The RAA has this week reported that the RAA says it has worked with Mid Murray Council to address the issue and work towards a long term solution.

It reported that work will commence to remove the SAPN transformer and remediate the footpath on Friday, April 12.

Furthermore, the RAA will meet with Council and the Truro and District Community Association next week to consider a long term proposal for the site.

have worked together to understand concerns and prioritise the investigation of options for Pioneer Park and the transformer," said RAA Charge, Program Director, Andrew Howard in a statement.

"SA Power Networks will remove the transformer ahead of ANZAC Day so the community can honour the service and sacrifices of service men and women at Pioneer Park."

MFS responds to fire at Tanunda

At 1.07pm on April 8, emergency services in approximately 30 minutes. responded to reports of a fire near Basedow Road at Tanunda.

On arrival, firefighters found grass and sawdust on fire near the train line at the rear of a commercial property.

Occupants of the property were using garden hoses to try and extinguish the fire. outside the property line and crossed over

One MFS appliance, three CFS appliances and one bulk water carrier were in attendance, and worked to control the fire further by SAPOL.

Firefighters worked to extinguish hot spots and watch for any reignition for a further 45 minutes.

There was no impact on the structure / building and no impact on machinery.

The fire was believed to have started to the rear of the property.

Williamstown supermarket gets the go


At its meeting on April 2, the Barossa Assessment Panel resolved to grant consent for a supermarket development on Queen Street, Williamstown to proceed.

Planning consent was granted to Beyond Ink Town Planning on behalf of Klose's Supermarkets to undertake the Variation of Development Authorisation to demolish existing structures and construct a new supermarket building, car park, earthworks, retaining walls, fencing, signage and associated landscaping, subject to some Reserved Matters, Conditions and advisory notes.

Planning consent was first granted for a supermarket project in May, 2021, but with some amendments made to the design to address shortcomings, a variation application was submitted.

The proposed development was subject to public notification, with 10 representations received, all of which were in support, with several noting some concerns.

The report notes that on balance, the proposed variation is an appropriate form of development in the Township Main Street Zone, and is sufficiently conducive to development in the locality, with an acceptable level of

'Vehemently opposed' to boundary reform proposal

If the Town of Gawler was successful in reforming the Council's boundary, it could secure the highly desirable areas of Concordia and Hewett.

With an inquiry currently before the South Australian Local Government Boundaries Commission, the contentious proposal, if successful, would have significant financial impact on both The Barossa and Light Regional councils, while also dividing the communities at ground level.

Speaking to The Leader, Mayor Bill O'Brien said Light Regional Council is "vehemently opposed" to the boundary reform proposal put on the table by the Town of Gawler.

"What it will do to our Council financially is dramatic, it will not make us unsustainable, but it would certainly go a long way in holding up the unbelievable future this region has and the projects it's got in line to deliver," Mayor O'Brien said.

"We were quoted at one stage by the Premier as probably the most progressive Council in the state, why would we want to tip the baby out with the bath water by all of a sudden putting this proposal in front of us? A proposal that could see us severely damaged..

Funded by ratepayer money, the independent inquiry spearheaded by the Town of Gawler would see Light Regional Council lose out on Hewett and face a financial blow of \$3.6 million annually from the 1429 rate paying properties within the

"Now, Mayor Redman and myself get on period, the Town of Gawler has justified

very well, we're good friends, so there's no personality involved in this, except that I admire her tenacity, but I don't admire her judgement at all," Mayor O'Brien said,

"I think her judgement in this matter is

way off... she hasn't read the room.
"The people out there, certainly in Hewett have no appetite for this at all and they're the ones who will be immediately affected with less services and higher rates – for what? To use services in Gawler that they have to

pay for anyway?"
"We've spent many millions on Hewett and trying to get it to the community that it is - they're not going to get those assets for free and where are they going to get the money from to buy them?

'Our Council developed Hewett in the first place, they didn't want to do it as a Council.

They never wanted to take the big step, but this Council did, well before my time and it was a very courageous decision.

"They made that decision and it's been extremely worthwhile – we have a wonderful suburb there and it fits into the look of our region.

'I think it's an absolute waste of time." Similarly, for The Barossa Council, procurement of Concordia would be detrimental – with \$1 billion in rate revenue on the line over a 30-year period according to The Barossa Council Mayor, Bim Lange.

'Concordia is Barossa, it's Barossian, not the Town of Gawler," Mayor Lange said.

"We absolutely applaud the Premier for releasing the land, but now we have Gawler knocking on the door, thinking that they're going to be able to take away a development which is worth a billion dollars to us over the next 30 years.

Throughout the ongoing consultation

the proposal by arguing that people in Hewett and Concordia choose to access services in Gawler, as opposed to towns in their respective council areas – a view that is strongly disputed by Mayor O'Brien and Mayor Lange

"It isn't (a) valid argument at all," Mayor Lange said.

"...We're a council that has a vision and it's very easy for a council like that to sit back and say it should be us.

"They see Concordia simply as a cash cow. "We see it as an opportunity to provide affordable housing within the Barossa."

While the independent inquiry conducted by BDU is still underway, Town of Gawler Mayor, Karen Redman said that there are many people in Hewett and Concordia that "believe themselves to be Gawler residents."

"That is a given because they're right on our boundary," Mayor Redman said.

"Back in 1985, Hewett was just being developed - we failed in moving Hewett into Gawler but that should have happened then.

'I represent Gawler and Gawler has not done well with developments on their doorstep and we need to realign our boundaries to bring people in.

There's going to be 25-26,000 people there, that would double the population of Gawler and we will be tripling in size over the next few years - so, we need to realign our boundaries to ensure that we provide the appropriate infrastructure and services that the people require."

Opening up larger discussions surrounding Local Government reform moving forward, both Mayor O'Brien and Mayor Lange agree that there is room for mature, collaborative

"What would be a better way of approaching this would be if all of the mayors sit down

and have a mature conversation about what local government is going to look like over the next 30 years... rather than just taking a piecemeal approach," Mayor Lange said.

We look for the opportunity for future conversations about cross regional collaboration and framework within the community in an inclusive way.

'That's the conversation we need to be having.

Mayor O'Brien added, "I think there are a lot of things councils can do better, our own Council included, we're well aware of that...

"We have great relationships with our neighbouring councils and we're prepared and have a track record of working with them, particularly the Barossa, and we want to build those relationships, not all of a sudden go into damage control where all we're doing is looking after ourselves and forgetting the big picture.

'Because that's what happens, we'd be in damage control for quite some time trying to work through this.

"It sounds like it's nothing, just a line on a map, but it's more than that.

In a statement issued to *The Leader*, a representative from the South Australian Local Government Boundaries Commission said the length of time that an inquiry can take, and the timing for the Commission to provide a report to the Minister, can vary according to the complexity of the proposal and the inquiry, including issues that the community and/or Councils may raise, that requires further investigation and consideration.

Noting that the inquiry into the Town of Gawler's proposal is in its early stages, and is a significant inquiry, it is expected that the Commission would be providing a report later in 2024," the representative concluded.

Main street upgrade confirmed for Mount Pleasant

Mount Pleasant's main street is scheduled for resurfacing next financial year, with Local Member for Schubert, Mrs Ashton Hurn MP, receiving confirmation after raising the condition of the street with Regional Roads Minister, Geoff Brock.

In a recent letter to Mrs Hurn it was advised that a '3.6 kilometre section of Eden Valley Road (Melrose Street), from west of the Tungkillo Road junction to the intersection of Fulwoods Road and Fromm Road is scheduled for resurfacing next financial year.'

Patching works were also completed in January to address the most immediate concerns.

Mrs Hurn said this news is a massive win for locals, tourists and freight.

"Melrose Street is a critical route for our region, and the condition of the road hasn't been up to scratch for a long time," she said.

"I doorknocked many people throughout the town, spoke to local businesses and truckies - no one was impressed with the condition, but we're now going to see action taken which is great news.

'We need to do everything we can to deliver safer, better regional roads - and while this is a great result, there's still much more to do right across the region."

"As the State Budget approaches I've also formally urged the government to invest more into our regional roads so we can see continuing investment in crucial road infrastructure in the regions.

"It's brilliant for the Southern Barossa and the Barossa Valley in general, because the southern area is perfect for such facilities with its proximity to Adelaide as well.

"The Southern Barossa has a lot to offer as well, not just Tanunda and Nuriootpa."

Ms Lohner said the potential of the announcement is two-fold, with Gather Round offering an economic injection into the area through tourism, and the facilities at the new Lyndoch facility providing infrastructure for the whole Barossa community and ongoing potential as a business and tourism drawcard.

"Locally, certainly all the businesses will get injections, the tourism industry, the bed and breakfasts, the hotels, restaurants, everything will benefit...

"Also being in the tourism industry, I work at a winery and certainly saw the injection of the amount of people coming from Adelaide for the day out, just from this year.

"So it was just very busy and if it's busy this year and I can imagine for next year, now with the announcement it will be a brilliant (economic) injection," Ms Lohner said.

The magnitude of the construction work required within a tight timeframe was not lost on Ms Lohner.

"They have taken a lot on, they being The Barossa Council, as well as the State Government, but I'm sure they will get it done now that the plans have been approved and the injection of funds too...

"It's been really great that The Barossa (Council) has purchased the additional land, saw the future and this will be a fantastic recreation park for the Barossa in the next 50 years."

the Lyndoch Recreational Park is a positive move forward for the Lyndoch township for several reasons," Mr Emms said.



Barossa growth plan draft spurs community engagement

Stockwell silos tipped for demolition as residents have their say

Almost 100 people turned out to attend a community meeting hosted by the Barossa Region Residents' Association (BRRA) at the Barossa Cellar, Vine Vale on Thursday, to share and discuss feedback on The Barossa Council Draft Growth and Investment

The evening provided an opportunity for BRRA members and the public to pose questions or comments about the strategy, which is currently open for community consultation until May 1, to a panel consisting of Jake McVicar, The Barossa Council's Director Development & Environmental Services; Aaron Curtis, Manager Development Services, The Barossa Council; and James Lindner, BRRA President.

BRRA provided attendees with a detailed summary of its position on the draft strategy, which includes opposition to the expansion of town boundaries, in particular for employment and tourism at Tanunda, Nuriootpa and Angaston.

Furthermore, BRRA's Cath Wills, who hosted the evening's question and answer session, added, "We believe that even the approaches to our individual townships are part of our special character, as is the rural space between our townships, therefore we don't support any growth strategies that propose placing developments adjacent to and outside the town boundaries.

residential sprawl, we also don't support those silos...'

employment lands, or what we used to call industrial zones, innovation zones, tourism development zones.

"We really appreciate the idea that the legislation set townships aside, and we love the idea of approaching a rural village, green space, approaching another rural village."

Topics raised with the panel by community members present included discussions around high density development fitting in with existing heritage overlays; signage; concerns around viable agricultural land being taken over by other development; the potential demolition of the Stockwell silos; affordable housing; and what considerations are being made around supporting infrastructure for

Panel members answered questions to the best of their knowledge, noting that some questions would need further follow up or directing to other sources. Of particular interest was the Stockwell silos, in which Jake McVicar deferred to site owner, Viterra as the relevant party making decisions regarding their future.

"I think its fair to say that we too were a little bit shocked when we got news of that, but unfortunately Viterra have made a commercial decision that they no longer need that infrastructure on their land," said

"Unfortunately demolition of those buildings don't require any form of approval through Council, so Council are generally "So it's not that we just don't support helpless I guess, when it comes to preserving

Specific topics aside, Jake provided broader comments acknowledging the eventual limits to growth in the Barossa, pointing to Concordia, Freeling, Roseworthy and Kapunda as being areas that would eventually do the "heavy lifting" in terms of the region's periphery expansion.

We are really fortunate in that we have the character preservation act and overlay in that there is only so much growth that can occur in the Barossa moving forward,"

"I guess what we're saying is, we have identified some opportunity for growth within the township boundaries, and whether that's appropriate, that's what we're here for, that's what we're on this journey for. We want to understand whether the community want growth, and to what level.'

James Lindner urged attendees to use the draft strategy's consultation period to seek solutions, and "see the big picture".

"Let's use this time to get the information you need to make informed decisions, use this time to help guide our Councillors, planners and Mayor around the Barossa you want in the future," he said.

The Leader has contacted Viterra to confirm or deny plans to demolish the Stockwell silos, but a response has not yet been provided.

Rockford Wines to facilitate complementary feedback sessions

To complement the BRRA community meeting held last week, a small group of family-owned wine businesses will aim to keep engagement flowing, with a further two information sessions regarding the Draft Growth and Investment Strategy to be held on April 17 and 18.

Linda Bowes and James March will facilitate the sessions on behalf of Rockford Wines, working with previous Barossa Vintage Festival Young Ambassadors to engage with their networks and encourage a younger generation to get involved.

James March said the wine industry has a responsibility to inform itself in terms of the proposals, and that the sessions would be an opportunity to break down some of the information to help attendees better understand the possible implications of the draft strategy.

Theatre group speeding to the stage with mystery show

This weekend, a group of very brave individuals will step onto the stage at the Mount Pleasant Soldiers Memorial Hall to take part in the Top of the Torrens Theatre (TOTT) Group's Mystery Show fundraiser for charity.

On Saturday afternoon, the group of around 30 to 40 people aged 14 to 76, will find out what show they are to perform, and then put together the entire production before curtain opens the following day.

Normally what the group would spend around three months putting together, with rehearsals two or three times a week, they are planning to pull off within 24 hours.

However, it will all be for a good cause as the event will fundraise for the Mount Pleasant CFS.

In the lead up to the performance, *The* Leader spoke with President, Matthew "Matt" Holding, as well as some of the cast, to find out a bit more about the concept, where the idea came from, and a sneak peek about what audiences can expect on Sunday.

Matt said the idea for a 24-hour show was first brought to the company by the previous President Gordon Combes.

"The idea is it's a workshop-type show, where everyone who's interested in being a part of it just gets together on the Saturday, literally the name of the show is pulled out of a hat," Matt said.

"Literally no one except the production manager knows what it is until then, and that's this guy, Gordon, and he's the only one who knows and he's keeping very tightlipped about it.

Matt also points out that every element of the show needs to be sourced within the timeframe, including the sets, props, costumes, lighting and sound, most of which will come from the group's existing inventory.

"Putting it on in 24 hours is challenging, it means a lot of improvising, (asking) 'what can we do in the way of building sets that are appropriate that set the scene?'," Matt said.

'We've got a shed full of bits and pieces down the road but exactly what we're going to need we won't know until the day."

Learning the entire script will also be quite the challenge in the span of just 24 hours, but luckily for the actors this will be accounted for when designing the production.

"They'll find ways, creative ways, of hiding their scripts, basically, too, because there's no way you can learn the whole thing in 24 hours," Matt said.

"So if it's (the show) something familiar, that might help quite a bit...but there could

"I'm looking forward to it, in a lot of ways from a tech perspective, with the lead up to a normal show, you've got a lot of stresses making sure everything's absolutely right..." Matt explained.

"...with this one we've just got the pressure of bam it's on, here's your script, let's get those lights up and connected and programmed and all that happening by Saturday night really so they can get on the stage Sunday morning and put it all together."

Another cast member, Kate Farrer, also told The Leader that the experience was anticipated to be "crazy but fun" and "terrifying and exciting."

A few weeks ago, on March 27, was World Theatre Day, so in the spirit of this, The Leader also asked Matt what it is that he enjoys most about being a part of productions such as these.

'I think it is the community spirit, the sense of all of (the) people pulling together and putting something on that's both entertaining and gives people a great sense of purpose as well, and it's something that you can do at any age...," Matt shared.

Archbishop to attend milestone Mass at Kapunda



Various events celebrating 175 years of faith and community will be held throughout 2024 to mark the anniversary, including the revival of the St Patrick's Day Picnic, which was held on March 17 and the marking of significant dates of patron saints and a special All Souls Day Mass at St John's cemetery.

Rich in history, Kapunda has one of the state's earliest Catholic parishes, established in 1849.

The early years of the area made a substantial contribution to the launch of Catholicism in the state and country.

the edge of Kapunda, 'the nursery of the Church in many parts of Australia'.

This was said to be due to the many Irish immigrants arriving, living and dispersing from the area.

Many Australian families can trace their Irish Catholic ancestral connections back to Kapunda and surrounding areas, including Northern Light parish priest, Father Mark Sexton.

St John's cemetery is the resting place for many departed souls and the quiet spot, surrounded by beautiful farmland, is also the burial site for many dedicated priests and religious patrons who served the parish through its 175 years history.


While the original St John's Church, presbytery buildings and original St Rose's Church have been long demolished, with other land and buildings sold for private use, the beautiful St Rose of Lima Church, nearby presbytery in Kapunda and cemetery at St John's continue to serve the community.

A light lunch is planned following the special Mass, to be held at the Kapunda Bowls Club on April 14, with bookings essential through the Parish office.


LEFT: The restored historic church bell came from the previous St Rose of Lima Church and was opened in 1866.

"That's the concept and certainly the driver behind this project for me."

Made possible thanks to the support of Enhance Barossa Mental Health and Barossa Fun Factory, which each donated a futsal goal, plus those who gave their time clearing the debris-covered tennis court, it is a wonderful achievement for the town.

"We're really, really happy that it's all come

"It was a real community effort and once the goals were funded, they were under the ownership of the Williamstown Action Group, before being donated to Williamstown Primary School, which is what brings them here today.

With special guest Mariah Lee, an All-Star from Adelaide United Football Club, cutting the ribbon and a welcome speech from The Barossa Council Mayor, Bim Lange, the opening was well attended by the com-

Looking forward, Matt hopes that the project will inspire others to implement something similar within their own communities.

"This isn't the only tennis court which isn't being used to its full potential... every community has a space, a bit of grass or a bit of bitumen, a safe area and all you need is two goals," Matt said.

"Once you have the goals, the kids will come, they'll bring a ball, they'll keep active and they'll do positive stuff rather than be bored and be tempted to do stuff that's not positive within their communities.

"So, I'm hoping this inspires people in the Barossa or even further afield to consider it for their community.

Vintage vehicles back in the Barossa

This weekend the Gawler Veteran, Vintage and Classic Vehicle Club Inc. will host its ninth annual vintage car rally through the Barossa region.

Starting at Gawler, the convoy of pre-1930 vehicles work their way up through the valley to Lyndoch, Tanunda and conclude at Nuriootpa, where the public is invited to come and view the display.

To learn a bit more about what will be happening at the Rally, how it started, and the kinds of vehicles that will be on display, *The Leader* caught up with one of the organisers, Gavin Launer, Trevor Evans, and Trevor's 1929 Citroen C6.

Gavin explains that the event started as a more mellow antidote to the Bay to Birdwood vintage car rally, which many older vehicles would struggle to take part in.

"It started because a lot of these old cars are getting older, hard to get parts, keep going, and we get people, like Trevor, and they're getting older and older and perhaps not confident driving," Gavin said.

Gavin said the Bay to Birdwood, which passes through metropolitan Adelaide and up the steep hills, was becoming too difficult for a lot of the cars, which with age were becoming more difficult to navigate through

heavy traffic, stoplights and up the hills.

"There's very few of the real old veteran and vintage cars going, so we've got a lot in our Gawler Car club, so we thought why not have a run from Gawler to the Barossa," Gavin said.

However, Gavin describes this rally as an "easy run, no hills, no traffic lights and a lovely setting, and take it from me, the first year we had about 15 to 20 cars and then it's slowly grown and grown."

Last year's event saw the group's best turnout yet, with 82 cars taking part, as well as about a dozen old motorbikes.

Gavin said this rally is strictly for vehicles from pre-1930, which he says are beautiful vehicles, but tend to not do so well against the traffic of today.

"They're not fast cars, and you sort of get them out on the open roads with brakes not too good, you've got to watch the traffic around you and people come behind you and beep, beep hurry up that sort of thing'," Gavin said.

Last year, the oldest car was made in 1902, and in the past, there has even been one of only two steam cars in the world taking part in the rally.

There are also some other very rare models which take part, Gavin said, many of which

would have ceased production during the Great Depression.

"For the general public who want to come (and see) some really old classic cars, there's a huge range, and there would be models there that people would never knew existed, and were only in production for a few years from say after World War I," Gavin said.

One vehicle which will be part of this weekend's rally is Trevor Evans's 1929 Citroen C6, which Trevor bought in 1988, and has rumours of a colourful past.

"I can't prove it...but the guy Î got it from said it had belonged to an Adelaide Bank robber." Trevor said.

While Trevor's extensive research hasn't yet proved the tale, it still makes for an interesting story.

Trevor's restoration work has also been extensive, which he says took 18 months and ranges from the engine to the upholstery on the seats.

Gavin adds that these kinds of vintage cars are becoming rarer on the roads, as are the people who know how to properly restore them!

"It really needs people like Trevor that really know how to maintain them and to drive them, that's why they're getting rare on the roads," Gavin said.

Sam's brave message

When 37-year-old Tanunda mum of two, Sam Bartsch felt a sharp pain in her breast after copping a wayward elbow from her one-year-old son, she initially thought he'd given her one heck of a 'corky'.

It was the week before Christmas last year, and as the days went by, Sam, an experienced exercise physiologist, knew something wasn't quite right.

"It hurt like nothing has hurt before. And I noticed over the days post that (happening) that there was a lump," Sam told The Leader last week.

After getting in to see her doctor between Christmas and New Year's Eve, several tests, including an ultrasound were ordered, which Sam underwent during the first week of January.

"You pick up on the vibe in the room, I suppose you could say, when they're doing the ultrasound specifically... I was in a bit of strife," said Sam.

"It wasn't something as straight forward as a cyst or anything like that... So that was pretty hard."

It took a further few days for Sam to have the diagnosis confirmed: she had stage three breast cancer, seemingly out of the blue with no recent family history, and too young to even qualify for routine mammograms.

It was a moment Sam describes quite simply as "horrible", followed by a few weeks of attempting to process and understand what was happening to her body and the treatment she was about to embark on.

Once you get that diagnosis it is that initial overwhelm, like how you're going to essentially function and where your support can come from and all that sort of stuff, and obviously what treatment you're going to need to do and how it's going to affect you, because it affects everybody so differently," shared Sam, who said she very quickly got taken on a "crash course" in understanding her particular cancer, known as 'invasive ductal carcinoma, triple negative', and what the treatment protocol would involve.

For Sam, it was straight into five months of chemotherapy, followed by surgery at some point later this year.

"I've just completed three months of weekly sessions, and I'll move on to eight weeks of fortnightly, so four different types of chemo drugs over that time, and then surgery," explained Sam.

"The concept is to shrink it down, and then remove it that way, versus removing it first then chasing it thereafter."

Understandably, it's been lot for Sam, her husband, Daniel and their two young sons, Harvey, aged four, and little Reuben, to come to terms with.

Just a few short months ago, Sam and Daniel had plans for family holidays and other activities with the boys, all of which have had to go on hold, and for Sam in particular, the year she was looking forward to has changed drastically.

"For me... I had just got back into 'life' after having children. I'd just had my first year back playing hockey, I was going back from maternity leave working for Daniel at the nursery now... And then having to essentially cancel life for almost this entire year," Sam said.

Naturally, as a mother, Sam's concern for her children in the wake of her diagnosis was also front of mind.

"They're four and 20 months now, so obviously we're concerned about the impact it's going to have on them, and who's going to essentially help me bring them up when I'm sick," she said.

many would know through Daniel's family has flowed, with family, friends and colleagues reaching out in whatever way they can. In particular, Sam and Daniel's parents, Carol and Graeme Schmidtke and Erica and Kevin Bartsch.

But support for the young family, who on greater responsibility with the boys, take on more household tasks, and still business, Barossa Nursery at Nuriootpa, run the business. I wouldn't be able to step back and stay in bed when I need to if he wasn't here."

Sam's breast cancer battle has also drawn some unexpected allies in the Garden Centres of South Australia "My mum basically quit her job, so she's (GCSA), of which Daniel, on behalf of

they nominated to be April 20, to raise funds for the McGrath Foundation," said

"They put their heads together and came up with this concept of 'Strike Me Pink Day', which was overwhelming in itself when I read that initial email. That did make me cry as well!"

Each nursery will fundraise on the day in its own way, and with a large production nursery also coming on board, many will have pink plants and flowers for sale specifically grown and distributed to support the cause.

"It was really, really, really good of them to do that," Sam emphasised.

"(On the day) all of our lovely staff with be there. A number of our current staff members have also been impacted by breast cancer, so it's obviously close to the team in that sense."

Meanwhile, Sam will continue to focus on her own health and family, and hopes that by bravely sharing her story, others may act on their own health concerns too.

"I've always been someone that has welcomed and encouraged people to be vigilant with their health, to listen to their bodies, to do what needs to be done to ensure that you can be the healthiest version of yourself possible," shared Sam.

"So this is somewhat natural for me to talk about it, and I want people to talk about (it) in the sense that this can happen, s**t can happen to you at any point in time, whether that is from an injury or an illness.

"If there's one person that reads (this) and goes, actually I do have something that looks sinister or I don't feel right, (then) they (might) go to the doctor and can get the diagnosis that they need...

"It happens, it's part of life and you've just got to know that you're not the only


here with me pretty much every day. Daniel Barossa Nursery, is the joint Chair. can continue to do what he needs to with support from Erica and Kevin," added Sam.

Bim celebrates 50 years in Local Government

The Barossa Council's Mayor, Michael Lange OAM, or "Bim" as he prefers to be known, in June this year celebrates 50 years in Local Government and for him, it has been an interesting and tremendously rewarding journey.

However, this modest man is not looking for praise for himself. Rather, he says without a doubt it is the dedicated people in our community that make his role so enjoyable.

He said these people volunteer for the betterment of our region. "They rock up and just get on with it, which is what makes the Barossa such a unique place," says Bim.

The local mayor, who is always beaming with excitement in his face, possesses a special ability to look past negative talk as he quickly turns a situation into a positive.

He admits to having a real passion and enthusiasm for what he does and thinks the Barossa, with its food, wine and lifestyle, are what makes our region so popular.

Early start to his career

Bim decided to leave school at the very early age of just 14 years.

Initially starting out with a shovel and then progressing to a loader operator, Bim had multiple jobs until he was aged about 22 when he gained what he described as his first real job. He met the late Mr Keith Davis, the then District Clerk at what was then The District Council of Barossa, based at Lyndoch.

Initially he joined the council's construction gang. Bim's uncle, Jim Bain was the foreman at the time and taught Bim so many valuable skills.

With opportunities and reeducation, promotion soon followed.

It wasn't long before Keith Davis asked if he would be willing to stay on in the works department, and eventually Bim became the council overseer after two years of study, much of it in his own time.

He went on to become Council's Bushfire Prevention Officer and was also CFS Group Officer.

"As I went into an office environment, using the photocopier was a little difficult at first but then I progressed to the computer and gadgets on my pushbike," said Bim. who is also well-known locally for his love of cycling.

When the late Don Bessell retired, Bim became the council's general inspector. He again took on further studies and remained in the role for six months, learning about road construction and civil work.

"I still like driving around and required in Local Government and looking at the roads I designed over the building didn't take long to fill. the years!" Bim said.

Credit to Judith

Bim credits himself fortunate enough to become Works Director with the support of Mrs Judith Jones, former CEO of The Barossa Council.

"She was a great support," he remarked.

He also travelled extensively with former Barossa Mayor, the late Brian Hurn, learning about leadership and the politics of Local Government from his mentor.

But things didn't always go to plan for council, like the Barossa Flood which hit every Barossa town in March, 1983.

It was said to be a once in 100 year flood and certainly took its toll on local homes and businesses.

Bim recalled visiting one such home which had been completely flooded, and Bim recalls the long process of rebuilding for the community.

Since then council has embarked on an extensive flood mitigation program at Angaston and Nuriootpa, with detention dams in numerous Barossa towns, and the Nuriootpa flood wall is a great example of latest technology in flood prevention.

Exciting developments

Bim cites the development of the former Oscar Linke property in Angaston main street and the Angaston Railway Station bike track among the many exciting projects Council became involved

"I was able to get grant money for the project but had to ensure none of the existing railway track was damaged. After this Council looked at the existing Angaston Railway Station and realised it had amazing potential for redevelopment and community use," said Bim.

"The late Brian Hurn, Mayor of The Barossa Council met with State Minister, Pat Conlon and in the end Minister Conlon agreed to the government gifting the land to council but the idea had to go to State Cabinet for approval.

"Brian Hurn and The Barossa Council worked really well on projects like that," he remarked.

Bim also recalled a number of challenging experiences, such as the relocation of Council offices from Angaston to the former Tarac building at Nuriootpa.

When council decided to move to new offices at Nuriootpa there was the thought, "Will we ever be able to fill this building?"

However, today there is so much more administration and reporting

The future for Council

With several former local councils amalgamating to form The Barossa Council, Bim said while there may be some negative comments about the idea of amalgamations, he thinks the current 68 councils in SA will have to consider further amalgamation because of the additional systems and processes, together with additional services and works required by councils in the future.

According to Bim, The Barossa Council area needs more growth to retain services and facilities.

"We still need young people, new opportunities for employment and options for affordable housing, especially with current rental prices," he added.

Reflecting on his time visiting Texas in the USA as part of the Grapevine Sister City delegation, Bim described how that state has become a tourism mecca.

The Barossa Council also hosted a Texan delegation and Bim says the visitors were fascinated by the amount of visible stars they could see in the sky when they came to the Barossa, and our food and wine

'The Barossa people have a real passion and enthusiasm with the best food, wine and lifestyle, while opening up our local reservoirs and parks for recreation and ecotourism has been a real jewel," said

"I think we need to market that even more," he added.

No time for retirement

Never one to stay still for long, on retiring from The Barossa Council Bim found new challenges consulting for Clare, Roxby Downs and Mid Murray councils.

In the back of his mind he always thought that he would like to run for four years as a Barossa Councillor. That was 10 years ago and today Bim is serving his fifth year as Mayor of The Barossa Council.

Respecting other people's opinion

Bim acknowledged the fact that he likes to respect other people's opinion on matters to do with council. However, he doesn't always agree with them but will sit and listen to their concerns.

"We are so blessed to live in the country we do, and yet there are those who have the mindset that everything is falling down around them," he said. "For me, a problem is just an opportunity to find a solution!

Ratepayers often have the idea of all kinds of things that they would like to see achieved, but Bim stressed the importance of balancing a budget. "If we had heaps of money we could solve all their problems but we just don't have all that additional money."

Everything in council is done based on its merit by the elected members while Bim adds, "We all have our own pet things we have to put the lens on to see what the community wants."

Always be honest and consistent

While Bim admits he has made mistakes over the years he tries not to repeat them.

"You have to be honest and consistent," he added.

Referring to the team behind him, Bim said, "We have some of the best staff I have ever seen at this council (The Barossa Council)."

Major achievements

Some of the major achievements "That's why I like reading the in his time include the initiation of

the Barossa Freight Route which diverts heavy vehicles away from travelling through major Barossa towns, and success in securing government funding to construct roundabouts on major Barossa intersections.

In more recent years Bim is so proud of The Big Project which has resulted in millions of dollars of Council and government funding directed to new facilities at every town recreation park owned by The Barossa Council.

A glowing Bim praised the work of his staff, saying they did the planning and when the government had the money they gave it to Council because Barossa was one of the few councils who were so advanced in their business plan for what has turned out to be amongst the most successful achievements by The Barossa Council.

With plenty more energy and vision to come, Bim concludes: "Looking back on what has been achieved, I sit at Tolley Reserve or the Train Park in Nuriootpa as it is known to some, and then I look at the Oscar Linke Reserve in Angaston main street, and I think to myself, "Well Bim, there is still a lot to be done!"

If you stand at the side of the pool and practise the movements of breaststroke and backstroke, you may become technically proficient, but you won't be able to swim.

At the last meeting of the German speaking group Kaffee und Kuchen, the guest speaker was Dr Heidi Kneebone, German scholar, linguist and teacher. She has worked on language curriculum and assessment in South Australia and in Queensland and is an accredited examiner for the Goethe Institute.

Her experience has led her to the certainty that language can only be assimilated through constant reinforcement.

An hour-long lesson every school day will not be enough for true language acquisition. In many schools in Europe, English is taught not as an isolated subject, but across the curriculum. For example, a History lesson will be conducted in English or a Physical Education class. For students to become bilingual this is essential.

At the Kaffee und Kuchen meeting Dr Kneebone spoke of her lifelong connection with the German language.

She was born in Austria and came to Australia as a child, with her parents.

Australia as a child, with her parents.

She studied German at school and continued those studies at university.

She spent some time in the university city of Freiburg, Germany's sunniest city, on the edge of the Black Forest and back in Australia she taught German to high school students and later at tertiary level.

In recent times she has been moderator

of Brisbane German Week and a committee member of Adelaide German Week.

Heidi's special area of interest has been the indigenous language gathering of the early German missionaries in South Australia and the Northern Territory. The instructions the missionaries had was to spread the Christian message and, in order to achieve that, to learn the language of the local people.

The pastors Klamor Schurmann and Christian Teichelmann arrived in South Australia in 1838 aboard the same ship as the colony's second Governor, George Gawler.

Gawler's successor, George Grey, forbade their preaching and teaching in the Kaurna language, an order the missionaries ignored.

They were soon joined by Samuel Klose and Heinrich Meyer, and schools were established on the Adelaide Plains and at Encounter Bay and Port Lincoln.

For the study of Aboriginal languages, the records they kept are crucial. In her study Dr Kneebone consulted and translated books, notes and letters that had not been examined before. Of special interest to her were the records of the Dieri language made by the Hermannsburg missionaries, first by Pastor Ernst Homan and the teacher Wilhelm Koch and later by their successors.

For the Aboriginal people it is not simply an exercise in history and linguistics. It has assisted the recovery and preservation of their language.

The next Kaffee und Kuchen meeting will be held on Monday, April 29 at the Langmeil Centre.

Retirement Living Council welcomes Act delay

The Retirement Living Council (RLC) has welcomed the Australian Government's decision to delay the commencement date of the new Aged Care Act.

Minister for Aged Care, Anika Wells, has also announced that the government is now considering feedback before it finalises its draft legislation.

"This is the best news we've had on this front for months." RLC Executive Director Daniel Gannon said.

'Genuine consultation on the Bill was a challenge from the outset and while the extended timeframe to provide submissions are yet to be drafted.

"Additionally, the delay in the release of the recommendations of the Aged Care Taskforce prevented a meaningful understanding of the holistic intentions for the future funding and provision of aged care services in Australia, which has flow-on impacts to the retirement living sector.

This has since been addressed with the recent release of the Taskforce's recommendations.

"For these reasons, deferring the commencement date for the new Act is an obvious and welcome development to ensure we get it right.

"Frankly, it's too important to get wrong," he said.

Mr Gannon said that retirement living operators fundamentally support the government's commitment to reforming the aged care sector to ensure older people who access government-funded aged care services are treated with the respect and dignity they deserve.

We welcome the renewed consumer focus was welcomed, key sections of the legislation in the provision of care, and the objectives to enable individual choice, sustainable funding arrangements, and to promote innovation in the aged care system, as referenced in the Bill," Mr Gannon said.

"Australia is experiencing a dramatic demographic shift, propelled by an ageing population. Over the course of the next decade and a half, the number of people aged over 75 is expected to increase by 70 per cent, with this cohort increasing from 2 million to 3.4 million.'

Be prepared for flu season

Thank you to our amazing referees for officiating our games with professionalism and watching the development of these young people over the season is fantastic.



McLennan wins Prestigous Fos Williams Medal

Tanunda footballing export Jez McLennan added to his list of sporting accolades with the Fos Williams Medal, as best on ground in the SANFL verses VFL state game, held at Glenelg Oval last Saturday, April 6.

The SANFL can again be acknowledged as Australia's best State League competition with a tenacious come from behind 14-point win against the VFL, getting home 10.5 (65) to 7.9 (51).

The Croweaters ran over the top of the Vics after half time, although they trailed by 13 points at the first interval.

The triumph was created from a dominant third term, kicking three unanswered goals in warm and sunny conditions

Earning its fifth straight win against the Big V, the State team drew upon an inspiring speech from 1994 State of Origin captain Chris McDermott.

"His speech was unbelievable – I felt like running through a brick wall after listening to him," Central District star Jez McLennan said after being announced as the Fos Williams Medallist.

"It was very inspiring and uplifting so we took that into the game to ensure we would not walk away with any regrets and that's the way we played."

Jez McLennan was SA's key defender, rebounding consistently when the side was under plenty of pressure in the first quarter.

McLennan finished with 26 possessions (15 kicks and 11 handballs) along with eight marks and a pair of tackles across half-back, being a high deserving winner of the Fos Williams Medal as SA's best player.

McLennan teamed up well with vicecaptain Max Proud and Sturt's Casey Voss in defence.

Central District has only previously had two other Fos Williams Medallists, Tony Lynn back in 1993 and seven-time premiership player Daniel Schell in 2006, who has a connection with BLG clubs Kapunda and Gawler Central through his father Geoff.

LYNDOCH OVAL GETS A \$40 MILLION INJECTION

AFL footy is coming to the Barossa, but not where it was expected to...

In an interesting and left field choice, the State Government has partnered with The Barossa Council to deliver the jointly-funded redevelopment of Lyndoch Recreation Park, with each contributing \$20 million, including support from the Barossa District Football and Netball Club.

"Now to turn their attention to hosting Gather Round next year is a huge reward.

"We congratulate the Council, the Barossa Light and Gawler Football Association and all local clubs in the region

"An important legacy of Gather Round is to improve football facilities right across the State

"This redevelopment at Lyndoch will provide state of the art facilities and two brand new AFL-standard ovals to cater for the growing number of young male and female footballers in the region."

Vice-captain of the side, Angaston's Miyu Endersby and her South Australia teammates started the Under 16 AFL Girls National Championship defence in emphatic style with a dominant and comfortable 63-point victory against Victoria Metro at Prospect Oval on Sunday morning.

The final scoreboard read SA 10.12 (72) to Victorian Metro 1.3 (9).

Endersby, who played in the state Under 16s Girls title winning team last season, played at centre half back and controlled their defence, was mentioned amongst the best players in this win.

Endersby, who played BLGW Under 16s with Angaston last season made her SANFLW debut with the Central District Bulldogs in round one this year.

South Australia will now take on the Western Australian girls in game two of the Under 16s Nationals at Thebarton Oval, on Sunday April 14, scheduled to start at 11.30am.

This means our Seniors will be buddying up with junior grades this year so they can share their knowledge and skills with them," the club said.


This will no doubt build on the 2023 season success enjoyed by the Club.




"Post-match presentations in the function centre space will be another opportunity to maximise the use of the facilities.

"We're hoping to see growth from each player this season and (we're) excited to see the new connections that build with our new line up."


