NAB has announced the Albyn Terrace branch will close on February 2, 2023, Fleurieu bank to "close its doors" on drawing community criticism - including following suit at Strathalbyn.

Earlier this year, Bank SA permanently closed its Goolwa branch in July following a shift towards cashless banking, with NAB

"It is really disappointing that after the support of the community for years and years, another bank is going to pull out of town," Mayor Parkes told The Southern Argus.

Last chance to vote in Local Government elections

While it's too late for postal entries, local residents are reminded that today (Thursday) marks the close for Local Government Election voting, at 5pm.

People with last-minute ballot entries may submit their votes at the Goolwa and Strathalbyn Alexandrina Council offices by close of business, and those voting in the Mount Barker District Council area can still do so, before 5pm, at a sealed ballot box at its Customer Service Centre - 1st floor, Local

Government Centre – 6 Dutton Road, Mount Barker.

As of Monday November 7, 2022, at 4.20pm, 36.44 per cent of enrolled Alexandrina voters had returned their ballots, compared to 28.75 per cent for Mount Barker District Council.

Broken into wards, Alexandrina was seeing 33.69 per cent returns in North Ward, 40.80 per cent in South and 34.89 per cent

Mount Barker District Council North Ward

returns were 29.30 per cent compared to 27.07 per cent in Central and 30.73 per cent in South.

At this time, the total number of envelopes returned across the state was 332,372 (26.73 per cent of total electors).

The Fleurieu Peninsula came away as the most decorated region at the 2022 South Australian Tourism Awards earlier this month, with Alexandrina businesses featuring predominantly among the winners.

Delivered by the Tourism Industry Council South Australia (TiCSA), the SA Tourism Awards are the pinnacle of excellence within the state's tourism industry, recognising businesses and individuals who have demonstrated business excellence, innovation and outstanding achievement.

This year's winners were announced during a gala dinner at the Adelaide Convention Centre on Thursday, November 3, with Alexandrina's Kimbolton Wines taking home gold in Tourism Wineries, Distilleries and Breweries, Carriage of Occasion taking silver in Tour and Transport Operators, Spirit of Australia's Big Duck Boat Tour also taking silver in Ecotourism, De Groot Coffee taking bronze in Excellence in Food Tourism, and Beach Huts Middleton taking silver in 4-4.5 Star Accommodation.

Alexandrina Council CEO Nigel Morris congratulated the winners and participants.

"It is great to share in their success, and we see the ongoing delivery of the Business Alexandrina program is an important part of Alexandrina's Economic Development Strategy going forward," he said.

Watch out for snakes, turtles

Residents are being reminded to take care around turtles and snakes, which can often be spotted at this time of year.

An Alexandrina Wildlife Support Group spokesperson said multiple sightings of snakes have been reported in recent weeks.

"They are out while the sun is out, (but) it's not always the case as they are active on overcast days as well, like we saw last year," the group posted on Facebook.

"Never attempt to catch or move snakes yourself; leave them alone."

Alexandrina Wildlife Support Group said if they need to be removed, such as from a backyard, to call an expert snake catcher.


Locals are encouraged to watch where they walk, including their pets, and to keep four-legged friends on leads.

Rain and warmer weather can also attract freshwater turtles, particularly eastern longnecks, as females start heading off to their nesting sites.

"Please be careful on the roads, not only for you and other road users, but these vulnerable species," an Alexandrina Wildlife Support Group spokesperson said.

"If the turtle is uninjured and it is safe to do so, please assist the turtle to the side of the road (where) the turtle is heading."

"Strathalbyn is a growing community, and has a lot of people who are elderly and like going to the bank to do their banking in person.

"Businesses also need a bank. Not everybody pays with a credit card

"It's just a shame, and they should be here for the community."

NAB Retail Customer Executive, Ann-Marie Simms, claimed no job losses would result in the local branch's closure and that customers would still be supported.

"We have worked closely with our colleagues on opportunities for them to continue to support customers either through other branches or across phone and digital channels," she said.

"Increasingly Australians are banking digitally, with more than 94 per cent of customer interactions now taking place over the phone, by video or online.

"While the Strathalbyn branch will no longer be there, we will still be there for our customers – just in different ways.

"Over the past few years, fewer customers are coming into branches to do their banking and foot traffic has lessened, which has been accelerated by COVID.

"More than half of our Strathalbyn customers have only visited the branch once in the last 12 months, and 68 per cent are already using other branches, including Mount Barker, which is the nearest alternative branch location."

Ms Simms assured local customers banking alternatives would be in place after the closure.

"These include our partnership with Australia Post and the Bank@Post service, as well as connecting with our mobile bankers, home lending specialists or business bankers in person or for phone or video appointments," she said.

"Bank@Post is available for our customers at Australia Post outlets including the Post Shop in Commercial Road, Strathalbyn."

According to NAB, both personal and business customers will be able to conduct a range of

banking services at Strathalbyn Post Office, including deposits up to \$9999 and withdrawals up to \$2000 per day.

However, Mayor Parkes raised concerns on the alternative, including with carparking in the vicinity.

"It is going to put more load on Australia Post," he believed.

"That means another impact on parking adjacent to the post office which is already a concern for everybody, and you can only do so much at the post office."

Seeking support from Alexandrina CEO Nigel Morris, Mayor Parkes planned to write to NAB to reconsider the closure.



The Rubens ready to give it 'the best we got'

While The Rubens have visited Adelaide multiple times, this weekend will see their first visit to the region, Langhorne Creek, for the much-anticipated Handpicked Festival which is returning after a two-year hiatus.

Well-known songs include My Gun, Hoops and The Best We Got, with singer Sam Margin "really pumped" to perform to local audiences, and hoping to squeeze in a local winery visit between sound checks at Lake Breeze Wines.

"We really are (excited); it's been a while since we've played a show," he said.

"We've been working on a new record, so have been really selective with new shows. "We're really looking forward to it."

Every time the alternative rock band travels to South Australia from Menangle, New South Wales, Margin is impressed by the crowds.

"We started touring (SA) on our first national tour back in 2011 or 2012... so we've always made an effort to get there," he said.

"We've always enjoyed the nightlife and the bars and the restaurants, which are amazing."

Margin joins the band of his brothers, Zaac and Elliott, and friends Scott Baldwin and William Zeglis.

The popular Australian group have been regulars in festival line-ups since their debut single in 2011.

They have now released four albums and have a decade of music to draw on when creating a set, with this weekend's Handpicked appearance including fan favourites from every album.

"We're in a lucky position now... we've got so much released material, we're able to just pick and choose," Margin said.

"Over this time, we've worked out how to put together a set that flows and feels good.

"With a festival set, we amp-up the energy a bit more, whereas a headline show you might bring things up and down, quiet and acoustic, (but) we want to create a bit of a party atmosphere for a festival; high-energy and hopefully all the songs that people are hoping to see."

Margin believes Handpicked Festival organisers have "put together something really special", with The Rubens joining a highly-anticipated line-up of artists including Hilltop Hoods, Babe Rainbow, The Dreggs, Hot Dub Time Machine, Middle Kids, Steph Strings and WAFIA.

"I'm actually looking forward to seeing all the familiar faces backstage," Margin said. "Being backstage, fans don't get to see that, but all the comraderie you have with other bands; we've all been through shared experiences.

"Hilltop Hoods obviously has a hugely energetic set, then closing it with a DJ, that's always great for the punters.

"It'll be great for us to get off stage not too late in the night, have a beer and go and watch the rest of it."

While live music has been opened for a while since the peak of COVID, Margin continues to be excited to perform at festivals again, and believes music fans still enjoy its novelty.

"I'm sure the punters are looking forward to the same vibe of just being in the same place, watching live music again," he said.

"I know we've been open for a while, but there still hasn't been a huge number of opportunities, especially in a festival capacity"

While the pandemic shut many live music opportunities, The Rubens were dealt a good hand

"We were one of the luckier bands to get a lot of touring done during COVID," Margin said.

"We were able to do seated venues, we got 20-something shows of the tour done, which is kind of crazy.

"The borders seemed to keep closing behind us as we went around the country."

After more than a decade in the

After more than a decade in the industry and multiple awards, including a recent APRA award for Most Performed Alternative Work and number one on the ARIA Albums Chart, Margin admits he can still experience moments of self-doubt.

"It's a learning curve, I have a combination of imposter syndrome and then, playing a show, I think 'actually no, we're pretty good at this," he said.

"I look back at where we were, say, five, six, seven years ago, and realise that we have improved heaps.

"It's from repetition and it's about learning to feed off the audience and make it so that every night isn't exactly the same, whether it's the interactions with the crowd or the performance itself."

He believes the band has "definitely evolved" and still finds performing "extremely enjoyable".

"If it wasn't super fun, I don't think we'd be able to handle doing it, being on the road together, but we have a ball," Margin said.

This week, the musicians have also been recording for their fifth album which will be released early next year, and are planning a national and overseas tour in 2023.

The local region will have an influx of visitors over the weekend when more than 7000 festivalgoers flock to Langhorne Creek for Handpicked Festival.

About one quarter of attendees will sleep overnight in Lake Breeze Wine's Tent City before meandering back home through local towns, and another quarter have booked buses from surrounding districts, selling out most accommodation providers between Murray Bridge to Victor Harbor.

"We believe it really injects money into the economy, but also puts the Fleurieu Peninsula on the map," organiser Kate Cooper said.

Held at Lake Breeze Wines, the festival started as a small backyard concert seven years ago, and since then, has brought in some big names such as John Butler, Matt Corby and Birds of Tokyo.

This year, the huge line-up has Australian favourites Hot Dub Time Machine, Hilltop Hoods, The Rubens, Middle Kids, Babe Rainbow, WAFIA, The Dreggs and Steph

"Hilltop Hoods are no doubt a crowd favourite," Ms Cooper said.

"I, however, believe that the line-up as a whole is very strong.

"Punters are going to see some of Australia's best artists all in the one space.

"Let's not lie, I'm pretty pumped to see The Dreggs live."

The "sensory experience" will include 13 market stalls, 20 food trucks, a hideaway space for parents and a cocktail forest.

Attendees to the sold-out event are

Budget cut leaves council in the lurch over Sugars Beach development

It's back to the drawing board for Alexandrina Council, which will have to reconsider funding plans for the Sugars Beach project following the discontinuation of the Building Better Regions Fund (BBRF).

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Labor's first Federal Budget since being elected axed the BBRF in favour of spending \$1 billion over three years for competitive grants in the growing regions, regional precincts and partnerships programs, leaving those who applied in Round 6 to miss out on \$250 million worth of grants to help crucial projects move forward.

This includes council, which applied for Federal Government funding for the Sugars Beach project under the latest round and will now have to reassess its options.

"We confirm council has been notified by the Federal Government that the program has been discontinued, however, council has been advised a new application can be submitted to the new Growing Regions Program," Council CEO, Nigel Morris, said.

"A report will be presented to council post-elections, with options regarding this project and associated funding.

"In determining the next steps, council will consider the outcomes of the public consultation in relation to this project."

The Goolwa Wharf redevelopment project is partially funded by previous BBRF rounds and remains unaffected by the program's axing.





Hail to the bus driver, bus driver man

Eastern Fleurieu School bus driver Brian Edwards – known as Bandy –hung up his keys for the last time after his final school drop-off last Tuesday.

"I enjoy working with children, I have done all my life with surf lifesaving," he said.

things they say and the things we talk about.

"They're treasures, absolute treasures.

"Kids are my life; I've always been working with them."

"My girls catch the bus... It's quite a highlight of the kids' day," she said.

"Bandy's really special; they purposely sit up the front to be engaged."

Georgia Drew's family created a

sign which read 'thank you Bandy' located along his route.

"He is just such a lovely, true gentleman with a big heart," she said.

"(He has) a soft spot for dogs too; my three-year-old blue heeler would launch himself up the steps into the bus for smooches from Bandy.

"We all just wanted a way to wish him all the best so I'm glad he had a nice send-off."

Bus driving was just one of the ways Mr Edwards integrated himself with local residents. The community-minded man was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) in 2019 for his 42 years of service to surf lifesaving with Port Elliot Surf Life Saving Club.

Mr Edwards will now enjoy retirement with Helen, his wife of 54 years, his two children and five grandchildren.

"At the moment, if I'm stressing about it, I just do homework, whereas if I'm not stressed, I don't do it, which is a bit bad, but it's working out because I've been practicing a lot with the past exams for the subject," Samuel said.

"And I've been spacing them out, so it's given me time to do it as an actual exam, mark it, then look at the questions I got wrong, and focus on those questions in the review books.

"Then I'm doing that process over (again), so it's making me a little bit more confident than I was a while ago."

Shaneika also sought the aid of her teachers.
"I've created cue cards for each chapter of the book and sections I personally struggle with" sha said

"I'm the same (as Samuel), with doing trial exam tests, then if I get a question wrong or don't understand it, I'm asking my teacher 'How am I doing this wrong? Can you explain it?'

"Then I'm trying to do a different test, but a bit similar, and seeing if I can improve my marks from the previous one."

Samuel received early entry into Tabor College for a Bachelor of Theology, which he will endeavour to complete before pursuing a secondary teaching degree, while Shaneika will spend the next year working or travelling before applying for Paramedic Science at Flinders University.

The pair hoped their peers enjoyed similar success.

"Don't feel discouraged if you don't get the grade you want because there's always alternatives to the pathway you want to go," Samuel said.

Principal Sam Cheesman felt proud of the Year 12 cohort no matter the results, particularly captains Samuel and Shaneika.

"Interestingly, I've seen these two in particular step up," he said.

"I know they feel nervous before, but they do come to believe in themselves, and I've seen them grow up as young adults and really admired the way in which they've developed as young people.

"They've taken courageous steps and enjoyed the success that's come from it, so they've really used their God-given talents and have gotten a lot out of their schooling."

The captains' parting words of advice for next year's graduating class were to believe in themselves and trust the process.

"Even if you're struggling at the moment, you're going to have a good outcome in the end," Shaneika said.

"High school is a big section of your life, but taking the exams is just one small part of it, so believe in yourself and don't leave things to the last minute."

Samuel added students should reach out to someone if they need help.

"There's also that wellbeing factor you definitely need to consider when going through Year 12, so I really think it's good to be able to talk to someone, so you don't feel as much of that load on you," he said.

"Just so you're not alone through this Year 12 process."

Mr Cheesman looked forward to seeing the great things the class of 2023 achieves. "We've got a bigger cohort next year," he said.

"I'm looking forward to them going through the same thing – they grow to believe

in themselves, they realise they are the older students and suddenly realise everybody does look up to them, and in that, they find a maturity from within and around them. "I like the way the students bonded together, so I'm really looking forward to the Year 11s bonding as well as I have seen the Year 12s bond this year."

SEEING RED: Mulgundawa family beefs up security after cow theft

It's been a difficult week for the Chandler family who had three Wagyu calves seemingly stolen from their Mulgundawa Dairy farm in the middle of the night.

The day-old newborn cows had only begun to enjoy life at the organic-certified dairy farm near Langhorne Creek when they were allegedly swiped from 'under the nose' of fifth-generation farmer Jessica Chandler and her family.

The suspected theft is thought to have occurred sometime between 6pm Sunday, October 30 and 4am Monday, October 31.

'We get up at four o'clock (to) check the paddocks and calves, and that's when we noticed the gate was wide open," Ms Chandler said.

"They're pretty crafty and we have had them jump out before, but it was the fact we had enclosed them in the shed with a lock, plus the gates had been locked, because we were expecting wet weather."

The calves had been reared as part of an ongoing Wagyu program, and were intended for sale once healthy enough.

Their sudden disappearance means the family is unable to meet their quota, resulting in a financial loss not only for them, but the rest of the supply chain.

However, the monetary shortfall comes secondary to the calves' health in Ms Chandler's eyes.

"They're quite fragile, so you've got to make sure you're feeding them within the right times," she said.

"They are like your children, and they rely on you since they are away from their mums physically, so you're pretty much acting as that second mum to them, and you need to be able to provide them what they would.

"That's the disappointing thing – you don't know where they've gone or if they're getting that right attention and care... but you hope for the best wherever they are."

While the family has no leads at the moment, the suspect/s are believed to be local or at least from the industry due to the timing of the incident.

"Unfortunately, it seems pretty coincidental that someone would come and take newborn calves - you'd have to know to some degree how to look after them," Ms Chandler said.

"You can't just chuck them in the back of them boot, you'd have to have a trailer.

"I think someone's scoped it out, and knew they got stored right next to the dairy, and took their chances when we weren't there.

"I get the appeal in them because the money's obviously there and it's good in beef prices at the minute, but it's just a horrible

Security measures at the farm have since been ramped up to prevent further theft.

It's the first time the family has had to implement these protocols, leaving them feeling "disappointed" and "annoyed".

"It's just unfortunate because we're fifth generation and in 70 years, it's never happened before," Ms Chandler said.

'Having to get keys and unlock things, it's just frustrating, but we're getting an electrician to put in cameras and CCTV, so we can watch it on our phones and get alerts if anything moves down there.

'It's just about stepping up that security

to make sure it doesn't happen again.

"It is a warning to other farmers to look out for their own stock; you just don't know what people are capable of."

The calves have yet to be found, but the family's message has been spread far and wide.

The initial post made to the Mulgundawa Dairy Facebook Page has been shared almost 400 times, which Ms Chandler was grateful for. She hoped the calves would be returned,

and asked anyone with information to contact the farm.

"People understand how much these animals mean to us and how distressing it is they've been taken in this manner," Ms Chandler said.

'That's why it's been so widely shared and talked about, which is amazing.

"It is what it is, and you keep on keeping on; it's all you can do."

Man arrested over **Murray Bridge assault**

A man was arrested for allegedly assaulting a woman at Murray Bridge last Wednesday.

Police were called to Lohmann Street just after 2.30pm on November 2 when a man allegedly attended a nearby house and assaulted a woman known to him.

The man was then seen staggering on the road by witnesses who contacted police to report his behaviour.

A 31-year-old man was arrested and charged with aggravated assault as a result.

He was taken to hospital for medical treatment, and will appear in court at a later date.

Police reassured the community no attempted carjacking or injuries were reported.

Man arrested over stolen motorbike

A Murray Bridge man was arrested over a stolen motorcycle on Monday.

At about 12pm on October 31, Murray Bridge police saw a pit bike being ridden on Frances Street before it was later found abandoned at a nearby home.

Officers conducted checks on the bike and discovered it had been stolen from Queensland in 2016.

Further enquiries located the alleged rider, who was found in possession of stolen clothing and an amount of methamphetamine.

The 29-year-old Murray Bridge man was arrested and charged with illegal use of a motor vehicle, unlawful possession, possessing a controlled drug, driving while disqualified, and driving unregistered and uninsured.

He was bailed to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court on December 7.

Hit-and-run driver caught at Murray **Bridge**

A man was arrested after allegedly committing a hit-and-run at Murray Bridge on Sunday.

The Southern Argus understands at about 5pm, a car collided with a motorcycle at the Adelaide Road and Old Princes Highway intersection before the driver left the scene.

A witness followed the driver for a short time to Bridge Street, where he stopped the suspect and removed the car keys, but the driver allegedly

The 55-year-old Murray Bridge East man presented himself to the local police station at about 9pm, where he submitted to a breath test and allegedly returned a reading of 0.232.

Further checks revealed the man was also disqualified from driving.

He was arrested and charged with aggravated causing harm by dangerous driving, leaving an accident scene after causing harm, aggravated driving without due care, and driving while disqualified.

The motorcyclist was taken to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

Driver to be sentenced over Strath tragedy

An elderly woman responsible for the death of her partner in a Strathalbyn collision last year pled the District Court to spare her from a jail sentence.

As previously reported in The Southern Argus, a Toyota four-wheel drive collided with a tree near the High Street and South Terrace intersection, severely injuring driver Marguerita Elizabeth, aged 70.

Her passenger and 'life partner' Paul sadly passed away from his injuries at Mount Barker Hospital.


Elizabeth, of St Marys, previously

Who's responsible?

In regards to the upgrading of the streetscape of Strathalbyn, the point made in your article that pavers are unsuitable for heavy vehicle traffic area can be seen in Mount Barker on the Hurling Drive, Albert Rd roundabout, where the pavers have sunk to a point where the council has filled in the depression with bitumen.

Another example of sunken pavers is the intersection of Hutchinson St and Morphett St, Mount Barker.

Your article explains that should the pavers in Strathalbyn need rectifying, the company who laid them will be held accountable for rectifying the problem, but in an atmosphere of building companies becoming insolvent, the council would have to pay for the repairs should the worst happen.

A more-needed traffic solution would be a safe pedestrian crossing on the corner of Dawson St and South Tce, where there has already been a fatality.

But it appears pretty pavers are higher on council's list of priorities than road safety.

Footpath cross-fall gradient

To allow sufficient drainage, footpaths should have minimum grade of 1:100 (1% fall).

To allow accessibility, the footpaths should have a maximum grade of 1:40 (2.5% fall).

If higher cross-fall up to 4% is required (about 1:25), it will be at the discretion of the city's engineer.

The above is for the City of Perth, but I doubt any other place has anything much different.

The question is, why hasn't problems with the footpaths also been included in the (Strathalbyn streetscape) upgrade?

At Swale Street on the south side, from the Sunter Street to the pub's bottle department, the cross-fall is excessive.

Only the replacement of some concrete pavers for different concrete pavers (I believe) is planned.

On the south side it has a kerb height of about 80mm – the minimum required is 150mm.

The footpath in front of my property has a cross path fall gradient of 1:10.

It is a massive amount above the

maximum suggested of 1:40.
With the minimum being 1:100. None

of those faults are being remedied.

The footpath is uncomfortable to walk

The footpath is uncomfortable to walk on (need one leg longer that the other), it is uncomfortable for a mobility scooter, as the slope is too great.

The cosmetics will be horrible too. The Commercial Hotel had their bottle shop exit extended a long way because some cars were scraping the road when exiting.

It gave council an opportunity to eliminate another carpark.

A simple grate would have been far less expensive and worked just as well and saved a fortune.

There is a nice new kerb around the abolished car park. The result is a kerb that looks good and is of the right height in front of the Commercial Hotel.

Apparently, my kerb will remain untouched, with the slope remaining at 1:10.

Just below my property a new kerb will be installed to narrow the road further with a new kerb.

I understand a kerb with a slope on the footpath will be way greater than would be considered acceptable.

It may also cause more vehicles to mount the kerb, potentially damaging my verandah posts.

So, I feel council is wasting massive amounts of ratepayer's money and not doing a proper job.

Also, considering council's declaration of a "Climate change Emergency" - why on earth concrete pavers?

Doesn't it know the manufacture of cement is one of the highest generators of CO2?

'MOVE IT, MOVE IT' to Monarto for new lemur exhibit

They once graced our screens as the fun, wide-eyed, ring-tailed King Julien in Madagascar, and now locals have a chance to get within tail's length of one of Australia's largest ring-tailed lemur troops at Monarto Safari Park.

Visitors can take an expedition through a 3.5-hectare habitat as the troop of 11 adult lemurs and four pups whip and zip from tree to tree or run between their feet.

The opening, this Monday, November 14, has been about three years coming, as the park has been settling the lemurs in the environment and with each other.


Monaro Safari Park Director, Peter Clark, said launching the experience is a "very significant milestone".

'Not only will it be an amazing way for our visitors to get up-close with a new species at Monarto Safari Park, but it is also the first experience to open in our Wild Africa precinct," he said.

"Land of the Lemurs is an insight into one of the world's most endangered primates and gives our visitors a chance to learn more about Zoos SA's conservation work and what we are doing to help species like the ringtailed lemur in the wild."

Innkeeper Katya Lindsay said lemurs live in a female-dominated society with dynamic family groups, and settled with each other before visitors were introduced.

"In the wild, because families will stick in a group, it's not really a natural instinct for them to accept new females in; that puts them in competition for resources and for



eating," she said.

"Introducing boys is a bit easier because eventually they will have to get kicked out of the main group and find other males.

"Even within the same family unit... there are hierarchies.

'We want to make sure they've got those strong bonds, because that's going to help them have that sense of security."

Ring-tailed lemurs inhabit the south-west corner of Madagascar and get their name from their black and white banded tail, which is around 60cm long.

Ms Lindsay said being from a "less hospitable part of Madagascar" makes lemurs "pretty resilient to lots of things".

"They're pretty confident around people," she said.

"They're very social animals, the young ones are very playful and bouncy, the old ones get lots of grooming and cuddling.

"They're very inquisitive about anything in their environment."

The species are classified by the IUCN Red List of Threatened Species as endangered with habitat loss and poaching the biggest threat to the wild population.

Along with the other 20 species of lemur, these are one of the world's most endangered group of primates, with 95 per cent of lemur

species threatened with extinction.

At Zoos SA, every entry ticket, animal experience, lemur adoption, or shop purchase helps support the conservation of species, like the ring-tailed lemur, in the

"There's just as many lemurs in zoos as there are in the wild; about 2000 in the wild and about 2000 in captivity," innkeeper Nicky Tomkinson said.

"Conservation is a big thing for the lemurs, hopefully we can educate everyone about how amazing they are and get some money together to send back to help our wild friends."

At Monarto Safari Park, lemurs are cohoused with the Tortoise Research Facility, with aldabra giant and radiated tortoises.

Ms Tomkinson said lemurs and tortoises often share the same space.

'(They were) recently introduced to each other, there was a bit of alarm bells and unsure of what they were, but in time they'll get used to them," she said.

"I have seen other zoos which have this configuration and there's lemurs sitting on top of tortoises."





"We all had a time which we really


appreciated, loved and enjoyed," Mr Telfer said.

"We can save peoples' lives and keep people safe, and I think it's an important thing to join.

"It's a great community group to get involved in."

Current volunteers include a "good mix of young, local lads" with various trades who volunteered their labour for the boat shed's interior.

"When we need to do jobs, they're there and they're great," the local Commodore said. said.

Mr Francis – who also encourages people to join Milang Regatta Club – said Milang Marine Search and Rescue Squadron currently has 28 volunteers, who can be on-call for emergencies.

Driving or joining a boat crew are just some of the roles available, others include

catering, monitoring communication system or helping with events.

As well as rescues, the group gets involved in community events such as Goolwa's upcoming South Australian Wooden Boat Festival.

"If we could get some new people, that would be great," Mr Francis said.

"The more members we've got, the more people involved, the easier it is to attract funding."

Alerts often come from SAPOL, or volunteers see people in trouble on the lake.

"Someone could get in trouble out there anytime," Mr Francis said.

"The lake can get very nasty.

"The wind can be quite treacherous when it picks up."

The Queen found her inspiration in Jesus Christ. Christians believe in the God who did not count the cost but freely gave all he had for us.

He sent his Son to us in our shame, who took the servant's role and made the sacrifice needed to set things right.

And Christians believe that we can do our duty and love God and all people with free hearts because his love has come to us.



REMEMBRANCE DAY Let We Forget

The community recently came out in droves to help the Macclesfield Returned Services League (RSL) Sub-Branch pause and reflect on its 80 years of history in town, ahead of Remembrance Day.

Established in March 1941, the Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch initially opened its doors to eight World War I veterans from the district who wanted a way to look after the young soldiers heading off to the 'new war' and their families.

The club has significantly expanded in size since that time, welcoming up to 180 members who share the RSL's communityoriented ideals.

"After the second World War, with a lot of returning veterans, it increased in size and it hung around the area of 30 to 40 people for most of its history – (all who) got involved in community projects within the town," Macclesfield RSL President, Dennis Oldenhove, said.

"I think that's been its strongest trait over the years - being community focused - and that's exactly where it's gone back to now.

"It had a bit of a lull in the 80s and 90s, where population declined as the number of, particularly World War II, veterans started to decrease.

"The club got down to about six or eight members again and they were looking to fold, but a couple of us younger veterans moved into the area and were allowed to get involved in the club in such a way that we could put new energy and enthusiasm into it.

"We've now increased the membership to between 160 and 180, so we're stronger than ever."

This is in part due to the club's extensive community engagement over the years.

Mr Oldenhove said the RSL gives back to community and vice versa.

We reached out to all the local sports clubs, (and) community clubs, and wherever they had activities, we would provide support, then in-kind, when we had activities, they would come support us," he said.

"We've created a store shed full of local assets that different community clubs can come and lean on... it saves them having to go out and buy resources or loan them from council.

"By engaging in all these different groups, when we need a bit of support, it all comes flooding back.

"It helps the fabric of the town because it gets groups and people from different areas of life engaging with each other."

The community's support for the RSL was never more evident than at the club's celebratory dinner for the major milestone on Saturday, October 29, with 120 guests gathering at the Institute Hall to acknowledge its long-standing history in the town.

The Macclesfield Netball Club helped by waitressing, while the football club ran the bar and the Royal Australian Navy Band provided live music.

Mr Oldenhove said it was a "fantastic" evening.

"It was delayed by COVID; we weren't able to do it at the actual time," he said.

"We picked this time, and it was good because it allowed people to be of the mindset where they're ready to come out and enjoy themselves, and break the shackles of COVID restrictions.

"We're now at the end where we've nearly lost the last of our World War II veterans, who were the sole reason for raising the club in the first place.

"We only have two left for our club, and it shows a significant milestone in that where it started (from) to where we are at the moment.

"It's worth pausing and reflecting on how much it does achieve, not only in the past, but now.

The club also took the opportunity to acknowledge several personal milestones on the night, including Robert McNamara who received the RSL League Service Award and

50 Years' Service certificate, Paul Lemar who received Life Membership, and Neil Wright, who was honoured for his outstanding service to the club since its establishment.

"As a seven-year-old boy, (Neil) rode around the district on horseback with his father, who was a World War I veteran, and the two of them rounded up the World War I veterans to raise the sub-branch in 1941," Mr Oldenhove said.

'So, he now volunteers with us, he's our Vice President, and... he represents the heart and soul of the club, given he was there from day one as a seven-year-old to now as an 87-year-old.

"He's still here and passionate about the club, so it was great to recognise his service over that time.'

Mr Oldenhove hoped to see the RSL continue to consolidate its membership over the next 80 years, and make improvements to its clubrooms.

"I would like to see the club be able to improve its facilities and clubrooms, so they're brought up to date and (to) modern standards," he said.

"So, we can provide a better and more veteran-specific environment, where people can come and enjoy the services we provide, both in social and welfare, and have a safe space where anybody in the community can come and feel like they're embraced."

Just after Clyde Malcolm Allender's 18th birthday in 1939, he joined the Army and was allocated to the Army Service Corps in recently declared war in Europe.

The Goolwa-born man went on to serve all but two weeks of World War 2, joining the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) as a pilot and flew a total of 1215 hours.

His story is one of 10 honoured in Macclesfield's ANZAC Memorial Garden's newly updated QR codes displayed around the path.

The project offers a self-guided tour to visitors, who can scan the codes and learn the stories of soldiers, reading their biographies, service records and photos.

Names of other veterans are also inscribed in the brick-path of the garden – managed by Macclesfield RSL – whose stories can be found on the Virtual War Memorial Australia website.

Macclesfield RSL President Dennis Oldenhove expects about 600 bricks and stories in total to be catalogued.

With support from residents and school members, the RSL is years into researching and collaborating information on local veterans, and Mr Oldenhove is expecting a further couple of years yet.

"We all say, 'we'll remember them', but we need to remember what they did, not just who they were, that's why a digital element takes us to another level," he said.

"These people did some amazing things or they led amazing lives; what they did needs to be

"Anybody can go onto the website and add their family's photos, add the story about their family member, they might have diaries, they might have photographs in their family's collection; they can put all of that on the website against their relative's name.

"It's a great resource for people wanting to find out about family members but also shares the family members' stories with everybody else and has it recorded and accessible in today's world."

Each soldier linked to a QR code is also associated with a characteristic, such as respect,

loyalty, service, mateship, and compassion.

Mr Oldenhove said those traits are role modelled to the younger generation.

"Everyone likes to think we demonstrate the Anzac spirit, (but) most of them don't know what that is... it's made up of all these characteristics," he said.

"We try to encourage young people to find a way to relate to those characteristics and make sure they're perpetuated in society.

"They're qualities that are important and we hope they embrace and continue to keep those characteristics strong in our community.

"If we can promote these characteristics in our young people, it makes us a better country."

Since 2009, veterans and members of the RSL Macclesfield Sub Branch have been developing the garden located near the Macclesfield Oval main entrance.

With donations of time, money and resources by local families, as well as government grants, the space has continually evolved and includes artworks, memorials and walking trails.

Mr Oldenhove said the native and flowering garden offers therapeutic outlet for some and acts as an educational resource.

"It's a good place for people to come and sit, have a safe space and at the same time commemorate the service of local men and women throughout the town's history," he said.

"You sit in the garden and all sorts of birds come around; it's a very peaceful place.

"Veterans find it a good spot to come and chillout and deal with their demons and with their PTSD."

The garden has a strong focus on women, with Mr Oldenhove committed to remembering a range of perspectives of the war.

"Women did so much, they made the planes, they made the ammunition, they were nurses, they were doctors," he said.

"They served in such a variety of roles but they were never put on war memorials."

Macclesfield planting fit for a Queen

Macclesfield community members put down roots of a special kind on Friday afternoon, taking a leaf out of her late Majesty the Queen's book by planting the first of many trees in the town's centre.

As part of the Australian Government's Planting Trees for the Queen's Jubilee Program, 15 - 20 advanced trees will provide shade at Macclesfield's Davenport Square, with the first planted on Friday, November 4.

The project is a partnership between the Macclesfield Community Association (MCA) and Macclesfield RSL Subbranch, with \$9600 in funding from the Australian Government allowing the community space to grow, aided by Mount Barker District Council's technical advice, support and maintenance.

A group of guests – including Macclesfield Primary School students, Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie, Member for Heysen Josh Teague, Mount Barker District Council Mayor Ann Ferguson, and fellow councillors – last week attended a special planting ceremony.

"This was a grant round that started back in February to commemorate the Queen's platinum Jubilee and 70 years of service to the Commonwealth," Ms Sharkie explained during the

all of them were successful, and what I particularly love about these trees is that all of us will get to see them grow and flourish and flower as the years go on."

MCA President Penny Worland told *The Southern Argus* a community survey revealed a want for more shade and trees at Davenport Square.

"The grant from the Planting Trees for the Queen's Jubilee program provided an opportunity to respond to that community request as well as create a planting that honours Her Majesty's 70 years as Australia's Head of State," she said.

"In the future when the trees are grown, there will be more shade for events, celebrations, performances and other gatherings in Davenport Square.

"The trees will also provide colour through flowers and autumn foliage, adding interest and beauty throughout the year.

"A mix of ornamental, (and) deciduous trees will be chosen with Mount Barker Council's Arborist so that they are suitable for the site conditions and provide seasonal colour."


The remaining trees will be planted at Macclesfield in Autumn 2023.
