PLAYFORD welcomed little bundles of joy to the local community last week with the inaugural 'Welcoming the Babies' event for families of those with children aged between zero and two years old.

Last week, children filled the Playford Civic Centre, enjoying floor play spaces and making friends, while parents interacted and learned about all of the essential community organisations available to them in the northern suburbs.

The event had 20 community groups and organisations holding stalls over two sessions, providing free products and information for parents and their children.

Alongside the State Assistant Minister for Autism, Emily Bourke, and the Federal Minister for Early Childhood Education, Anne Aly, Member for Spence Matt Burnell spoke with parents and presented all children in attendance with an honorary certificate.

"Being a parent myself, I remember a time when my daughter was little, and while it was a once-in-alifetime experience, it was also challenging and tough at times," Mr Burnell said.

"That's why events like 'Welcoming the Babies' cannot be understated, as they connect families to essential services within our community, all in a safe unassuming environment.

"Raising a child can be challenging for everyone involved in the parenting dynamic, so sharing information on community groups, infant support services, and the large array of vital services right here in the North is fundamental."

Ms Bourke said the event was a wonderful opportunity to learn what new parents in the community need.





"It is wonderful to be able to connect parents and caregivers not only with local services, but also other local parents and caregivers helps strengthen our communities and provide the best support to little ones and their families," she said.

Northern Region Community Development Co-ordinator from the Department of Human Services Tracey Alexander also lauded the event.

"I believe the most valuable asset of the Welcoming Babies event is the collaborative partnership between the community services working on the ground with families and the Member for Spence's office team," she said.

"This partnership facilitated sharing of the collective knowledge and ensured the families were met with the most pertinent service connections on the day."



Top dogs in the hot seat for fundraiser

ALMOST \$7000 was raised at a special Hope Cup fundraiser at The Exchange Hotel on Friday night.

Organised by Member for Spence Matt Burnell, more than 40 community members came to the event that included interviews by local business owners with all three tiers of government

Gawler Mayor Karen Redman, Member for Light Tony Piccolo and Mr Burnell all answered questions on what their respective levels of government are doing to assist business owners in tough economic times.

Topics included the rising cost of operational expenses local businesses are facing, particularly in regards to energy, pathways available to address skilled labour shortages, plus the importance of keeping Gawler an attractive place to live to continue to support local businesses.

The night raised \$6720 for those sleeping rough in the Gawler community, thanks in large part to an auction, which raised approximately \$3400 and featured several items including an AFL football signed by Billy Brownless and Sam Newman and an Adelaide Crows guernsey signed by Izak

Mr Burnell said he is eager to make the fundraising event an annual tradition.

"Last year for me, I got the great opportunity to toss a coin and do an Acknowledgement of Country at the Hope Cup, but using my platform to generate funds this year and help people who are doing it tough directly, is more important to me," he said.

"Being able to hold fundraisers is a much more direct way of assisting our community, in a way that I think the Town of Gawler is renowned for, and that is bringing the community together to help each other.

"That's what makes Gawler so special.

"Actions do speak louder than words and everyone's participation to fundraise for the Hope Cup will make a huge difference and I am eternally grateful for that."

The Salvation Army Riverside Gawler church leader Darren Dwyer and Riverside All-Stars team captain announced on the night that the Hope Cup is partnering with Tiny Built Co in Tanunda, with plans to use future funds to purchase one of their units to provide crisis and short-to-medium-term

"The heart behind the Hope Cup comes from three main areas that [Gawler officer in charge Senior Sergeant] Rob [Mowday] and I really wanted to push, which was firstly some practical everyday support for those doing it tough," Mr Dwyer said.

"Anyone that comes to us for support, we say 'what is going to make today easier for you?'.

"And out of that, that philosophy, the

lockers, the everyday breakfast, the shower facility and the practical things have started to flow.

"We've gotten to know the individuals and their history and as they've gotten to know us, a bit of stability and trust has developed."

Mr Dwyer said events like the Hope Cup portray that these people do have support and there is a desire for compassion within the

"That was the second prong of the idea behind the Hope Cup, to actually raise a little bit of awareness amongst the whole town that these are still individual people with names and with history," he said.

"The third one was the practical side of just raising some funds. To date, I think close to \$65,000 has gone directly into frontline stuff, the lockers, the security systems, the everyday breakfast, the food relief."

A LARGE convoy of motorbikes rolled through the Barossa and Gawler on Sunday as part of the annual Ride Against Suicide.

Now in its ninth year, around 180 riders took part in the run which kicked off at Palmer and stopped at Nuriootpa RSL and Willaston Football Club, picking up riders at each location, before finishing the journey at the Royal Adelaide Show.

This was the first year the Gawler region was a pitstop on the ride, having previously gone through Two Wells, before the RSL closed.

"We went to Willaston because they do a lot of stuff with the football club with youth suicide and mental health," event organiser Janet Kuys said.

The ride began in 2016 and raises money for Silent Ripples, a suicide bereavement support group based in Murray Bridge, which Ms Kuys began 14 years ago after losing her son to suicide.

She approached the Longriders motorcycle club who jumped on board, with around 50 riders taking part in the initial ride, and has grown each year, attracting people from right across the state.

"We're still getting new people to it, but there's a lot of people who have done every ride, which is fabulous and they don't want to miss it," Ms Kuys said.

"They come back all the time, but we're still getting new people so it is still growing." Ms Kuys said this year was a "brilliant,

successful day". "It went really well, everything organised

went well and I'm not sure how much we raised but it must be somewhere over \$5000," she said.

This year's ride aligned with World Suicide Prevention Day on September 10, and 'R U



OK?' Day on September 12.

The riders do a couple of laps of the main arena at the show, while there is also a talk about suicide awareness and prevention.

Ms Kuys thanked everyone involved in the ride for their support.

New grants to boost healthcare in northern suburbs

HEALTHCARE in the northern suburbs is set to receive a boost thanks to funding from The Hospital Research Foundation (THRF) Group.

THRF Group has teamed up with the Northern Adelaide Local Health Network (NALHN) to hand out grants worth \$20,000 each to 10 different projects.

Recipients were presented with their grants at Lyell McEwin Hospital on Thursday, September 5, at NALHN's annual Research Day conference, which is part of its Research Week which ran from September 3 to 5.

The projects span a broad spectrum of the healthcare system, including paediatrics, geriatrics, plus more.

"This is another example of The Hospital Research Foundation Group working with local health networks to identify unmet need in healthcare to ensure that solutions are well-researched and then subsequently translated into better outcomes for the community," THRF Group chief executive Paul Flynn said.

The Research Week began on September 3 with the Nursing and Midwifery Grand Round, which was a demonstration of what they can do in the research space.

The following day featured speakers from Health Translation SA, discussing how research can be implemented.

BITUMINOUS ROAD CONSTRUCTION... It is officially reported that the reconstruction of 70 miles of metropolita man roads with bituminous concrete, which work was suspended over winter, will be resumed towards the end of this month by the Roads and Bridges Department. Fourteen miles have been completed on the Gawler, Bayand Mount Baker braches. Five miles of the Port Wakefield road will now be made, and then the man north route will be 'dressed' from Follen's Hill to the Enfield tram terminus. After that the plant will be taken to Smithfield for the completion of the Little Para and Gawler section, and thence to Virginia to continue operations on the Port Wakefield system.

FACTORY IN \$300,000 EXPANSION... A \$300,000 expansion programme is planned at the F. W. Wintulich smallgoods factory in Hill Street, Gawler South. General manager, Mr John Wintulich, said this week that work on the new building would start at the end of the year, subject to approval from Gawler Town Council a d the Department of Agriculture. He said final plans were now being drawn up. The present fa tory – the only one in Australia specialising in mettwurst – produces about 15,000 lbs of mettwurst a week. Mr Wintulich said the new factory would produce 45,000 lbs of mettwurst a week.

WILLASTON'S FIRST FLAG IN 11 YEARS... Willaston's 11-yea premiership drought ended on Saturday when they

An intangible, immeasurable difference

THROUGHOUT the past 20 years or so, perhaps nothing has grown in stature as much as mental health.

Countless organisations, individuals, sports teams, associations and plenty of other bodies have worked hard to erase the stigma surrounding talking about mental health and wellbeing.

While undoubtedly there remains plenty of work to be done, with funding in the mental health space likely to be an issue well into the foreseeable future, the fight is certainly being fought.

Gracing the pages of this week's edition is a number of people from our patch doing their bit to raise both funds and awareness.

We are currently in the middle of the

busiest time of year for these organisations, with World Suicide Prevention Day (September 10) and R U OK? Day (September 12) both front of mind right now.

The courage on display from those involved in fundraising efforts is inspiring to say the least.

It can be hard to quantify how big of a difference events like the Ride Against Suicide (page one) are actually making.

While the dollar amount is always a pleasant surprise as every cent counts in a sector in desperate need of help in a number of fields, but the flow-on effect of increased visibility is hard to know.

How many people has this organisation helped simply by highlighting that the loss of life suffered at the hands of poor mental health is too high?

How many people drove past the crew in yellow walking to Adelaide Oval (page

We know for a fact that the suicide rate is higher in those sleeping rough or doing it tough financially, so how many people has the Hope Cup (page three) saved?

We can track where the funds go and what they lead to, but on pure visibility and awareness levels alone the value of weeks like this are immeasurable.

Within this truth lies the beauty of what these people are doing. We will never know how many they have saved and there is no personal gain on offer – they simply put their hand up to make a positive change.

Kudos to those in the community that have helped already and for those looking to get involved, there is no time like the present.

The Confusion and Destruction of Scope 3 Emissions

THE recent passing of the Federal Labor Government's 'Nature Positive' legislation has resulted in the inclusion of Scope 3 emissions in greenhouse gas reporting.

This has introduced a layer of confusion and panic, particularly for farmers and small businesses.

Scope 3 emissions are indirect greenhouse gas emissions that occur in an entity's value chain, encompassing both upstream and downstream emissions, including those from financed activities.

This broad definition has not only complicated the regulatory landscape but has imposed unfair burdens on smaller entities such as farmers and small family businesses across the nation

To be clear - Scope 3 emissions are notoriously difficult to measure and control.

Unlike direct emissions from a company's own operations or those from purchased energy (Scope 1 and Scope 2), Scope 3 emissions include a vast array of indirect activities.

This includes emissions from the production of goods, transportation, waste disposal, and even the use of sold products.

For farmers, this means their emissions are intertwined with those of various suppliers and buyers, creating a nebulous web of responsibility that is challenging to manage.

The most pressing issue is the uncertainty Scope 3 emissions introduce for farmers and small businesses.

The lack of clear guidelines and support means that these entities are left grappling with how to accurately measure and report their emissions, despite being mandated to do so through amendments to the Corporations Act 2001.

Such uncertainty often translates into significant operational stress and financial strain.

With this change, there is a real risk that larger companies, which are more directly targeted by Scope 3 reporting requirements, may offload their compliance costs and risks onto their smaller suppliers.

This is already happening with the Modern Slavery Act which places significant burden on individual farmers and businesses.

Consequently, a farmer who relies on a major agribusiness for financing or supply may find themselves facing unexpected demands for emission reductions or additional reporting burdens.

Small entities, which often lack the resources or expertise to navigate complex

emission calculations, may struggle to meet these new demands.

We must ensure the burden of emissions reporting does not disproportionately harm the very entities that are crucial to our economy and environment.

Housing affordability plummeting

THE total value of new housing loans continues to rise as the housing affordability crisis reaches new heights.

The latest ABS figures show the total value of new housing loans rose 3.9 per cent in July to \$30.6 billion.

Housing affordability is now more than a growing concern, with the proportion of family income required to meet loan repayments reaching significant levels.

The latest REIA Housing Affordability Report shows that the average loan repayment today is a whopping 48.1 per cent of income, placing housing affordability is at its lowest in almost three decades.

The ABS figures show the total value of new housing loans rose 3.9 per cent in July to \$30.6 billion.

The value of new investor loans rose 5.4 per cent to \$11.7 billion, which was 35.4 per cent higher than July 2023, while the value of owner-occupier loans rose 2.9 per cent to \$18.9 billion, 21.4 per cent higher than July 2023.

The value of new owner-occupier first home buyer loans rose 0.8 per cent in July, which was 19.7 per cent higher than July 2023.

With the chronic housing shortage putting pressure on rents, first home buyers have found themselves competing in a tighter market, pushing them to act quickly despite higher borrowing costs.

"We've also got a range of push bikes that we get in, some of them might be a quick repair job... and we try to give them to the less fortunate, especially kids around Christmas time," Mr Flaherty said.

As part of Men's Shed Week, which ran from September 1 to 7, the Australian Men's Shed Association held its 10th National Men's Shed Gathering at Murray Bridge on September 4 and 5.

Mr Flaherty and two other Willo's Men's Shed members attended the conference, alongside around 160 other shed members from right across the country, learning about ways to grow membership and sustainability

of their shed, while also covering a range of topics including leadership, culture and mate-

Events like the Gawler Show and the Gawler Village Fair help Willo's Men's Shed continue to gain exposure throughout the community, which leads to more members and projects.

Mr Flaherty said their shed is open to anybody, young and old, with a couple of members currently still in high school.

There are also members who are part of an NDIS social inclusion program.

At any given moment, there will be men working at the many different stations available on whatever project is on their list for the day, or sitting in one of the communal areas, having a chat.

LIGHT Regional Council has made some cuts to its 2024/25 Discretionary Initiatives Budget, following the recent ordinary meeting on Tuesday, August 27.

As part of the Annual Business Plan and Budget, council set aside \$400,000 for discretionary initiatives to be completed.

There were originally 11 initiatives recommended to elected members to be included, but after some discussion, that was cut down to six.

Those recommended included RV and caravan parking area signs and controls, Greenock extension, for the shared use path in Gawler Belt, the Community Infrastructure Grants Program, budget increases for event grants and spon-

sorship and library public access computers and digital equipment replacement, totalling \$191,000.

Councillor Colin Ross was voal about making some cuts in an effort to save money.

"We've got to be very conscious of money," he said at the meeting.

"We did cut a substantial revenue from our budget, so there's some of these things... that I think should go."

Mr Ross originally took out the library computers and digital equipment, but Lynette Reichstein pushed to include that ini-

other things are involved in it, so I'd be happier if it was kept in there," she said.

Part of the original recommendation also included an acknowledgement of an expression of interest that has been submitted for the Kapunda Silo Art Activation project and authorising the chief executive to submit an application if invited.

Mr Ross moved to remove that point of the motion, saying those silos are not in an ideal location.

"If you look at Eudunda and all the others... Kapunda is off the main street," he said.

"I've spoken to the artists who have looked at it and said no, and they're local artists as well.

The motion was carried without that final point of authorising the chief executive to apply for the project.



THERE is a new physio in town, and if the first couple of months are anything to go by, it is a welcome addition to the Roseworthy area.

Whitewolf Physiotherapy opened at Roseworthy about three months ago, and owner Brad MacGowan said it took off from the get-go.

"I've got a lot of community support from the Roseworthy and Freeling areas," he said.

"It's been awesome to be able to provide health care out here, because everyone has been so appreciative of it as well, because I think they haven't had anything like that where they've lived for so long."

Mr MacGowan graduated from UniSA with a Bachelor of Physiotherapy in 2019, before taking up a job with The Injury Hub in Gawler.

His physio journey started out in 2020 right at the height of the Covid pandemic, which created some challenges.

He learned lots during his time at The Injury Hub, and before long came the time to move out on his own, which had "always been a dream" of his.

"It has been a bit like living the dream," he said.

"I've got to pinch myself a little bit, because of how surreal it is.

"When you work for something for so long and you finally get it... it's been really cool."

Mr MacGowan's clinic boasts a comprehensive gym setup, which allows him and his clients to perform the necessary rehabilitation together.

He said one thing that might set him apart from other physios is offering longer appointments, which allows him to really listen to what his clients need, which leads to a better service.

There are some plans to open up a larger clinic in the future, but right now Mr MacGowan wants to continue offering personal support and evidence-based treatment to his clients.

New hangar to be built at Edinburgh

WORK has begun on the building of a giant aircraft hangar in the northern suburbs to facilitate the specialist maintenance of the Australian Defence Force's (ADF) Boeing 737 variant military aircraft.

In a partnership between the Federal and State Governments, the \$200 million Deep Maintenance and Modification Facility (DMMF) will be built adjacent to the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) Base Edinburgh.

The 240-metre long, 60-metre wide, 25-metre high, four-bay hangar is almost 50 per cent longer than Adelaide Oval.

The project will enable the long-term deep maintenance and modification of the ADF's fleet of 737-sized aircraft.

Playford Mayor Glenn Docherty said the new facility will be a major boost for the region.

"The City of Playford welcomes this major investment by the Federal and State Governments in this project, which strengthens northern Adelaide's defence industry," he said.

"It is a major boost in demonstrating our region's defence capabilities. NORTHERN ADELAIDE HAS THE POTENTIAL TO FURTHER GROW THE STATE AND NATION'S DEFENCE SECTOR, WHICH MEANS MORE ECONOMIC AND EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES FOR OUR COMMUNITY.

"Northern Adelaide has the potential to further grow the state and nation's defence sector, which means more economic and employment opportunities for our community."

Construction has already commenced on the project and is forecast to be completed in mid-2026.

"This \$200 million, state of the art facility will allow us to maintain, repair and overhaul RAAF aircraft in northern Adelaide, reducing our reliance on offshore maintenance services," Federal Minister for Defence Industry Pat Conroy said.

"It means Australian aircraft will be maintained by Australian workers, using their skills to keep RAAF aircraft safely in the skies for years to come."

Approximately 450 construction jobs are forecast during the two-year build and upon completion, the facility is expected to support

around 50 new highly skilled jobs including mechanical, avionics and structural engineers, painters and ground servicing equipment trades.

The new 2.1-hectare purpose-built facility will be built on the 16-hectare parcel of land owned by the State Government with a tow-way to connect the project area to RAAF Base Edinburgh.

"The State Government has a proud history of directly investing in infrastructure to grow our defence industry and this project will see our state become the home of aircraft maintenance for this part of the RAAF fleet," Minister for Defence and Space Industries Stephen Mulligan said.

"Because of our investment, for the first time, the Defence Force will be able to modify and maintain its fleet of Boeing military aircraft on Australian soil."

Service provides free internet for Playford students

SCHOOL-aged children in Playford can apply for free home internet through a federal government program designed to bridge a digital divide across Australia.

The School Student Broadband Initiative will offer a free National Broadband Network (NBN) service until December 31, 2025 to up to 30,000 eligible families and carers with school-age children across the country, who currently lack an active NBN connection at home.

The program includes free home internet until December 2025, a free WI-FI router and unlimited data.

Playford Mayor Glenn Docherty said the opportunity was a "fantastic way for everyone to have equal digital access to support their education needs".

"As school curriculums increasingly transition to and use digital platforms for learning, having internet access at home has become essential," he said.

"Playford families with school children who lack internet access at home will not be left at a disadvantage."

Mayor Phil Cameron welcomed the appointment of Mr Inat, who boasts more than 20 years of senior executive experience in the local government sector, with his 11-



Mark Wasley said council is encouraging everyone to get involved and give feedback on what their priorities are for the next four years.

"Community feedback is critical as the Strategic Plan will be used to plan services, inform advocacy and grant applications, and shape the next Infrastructure and Asset Management Plan and Long Term Financial Plan," he

"As we sit back in 2028, where would we as a community like to see our region?

"It will transform, unquestionably it will. How should Council and the community shape that transformation."



Fostering futures at heart of new campaign

THE impact of foster care is front and centre of a new campaign urging South Australians to open their hearts and homes to some of the state's more vulnerable children and young people.

'Fostering Futures', driven by social enterprise Junction, highlights the deep impact a stable, loving and caring foster care placement can have on the lives of children, and those who take on the caring role.

Junction's head of impact Alisa Willis said the initiative was a call-out to people who had been thinking about becoming a foster carer as well as those who might not have previously considered fostering.

"People who open their hearts and homes to children and young people are incredibly special individuals and families," she said.

"There is no doubt taking on the role of a foster carer comes with challenges, but also the potential for life-changing reward and impact.

"Through this campaign we take a snapshot of the simple things to show how becoming a foster or kinship carer can, and frequently does, change many lives for the better."

The digital campaign comprises a range of visual imagery of everyday interactions such as cooking, playing sport and even sitting on the couch, demonstrating how caring can foster joy, memories, possibilities, potential and love.

"Having the love and stability of a secure foster care placement can go a long way to helping children and young people, many who have been through significant trauma, heal and ultimately live their best life," Ms Willis said.

As South Australia's first non-government provider of residential care, Junction expanded its services in 2020 to include foster care.

The organisation's family-based care program now manages short and long-term placements supporting around 65 carers.

Ms Willis said that Junction provides training, case management and support for carers.

"We are committed to not just supporting but embracing diversity and welcome interest from potential carers from all walks of life," she said.

"We respect that this is a big life decision for carers and families, but we urge people – whether they have been considering this for some time or are just curious – to get in touch to hear a bit more and have a chat."

A railway of knowledge — Vale George Rau

THE town of Gawler is in mourning following the loss of the town's most knowledgeable local rail historian George John Rau.

Born and raised in Gawler from February 6, 1928 to parents Harold George William Rau and Catherine Leidle Rau (nee Ford), George completed his schooling at Gawler Primary School and his first job was part of the production line for local paper *The Bunyip*.

It was not long before George, the second of three brothers – the late Ray Williams (eldest) and Robert Harold (youngest), followed in his father's footsteps to work at the Islington Railway Workshops, developing into a highly skilled rope and steel wire splicer.

George went on to spend 45 years working in South Australian Railways and with his father learning the art of a blacksmith as an apprentice under Gawler's own James Martin.

Member for Light Tony Piccolo said it's not surprising both became passions in his life

"His brother Robert mentioned in his eulogy that George could look at any engine and tell you where and when it was built along with all the information you could think of about that engine," said Mr Piccolo.

"George was passionate about our community and was highly sought after for his knowledge of the railway – if there was anything George didn't know about trains, it certainly wasn't worth knowing.

"I think it's fitting his first job was at *The Bunyip* because he loved to share stories, and he leaves behind a collection of the plans, records, drawings and photos of all the locomotives built in Gawler.

"Gawler was once a leading manufacturing town, producing many locomotives and farming machinery.

"We will seek to have these memories and historical pieces publicly available in our community to honour our region's history – but it will also pay homage to George and his love of the rail."

The legacy George leaves behind in the Gawler community and the hearts of family and friends is more than his love of the railway.



George was a keen and active Rover Scout in his early days, even starting a Lone Scout Patrol of eight boys to begin with, which grew to help revive scouts in the region.

He also spent time coaching a team of marching girls in Elizbeth in the mid-1960s, even helping organise the North Metropolitan Zone Championship in 1964 and enjoyed his time with the local Probus Group.

His passion for cricket grew during the Don Bradman-led 'Invincibles' era, reciting all the statistics and possessing memorabilia of the greatest test team ever through his eyes.

During the same 1950s era, George joined and remained forever faithful to his three great passions – the mighty Port Adelaide Magpies Football club - even performing trainer duties for 22 years, the Trade Union Movement and Australian Labor Party.

George also took pride in his FJ Holden – his epitome of motor vehicle for its looks,

sturdy mechanics and comfortable drive – and knew the number of bolts, rivets and steel used in the Sydney Harbour Bridge.

"Not many people knew about George's personal life because he preferred to focus on other things, but he certainly has touched a lot of lives in our community," said Mr Piccolo.

"He was always generous with his time and it was an honour to hear more about the man behind all this knowledge.

"George lived a full 96 years, and our hearts go out to his family and friends during this time."

Robert ended his eulogy by saying "George's death ends 196 years of the Raus in Gawler".

Giving thanks for Shanks

REWIND to maybe three years ago, I was hot on the trail of trying to get some more mural art here in Gawler.

I'd started my new job taking me around Adelaide and I knew that we needed some of the amazing art work I'd seen on my travels.

"You need to talk to the council," is what I was told over and over again. That's great, sage advice, but for someone who had little or no interest in local politics or any kind of politics in general, it was the major stumbling block I kept encountering.

Then one day I happened upon a chance meeting with one of our local members, councillor Nathan Shanks.

Nathan grew up in Hamley Bridge but also spent a lot of time on a tiny blip in the Pacific Ocean, on an island called Rarotonga which was, "just a paradise".

He went to Riverton District High School for years 8 to 10 and always had a keen interest in the wood and metal tech classes.

His parents realised something needed to change for Nathan's schooling though, to keep him on track to finish Year

He enrolled into University Senior College (USC) in Year 11. This was a big change for Nathan but seemed to be enough to restimulate him to finish high school.

During his time at USC he lived in the western suburbs and worked at the Original Pancake Kitchen on Hindley Street which funnily enough, is kind of

how he ended up being one of the very first employees at The Java Hut here in Gawler.

"Getting the country boy into the city was a good thing. I sort of realised that architecture wasn't for me, I wanted to be more hands on, more on the tools..."

After high school Nathan completed his CERT 1 in Carpentry and Joinery at TAFE which secured him an apprenticeship with Modern Miracles. The first official building project he was involved in was the old shops across the road from Stratco in Willaston.

While completing his apprenticeship he also worked as a barman at the Bushman's Hotel which is how he met his wife Erin (who is now the mother of his two beautiful little girls, Addi and Milly).

After he completed his apprenticeship he hung up the bartender's apron and started up his own building business doing alterations, additions and even the odd new build.

After running his own business for nearly 10 years, he took an opportunity at GC&J Constructions where he is still today as one of GC&J's senior project managers.

On top of his career move and starting his family, he also decided to run for Gawler council in 2018 and was elected.

As a local builder trying to do local developments with clients he found dealing with town planners frustrating, but in an epiphany moment he thought "how can you complain about the system before actually understanding the system?"

That's pretty much the reason he ran for council, to figure out how things run and hopefully contribute by offering a builders point of view.

If you ask him today if he has achieved that he will answer cheekily with a "No, I still have work to do".

It's the little difference that keeps him going though.

"Each year it seems like I connect to people more and more, and we do get the little wins here and there..."

One of the most rewarding challenges for Nathan is trying to communicate (to us, the rate payers) how the Town of Gawler council works.

He admits he still has a lot to learn but has been able to help those who have needed that "translator" over the last five and a bit years

"The bi-product of running for council is having the opportunity to meet some really community minded people like myself who really care about what goes on in our town..."

Nathan's weekends tend to be as family based as they can be (with building work and council errands running well into most weekends).

Every Saturday morning he and Erin take Milly to swimming lessons and Addi to gymnastics whilst trying to keep the weekends as laid back as possible, to just have fun with family. Anyway, rewind to our chance meeting, mentioned earlier. I received a

message via the Facebook page, I'm From Gawler, from a local councillor asking for a catch up with the admin of the page.

Admittedly, I was a bit apprehensive to answer as I knew our page had one of the biggest reaches in Gawler, so I figured it was something he wanted from us.

I (as many) had the biggest misconceptions about our local councillors. As it turned out, Nathan had a great idea for how we could both make a real impact on the local community. We wanted to find out a way that we could clearly communicate with the online audiences we both shared.

We came up with the hashtag '#GawlerSocialNetwork' – a way for us and others to group all our important posts.

By ending posts with that hashtag, it would give people easy access to all the best local information.

Sadly for us, it kind of fell apart as we both forgot to use the hashtag and hardly any one uses them on Facebook anyway.

But, the friendship that was formed on the day wasn't a waste of time.

In that chance meeting I finally got to put my point across to a local member regarding murals in town.

With Nathan's guidance, I spoke in front of the council, at the council chambers (I'd only ever paid my cat registration there), and before I knew it, speaking to my own deputation about murals.

Now we have some amazing murals here in Gawler and only just recently an Arts Trail was made, giving locals and tourists an opportunity to explore the colours of our town.

Nathan and I have met and collaborated on several projects around town, the most well-known being the Centenary Lane mural painted by local artist Kyle (Whaletale) Armstrong. I've enjoyed every one of our catch ups and it's so great to see someone with such importance in our community be so down to earth, but be able to switch it on and be so knowledgeable about the community when the need arises.

He's always able to answer my dumb council questions over a Friday 'business lunch', usually at the local tavern of course.

Message from the top

REBECCA FALKINGHAM NDIS CHIEF EXECUTIVE

LAST month, the National **Disability Insurance Scheme** Amendment (Getting the NDIS Back on Track No. 1) Bill 2024 was passed by the Parliament.

The Bill provided the framework to deliver on the NDIS Review's vision to restore the NDIS to its original intent and deliver better outcomes for Australians with permanent and significant disability within a broader ecosystem of supports.

Some of these changes will take time to develop together with people with disability but, once implemented, participants will experience the benefits.

The task ahead for the Agency is to now deliver these reforms in partnership with people with disability.

It is absolutely essential people with disability continue to have a voice in how the detailed design is done and how these changes are implemented – and it's my commitment they will.

The NDIA has been delivering reform in partnership with people with disability and the disability community over the past two years and co-design will continue to form the cornerstone of implementing change as we move forward.

This includes a long-term program of work alongside people with disability on assessment and budgeting reforms, functions of a new navigator role, changes to the way plan management services are delivered, integrity improvements and designs of the new psychosocial early intervention service.

This Bill has not come into effect yet, so there is not any immediate

The passing of the Bill means there will be changes in the coming weeks once the laws come into effect.

I want to acknowledge that many participants may be uncertain about change.

The NDIA will work continue to work with you and share information in the coming weeks to explain what specific changes will mean for you.

Future changes will be supported with transparency and communication and not all change will happen at once.

There is much work to be done and participants and the disability community will shape and guide how we change into action.

We will use co-design to amplify the voices of people with disability – to ensure we get these improvements right.



NDIS launches annual survey

THE National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) has launched its annual **Long Form Outcomes** Framework (LFOF) survey, which is used to measure how NDIS participants and their families and carers are progressing in different areas of their lives.

The survey helps the National **Disability Insurance Agency** (NDIA) to understand what types of supports lead to good outcomes – this information helps improve the delivery of the NDIS.

The NDIA also uses this data

to benchmark the experiences of participants against the experiences of people without disability in Australia and in other countries.

This helps the NDIA to gather more detailed information about the experiences of participants, families and carers.

Participants are set to be contacted via phone, SMS or email until December 16 of this



Kindness as a calling: Sarah Greaves' remarkable support work journey

Her journey from cleaner to champion of disability support illustrates that with determination and empathy, it's possible to create meaningful change in people's lives.

Another key topic was the complexity of Appendix H legislation.

With the introduction of the new "Appendix



H" funding in the 2023-24 NDIS SDA pricing arrangements, eligible SDA participants can now live with their non-NDIS family members or loved ones in their selected property.



Over the course of her journey, Esther has engaged in work experience opportunities in schools and at the local library.


She is also eager to undertake a trial in aged care, aiming to expand her knowledge and gain insight into the essential skills

Change is challenging

STEPHEN, now in his 60s, has been a participant in the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) for many years.

Despite having both intellectual and mental health disabilities, he has managed to live independently.

However, ongoing experiences have highlighted the need for additional support. After his carers leave for the day, Stephen is left alone, which has resulted in him wandering the streets and having accidents.

His inability to cook and the need for supervision with basic hygiene and daily tasks underscore the importance of finding a more supportive living arrangement.

Obtaining funding for SIL has been challenging, with the family persevering for a considerable time.

The result has been that Stephen now has access to the necessary resources that will allow him to live with dignity.

Getting funding is one thing; finding the right home presents a different challenge, one that offers a suitable mix of housemates and surroundings.

The transition into SIL requires careful planning, coordination, and adjustment. Everyone must be involved, and in this case, it was Stephen, the support coordinator, behavioural therapist, psychology team, SIL team and the family, working together as a team. Key steps

taken to support Stephen's adjustment:

- Familiarising Stephen with the new environment.
- Involving Stephen in decision-making from the start.
- · Finding a home in an area he is familiar
- Emphasising that he won't return to his previous location.
- Discussing his preferences in terms of food and the room he would have.
- Gradually introducing Stephen to his new surroundings and housemates.
- Helping him feel comfortable and at ease in his new home.

 Establishing a consistent

routine to alleviate Stephen's anxiety and provide stability and predictability.

• Ensuring Stephen maintains his activities.

At this early stage, we highly recommend meeting with all team members involved to ascertain how the participant is settling in.

This should be done within the first month, with follow-up meetings. It is early days, but Stephen has a loving family and the support to see the transition through.

Stephen's family has been a key driver in facilitating Stephen's change to SIL. Plan Manage Assist is Stephen's NDIS Plan Manager and has provided support not



SOUTH Gawler's Travis Head etched his name in the short-form history books vet again in Wednesday night's contest against Scotland, tying the record for the Australia's fastest ever half-century in a T20 international.

The first of the three-game series in Scotland ended up being a dominant victory for the Aussies, requiring only 9.4 overs to chase down Scotland's respectable total of 9/154 thanks in large part to Head's heroics.

After his opening partner Jake Fraser-McGurk fell for a surprising thirdball duck in the first over, Head put the team on his back and blasted 80 runs off just 25 deliveries, including 17 boundaries (five sixes).

He reached his half-century in just 17 balls, tying Marcus Stoinis's effort against Sri Lanka in Perth back in 2022. Glenn Maxwell has twice reached 50 in 18 deliveries (2014 against Pakistan, 2016 against Sri Lanka), and David Warner has done it once (2010 against West Indies).

It was part of a lightning-quick 113-run partnership with Mitch Marsh (39 runs from 12 deliveries) that lasted less than six overs.

When Head finally fell from the final ball of the seventh over, he left Australia sitting pretty at 3/123, and the pair of Josh Inglis (27 not-out from 13 deliveries) and Marcus Stoinis (eight not-out from five balls) finished things off 16 balls later for a seven-wicket triumph.

The record for the fastest half-century in an international T20 fixture belongs to India's Yuvraj Singh, who bashed his way to 50 in just 12 deliveries against England back in 2007.

The quick three-game series was then wrapped up on Friday night and Saturday night, with Australia securing a clean sweep.

It was a forgettable outing for Head in Game 2, falling for a golden duck after the Aussies lost the toss and were sent in to bat first.

Despite his disappointing exit, it opened the door for number three Josh Inglis to put together an innings, and he delivered a massive 103 off 49 deliveries to lead the visitors to a 70-run triumph.

Rounding out the action, Head contributed 12 runs from 11 balls in Saturday's series finale, and this time it was Cameron Green (62 not-out from 39 deliveries) who took home Man of the Match in a six-wicket win, chasing down Scotland's 9/149 in the 17th over.

No more chances: Bulldogs set for do-or-die prelim

CENTRAL District were brought back down to earth with a thump after losing Sunday's SANFL second semi-final 14.10 (94) to 5.5 (35) against minor premiers Norwood at Adelaide Oval.

It was a disappointing result after the high of the previous week's victory over Sturt, but the Bulldogs have a second chance to make the premiership decider when they take on Glenelg in this Sunday's preliminary final.

The pressure Norwood exerted throughout the match proved too much for Centrals, but from pressure comes diamonds, so now the Dogs have a chance to respond and earn another shot at the Redlegs.

Through the first quarter of the second semi, Centrals were able to match it with Norwood and led at the first break, 3.2 (20) to 2.0 (12).

Beau Thomas nailed the first goal of the match at the three-minute mark, and after Norwood booted the next two, the Bulldogs responded with a pair, including a pressure snap from Mani Liddy for the Goal of the Game, 19 minutes into the opening stanza.

Norwood lifted a cog and kicked

the only five goals of the second term to go into half time with a 22-point lead – the same margin as the previous week, when Centrals trailed Sturt at the long break.

Hopes were high that another thrilling comeback was around the corner, but it was the Redlegs that dominated – although they just couldn't nail the goals – with 1.6 (12) in the first 15 minutes of the third quarter to 0.1 (1), before a second goal.

Finally, the Bulldogs kicked their first goal since the first quarter at the 19-minute mark through Aiden Grace, to trail 9.8 (62) to 4.4 (28) at lemons – a bridge too far?

Norwood kicked the first two goals of the final frame, and after Hugo Munn nailed one for Centrals, another three Redlegs majors brought the final margin to 59 points.

The best half-dozen players on the field were all from Norwood, with Dyson Sharp, Jez McLennan and 150-gamer Kyle Presbury the better Bulldogs on the day.

To make the grand final, Centrals must do something for the first time in the 21st century – win a game after losing a final.



The last time the Bulldogs responded to a finals loss with a victory the following week was against North Adelaide in the 1997 first semi, where they still failed to make the grand final. 1995's preliminary final against Norwood was the most recent finals bounceback to result in a trip to the big dance.

From seven previous preliminary finals, the Dogs have only one victory, so they are up against it.

Still, this Centrals side are a resilient group of players and have shown plenty of character this season, and still have a golden opportunity to secure their first grand final berth since 2011.

The club's Under 18s will play the curtain-raiser next Sunday at Adelaide Oval from noon against the Eagles in their grand final, with the league preliminary final – Centrals versus Glenelg – at 3.15pm.

Artillery has too much firepower in Port Pirie

STAR South Australian pacer Artillery returned from a spell in brilliant fashion at Port Pirie on Saturday.

Artillery came from fourth at the 400-metre mark to score a three-metre win in the Spencer Motor Company Pace (2050m).

The field sprinted home in a brisk 55.8 seconds for the final 800 metres, and the winner's time would have been quicker as he gave about a 15-metre start to the leader Dancing Finn.

Artillery (\$2.30 favourite) beat Dancing Finn (\$4.40), with Imperials Reason (\$9.50) an eye-catching third, eight metres away after galloping early in the race.

In a word of warning to rivals, trainer-driver Paul Cavallaro said there was still good improvement in his six-year-old.

"I would say he was only about 70 per cent fit," Cavallaro said.

"He has bigger goals next month and I will be building him up to peak then. I was very happy with the win as I thought he might have been in a bit of trouble early.

"Dancing Finn is a very good mare and when she led and got away with such a slow first quarter (34.7 seconds) I thought it might be too much of an ask to catch her.

"But I got a good cart into the race trailing Uncle Chan and my bloke sprinted really well."

Cavallaro said the Kapunda and Kadina Cups were goals ahead for Artillery, which has now won 26 races and is closing in on \$250,000 in stakes.

It was a busy weekend for owner-breeder Tara-Shae Linke.

Her classy mare Coco Mia impressed with an excellent win in the Risdon Hotel Pace (1609m) at Port Pirie, then when she arrived back at her parent's Kadina home there was only a little sleep.

In the early hours of Sunday morning, her broodmare Jet Quick, the mother of Coco Mia, delivered a colt foal by the American stallion Cattlewash.

Tara-Shae's brother Tyson, who trains Coco Mia, said the colt was an impressive looker and mother and foal were doing well.

"It has been a busy 24 hours for Tara," Ty-

"She and Dad (Ross) were up to help the mare foal down after being at Pirie to watch Coco Mia."

Coco Mia (\$1.30 favourite), driven by Wayne Hill, had little more than a trial in sprinting home to win by five metres from Bettor Be Lively (\$10).

She rated 1:55.1 with a last half of 56.1 seconds.

"Wayne didn't know her around once he knew she had the race won," Linke said.

"He allowed her to cruise up the straight without pulling the (ear) plugs, and we know how she sprints when the ripcord is pulled."

Linke said he was being a "little protective" of Coca Mia on the return from racing after injury.

"We are really happy with her return, and she is doing really well," he said. "In fact, our vet has trouble seeing which hock was injured when she is striding out. Maybe we are protecting her a bit too much, but we are always cautious.

"I will continue to try and space her races to two or three weeks and progress through the classes, realising we will have to test her against the best eventually."

Linke said he might also consider going to Melbourne with Coco Mia if a suitable option presented.

The mare was one of a treble for South Australia's leading reinsman Wayne Hill at Port Pirie.

He also scored on Merlins Illusion for Victorian trainer Naomi Kerr in the Kauschke's Discount Paint Pace (1609m), and Mixed Messages for Gawler trainer Garry Connor in the Frank Borg-Short Term Financial Solutions Pace (16909m).

Merlins Illusion was part of as double for Kerr, who also prepared Feng Shui Star to win the PPHRC Volunteers Appreciation Pace (1609m).

She was unlucky not have to have at least a treble, with Go Away Again a close second to Tembie, and Prioritise second to Mixed Messages after being trapped three-wide for the entire race.

Hill had Merlins Illusion (\$3.20) perfectly placed one-out, one-back in his race before sprinting strongly over the final 300 metres to score a three metre win over Resurrects (\$1.90 favourite), with Mighty Carson (\$7.40) two metres away third.

Feng Shui Star (\$2.15 favourite), driven by

Jason Kittel, made it four wins from as many starts since joining the Kerr after stable finishing strongly to win by two-and-a-half metres from Always Torque To Me (\$5).

Mixed Messages (\$3.90), a lightly raced eight-year-old, trailed the leader Bernie Macray (\$7) before dashing up the sprint lane.

The gelding scored by three metres from Prioritise (\$3 favourite), which had no luck being caught three-wide throughout.

Despite that adversity, Prioritise had the

audacity to loom up as a possible winner on the home turn, but had no answer to the sprint of Mixed Messages.

Tembie made it two wins in a row for Port Pirie trainer Dale Afford and reinsman Josh Holberton, taking out the Ladbrokes Easy Form Pace (2050m).

Well rated in front, Tembie (\$2.60) showed great courage to hold off Go Away Again (\$2.10 favourite) by a head, with Hesashark (\$12), a stablemate of the winner, five metres away third.

Owner-trainer Matt Maguire had another win with My Bad Habits (\$6.50) in the PPHRC AGM 15th September Trotters Handicap (2050m).





Gregurke breaks Nuriootpa's Schluter drought

NURIOOTPA'S Nicholas Gregurke took home the 2024 Schluter Medal on Monday night, securing 22 votes to top the podium ahead of Tanunda's Sam Colquhoun (17 votes) and Willaston's Justin Hoskin (16).

It had been a long time between drinks for Nuriootpa players on awards night, with their last Schluter Medal coming back in 1998 courtesy of Darren Westlake. The only other Nuri representative to earn the honour was Matt Davoren in the BLG's inaugural campaign in 1987.

Gregurke, a star inside midfielder, got his hand raised despite missing two games, earning four best-on-grounds, four 'twos', and a pair of one-vote outings from 14 total

All up he was selected in Nuriootpa's standouts in 12 of the 14 games, kicking nine goals in the process.

It followed a 2023 campaign where Gregurke finished as his club's top vote-getter (14 from 15 games), which was tied for fourth with South Gawler's Josh Wittwer and Barossa District's Leigh Ryswyk.

But this time around it appeared clear that Gregurke was in with a big chance after polling in each of the first five rounds, and he had 17 votes by the end of Round

The only player in striking distance all night was Tanunda's player-coach Colquhoun, who had 14 of his 17 total votes by the end of Round 10, but his challenge fell away after surprisingly polling in just one of the final eight weeks.

Willaston's Hoskin made a charge through the middle stages in his debut BLG season, piling up 13 of his 16 votes from Rounds 7-13, but he also mustered just a single tally in the five weeks before finals.

Leading Angaston was Tom Corcoran, who just missed out on a podium spot with 15, as did last year's joint runner-up from Freeling Austin Poulton.

Ethan Gant (14 votes) edged fellow Barossa District midfielder Brendan Dew (12) for the Bulldogs' highest total, while for the reigning premiers back-to-back Schluter Medallist Steve Burton once again led South Gawler with 12 votes from 14

Rounding out the team leaders, top recruit Matthew Rankine banked nine votes for Kapunda, and the trio of Bradley Pilkington, Ryan Williams and Tyson Friend finished tied on three votes for Gawler Central.

Reserves

Earlier in the night, Nuriootpa's Kade Rohrlach ran away with the Reserves medal to give his Tigers the senior double.

Rohrlach, who played 19 A grade games during Nuriootpa's premiership-winning 2022 season, split his time between the two levels last year before becoming a full-time Reserve this time around.

In his 15 appearances this season he was named in Nuri's best 12 times, which trailed only Kapunda's Tyson Barnes (15 selections from 15 games) and Barossa District's Riley Horsburgh (13 from 13) for the division's most.

He made the most of his big games, earning eight best-on-grounds to account for 24 of his 27 total votes. No other player reached the 20s.

Rounding out the podium places were Willaston's Hudson Cole (19 votes) and Tanunda's Benjamin Swan (16), with South Gawler's Callum Hall (13) and Kapunda's Barnes (13) tied for fourth. www.bunyippress.com.au

Under 17.5 Boys

Gawler Central's Tyler Best secured the senior colts crown, narrowly defeating Angaston's Hayden Henke by one vote (21-20) in the Under 17.5 Boys count.

Best was one of the stars of the Tigers' undefeated squad, racking up 10 best player honours while kicking 11 goals from his 16

He also earned an A grade call-up in Round 5, contributing a goal and being named in the bests against top division minor premiers Tanunda.

Best ended up polling in eight contests, including six best-on-grounds, and even though Henke delivered a three-vote performance in the final week of the season, it was only enough to cut the margin to one.

Henke polled in more games (10), but he received four 'ones' and two 'twos' before rattling off four best-on-grounds in the last

Rounding out the podium was Nuriootpa's Kaiden Pfitzner with 17 votes, and an eye-catching fourth went to South Gawler's Shaquan Davey.

Davey, a former Angle Vale A-grader, did not arrive at the Lions until Round 10, and he polled in six of his seven games including five best-on-grounds (four in a row to end the season).

Under 15 Boys

South Gawler's Zachary Quintel-Moyle finished with a flurry in the Under 15 Boys count, recording 17 votes out of a possible 18 in the final six rounds to finish well clear

Quintel-Moyle led the Lions to an undefeated regular season and delivered again in the qualifying final victory with a pair of goals, giving him a team-leading tally of 25 majors from 17 games while playing all over the ground.

He had only polled one vote through four rounds, before catching fire with eight best-on-grounds in his last 13 appearances. Quintel-Moyle also ended the year by receiving votes in eight consecutive games

His closest competitor was Gawler Central's Perry Sibbick, who put together a red-hot run home himself by matching Quintel-Moyle's 17 votes from his final six

He ended up finishing on 24 votes despite sitting on just seven heading into

Also breaking the 20-vote barrier to earn third was Tanunda's Under 13 star Erywn Rothe, who played all 16 games up an age group despite the former state representative still being eligible in the division where he won the league medal last year.

Under 13 Boys

Last but certainly not least, the two players to collect the most votes on the night were both down in the Under 13s, where Kapunda's Kobie Menzel racked up an enormous tally of 41 to best Gawler Central's Lucas Asher (32 votes).

Menzel, who led the division with 65 goals from 17 games - 20 clear of his nearest challenger – polled in all 16 games.

He began the year with four consecutive best-on-grounds, and after Kapunda's bye in Round 10 he rattled off six 'threes' and two 'twos' in his last eight appearances. All up, he earned 10 best-on-grounds, five 'twos' and a solitary 'one'.

Most other seasons Asher's 32 would be a winning total, and he got there with eight best-on-grounds among the 13 games that he polled.

South Gawler's William Cochrane and Tanunda's Ryder Underwood shared bronze with a pair of terrific seasons, securing 24 votes each.

Willaston will their way into grand final

SATURDAY'S A grade qualifying final between minor premiers Tanunda and second-placed Willaston provided a classic 'finals' brand of football – and a finish for the ages.

With a spot in the grand final on the line, and played on an immaculate Freeling Oval, Willaston snatched victory from the jaws of defeat with a stunning last-quarter comeback to prevail 10.10 (70) to 10.9 (69).

Coming into the contest the season series stood at one-all after Tanunda won the first time around 14.12 (96) to 11.10 (76), before

Willaston evened the ledger 9.7 (61) to 7.8 (50) after the second meeting in Round 11.

It would always be a tight game; particularly with the Magpies' gun forward Shay Linke absent for the finals campaign. Could the Maggies register a winning score without his presence?

For the Donnys to win they had to play 'stoppage football'. Tough, tight and aggressive, to prevent the more attractive flow-on overlap Tanunda-style game.

They did it perfectly, allowing the 'Pies little space and time to apply their game plan.

The opening was sensational. The first ball-up clearance went directly downfield

to where a clever tap from Josh Waldhuter, to Enrique Mazzeo, and resulting major had Willaston six points up inside the first 50 seconds.

That marked the end of the flow-on footy and the congestion took over. After collecting several early touches, Willaston tightened up on Sam Colquhoun with great success.

With little territory being gained by either side, ball-up after ball-up was eventually broken when Campbell Wildman found Henry Voigt, whose conversion recorded Tanunda's opening goal.

Early on, Luigi Mondello seemed to be everywhere for the Donnybrooks, as was Voigt

for the Pies, particularly after he potted his second major resulting from a forward-50 ruck free kick.


A second from Mazzeo and a smart tap from Saxon Evans to Zac East resulted in a run-in goal and the Donnys were a goal up.

A favourable bounce in favour of Jake Sutcliffe resulted in a 'gimme' goal for Tanunda, and it was all even at the first break, 3.2 (20)

The pressure and heat from Willaston's approach produced an unattractive spectacle, but successfully held back any major Tanunda dominance. It simply developed into a war of attrition, wearing down your opponent.

After Waldhuter's early second-quarter goal, Tanunda appeared to be slowly but surely gaining the ascendancy with six-pointers to Colquhoun, Collins and Bailey Smith, taking a 12-point margin to the long interval.

Willaston seemed to have no plan of attack in rebounding out of defence and advancing.

Tanunda wasted a couple of relatively easy shots on goal early in the third, but successfully prevented the Donnys from getting their hands on the Sherrin.

A clever tap-on from Collins resulted in Darcy Thompson's conversion for the opening major of the third quarter.

Angaston's talent is overflowing, with a true standout second forward in recruit Gavin Shephard (31 goals from 17 games) and a cast of valuable veterans such as captain Jack Miles, Jay Shannon and Ben Antonie, and they may be the only club capable of matching Tanunda player-for-player.

But they will need to figure out a way to score freely against the Magpies' daunting backline, led by superstar key back Rune Gilfoy, gun intercept defender Matthew Westhoff and player-coach Sam Colquhoun in the quarterback role.

Angaston have the momentum coming off a win, but coming into a prelim off a bye is not always an advantage, and against a Tanunda team who have set the standard all year, it has all the makings of spectacular battle.


Two Wells too big, too strong



BOTH Angle Vale and Two Wells will come into this Saturday's APFL A grade grand final expecting to get the job done, and both have a great case for favouritism.





Take two: grand final rematches on deck

Joshua Paton, Riley Ansell, Tommy Russell, Alexander Pool, Corey Penn and Michael Daly have been among the Roosters' most consistent performers this year, while the Owls will be relying on Kobe Sweetman, Tyler Dark, Jack Pessano, Zachary Thiel and Jamahson Davies to be difference-makers.

Two Wells coach Adam Spencer knows it will be a tall order to take down the Under 17 side that finished the regular season 14-1-1, but has plenty of belief after pulling off the qualifying final upset.

"They've done extremely well as a club to get all four of their teams into their respective grand finals, it shows their depth and strength as a club in the APFL," he said.

"The midfield of Angle Vale is a strong unit, when the likes of Jack Pessano and Jobie Maynard are in there, they're a force to be reckoned with.

"While they definitely have a couple standouts in their side, the whole team links up really well and they never give up.

"The qualifying final has been incredible for the self-belief the team needed going into the grand final. The group truly believes they can get the job done, but they know it's going to be a battle for the ages.

"Our best footy simply looks elite, like polished professionals, and Angle Vale seem to bring that out in our boys. Our boys just instinctively know exactly where to be and when to be there on the field.

"Our best two games this year were against Angle Vale in the qualifier last week and in Round 12 before that. The best part is we weren't at full strength for those games,


and this week everyone is back from injuries and available, so I'm excited to watch our best footy yet – and in a GF, you need to bring your best."

Down in the 14s Angle Vale will be taking on a Virginia side that represents the '1' in their 15-1 record, going down against the Rams 4.10 (34) to 4.2 (26) all the way back in Round 2.

The rematch ended up a getting the Owls back on track, delivering a 4.8 (32) to 3.3 (21) home win, but still the Rams remained the only team in the age group that Angle Vale could not blow off the park.

That was proven the case yet again in a terrific qualifying final, where Angle Vale led 2.0 (12) to 0.1 (1) at quarter-time and saw their lead slashed at the end of every break before ultimately holding on by the skin of their teeth 5.7 (37) to 5.6 (36).

For the defending champions Pasquale Virgara, Luca Virgara, Zak McAteer and Jack Farnden are some of the top players to look out for, while for the challengers Frank Musolino, Lucas Musolino, Archie Atwell and Hudson Pilaia will be hoping to cause the upset.

She won a gold medal in the Women's 100m Freestyle S9 just outside the world record – and a silver medal in the Women's 50m Freestyle S9.

Alexa Leary is the very definition of determination; she is the ultimate fighter. Every morning upon waking, the competitive swimmer with a part-time modelling career has to "restart a whole new life every day".

The permanent traumatic brain injury (TBI) suffered in the accident has caused life-altering effects. Alexa's emotions and memory are compromised and the result is that even the simplest of everyday activities represent a

She has to set reminders on her virtual assistant device to help her organise her day and tell her when to leave the house to attend appointments.

'Sometimes, due to my memory loss, I don't actually know what I'm meant to be doing or what's happening - I'm living a second life," she explained.

Having also dealt with the symptoms of attention deficit hyperactive disorder (ADHD) throughout her life, this TBI has resulted in Alexa now having to also deal with obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD), resulting in her often being overwhelmed by and fixated upon specifics that may not appear worth bothering about to others.

Alexa's performances in Paris say it all. Her effort in winning a gold medal in the 4x100m mixed medley relay, together with Jesse Aungles, Tim Hodge and Emily Beecroft, has become legendary already.

Swimming the anchor leg, Alexa dived in with Australia in fourth place, seven seconds behind the Dutch, who had picked a male to swim the final freestyle leg and were comfortably ahead.

At the final turn, the Aussies still looked to have little chance of winning the gold medal, even though Alexa had pulled her way into second place, but with her determined and fighting spirit she grabbed the lead in the final strokes as the packed poolside crowd erupted in amazement of what they had just seen.

"I knew I had to catch him and overtake him," Alexa said.

"I was like, that's it, I'm going to have to just take this win. I have to. He was actually a bit in front of me at 15 metres but I caught him. I had to, I just had to do that.

"What we are doing is just in-

credible. The fact that we're actually in that war room, we are going for what we're told we could never

"I think it's the most inspiring thing ever. I love this team. Our Australian team is so powerful. It honestly is."

And just as a follow-up, Alexa won gold in the 100m S9 freestyle - breaking her own world record that she had set earlier in the day, in the heats.

Not bad for a 23-year-old girl whose mother, back in July 2021, was told by a nurse: "You're not going to get the same girl back. This is serious".

Alexa is, as she describes herself, "a weapon", and as she says: "I will never not have a TBI, and will always face challenges. But I hope to raise awareness, and for people to understand and have acceptance for those who have such an injury".

Tigers and Lions trade blows in junior finals

GAWLER Central had a team in all three BLG junior qualifying finals on Saturday and sent two straight through to the big dance, including the Under 17.5 Boys after a comprehensive 12.14 (86) to 4.6 (30) performance against South Gawler.

The Tigers were already coming into the

contest as strong favourites thanks to their flawless 16-0 home-and-away season, and they were further bolstered by the inclusion of towering Central District ruck Callan Semmler for his first appearance since Round 10.

With Semmler in the middle combining with Under 17.5 league medallist Tyler Best, Gawler Central were blessed with considerable firepower and capitalised with three dominant quarters.

The Tigers led by 14 at quarter-time, and

increased that buffer by 21 points in the second and another 20 points in the third. Even when they put the cue in the rack in the fourth they still edged the period 2.3 (15) to 2.2 (14).

Jeht Ryan had a terrific day up forward, slotting a game-high four goals. He came into the fixture with just three goals for the season, and none since Round 3.

Tyler King (two goals) and Jack Starr (two) also provided valuable contributions, as did best player selections Jett Poulish (one goal), Paddy McAulliffe-Smith (one), Calder Ward and Kayde Ward.

Lions captain Biar Deng and Joshua Saunders kicked two each to account for all of their side's scoring, and the group of Jye Gordon, Raysharn Davey and Elijah Murch were among their top performers.

South will now get their double-chance this week in a preliminary final showdown against Angaston. In their two meetings this year, the Lions beat the Panthers 10.4 (64) to 7.15 (57) back in Round 5, before Ango turned the tide convincingly for a 10.6 (66) to 4.4 (28) triumph recently in Round 14.

Under 15 Boys

Gawler Central's only qualifying final loss on Saturday came in the 15s, where South Gawler showed why they have been undefeated all year in a strong 7.11 (53) to 3.2 (20) victory.

Six of the Lions' seven goals came in the middle two quarters, and it was Under 15 Best-and-Fairest Zachary Quintel-Moyle who added a pair of majors to his team-leading tally (27 from 18 games).

Jeremiah Burford also chipped in two for South, while Charlie Brant, Lawrence Raschella, Cooper Fawcett, Denver Hryhorec and Kai Winning filled out the best players.

Of the three meetings between these clubs, this was comfortably the most one-sided battle, failing to deliver the kind of spectacle that was expected after a thrilling 2.5 (17) to 2.4 (16) slog less than a month ago in Round 17.

To earn another crack at the Lions in the grand final, Gawler Central will have to overcome Kapunda for the third time, having already knocked them off by 25 in Round 9 and 33 in the final week of the regular season.

Under 13 Boys

Gawler Central have the opportunity to complete a perfect Under 13 season after the 16-0 Tigers cruised through to the grand final, nearly holding Kapunda scoreless 6.7 (43) to 0.1 (1).

Jackson Schubert (three goals), Max Argent (two) and Mitchell Semmler (one) put the Gawler goals on the board, and were supported well as usual by Under 13 Best-and-Fairest runner-up Lucas Asher.

It was a solid four-quarter showing from the premiership favourites, kicking at least one major in every quarter, and after conceding a behind in the first frame they shut the door the rest of the way.

It was a startling gap between the sides given that Kapunda also put together a stellar 14-2 campaign, but for a chance at redemption they will have to bounce back quickly and handle Tanunda in this Saturday's preliminary final.




