty much everyone from last year, plus the addition of 'Baldy'"

Been a great couple of years for the club - what was the focus this preseason and what can you get better at?

"We can always be a little bit fitter – we've had more of a focus on that - and finishing off goals. That's how we are going to win games is kicking goals.

"We've got pretty good defensive players, it's just finishing off and moving the footy a lit bit more efficiently so we give ourselves more opportunity."

Who do you expect to be in contention for Best-and-Fairest this year?

"Probably Nick Gregurke is going to be right up there. Lachie Westlake as well - he's one of our better defenders.

"Obviously we've got Mitch Norton whose won our last two Best-and-Fairests – they're probably the three standouts."

You mentioned your strong talent in the backline - how can you use that strength to your advantage going forward?

"What we've done this preseason is try and move the footy differently and trying a couple of different setups and a couple of different ways to exit.

"We don't really need to reinvent the wheel, we've got some really good players, and the way that we've been playing the last couple of years, that brand of footy has done really well for us

"We don't want to change too much and try and do something completely different - probably just the way we move the footy out of defence slightly to give us the best opportunity to go forward in a different way."

Where do you need to improve to become the team you want be by September?

"Just finishing off. We create plenty of opportunity, but it's just finishing off up forward and putting a score on the board is going to be important to us.

"We've given ourselves plenty of opportunity over the last couple of years and we want to win big and lose small I guess. We are trying to put more scoreboard pressure on and win by four, five or six goals; not just limping across the line."

Have you had any big outs from last year's premiership team?

"We've had lots of big outs. (Jackson) Dare retired, (Michael) Dejonge Cairns, (Connor) Willsmore injured, (Cody) Gilchrist is with Port Adelaide, (Jackson) Penrose injured, (Steve) Burton is a Crows SANFL top-up player."

Have you been able to replace them?

"We're not a club that ever goes out and recruits heavily. We've been a club that has been so good, we've got a great culture and a great history. "As you know we've been the best side for three years if not four, so we've got three (recruiting) points. "When you are really good and successful, you are inhibited by what you can recruit aren't you. The competition is always trying to pull back the good sides, so we are limited in what we can replace."

Do you think that's fair?

"I think it is a very unfair competition, I always have thought that. I'm not sure why we are different to the Adelaide Footy League where they all get 15 points every year.

"We don't like the system... if you win too many games over a twoyear period it limits you on how many points.

"We've been really good obviously, so it is what it is. We'll just soldier on, you can't do anything about it."

With some spots to fill, have any of the reserves been catching your eye this preseason?

"Oh yeah, we've got some nice depth and that's probably one of the reasons we've been pretty good.

"There's probably 10 blokes that will play A grade early this year – Callum Fielke, Zac Piddington, Max Kershaw, Brock Judd-Smith, Joseph Arnold, Boyd Worden, just to name a few. They'll all come into the equation for Round 1 with the blokes that we've lost.

"They've all been really good players for a couple of years at the level below, so we'll continue to make developing depth a focus, which will hopefully continue to make us a really competitive club."

With the big outs, who is still around that you expect to lead this year?

It's still going to be the same guys – it's Lachie Arnold, it's Jackson Press, it's Steve Burton who'll play



some games, it's Henry Bennison, it's Bailey Fielke, it's young Joseph Fenwick who played a premiership in his first year.

"Bailey Thorp, we've still got Chris James around, Anthony Simpson, Matty Naumann. We've got still got enough good players that we are expecting to play finals footy. "Our expectation is still to be playing finals footy."

Coming off a premiership how can you continue to improve?

"We're not looking at it like we are the premiership side, but we know we are a really good footy club with a great culture and a great history.

"We are all part of that history now – we've been able to continue great culture. We just want to be a competitive side week-in, weekout, which we've been able to do over the last four years since I've been there.

"That's our aim, we just want to be competitive and be as good as anybody, and that's all we can control. Obviously with the number of players we've lost we'll come back in the field a fair bit. "The rest is up to us and how well we can adjust with our good players being able to perform and our depth players to come up and play really significant roles. Hopefully they can do more than that and they can go to the next level, and then drop off might not be as much."

What do you think are the strengths of your side this season?

"The strength of our footy club is our culture, is our history, is our buy-in. We are all there for one reason and that's to play in grand finals, it's as simple as that. "My history being involved at Centrals over that 10-year period where we had 10 grand finals, and I played there. Similar to that, once you create a good culture you can keep it for a long, long time. "There's a turnover, but I'm

confident that we'll compete pretty well and that's all we can ask for.

"Numbers have changed, faces have changed, but not much else has – we still expect to be a very competitive team."


FIXTURE TO WATCH

Have you landed any sure-fire A grade recruits this season?

"Yes, we've got Campbell Wildman who has come from PAC Old Collegians. He's played a little bit at Port and Sturt as well. "We've also got Jake Sutcliffe, who has come from Unley Football Club. Both Campbell and Jake are former teammates at Sturt. "Shay Linke from Central District and Lewis Cowham from Central District – they're returning, they are Tanunda juniors coming back. "Another former Tanunda player Isaac Feltus, who had a year off last year, has also returned."

What position do you expect the new recruits to play for you?

"Jake Sutcliffe will play as a key forward. Shay will play as a key forward and midfielder, and the other guys are all mids – but they can play half-back, half-forward or wing and they'll go through the midfield.

"I think Lewis Cowham is going to be really exciting for us. I've really liked what I've seen there and he's a midfielder who can push forward and win his own ball as well.

"Shay Linke is going to be

impressive and Campbell Wildman is probably one who will fly under the radar – I think he'll be one of the stronger players in the competition.

"Jake Sutcliffe as well – his ability to hit the score board for us is probably what we've lacked the last couple of years, where we are quite competitive through the middle, but struggled to capitalise."

How big of a coup is it for the club to have three young home grown talents returning?

"Yeah definitely. Hopefully we can have them around for years to come, and they live locally, it's convenient for them and obviously there is the (recruiting) point factor that helps things out as well."

Have you lost any key contributors?

"It's up in the air what Lachie Earl is doing – he is more than likely moving on – but other than that we haven't lost any key contributors, no."

Are any of the graduating under 17s getting a look in the As?

"Yeah the main one coming up from under 17s will be Jack Collins. He'll hopefully play some consistent A grade footy. He looks quite a talent. "At the moment he is still quite slender, has some good leg pace and neat foot skills – so he probably fits in across the wing, half-back, half-forward, any of those type of positions I can see Jack playing."

With the list you have and seeing them through preseason, what do you think are the strengths of your side?

"Probably going into this year we are going to be strong down the spine, and structurally we've got quite a deep, young midfield now. "Hopefully we'll play a little bit quicker through the midfield and have a lot more dynamic guys going through."

Coming off a five-win campaign in a very bunched ladder, what would you consider a successful season?

"Oh we definitely want to be playing finals football again. "Even though we only had the five wins last year, we were competitive in probably 80 per cent of games we played in. There was probably only a few where we were genuinely beaten from siren to siren.

"I think finals is a realistic expectation for us and winning a game in a finals campaign would be a huge plus for us. That's what we'll be striving for."

Coach chat

with Damien Herzick

After finishing one win outside of the finals in 2023, what are your expectations going into this season?

"We start every year planning to play finals at the end of the year and this year is no different."

Have you gained or lost any A grade players this off-season?

Tigers on quest to become BLGW's first consecutive premiers

THERE will be one more team competing in the BLGW's senior ranks in 2024 as the Angaston Panthers re-enter the fray – meaning an even eight participants, and no byes.

Gawler Central will be looking to defend their premiership crown after coming from fourth in last year's finals, knocking off each member of the top-three in consecutive weeks for a hard-earned flag.

Recent history would suggest it is once again Willaston's turn to go all the way, having alternated premiership victories with Gawler Central every year since 2020.

With Gawler Central's grand final Best-on-Ground Shannon Murphy set to miss the entire season after rupturing her ACL, it could be tough sledding for the Tigers to hold off a Donnybrook side that went into the 2023 big dance as heavy favourites.



Sporting a 10-2 record last time around, Barossa District is prepared for at least a minor slide down the ladder as a swathe of former Angaston players return to the Panthers, although the Bulldogs' terrific junior stocks will ensure their floor remains relatively high.

Ella Mickan's Light could be the darkhorses this year, with the 2022 grand finalists boasting plenty of Central Zone representative talent, while Tanunda, South Gawler and Nuriootpa are confident that they will benefit from natural improvement, muddying up the fringe final positions.

Willaston's reigning league Best-and-Fairest Liz Wilson is spreading her wings in the SANFLW, putting her availability up in the air, and leaving the top gong up for grabs in one of the strongest competitions in the state.

Coach chat

with Brett Burgess

After not entering a senior women's team in each of the past two seasons, why does Angaston feel confident about fielding a side in 2024?

"I think the club feels in a lot stronger position now to get a team back in the senior women's because of all the work they've done on building a platform for the juniors.

"We have quite a few girls now that have become old enough to play up in the seniors, and amongst them are some very talented ones."

How did you end up putting your hand up for the coaching role?

"I've always had a passion to coach, I started out many years ago coaching junior colts at Hamley Bridge.

"That really introduced my passion and showed me that it was definitely an area in which I wanted to get more involved in. "Although a different sport, I started captaining and coaching the Angaston Cricket Club, and those eight years were such a great learning experience in how to deal with people, have tough conversations and bring a group together to install a belief that they can do anything. "In the recent years I have become an assistant coach out at Hamley Bridge under Todd Miles, and have

accepted the senior coaching role there this year, which I'm really excited about.

"All these things combined gives me great confidence I'm ready to take in the challenge of senior women's coach at Angaston. I'm super excited to get cracking."

All things considered, what would you consider a successful season?

"Obviously we have been missing from the league for a few years and I feel for us to have a team out there competing each and every week will be just awesome for the club and the girls.

"So success this year won't be winning or losing as such, but it will be the fact we are back out there having fun and being involved again.

"In saying that, anyone who knows me knows I don't like losing, so we



will be giving it a red hot crack. "I'm just really looking forward to continuing these girls' development for the ones who have been playing, and then teaching any new girls to the game the basics and trying to get them all to play as a team."

Who do you expect to be some of your stronger players this season?

"I'm really excited to watch how

Hayley Henke and Sage Logan do, they're both very talented and haven't missed a session.

"I've always been very passionate about women's football due to my niece Katelyn Rosenzweig, who has played in the SANFLW since it started and was lucky enough to be drafted by the Crows a few years back.

"Hopefully she pulls on the blue and white Ango guernsey this year."

Have you lost many players from last year's preliminary final team?

"Yes we have lost quite a few from last year as many of the Angaston girls that came to us last year have returned to Angaston to try and form a seniors team there. "We are also a bit up in the air about a few of our other players as they have been selected to participate in SANFLW programs, and we are not sure if they will be permitted to play local football this year.

"Because of that, I don't have massive expectations this season. I see this year as a fantastic opportunity to build and create a solid base for our future.

"Numbers will be a challenge this season but we will continue to work on this, and hopefully everyone that plays enjoys the game and wants to play again next year."

Have you been able to secure any strong recruits?

"We have been lucky enough to have recruited two new exciting players this year, Abbey Harrison Rieffel and Kate Case. Both ladies live locally so that has been a bonus. "We are still actively searching for more players to strengthen our side this year."

Who will be in the mix for the Bulldogs' Best-and-Fairest?

How did you become the man to take over in charge of the reigning premiers?

"I played most of my footy out at the Mallala Magpies, and in recent years my daughter Skye became interested in plaving football, so we went out to Gawler Central in 2022 with a couple of her friends. Light finished third on the ladder and lost in the elimination final to eventual premiers Gawler Central, do you think your side can improve this year?

"Yeah, I think everyone is absolutely up for the challenge. We've got a really good group of under 16s coming through who probably last year gave us a fair bit of'oomph'in our line-up as well. "With some of the names coming into the other teams it will definitely make it a bit more challenging across the board for our association, but we're always willing to give it a crack, and I think that determination will do us well this year."

Who are some of those youngsters that are really putting their hands up for the senior side?

"We've got Scarlett Bird-Fidge, Jess Jones, Olivia Leslie – there's a few really. They bring a bit of speed, good run through the guts and probably a good understanding of

the game.

"Those girls have been in it for long enough that they can sort of read the play a bit better than some of the others, and they understand the structure of the game.

"The young ones, because they've had a chance to start playing footy at a younger age, a lot of the kids these days have had footy as their main sport, whereas when we started a lot of us had netball, basketball or soccer as our main sports.

"Understanding that, their skill level is much different compared to when the Barossa & Light started out playing nine-a-side. I think in the under 16 competition in particular you can see the difference there, so coming up into seniors is just going to make them stronger and stronger."

Have you had a lot of list turnover this off-season? Who are the big ins and outs?

"For us we've had some big outs. Nicole Moss is one, she's moving to Tasmania, we've got one key forward who isn't 100 per cent sure if she's playing again... and in terms of getting heaps of new players – not a lot."

What do you think the strength of this side will be?

"Definitely our junior kids coming through will be our strength. Probably speed is the massive one for us, I think that was our strength last year and got us into the finals – speed and hard running."

What would you consider a successful season?

"I think making tracks on what we achieved last year. Obviously winning games is really important, especially earlier in the season before the SANFLW players and Development players come back in.

"That's probably going to impact our team a fair bit. Sasha Branson won't be able to play until we finish up with Development, myself, and then big names like Sophie Eaton, Jasmine Elsworthy and Tess (Gerhardy) can't play if they've played League, which is my understanding.

"We're going to miss a few of those players, so making our mark on the competition early with the younger crew we do have is going to be huge for us to get a head-start.

"In terms of being successful, it

will be our retainment of players, the improvement of some of our older players who have come in later – those are the kind of things I think are important for our development in women's footy."

With a lot of your key players not available for at least half the season, who would you say are some of the early favourites for best-and-fairest?

"Jasmine Elsworthy was our bestand-fairest last year but she will be playing for Woodville-West Torrens in the SANFLW, so in terms of the players who will be there from Round 1 I'm going to say Scarlett Bird-Fidge.

"She's a young player – she could still play under 16s – but she went up last year as a small forward and I really enjoyed watching her play. "Her ground-balls, her one-on-one ability to win that contest, off the ground especially, combined with how clever she is around goals, she has a really good chance to poll some votes.

"Ebony Noack is another one, she's a really strong player off the backline and can run into the midfield, and at pre-season she has been doing really well so far."

Nuriootpa returned to the senior women's competition last year and went 2-10 – what has been your focus coming into your second season in charge?

"We're looking to build on what we achieved last year. Obviously, we're trying to add a few girls who have played a bit of footy, because we have a lot of girls who haven't played a lot.

"So first year, just getting a team together, now second year we're trying to become more competitive, and more relevant in the competition.

"We had a team last year that tried really hard and competed really well, but we just weren't able to hit the scoreboard against those good teams."

Have you picked up any big recruits this off-season?

"We got three. The first is Gemma Doughty, who was one of the captains at Central District back when I was there in those first few years (of SANFLW), and she's going to come and be an assistant coach as well.

"We also got Courtney Smith. She was at Centrals last year – she's Shelby Smith's sister – and she'll be similar to Gemma in that she will be helping coach as well as playing.

"And Jess Axford – she's a ruck from Centrals – so they're the three inclusions from a bit higher level that we hope can give us a bit of a boost and accelerate the process. "Another big one is Renai Richardson returning – she was our captain last year and will be hugely important for us again."

Which of the returning players do you think will play important roles?

"I'd say the main ones are a couple of returning first-years. Em Boothey, she plays on the ball and I expect her to really improve. "Maddy Rohrlach too, she plays on the ball as well. Just their competitive nature and willingness to get in and win the hard ball really caught my eye."

What would you consider a successful season?

"If we can still play with the attitude that we had last year – we need to maintain that – but I would be hoping that we can bridge the gap to those top sides on the scoreboard.

"We have to hit the scoreboard more, and get a bit more footy in our forward half, so that will be a big focus for us.

"Seeing the girls improve will be the biggest thing – we've got a lot of girls who will be playing in just their second year – so individual and collective improvement will be what I'm looking for.

"We will be adding an under 16 team this year. We had a comeand-try day and 37 juniors rocked up, and as a club that age group is so important because you'd expect those to turn into your senior players.

"Being able to build teams from within your area and just add a couple – kind of like how the men do it – that's the aim, so this season is a big step in the right direction."

What's your coaching background?

"I've just come from Greenacres Football Club, before that it was Elizabeth and Ingle Farm for four years as senior women's coach. "I was looking around after last season, and I wanted to come to a country footy team because I know how great country football is, so when I saw South Gawler was looking I thought it was a great fit."

South Gawler is coming off a premiership in the under 16s, how can you capitalise on that to create the best senior team possible?

"The last few years I've been in the situation of building a women's program from scratch, so it's exciting to come somewhere that already has a strong junior setup. "If you run things right, your best juniors end up becoming your best seniors, so as a club we just have to make sure we're nurturing our talent and giving them every opportunity to become senior footballers."

Big shoes to fill – do you feel any pressure taking over after such a great run?

"'Megs' (Megan Boers-Veen) and Andre (Boers) have done a great job over the last few years. Hats off to them and the other helpers on where they have got the women's program to.

"I don't feel any pressure at all. My job is to teach the girls all the fundamentals that they haven't learnt yet, and to help them grow as players.

"With that success will come, winning doesn't always mean success. We have a very young team this year and not everything happens overnight.

"We are looking long-term with the amount of juniors we now have at our club."

With a young team this year, who do you expect to be some of the standouts?

"Reese Chamings, Lillian

Bornholdt, (new recruit) Sarah Burns and (former South Gawler junior) Lauryn Farr are the ones I would be looking out for. They are just some of the exciting players we have this year."

Have any of last year's Willaston juniors made an impression during this senior preseason?

"A couple of 16s coming through that I'm excited to see are Chelsea Jasmine and Tayla Williams."

Do you plan on making any changes to the Willaston game plan now that you're in charge?

"We will adjust our game to suit our players this year. Every side is different each year, and each player plays a different style."

What would you consider a successful season?

Drought-breaking Panthers the team to beat

FOR the first time in 57 years Angaston will head into the Barossa, Light and Gawler Netball Association season as the Senior 1 reigning premiers.

It was a spectacular and deserved premiership run for the Panthers, who lost to minor premiers South Gawler by one single goal in the qualifying final. Angaston refused to go out in straight sets, getting the better of perennial finalists Barossa District 42-35 in the prelim, before working their way back into the big dance and conquering the Lions 37-33 in the rematch. Three members of that winning Ango outfit will not return in 2024, leaving the door open for some of the league's usual powerhouses. With back-to-back

minor premierships, a combined 29-3 record over the past two season and a flag in 2022, South Gawler will be desperate to wash the sour taste out of their mouths.

While Angaston's drought-breaking triumph was relatively unpredictable, the league has been incredibly consistent over the past two seasons, with Gawler Central and Barossa District joining the Panthers and Lions in finals action.

Nuriootpa has spent two years as the fifth-placed team narrowly missing the postseason, but the Tigers are in danger of being leapfrogged by a Willaston side who, under new direction from Steve O'Brien, were aggressive in their recruiting. Kapunda has been in a lull after a long period as



a top four side, but that could turn at any minute when their standout Inter 1s arrive at the level with valuable reinforcements. At the tail end of the table Freeling has sights set on a step in the right direction after some handy additions, and Tanunda's new co-coaches will be scratching and clawing to avoid a third consecutive wooden spoon. Freeling defender Meg Cocks will spend the year as the league's reigning Best-and-Fairest in what is sure to be another high-quality season of elite netball.

How long have you played for Angaston, and when did the opportunity to coach come up?

"Lou was an amazing coach and let us play to our individual strength. Everyone knew what role they needed to play and we all just went out there and did it.

"I learned to trust in my role. I'm one of those players that loves to float, I love to hunt the ball.

"But really in the Senior 1s squad it's really important to just play to your position and know that every single person on that court is going to do their role and their iob and just to trust in that.

"Our Senior 1s this year are comprised of a complete group of new faces



"I came to Freeling in 2022 and played in the Senior 1s – unfortunately I did my calf muscle in the first game and haven't got that recovered and back to where it needs to be, so it's taken me away from the playing side of things and now gone into coaching."

How different will this year's Senior 1s look compared to last year?

"In terms of the team for this year, we've got Sarah Luke joining us – she's a very tall goalie, which is great to our attack end.

"She moved back to the community last year, but she's a nurse at the RAH so she needed to make sure her work commitments could fit her playing netball. She's got that sorted and will be playing most games for us which will be great.

"We have another new player joining the club this year – Kirsty Murname, a vet from Roseworthy – who is a very versatile player as well. I can't wait to see what she'll bring on the court, which is very exciting.

"We are running a Senior 1-2 squad, so looking at our Senior 2s, we've got a lot of inters coming up from last year. We've got some young players playing with some experienced players. "During the season we have some players with planned holidays, but that's going to give those inter players the opportunity to show me what they can do and what Freeling is going to look like in the future.

"It's all positive for the club and I can't wait to see what 2024 and the future brings."

What would you say is your goal this season?

"A lot of our Inters have gone into our 1s-to-4s teams, and when people are away I want to give opportunities to those girls against teams like South and those that have a lot of experience and can help girls develop."

What are the strengths of this team?

"This year we are going to focus a lot on defence. You need to have a strong defence to be able to win games.

"The way I see a netball game – you get the same amount of centre passes, so it's up to defence to get one intercept and you are up by one goal.

"Then just movement through the court – use of give-and-gos – opening up the court to be able to get it from one end to the other very quickly and score. Speed and defence will probably be the two things that we'll be focusing on."

holding your defence together?

"Her experience and talk on the court is amazing, and her and Carly Scott are actually coaching our Senior 2s as well, so I think with all of us working together we definitely have a great future at Freeling.

"Meg's knowledge – she played State Country with me when we were younger – so the relationship we have and her experience is absolutely sensational.

Coach chat with Scott Waddington

Last year was your first season in charge of Gawler Central. how did it go?

"I'm from Gawler, and I've lived there most of my life. My daughters played at Gawler Central, and now my granddaughter and grandsons play at the club, so it's like I've come full circle.

"It was a time to change from what I believe is a group of players who have done extremely well for a long period of time, and it was just getting to a point where I thought it needed to be freshened up a little bit.

"So what we did last year was take the opportunity to use guite a few new debutants, and I think six of the nine players I used were all under 20 years of age.

"So when you look at the rebuild - which I suppose some people called it – we did extremely well to have such a young group and still maintain such a good, healthy position on the ladder."

You've landed a couple of big recruits this off-season in Sonja Davey and Kelsey, how much of an impact do you think they will make?

"We identified last year that the goalie end was probably an area that we needed to look outside the club to address.

"We didn't really have established goalies that we felt were ready to compete at a very high level. We had two youngsters, one was 18 and the other was 20, who basically carried the workload last vear.

"Both of those girls are still at the club, one of them has been selected in the Senior 1s again and the other will go back to the Senior 2s to get a bit more court time and experience.

"So Sonja and Kelsey both come into that group now with not only the anticipation of playing well for me, but also helping to develop these youngsters to eventually understand what it takes to compete week-in, week-out at a high level."

Other than those two additions, will there be any other big changes to the Senior 1 team?

"Our captain Ali Parsons is pregnant, and we just picked up a former Nuriootpa Senior 1 defender Brianna Falland. "At the moment I've selected Brianna in the Senior 2s, and I've got Sharni Assender coming up from the 2s. Sharni was the best player in the 2s grand final last year, and won the Best-and-Fairest, so I'm rewarding her with a call-up.

"Brianna adds some more depth to that group, and no doubt she will get court time and play a part in the Senior 1s, and we'll just have to wait and see if Ali comes back from having a baby at some stage this season or if it will be the vear after.

"Ali is undoubtedly one of the best players in the competition, but while we lost some talent down that end, we gained a bunch down the other end, so who knows how it will shake out

"It could end up just keeping the status quo, but I am hoping we will improve.

Which returning GAWLER CENTRAL players do you think will be key contributors?

"Erin Scheepens has made the Team of the Year for the past four vears, and she will be back as the sole captain while Ali is out. "Casev Black as well, another wing attack/centre, she's been around,

she played in the last premiership team and is still only 27. She's obviously a huge contributor to our group.

"We've also got one of my daughters, Brittney Waddington, returning from pregnancy. She was out all of last season, but was a Senior 1s player prior to that. "Then there's who I think was the unearthing of the season last year, Ebony Dekort. She was only

17 last year, and she played nine Senior 1 games. "She had come from the city as a

junior after not quite making their senior ranks out there, so she was a big plus for me. She was offered positions again this year in the city but turned them down, so I'm really excited about her



What has been your focus during your first preseason in charge?

"Karla is an exercise physiologist, so our main focus for pre-season was to better prepare players' bodies for the demands of game play and ultimately reduce injury risk.

"We know knees and ankles are the most commonly injured body parts in netball, of which the majority occur when landing.

"Although we only had a short pre-season I placed a strong focus on lower limb strength, stability and landing control. "We will continue to have a focus on these elements throughout the season and all teams in the club will continue incorporating aspects of Netball Australia's Knee Program in every warm up."

What is your coaching background, and how did you end up at Willaston this year?

"That's my biggest aim – to work on their technique with shooting. Even with the other girls that have been with the club for a while, I'm helping to change their technique.

"It's been a good preseason so far. I've brought up some girls that played in Senior 3s last year and given them an opportunity to play in the 1s this year. So it's going to be a challenge for me as well as for them."

Of the players who were already at Willaston when you arrived, who has caught your eye?

"There's three girls that are real pocket rockets – Tayla Cuy, Jasmine Gower and Caitlyn Muhs – I'm going to let them play their natural game, which is their speed, and bring the ball out of defence as well.

"I'll let them play to their strengths, I'm looking forward to the challenge of that as well."

Roosters carry 23-game winning streak into 2024


ON a run of three consecutive premierships, and only one missed grand final since 2017, Two Wells will head into 2024 having not tasted defeat in the APFL since July 30, 2022. Since that loss against Angle Vale in Round 13 of the 2022, the Roosters have responded with 23 victories on the trot, and they will bring in an almost unchanged playing list once again.

Despite that powerful position, Two Wells' star player/coach Caleb Edmead is pointing at Angle Vale as this year's team to beat after the Owls secured the services of former Barossa District superstar Leigh Ryswyk and former Gawler Central premiership player Andrew Wright.

The Owls departed in disappointing fashion in the most recent finals, bombing out in straight sets, so there will be plenty to prove as they and reigning grand finalists Mallala likely battle it out for second spot.

Hummocks-Watchman and Balaklava both have finals on their minds, and new Hamley Bridge coach Brett Burgess thinks his side is right on the brink as well, creating a strong chasing pack breathing down Mallala's neck.

Wooden-spooners Virginia have nowhere to go but up in coach Wayne Knowles's second year of the rebuild, while United will be determined to remain in the mid-table at worst. Hummocks-Watchman's Ethan Kwaterski may have turned some heads when the talented Eagle swooped on the league's Best-and-Fairest from outside of the finals spots, illustrating just how much quality is present throughout the starstudded APFL.

Coming off back-to-back topthree finishes, what are your expectations for this season?

"Playing finals. We expect to play finals. Two Wells is still the benchmark, no ifs or buts about that, and we're in that group of three or four chasing right behind them."

Have you landed any big recruits?

"We've picked up a few players, and lost a couple as well. Obviously Leigh Ryswyk has come across from Barossa District, he might be in his twilight years, but his experience will be fantastic for us.

"I was assistant coach at Barossa District for four years when Leigh was playing there. I've known him for a while – I was involved with getting him out to Barossa – and yeah, he just wanted a change after the last couple of years and has decided to come across as an assistant coach as well. "We probably lacked a little bit of leadership, and that's why wa've recruited him and another

we've recruited him and another experienced player. "We also picked up a guy named

Andrew Wright, he's come from Port Pirie, but he was at Gawler Central around six or seven years ago. I've known 'Wrighty' for quite a while, I coached him at zone level, and he's played State Country in 2019 and 2021. "He's moved back to Adelaide, close to Angle Vale, so that was a very easy fit for Wrighty to come and play with us, and he'll probably run through the midfield

"We targeted a couple of experienced players because our list is still pretty young. Everyone talks about other clubs, but I think in our best-20 we probably have 12 or 13 guys under the age of 23."

Who do you expect to be in Best-and-Fairest contention?

"That's hard to say to be honest,

it could easily be any of 10 or 12 players. The midfielders will always get a fair few votes.

⁷Lachlan Mitchell won it last year, and he's back again. He's Angle Vale through-and-through, I think he's won two of our past four Bestand-Fairests.

"The experienced lads coming in I assume will be around the mark, and we've got some youngsters now who have got those 40 or 50 games under their belts now – blokes like Jake Edwards and Xander Bates.

"They're the sort of guys we're expecting to take it to the next level this year, and we've got some really good kids down at Central District at the moment – Shaquan Davey, Conna Mackay, and we're hoping they play a bit of A grade footy for us as well.

"Shaquan and Conna are only 16 and 18, Edwards and Bates are 21 now and are ready to go – we're in a good spot."

Do you have any graduating juniors who are in A grade

consideration for Round 1?

"The main one so far has been Jesse Burns, he's had a really good pre-season and has done everything right. He's definitely one who has earned a start in the trial games in the A grade.

"A lot of kids coming out of under 17s are all midfielders, but I think at the senior level he's going to fit in as maybe a winger or a halfforward."

What will be the strength of this year's Owls side?

"I think the strength from these guys is the fact that we've played together for a bit. At this stage it looks like we've lost Beau Shinnick, he's going to play for Penola, but realistically most of these remaining guys have played at least 40 or 50 games together now.

"I think that continuity is a key for us, we haven't lost any of the other guys, nobody is retiring, and the experienced players we've got coming in should hit the ground running."

Coming off a fourth-placed finish in 2023 and a first-round exit in the finals, what would you consider a successful season this time around?

"In 2024, like every team we want and expect to play in finals, and we will be doing everything we can to ensure that our squad is well placed to achieve this. "Another area of equal focus for us is on developing our

upcoming local talent within our footy club.

"For the last five-10 years we have been really lucky as a club to have players like Lachy Michael, Chad Ruiz, Tommy Chapman and Mitch Daniel to name a few all running through our midfield.

"Now we have an exciting group of lads that are all around that 18-23 age bracket that are looking for opportunities to take on more of the workload. With this in mind it's critical that we continue to develop and provide opportunities for these lads that are going to carry this club forward for the next 10 years."

Have you had any big ins or outs to report this off-season?

"Overall our squad is similar to last year, we have lost Corey Waters due to work commitments, Dylan McPeak has retired and Josh Harkness and Ben Heaslip have both gone out to Hummocks Watchman Eagles. "But other than that our recruits from last season are all returning, and we have managed to grab a few extra recruits with Jarrad Miller, Matty Gould and Lachy Whittaker joining us for the coming season.

"We are also fortunate that that we have got some good locals back to the club and it's great to see – guys like Ethan Brownlie, Will Dixon, Brady Krieg and Harrison Veitch back at the club training the house down."

Who do you expect to be in the running for Best-and-Fairest this year?

"Given we are going to be playing players in different roles to what they are used to, and we are going to be providing some of the upcoming lads with new opportunities, it will really be up to those that take it with both hands. "We have a great spread of experience, strength, and youth and I'm keen to see how they all progress."

Have any of the younger fellas caught your eye this pre-season?

"Jack Pike and Riley Hannaford have both been training the house down and I expect that they will be given an opportunity at some stage, which is exciting for these lads and their families."

What do you anticipate being your side's strengths, and where can you improve?

"One of our biggest strengths will be the development of our younger players. We have a great group of lads in the 18-23 bracket who have all now played 20-50 A grade games and are all in that window raring to go, so I'm excited to see what they can produce.

Two years in a row the Eagles have barely missed finals with an 8-8 record - what are your expectations this season?

"We spoke about it as a team at the start of the pre-season and our aim is not just to get into finals, but hopefully win some finals.

"We've realised that this year we need to get fitter as a group, as well as tighten up our skills, so we've been working hard on our execution and our fitness over the summer

"I feel like if we can show real improvement in those areas then we can get back up to speed with Two Wells – who have obviously been a great team for the past three years, even longer really.

"Mallala have been really consistent, Balaklava have played in two or three grand finals, Angle Vale have a good team as well, so we know what we have to improve to get in the mix and hopefully we can do that this year."

Do you have any big ins or outs to report?

"No real big outs, which is good, and our focus in recruiting has been on bringing back some local lads.

"One really big one is Tait Nottle, who went to Blyth-Snowtown for a year. His partner played at Blyth in the netball, but he's come back, and he's a fantastic footballer

"Jordan Bailey is another, he had a couple of years off with a knee injury but is good to go again, and these guys all played for us in the 2019 premiership.

"Josh Appleby is the same he was the captain for the 2019 premiership because the actual captain was injured on the day and Josh Kelly has come back from Min-Man after a vear.

"They're mostly in that age bracket we were looking for - around 26 - because we felt like experience was another area that we needed to add to our group. We've

put some experience around them.

"The other two really good ones are Josh Harkness, who was a ruckman at Balaklava, and Ben Heaslip from Balaklava as well. They've been strong additions to our aroup

"The only real big out for us was Angus Aldenhoven, who has retired from footy. He came across for a year and was a really good lad, but he's really our only big A grade out I suppose. "Most of those recruits will suit up for the As in Round 1, but we've really made a point of adding depth in general to the squad, because our B grade last year really struggled for numbers

"It's about making our whole playing squad stronger – we talk a lot about just being a footy group, not separated into A and B grades – and I think we've made good progress this pre-season."

Who do you anticipate being in the Best-and-Fairest mix?

"I think definitely Tait Nottle. he's a fantastic footballer who plays through the midfield and can go forward and kick some goals. A real goal-kicking midfielder very handy to get one of those.

"Mitch Jude as well, he's been with us a couple of years and he's really started to mature now as a sort of half-forward/on-baller. "James Daly has been runner-up before, obviously Ethan Kwaterski won the Mail Medal. They're some of the guvs who are driving our engine room."

Have any youngsters been able to force their way into the As?

"Dylan Williams is one, he's the president's son and he played three games in the As last year as an under 17. He's come into the A grade squad now, been training well and will probably play half-forward for us.

"We picked up some young kids last year who are coming into their second seasons and really finding

their feet - Archie Yelland, Brodie Hocking, and I really like Cody Redpath.

"Cody came through the junior system and is in his fourth year of A grade now, he's had a really good preseason and is one to keep an eve on."

What do you think will be the strengths and weaknesses of this group?

"We're not necessarily big like your Two Wells or Angle Vale, who have these big guys they kick down the line to, so I think we're hoping to be a fast ball-movement team

"We've been working really hard on being more defensively sound when we don't have the footy to try and slow teams down, but I'm hoping our attacking style of footy won't change. "Over the summer we've been working on a fair bit of overlap run and trying to carry the footy with leg speed. Especially when we get on the big ovals we're hopeful that will help us pick teams apart a little bit. "We're fully understanding that we're going to be coming up against some very good opposition just about every week really. There's the benchmark in Two Wells, Angle Vale, Mallala and Balaklava, but we've got to try and beat these teams consistently to get back into finals contention.

"Definitely defensively, and accountability I suppose comes along with that. At the back-end of last year we won our last five games, so I think consistency will be a real key, we want to be performing week-in and week-out, which is hard with a young group.

"But we feel with some added experience they can help those younger lads not be up and down as much, and that will hopefully help us win another two or three games to get us into finals. "Consistency is something we're really striving for this year, to be a really competitive footy team every week and win some games of footy on the back of that."


what do you need to improve on?

How different will this year's United team look compared to last season? Any big ins or outs?

"We've recruited a fair few players, but I'd say Daniel Kaipara from Modbury, he's probably the biggest in for us. Danny spent some time with the Crows in the SANFL, and he'll play up forward. "We've also brought in Matthew Stewart from Kilburn, Jake Egel from Eudunda Roberstown – both midfielders – Jack Murphy from SMOSH West Lakes has come in. and our old ruckman Hayden Ingram is back from Wallaroo. "Last year we had to use 66 players in our B grade, we were pulling blokes off the farm who hadn't played for 15 years, so we've made a real effort to strengthen our overall depth.

"Most nights this pre-season we've been getting 35-40 on the track – compared to this time last year where we were getting 15 or 16."

Who are some of the brightest young talents at the club?

"Coming through from the under 17s we obviously have Connor Clery, he won the APFL under 17s medal last year. He's been training well, he's down at Central District at the moment.

"Levi Hite is another who has come through the 17s last year,



I like how he moves so he'll probably play a bit of A grade footy. He's more of an outside player, I can see him on a wing or maybe a pressure forward."

Who do you think will be in the running for Best-and-Fairest?

"Last year's Best-and-Fairest Chris Foura will be around the mark again this year, he's a key defender, and the likes of Egel, Stewart and Kaipara are all class."

What do you think will be the strength of this side?

"We'll play an exciting game style, which we will be fit enough to do this year. We weren't fit enough last year, so you'll see a lot fitter Virginia. "We've brought in some blokes who have real skills. Last year I might've come in with a game plan that, if we're being realistic, was a little bit hard for them to execute.

"We've got the people around now who can execute an exciting game plan, so we're excited to test ourselves.

"Our fitness and our skills have been the big focuses this preseason, and that will be something we hope to continue to improve on throughout the year."

FOLLOWING a plucky 2023 season that saw Paul Thomas's side bow out in the semifinal, Central District is poised to improve yet again in the upcoming SANFL campaign.
